Sunday Worship Services – These continued online for the first half of the year. Attendance was good, with a wide range of ages involved, and activities for children sent to families before the Sunday. Public, in-person meetings resumed on Sunday afternoons in summer 2021, and we went back to full, in-person Sunday morning services in Autumn 2021. These also continued to be available online. The in-person services took place in our new venue, which has much more space for social distancing.

Sunday Club (School) – For pre-school, infant and junior aged children. Whilst services were online, a video was produced each week, and age-appropriate teaching materials were sent to families for them to complete together, at home on Sunday mornings. In-person Sunday Club resumed with the re-start of Sunday morning services.

Wiggles & Giggles – It has not yet been possible to re-start our Parent/carer & Toddler group but we expect to do so.

Community Groups – Three groups, meeting weekly for friendship, group Bible study and prayer, continued on Zoom throughout the year.

Summer Holiday Club – This did not take place this year due to Covid, we hope to be able to re-start in 2022.

Night Light – A joint initiative with other churches in Brampton area, is a youth group aimed at those of secondary school age that meets on a Friday evening, fortnightly in term time. The group aims to create a fun and safe environment where young people can learn something of the Christian faith. The group continued on Zoom for the first half of the year, due to Covid, and resumed in-person in the Autumn.

Pathfinders – A group for secondary school aged children, meeting every Sunday afternoon in term time. This is aimed at those children who want some deeper Bible study in an informal environment, with food and games. The group continued on Zoom for the first half of the year, due to Covid, and resumed in-person in the Autumn.

Make & Mend – A weekly group, open to all, where people meet together while making and mending things (eg. sewing, making soap, etc). It provides an opportunity for people to learn from each other and to socialise, and is a good way of introducing people to the church community. This group continued weekly as a Whatsapp group.

Sunday Prayer meetings - In the summer months, before resuming full morning services, we had public in-person meetings, where people could listen to singing, hear from the Bible, and pray together. We used the opportunity to have longer interviews with members of the church each week, to hear about their experiences of Covid, and how God had sustained them during it. A wide range of experiences were shared.

Socials - we organised appropriate Covid-secure social activities, e.g. walks around Talkin Tarn, so that people could enjoy friendship together, and as a means to welcome newcomers to the Brampton area.

Public Benefit

We, as trustees, take our responsibility to ensure that our activities provide public benefit very seriously. We are confident that all the activities listed above provide such benefit. They are all open to members of the general public and are advertised in various ways.

We also very much encourage church attendants to invite friends and acquaintances to these activities and to serve the community in any way that they can. Some of our church services (e.g. Christmas) and the Christianity Explored course are especially geared towards those who might not normally come to church and give people an opportunity to learn more about the Christian Faith.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

2021 was another year of significant change for Bethesda Church, especially as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic. The year began with most church activity still online. Attendance at Sunday services, midweek *Community Groups*, and the *Pathfinders* group, was amazingly consistent. It has been a huge encouragement to see people persevere throughout the pandemic, and to see how much the church community means to people, that despite the limitations of Zoom and Facebook, people have made such an effort to join in and stay connected.

For Bible teaching, we focused on Jesus (in the Gospels) for Sundays, and New Testament teaching on the identity and purpose of the church in midweek groups. These encouraged folk to keep trusting Jesus, and helped the church to continue as a community during the pandemic, and be better equipped for church life after it. People really appreciated being able to meet together in-person, as Covid restrictions eased.

The importance and value of human relationships has become more clear, and simple things such as a chat over coffee after a service is more appreciated than before Covid. As Covid progressed, a significant proportion of the church moved away (15-20%) for family and work reasons. It was difficult to say farewell appropriately, whilst Covid restrictions were in place. Wonderfully, new people have joined, and it has been a good challenge to welcome them to Bethesda (and in some cases to Brampton too), whilst some restrictions were still in place. This made the Autumn, with the resumption of full in-person Sunday services, daunting, as it was more of a re-start of church than we envisioned when Covid first struck.

It has been wonderful to see people serving in new ways, as musicians, serving on welcome, refreshments, maintenance teams, leading Sunday Club, and contributing to Sunday services. Many have integrated well, and Sunday attendances are not too far below pre-Covid levels. It was a joy to see a relatively normal carol service, after so much change. A good number of newcomers have also joined in with midweek groups and are already a key part of the church community. Some folk still join online on Sundays, and we hope that they will be able to rejoin in-person in 2022. A few have drifted from any engagement with us, and we hope they will reconnect next year. There has been a general unity around church policies in light of Covid, which we are very grateful for.

Particular achievements include:

- Persevering with and improving church online. Worship services, Bible teaching and prayer were offered every Sunday. Materials for Sunday Club were provided for parents & carers each week. Playlists of encouraging Christian songs were produced weekly. Breaking of Bread services continued throughout the year. Church Facebook pages and the church website were regularly updated.
- Sunday meetings and services in-person resumed. New teams were formed to make services possible, risk assessments updated and Covid guidance followed. Sunday Club attracted encouraging numbers of children, numbers at Sunday services, on average, only about 10 lower per week than pre-Covid. The tech team made streaming of services from the new building possible, with 5-10 people joining in online on a typical Sunday. This has made it possible for everyone to continue to attend and be part of the church community. The opportunity for people to share their experience of Covid, and how God sustained them through it, was greatly appreciated.

- Midweek *Community Groups* continued online, with three groups meeting each week. Some groups welcomed newcomers over the year, which has helped friendship begin. These have been a very important means for people to grow in Bible knowledge over the pandemic.
- Knowledge and skill with various forms of IT continued to grow. Some of this will be very useful post-Covid, especially the use of 'hybrid' meetings to enable more people to join services and meetings in future.
- Progress towards sale of our older building slowed but did continue - much of the year was spent waiting for the Land Registry to process the paperwork we had submitted, which would then enable the sale to move forward. We expect progress towards sale to happen in 2022. The new building is still awaiting refurbishment, and progress also slowed due to the pandemic. However, detailed plans for the Mechanical and Electrical (M&E) works were developed, which is a big step towards determining costs and finalising the plans for the whole project. We hope to make significant progress with the project in 2022.
- Trustees adapted policies and risk assessments rapidly in light of changing government guidance and the changing impact of Covid. We are grateful for national church groupings that were able to communicate with government, and provide clear guidance for churches.
- Financial support for the church remained quite strong despite the pandemic. We did experience a drop in income as some members of the church moved away, but we had sufficient reserves to continue all our ministries. We hope that as newcomers settle in, they will be glad to support financially. Some members also diverted some giving towards the building fund, which impacted the general fund, but is helping the building project to move forward. Our reserves enable us to continue to plan our usual range of ministries for 2022, and we hope that income will increase over the year.

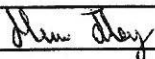
