## **2. Trustees' report**

### **2.1. Structure, governance and management**

The name of the organisation is Brighter Future Foundation. The organisation is an unincorporated body. It was governed by a trust deed dating from 23 September 2012. Trustee selection method: Trustees are appointed and reappointed annually at the general meeting held in June. The trustees present their annual report for the year 31 March 2023 and confirm that the accounts complied with the charity's constitution.

#### **2.1. Objectives and activities**

The aims of the charity are:

- to relieve sickness and to preserve the health and welfares of the people of Myanmar by providing and assisting in the provision of equipment, education and support services not normally provided by the government organisations,
- to advance the education of the health care professionals and public in health care in Myanmar by the provision of educational lectures and fora, and
- to support the undergraduate and post-graduate medical education and training in medical institutes of Myanmar by assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and provision of lectures, ancillary to those provided by the government authorities.

### **2.3. Achievement and Performance**

#### **(1) Support to build the Safe Hospital for internally displaced people**

Many health care facilities in north-west and in ethnic controlled areas have been targeted and attacked by the military air forces since February 2021. For more details, please visit

A funding of £50,000 was provided to build a hospital designed in such a way to provide a safe environment for health workers and patients.

#### **(2) Collaboration with Royal College of Surgeons (Edinburgh)**

This project works on the development of undergraduate medical education platform in non-military controlled areas. Their newly agreed integrated curriculum was piloted in Karenni medical schools and the other 6 non-military medical schools in Jan 2025.

The second cohort in Karenni Medical School was recruited in a January intake, but the actual school opening was delayed to April 2025 due to increased bombing attacks in the region. During this reporting period, the project had good opportunity for engagement with the regional institutions and diaspora communities.

The Training of Clinical Educators (ToCE) for the Technical Capacity Unit of the Ethnic Health System Strengthening Group (EHSSG) educators and nurse educators was provided.

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### **(3) Continued collaboration with Cambridge Global Health Partnership (CGHP) to improve access to health services by provision of Telehealth Services in Myanmar**

A continued support was provided for Telehealth services. The Cambridge team focused on establishing a telemedicine consultation service to fill the gap that was left in medical consultations in the immediate aftermath of the military coup. By the end of December 2025, a total of 6,481 teleconsultations were provided, and nearly 3,366 patients were new (66% of new patients were from conflict-affected areas). 23 new healthcare workers were recruited and trained for the telemedicine programme.

### **(4) Continued collaboration with Myanmar-UK GP Alliances (MUGA) for quality improvement of General Practitioners in Myanmar**

The Royal College of General Practitioners worked under three different workstreams focused on different aspects of strengthening GP education and working GPs in Myanmar. The first workstream focused on delivering educational webinars on specific topics, accessible to a wide range of GPs. The second workstream delivered Quality Improvement courses, focused on training master trainers that can cascade down training to others. During this reporting period,

Quality improvement (QI) to Myanmar GPs through Myanmar GP Education

- 4 QI Introductory Courses to 66 Myanmar GPs were delivered.
- Monthly webinars for Myanmar doctors in collaboration with Myanmar GP Education were provided.
- 50 clinical resources have been uploaded to Myanmar GP education website and there were 1400 new users to the website in the previous six months.
- QI circles (8-10 GPs in one circle) had their monthly meetings for the collaborative learning and 12 circles were active in this reporting period.

Quality improvement in Mae Tao clinic (MTC), Mae Sot, Tak Province, Thailand

- QI training to 25 health professionals from ethnic health organisations.
- Two QI audits were conducted on diabetic care and medicine record charts and discussed for implementation on improvement and re-auditing.
- Monthly QI sessions with 30 health staff were conducted to support the development of QI plans within the clinic.
- Online workshops were done for MTC staff for case reviews and building consultation skill.

### **(6) Humanitarian support in conflict affected areas in Myanmar**

A continued support was provided to the individuals and families of displaced people affected by the conflict. This support has been used to distribute cash, food, medicines and shelter in

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different parts of the country. A disastrous earthquake hit Sagaing and Mandalay region on 28<sup>th</sup> March 2025 and hundreds of people died and thousands displaced. Emergency aid and shelter assistance was provided through local community responders.

The total amount spent for humanitarian response during this period was around £95,000.

**2.4. Public benefits**





- to advance the education of the health care professionals and public in health care in Myanmar by the provision of educational lectures and fora, and
- to support the undergraduate and post-graduate medical education and training in medical institutes of Myanmar by assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and provision of lectures, ancillary to those provided by the government authorities.

### **2.3. Achievement and Performance**

#### **(1) Support for emergency medicines and medical equipment needed in health facilities in conflict affected areas.**

The political instability and intensifying arms resistance against the military coup on 1 February 2021 has led to increased numbers of civilians being displaced. The health services under Myanmar Military Council cannot deliver the health needs of the displaced population. Their health service is delivered by ethnic health organisations and the Ministry of Health of National Unity Government.

Emergency medicines, equipment including ultrasounds, operation theatre devices and hygiene kits were supplied to clinics and mobile hospitals in Sagaing, Magway, Bago and Tanintharyi regions.

#### **(2) Support to build the Health Facilities in Karen and Karenni**

Many health care facilities have been targeted and attacked by the military air forces since February 2021. This includes many frontline hospitals. We have supported the building of two hospitals in Karen and Karenni areas.

**(3) Training on prosthetic and orthotic production and fixation to set up a rehabilitation clinic in Mae Tao clinic**



A collaboration has been made with a French organisation and French technicians in December 2023 to provide a 6-days training on prosthetic and orthotic production and fixation. A total of 13 health workers have been trained from South Eastern part of Myanmar and a total of 30 patients were reviewed for revision of old limbs or fixation of new limbs.

