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REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

Our aims and objectives

Purpose and aims:

Our charity's purposes as set out in the objects contained in the company's memorandum of association are to:

Benefit the public by promoting the advancement of Christianity for the public benefit by such means as the trustees may from time to time determine.

The aims of our charity are to impact the world, inspire the communities and motivate the youths to stay on the Right track of life and fulfil all their God-given potentials regardless of cultural, ethnic or religious background. Our aims fully reflect the purposes that the charity was set up to further.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims.

We review our aims objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work in the previous 12 months. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those people we are set up to help. The review also helps us ensure our aim; objectives remained focused on our stated purposes. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

The Focus of our work

Our main objectives for the year is reaching out to the communities to impact the world around us and the advancement of Christianity for the public benefit as by such mean the trustees may from time to time determine. Our trustees had determined to focus on project that inspire the community and motivate children, young people, and adults to have a better life and stay on the Right track of life. The strategies we used to meet these objectives included:

Providing a range of services, which are reflective of relevant quality standards and address to empower children, young people and adults with relevant training, tutoring, creative social activities, sports activities, and the potential problems related to poverty, isolation, health and well-being. Providing tutoring classes and creative social activities for children with special educational needs, family day trip, social outing, and family support forum group for parents and carers who have children with additional needs or disabilities.

Focusing on evangelising the world's athletes for Christ and specially reaching out to the youth in the community through sport outreaches and Right Track programs.

Working in partnership with other organization and partners to secure the widest range of services that are available and best matches the needs of people in our communities.

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and whom we try to help are described below. All our charitable activities focus on reaching out to the communities to impact the world, the advancement of Christianity for the public benefit and the prevention of poverty and isolation by supporting our communities to have a better life.

Who used and benefited from our services?

Our funding limits the services we provide to the communities in London. Children, young people and adults in the community benefit from our project. Our project work is open to children, young people and adults. Children from the age of 5-16 years benefit from our Sports Club (football, basketball), tutorial classes and creative social activities for children with special needs (Destiny Children and Family Support project). Women and girls of all age including young adults benefit from fitness and mindfulness programs and also benefit from our counselling and mentoring referral service. Our funding limits those we can help, for example, our counselling and mentoring services is only by referral where we sign post client to other specialist organisation due to lack of funding. Demand for our services is limited by giving priority to our members or client from our partners' organisations and is also based on initial assessment of an individual's personal commitment to seeking help. Most of our services are provided free to our clients or a small fee as contribution to the cost.

Equal access to our services is important for us. In addition to our current monitoring of access to our services, we believe equal access to our services is vital to our success and that all communities that use our services must share successful outcomes. We are aware from the research undertaken in 2021 by our volunteer's team and also using data available on the national statistic website, that Black and minority ethnic communities are disproportionately represented in deprived areas of East and South East London. Social isolation and loneliness is a big problem in the communities which link to depression and other health related problems. We conducted another short survey in April 2022 by asking questions to parents and carers of children who are currently attending our Destiny Children SEN CLUB and to local special schools and we find out that 80% of the parent of children with Autism and other learning disabilities are socially and materially disadvantaged. Covid-19 has also affected many of our families and some of them still feel the impact of isolation and increase in the cost of living. Parents or carers are often socially and materially

disadvantaged because they cannot afford to pay for professional respite services or private tuition or social group of them or their children.

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REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (continued)

Children are more socially affected because of their complex communication needs where they are lonely home due to lack of accessible child activities available for them locally. Many parents and carers of children with special needs such as Autism, ADHD and other learning disabilities are isolated with their children from the local community because of lack of social network and lack of affordable activities for their children locally. However, Lay Witnesses for Christ International - United Kingdom are determined to change this and help people in our communities. We believe everyone deserves equal opportunities to socialise with others in the community, meet new people and learn something to help them in transforming their lives. In short, Lay Witnesses for Christ International-United Kingdom exist to empower and inspire children, young people and adults. We are currently running sports activities in Bromley and Orpington, Tutorial classes and creative social activities as an SEN Afterschool club for children with Special educational needs and support group for their families and training programs in Bromley to equip young people and adults with the skills, confidence and opportunities to realize their potentials.

Our vision is to impact the world and inspire the communities to motivate the youths to live a better life. We aim to run youth clubs and support groups, deliver creative and education programmes and facilitates mentoring schemes. Our methodology is creative, reflection and positive expression. An independent evaluation recently verified that this approach leads to a reduction of boredom and in offending. Further information about who benefit directly from our services is explained analysis of performance below and on our website.

However, the impact of our work goes far beyond those we help directly and include reducing the stress suffered by the families and friends of users. Some areas of our work, for example the LWFCI Sports Club, gave rise to positive sport awareness, mindfulness, and wellbeing. Our active liaison with local young people and families helped significantly in bringing the community together and has created better local understanding of our project work.

Another example is Destiny Children SEN Club and Family support group project which give opportunity to children with special educational needs and their families to meet regularly to learn new skills, develop their social communication and improved connection, integration and friendships among participants.

The main areas of our charitable activity are the provision of Sport activities, tutoring, social activities, support group, mentoring, for children, young people and adults. The activities, achievement and future plan of our work are described below.

LWFCI Sports Club (Sports project)

LWFCI Sports Club has been running since 2013 by offering sports activities to young people and adults in the communities of Hackney, Lewisham and Bromley. This project was initially funded by Sports England, Sported and Downham Assembly Fund of Lewisham council in 2014 and respectively by London Sports in 2015, Big Lottery awards for all, London Sports and Clarion futures (formerly known as Affinity Sutton) as part of the Clarion Housing Group managed by Ground work in year 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019, 2021 and 2022.

LWFCI Sports Club project is providing various activities of sports including Football, Exercise Fitness dance for women and girls, Yoga, basketball as well as everyday form of Sport inspiration. Women and Girls of all ages get the opportunity to Exercise and keep fit for life and to stay healthy and this session been running this year on zoom every Saturday from 10:30am-12:30pm. We also host Occasional Workshops on Health, as well as cooking for wellbeing.

Football is for all boys and girls aged 8-14 years, running every Saturday from 2pm -3:30pm in Orpington, at Harris Academy Football ground. This class is free to all Clarion residents, or £1 per session for all other residents. Our football club has been going from strength to strength with a weekly turnout of approximately 22 -25 boys and girls.

Inclusive **Basketball** for young people up to age 16 has been running successfully on Tuesday evenings in Bromley from 5.30pm - 6.30pm term time. We desperately want to get funding to expand this to 17-24-year-olds as our children are maturing and want to mix with their peers. Both football and basketball projects are inclusive sports projects giving equal opportunities to all children and young people of all abilities to play sport together and allow SEN children to engage in sports with other young people.

The aim of LWFCI Sports Club is to develop the health and wellbeing of young people, develop social and emotional skills, self-confidence, develop good behaviours and awareness of the love of God through sports, and promote sportsmanship and fitness in a non-competitive environment. This year, LWFCI Sports Club has been delivering football and basketball for children and young people, exercise dance and yoga for women and girls of all age group. We have seen a good change and personal development in young people from the areas of Downham, Bromley, Lewisham, St Mary Cray, Orpington and the surrounding area of Bromley. LWFCI Sport club is an effective vehicle through which personal and social development in young people and adults can be positively affected. LWFCI Sport Club has been helping to break down barriers in sports and build positive relationships between young and adults from different culture and different back ground. Young people have built a good relationship with their coaches who are their role model and have created new friendship with their peers.

The main achievements of LWFCI Sports Club have been bringing young people from different cultures to play together and create friendship with their peers in the community, building their confidence and improved fitness. LWFCI Sports club did reach most of the expected impacts by Promotion of health, fitness and well- being and also promote social integration and cohesive community. The main reason behind these successes was our active liaison with the local people and local organisation helped significantly in bringing the community together and has created better local understanding of our project work. LWFCI Sports Club has gone from strength to strength and is now beginning to establish itself as an inclusive quality Sports Club and we are looking to partner and affiliate with other approved sports academies for sports club development.

Despite changes in economic fortune, constantly changing youth work strategies and even changing demand of our club members, we have been able to provide weekly indoors and outdoors sport activities to young people and adults. We continue to work in Collaboration with Mytime Active, and Street Games and strengthen our working partnership with Kick London and the Sported to increase quality of the services we can jointly offer to the young people and our plan is to extend partnership working with other organizations. Our volunteers and staffs had the opportunity of having sport training delivered by Kick London and Street Games for sports development of our sports club.

In April 2019 we were awarded free tickets by Clarion Housing (Clarion Futures) and Breyer Group giving Opportunity to our members to have a day outing coach trip and watch a live Football match between- Halifax town and Leyton Orient FC in Leyton East London.

In October 2019, LWFCI Sports Club took part in a community football tournament in collaborations with Mytime Active, playing a tournament against MyFuture team as part of the Football Festival and Tournament. We were very pleased to see our team LWFCI Sports Club winning the tournament and the children were proud of their accomplishment. The Winning team received a Trophy and each team player received a medal and a T-shirt at the award ceremony.

We also had our fit and fed basketball session and sports award event in summer term to celebrate participants. Young people were presented with certificates of sportsmanship for their achievements while participating in our weekly inclusive basketball session. Thanks to our in house coach and Kick London coaches as well as our volunteers for your hard work and commitment in supporting our young people playing sports

Our Inclusive Basketball sessions allow young people of all abilities to play basketball for good health and wellbeing. They learn to develop social skills, good behaviours and awareness of the love of God through sports, promoting sportsmanship, and fitness in a non-competitive environment. Basketball continues to be an enjoyable and popular weekly club with our young people, with attendees gaining more confidence in their abilities as they progress over the weeks.

Our football club continue to run on weekly basis every Saturday providing opportunity to many children and young people to keep fit for life. The consistency of our sports project has helped to reach out to many young people with different abilities to stay connected while engaging in sport and socialise with other to improve their wellbeing, reduce obesity and isolation.

We continue our partnership work with *Fareshare* in collaboration with Tesco and Waitrose for food donation which is given to our sports club participants as part of our fit and fed scheme in conjunction with Street Games. The purpose of this initiative was to combat hunger among disadvantaged participants, by providing nutritious lunches for them to eat so that they don't go without. Thank you to Clarion Futures and Groundwork Tesco bag for help for providing funding to cover the costs of the football and basketball project during this year.

LWFCI -UK has more than 150 members on our registry who participate in our project work . We put in a lot of time in delivering Sport activities, Family Day outings, tutoring, creative social activities for children with special needs and support group for parents and cares as part of the Destiny Children SEN CLUB and Family Support Group. Successful growth of LWFCI Sports Club has been recognised by young people and local communities as we have received letter of support and word of appreciation from parents.

In 2022 we received grant funding form Clarion Futures, BBC Children in Needs, London Borough of Bromley, Bromley Children and Family Forum Voluntary Sector and in kind donation from members and partners who donated to support our charitable work via Global giving. These funding has enabled Lay Witnesses for Christ International - United Kingdom to provide sport activities, Tutoring and creative social activities for children with special needs and family support group, training program and services to disadvantaged children, young people, and adults in our communities. We are very grateful for their support and we couldn't achieved this without their support. These are project that we are currently delivering and hope to continue in the near future and moving forward.

Destiny Children and Family Supports Group

Destiny Children and family support group (known as Destiny Children SEN Club) is providing tutorial classes for children with special educational needs, providing support to children with Autism, ADHD and Speech and language difficulties and support group forum to their parents or carers. Destiny Children and Family Support project is led by a team of staff and volunteers, whom the majority are themselves parents or carers of children with special needs and learning disabilities. Sessions are currently running every week on Mondays from 5-7pm at Mountfield Community Centre as face-to-face activities drop-in session and every Wednesday from 5-7pm on zoom. Children and young people are encouraged to take part in a variety of creative social activities, from traditional games and table-football, sensory play, arts, and crafts activities.

The project started in summer 2014 supported by parents who contribute a small fee to cover the cost and later was awarded funding grant from the People's Health Trust (money raised by health wisdom trough the health lottery) in October 2015 for a year

project until October 2016. We later received funding from *Big lottery* award for all to run the project from November 2016-2017 and voluntary contribution from members and crowd funding from Global giving supporting this project until now.

In August 2018 the charity was fortunate in securing a 3 years funding from BBC Children in needs and in 2022 we also received another funding to extend the project for extra 1 years in Bromley with funding grant payable in yearly instalments. Destiny Children also offers a support forum group for their parents/carers both in person and online via our WhatsApp group

Since COVID our Wednesday club, is now, still an online Zoom session where the children enjoy sensory activities, arts, and crafts, singing and general social activities where they get to interact, discuss their week and receive supported and guided play from one of our specialist team. The zoom club started due to the lockdown of Covid-19 and our kids continue to enjoy it until now. The first hour being sensory play and an arts and craft project with all materials being bought by the club and delivered to each household by volunteers. It attracts a regular group of between 7 and 10 children who love the routine. Children learn to listen to others, ask questions, share their own ideas, and engage in discussion which involves turn taking. Our regulars really look forward to their Zoom club. We talk about upcoming events, the weather, how everyone is feeling and how their week has been then we go on to play bingo. The winner of bingo gets to choose a prize. After bingo we play an online game called Blooket. This is a fun game stealing gold from others whilst learning new information and learning how to lose. A few children have come from crying about losing to clapping others when they win. Playing these games and interacting with friends has been great for learning life and social skills. After Blooket we have a wonderful sibling of one of our members who has a great singing voice and volunteers her time to sing with the children. They each choose a song, and everyone sings along karaoke style! Our Zoom club is a great opportunity for our members who cannot access the face-to-face activities and has become something that the young people really look forward to. It has been an amazing forum for friendships to blossom as time is allowed at the end for socialising.

We have continued to provide our weekly face to face sessions of creative social activities for Children with Special Educational Needs every week on Mondays giving carers a short break. Our family support group continued to provide carers with beneficial information and support. We have arranged various family day outings and educational coach trips for the beneficiaries of Destiny Children's Project and their families, as part of the educational and fun activities which we run during the half term breaks.

Destiny Children and Family Support Group is currently funded by BBC Children in Need. We appreciate their funding for these beneficial projects. We have yet to get back in the groove with our Support Forum group for Parents and carers where formerly we met together on the 1st Monday of each month its now on a more ad hoc basis. We still meet and share information and personal experiences, learn new tips from professional guest speakers, network with each other, as well as meet new people. The Project was running monthly since November 2015, supporting families who have children with a range of disabilities such as Autism, ADHD, speech, and language difficulties as well as other learning disabilities. Lack of funding for core cost has meant that this important support group has become one of the COVID casualties, current meeting on ad hoc. We are desperate to restart this again but need more funding to support the demand.

We have seen positive outcomes, through our clubs. All our projects encourage social communication and bonds between children, their parents, and peers, and is helping children and young people to develop their self-esteem, improving social integration in the process. Children and Young people learn to connect more during social activities and Family Fun Day outings, encouraging friendships. Parents and their children get to spend quality time enjoying themselves, whilst on trips together. Children often learn to design and take turns in choosing topics to be covered during tutorial sessions, all of which build learning skills, encourage independence and choice, foster creativity, build leadership skills, as well as engage them more in their community. Encouraging teamwork and socialisation through group activities and increasing the amount of outdoor play and exploration time providing more opportunities for children to be creative and express themselves.

Monday Session (face to face SEN club)

The club takes place on Mondays between 5pm and 7pm at Mountfield Community Centre, and is for SEN children aged between 8 and 14 years. This club enables older children to participate in arts and craft, educational games, social fun activities, learn about life skills, outdoor play, as well as other activities for their age group. Children get the opportunity to engage in indoor play as well as outdoor play during the warmer seasons, giving them flexibility and choice, this club is well attended each week with children not only enjoying the activities on offer but the social aspect of it too.

Short Breaks and HAF 2022

We offer various **Short Breaks and HAF (Holidays, Activities, Food)** as part of the **Destiny Children SEN CLUB**, during school holidays, in partnership with BCFF (Bromley Children and Family Forum Voluntary Sector) for the past 3 years. The popularity of these free, full day sessions for parents of children with severe SEND has meant that we always have a waiting list. Thanks to the funding of BCFF and Bromley Council, we can offer a high percentage of spaces to children that require 1-1 and personal care which in our borough, it's very difficult to find a provider.

Our Short Breaks specialist provisions offer 'respite' short breaks which are intended to provide opportunities for children and young people with disabilities to have enjoyable experiences away from their primary carers, contributing to their social inclusion and personal and social development. They also provide the parents and carers of children and young people with disabilities with a necessary and valuable break from their caring responsibilities.

During February half term 2022 we had 2 days of enrichment activities with the lovely Ying Ying who engaged our children in Tai-chi. We also had Zumba dance for the 1st time with Marnie Carr and the amazing Captain Fantastic Children's Entertainment and Zebadee Kidz Parties who provided our children and young people with sensory and classic entertainment. We also had basketball, football and our own in-house activities such as sensory play, arts and crafts and many more activities led by our amazing staff Lay Witnesses for Christ International UK. Short Breaks allows our children and young people to engage with their peers whilst at the same time giving respite to parent/carers of children with special needs and disabilities in Bromley.

During the summer 2022, we took our children and families to have family swim at the West Wickham Swimming Pool. The whole teaching pool was for the private use of our SEND group. It was an unforgettable experience that so many benefitted from. Many children attending had never been in a swimming pool before! The excitement in the water was tangible and even the lifeguards were touched by the happiness on display from both children and adults, seeing that their parents are really enjoying it too. "It was very emotional to watch" The children were hungry after their swim, so we all walked to Scott's Kitchen in West Wickham High Street to enjoy a yummy lunch. Some of the young people had never experienced eating in a restaurant before and the hire of the venue by BCFFORUM made this possible. Thanks to Bromley Children & Families Voluntary Sector Forum supporting our Destiny children SEN Club.

Our HAF summer scheme participants enjoyed tai chi, face painting, football, basketball, team building games, arts and crafts, water play, film time, dancing with Magpie dance, dressing up and most importantly social interaction with each other and building friendships. We ended the summer with a surprise visit from the London Fire Brigade of the Orpington Fire Station. Our children were overjoyed to see the firemen and the fire engine and asked many questions.

The Project continues to run every week and support families who have children with a range of disabilities such as Autism, ADHD, speech and language difficulties as well as other learning disabilities, to learn and connect. Children and young people get support they need to boost their communication and learning development. During the Monday activities we encourage children to read, and play social games, sensory activities, speech, and language, as well as building relationships. We teach children how to manage anger and anxiety. Wednesday Activities consist of online activities such as bingo games, music, painting, and drawing, this is to encourage social skills, and development. Our children enjoy our clubs because we provide a warm and loving environment where they can be themselves, but also be supported to build confidence to overcome their challenges. The Family Support Forum Group gives parents and carers the opportunity to come together with the aim of exchanging and sharing information and experiences, as well as to discuss common issues. We try to arrange for professional guest speakers to attend meetings in order to provide information and support to our members. The Family Support Forum Group is a safe space for parent/carers to come together to exchange and share information and experiences as well as to discuss common issues. We try to arrange for professional guest speakers to attend meetings in order to provide information and support to our members. Attendees had the opportunity to network with each other and relax without the interruption of their children, who were busy learning and engaged in creative social activities at Destiny Children Club. In July 2022, we had a collaboration event (Embracing Diversity) with Your Voice and Health Social Care which was an open event to families from ethnic minority backgrounds who have children with special needs and disabilities in Bromley. Our members had opportunities to share ideas with other parent/carers and hear relevant information from senior members of Bromley Council and NHS representatives who were the guest speakers of the event giving opportunities to ask any questions about SEND Services in Bromley

Destiny Children and Family Support Group continues to grow, with the number of attendees increasing each year. We have been accumulating positive outcomes, through our clubs and have seen good changes and personal development among children and their families. We have had an eventful year by organizing and arranging various trips and activities for our members, as part of our Destiny Children's half term programme.

The project is increasing social communication and bonds between children, their parents, and peers, and is helping children and young people to develop good self - esteem, which improves social integration in the process. Children and Young people learn to connect more during social activities and Family Fun day outings, which encourages friendships. Parents and their children get to spend quality time enjoying themselves, whilst on trips together. Children often learn to design and take turns in choosing topics to be covered during tutorial sessions, all of which build learning skills, encourage independence and choice, foster creativity, build leadership skills, as well as engage them more in their community. This is an ongoing project and we are looking for funding to extend the project in the long run. As a charity, we also run in-house and online fundraising through global giving to raise fund for our family day outings and community outreaches.

Family Day Outings and Educational Day Trips - Outreach

We have had an eventful year by organizing and arranging various trips and activities for our members, as part of our Destiny Children's half term and summer holiday programme. It is always rewarding to witness the sheer joy and excitement of the children and their families on an enjoyable day out. Children and parents get the opportunity to form social bonds with each other as well as with other families.

Brighton Beach

Half term May 2022 ended with a day coach trip to Brighton Beach and an inclusive football for children and young people.

Christmas Party 2022

2022 was yet another amazing Christmas party put on by our staff from Destiny SEN Children Club Lay Witnesses for Christ International UK in partnership with Bromley Children and Family Forum. All the children had a blast and even got a gift from Santa and put on their very own Christmas show! There were so many fun games and activities to do from a disco, opening presents, playing, and making music and poems. It was a true joy! We ended the year 2022 by hosting our annual Christmas party for recipients of our project, for children and families to enjoy. Our SEN children club did a small performance and singing Christmas songs with everyone having a great time.

Thank you to all supporters, volunteers, staffs, and members supporting our charitable work throughout the year. A HUGE THANK YOU to all our sponsors and funders supporting our projects work this year and we look forward to year ahead and make more impact in our community. A huge thanks to all our funders as well as all our members and sponsors for their general support towards our organization, supporting our charitable work, we cannot achieve these without their supports. We are very grateful for their generosity.

Right Track Outreach

The Right Track Outreach work of the charity provides counselling, mentoring, information and motivation to young people and young adult in the community. This year our Right track outreach was put on hold due to difficulty in securing funding and as result, our target could not be reached, we were only able to support few young people through our Right Track program and basic online training during the year. Our strategies is to inspire the communities by providing specific project work in recognizing and talking to young people affected by poverty, isolation, loneliness, drug, alcohol and violence problem. We achieve this provision by a mixture of personal approaches, referrals and partnership working.

We hope to create the trust needed for children and young people to talk about their problem and seek help without feeling that they are being blamed or a risk of prosecution. By explaining the services available to them and by developing support networks, we hope to change and rescue lives from the misery of poverty, loneliness, isolation, drug, alcohol and abuse.

Partnership and Collaboration

This year we continue to work with BTSE -Bromley Well and Bromley Children & Families Voluntary Sector Forum as an associate member. We continue to work in close collaboration with the Voluntary and Community Sectors such as Bromley Community links, Bromley Mencap, Downham Assembly, Sported, Kicks London, Millwall community Trust, Revolution foundation, Street Games, partners' churches, sponsors and other organization and local council for collaboration and development of our community work. We are grateful for their support. Again, all grant received was restricted specifically to the LWFCI Sports Club project and Destiny Children and Family Support Group.

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REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (continued)

Right Track project has been on hold due to lack of secure funding and we continue to focus on Sport activities, Tutorial classes for children with Special Need, Family Support Group and continue to expand the recruitment of new voluntary team. Volunteers support the Right track project and we still seek for grant to fund this project and other project on hold. To date with have 12 volunteers including management committee members who have been given enormous time each week to volunteer and support our project work by giving their time and skills to the charitable work of the organisation.

Financial review

Against the backdrop of limited resources over funding, it has continued to be difficult to plan or develop our services. Nerveless the charity, with the aid of sound financial management and the support of trustees, partners and volunteers generated a positive financial outcome to deliver the Sports project , Destiny Children and Family Support Group, even though it was difficult to sustain all cost associated with office management cost.

Principal Funding sources

Aside from the income generated from fundraising activities and donations from partners and members, the principal funding sources for the charity are currently by the way of grant received and funding secured for this financial year was from the Big Lottery Award for all, BBC Children in Needs , London Sport , Clarion Futures and Ground work Tesco bag of help and crowd funding from Global giving and regular donations from Trustees. As a result of increasing constraints on donations, the charity has to look for different ways to raise money and seek for secure funding from a much broader organization of grant provider. The involvement of the charity with organization for voluntary and community Sector is providing particularly useful in identifying possible opportunity for a much wider range of funding for the future.

Investment Policy

Aside from retaining a very small amount in reserves each year most of the charity's fund are to be spent on project in the short term so there are few funds for the long-term investment. Having considered the options available, the Management committee has decided to reserve small amount that it has available in the bank for future expenses. Donations received are paid directly into the charity bank account and there is no interest with HSBC currently due to the balance in the account. A review of investment policies is therefore planned early in the new financial year.

Reserves Policy

The management committee has examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organization. It has established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held up by the charity should between 3 and 6 months of the expenditure. The reserves are needed to meet the working capital requirement of the charity and the Management committee are looking forward to set aside more reserve in the future to be able to continue with current and future activities of the charity in the events of a significant drop in funding.

Plan for future Periods

The charity plans continuing activities outlined above in the forthcoming years subject to satisfactory funding arrangements. Plans are also being developed to work on a number of schemes with local organization and local community centres for young people and adults in need of our services on our Training program, Tutoring services, Family support group, mentoring, counselling schemes, and sport activities which it is hoped will lead a long term benefit for the community.

The charity will also continue to work towards developing working partnership with other local organisation that provides a set of quality standards for the organizations in the sector. The charity will also work toward the continuing implementation of Sport Outreach, Tutoring services for children with special educational needs and support forum group for families and training skills as needed by the local people and specially the youths.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The organization is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 01st December 2011 and registered as a charity on 10th September 2012. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company, and it is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Recruitment of Appointment of Management Committee

The Directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's Articles is known as members of the Management Committee. Under requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members of the Management Committee are appointed by the chairman of the organization and re-elected as per the majority of vote at the Annual

General meeting. All member of the management Committee give their time of working as trustees voluntarily and received no salary from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in note of the accounts.

Due to the nature of the activities much of the charity's work inevitably focuses upon children, young people and adults. The Management Committee seeks to ensure that the needs of this group are reflected through the diversity of the trustee body. To enhance the potential pool of trustees, the charity advertise online and get recommendation from partner in the events of a particular skills being lost due to retirement or resignation, recommended individuals are approached to offer themselves for election to the Management committee.

Trustee Induction and Training

Most trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity having been encouraged to take up in house training and the Outreach work offered by the management as part of the charity membership open day. Additionally, new trustees are invited and encouraged to attend a series of short training sessions and meetings to familiarize themselves with the charity and the context within which it operates. The Chair of the Management Committee and the Executive Directors of the organization and cover jointly lead these:

- The obligations of Management Committee members.
- The main brochure documents which set out the operations framework for the charity including the Memorandum and Articles.
- Re-sourcing and the current financial position as set out in the latest financial account
- Future plans and objectives.

A question & Answer pack has also been prepared drawing information from the various Charity Commission publications signposted through the Commission's guide "The Essential Trustee" as a follow up to these sessions. This is distributed to all new trustees along with the Memorandum and Articles and the latest financial statements.

Risk Management

The Management Committee has conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. A risk register has been established and it will be updated at least annually. Where appropriate, procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity face. Significant external risks to funding have led to the development of a strategic plan, which will allow for the diversification of activities. Internal control risks are minimized by the implementation of procedures for authorization of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of members, volunteers and visitors to the premise.

Organisational Structure

Lay Witnesses for Christ International -United Kingdom have 5 Trustees (Directors) who made up to 5 management committee who meet Quarterly and monthly Skype or zoom meeting and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the committee has 4 members from a variety of professional background relevant to the work of the charity.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day today responsibilities for the provision of the services rest with the Chairman (National Director) along with the other Director in collaboration to manage the charity. The National Director is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met. The Operations Manager supported by directors have responsibilities for the day today operational management of the charity, individual supervision of the team members and volunteers, ensuring that the team continue to develop their skills and working practices in line with good practice.

Responsibilities of the Management Committee

Company laws require the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial Period. In preparing those financial statements the management committee should follow best practice and:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the Charities SORP and with applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the *going concern basis* unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

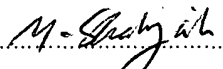