**(4) Continued collaboration with Cambridge Global Health Partnership (CGHP) to improve access to health services by provision of Telehealth Services in Myanmar**

A continued support was provided for Telehealth services. The Cambridge team focused on establishing a telemedicine consultation service to fill the gap that was left in medical consultations in the immediate aftermath of the military coup. Over the course of the programme, it has gone from Telegram channels to a bespoke professional telemedicine service with its own electronic medical records system. Towards the end of the programme, it also began assisting EHOs in establishing further telemedicine services.

The project took advantage of the virtual component of its telemedicine platform by putting in significant effort to make it more accessible for those in ethnic regions. Currently, the telemedicine service is running 24 specialist clinics and four general clinics, with nearly 190 volunteers from Asia and Europe.

By the end of December 2023, A total of 70,797 consultations through the telemedicine service during the programme was held, with 12,263 new patients utilising the telemedicine service; of these, 3,970 patients were from the ethnic regions.

**(5) Continued collaboration with Myanmar-UK GP Alliances (MUGA) for quality improvement of General Practitioners in Myanmar**

The Royal College of General Practitioners worked under three different workstreams focused on different aspects of strengthening GP education and working GPs in Myanmar. The first workstream focused on delivering educational webinars on specific topics, accessible to a wide range of GPs. The second workstream delivered Quality Improvement courses, focused on training master trainers that can cascade down training to others. The last workstream worked closely with the Myanmar GP Education (formerly Myanmar Association of General Practitioners) to improve their organisational capacity.

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The team provided 17 bi-monthly webinars on a wide variety of medical topics and 3,362 GPs joined the whole series of webinars to get the up-to-date knowledge in medical practices. The project estimated around 84,050 patients benefitted from GPs who got the up-to-date medical knowledge through those webinars. 39% of webinar attendees were female GPs and 29.4% were from the states/regions other than major cities (Yangon and Mandalay)

#### (6) Humanitarian support in conflict affected areas in Myanmar

A support has been given to internally displaced people affected by the widespread conflict in Myanmar. Following table describes the number of people reached for different forms of assistance during the reporting period. The total amount in GBP is equivalent to £168,526.





## 2. Trustees' report

### 2.1. Structure, governance and management

The name of the organisation is Brighter Future Foundation. The organisation is an unincorporated body. It was governed by a trust deed dating from 23 September 2012. Trustee selection method: Trustees are appointed and reappointed annually at the general meeting held in June. The trustees present their annual report for the year 31 March 2023 and confirm that the accounts complied with the charity's constitution.

### 2.1. Objectives and activities

The aims of the charity are:

- to relieve sickness and to preserve the health and welfares of the people of Myanmar by providing and assisting in the provision of equipment, education and support services not normally provided by the government organisations,
- to advance the education of the health care professionals and public in health care in Myanmar by the provision of educational lectures and fora, and
- to support the undergraduate and post-graduate medical education and training in medical institutes of Myanmar by assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and provision of lectures, ancillary to those provided by the government authorities.

### 2.3. Achievement and Performance

#### (1) Support of COVID-19 Vaccination Program in Conflict Affected Areas in Myanmar

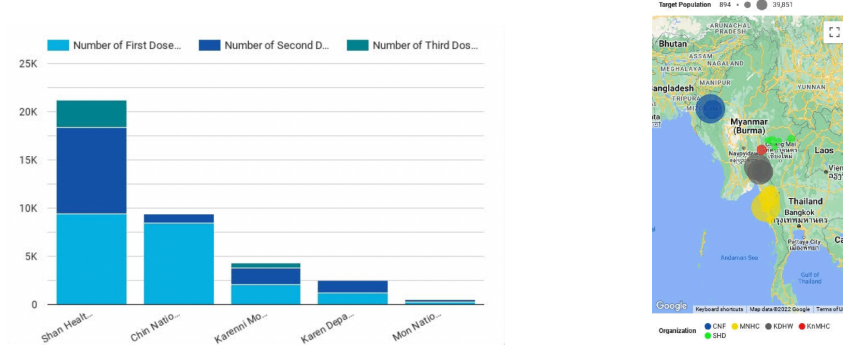
During the pandemic COVID-19 in 2021-2022, the COVID-19 vaccines were not available for civilians living in conflict-affected areas. The vaccines delivered from COVAX, co-led by GAVI only delivered vaccines to the Myanmar Military council's administrative areas. To respond to this crisis, Brighter Future Foundation received funding from Suu Foundation to help deliver COVID-19 vaccination through COVID-19 Task Force (CTF), which is formed with ethnic health organisations and Ministry of Health, National Unity Government. Between March and August 2022, GBP 37217.89 delivered 37,716 total COVID-19 doses to adults living in Chin, Mon, Karen, Karenni and Shan states. A further USD 50,000 delivered total COVID-19 immunisation of >6000 doses in three townships in Chin State from October 2022 to February 2023.

**(2) Support for emergency medicines and medical equipment needed in health facilities in conflict affected areas.**

The political instability and intensifying arms resistance against the military coup on 1 February 2021 has led to increased numbers of civilians being displaced. The recent OHCHR report stated >2.6 million are displaced internally. The health services under Myanmar Military Council cannot deliver the health needs of the displaced population. Their health service is delivered by ethnic health organisations and the Ministry of Health of National Unity Government.

We supported a total of £134384 to purchase essential medicines, medical equipment (portable X-rays, Portable Ultrasounds, Operation theatre equipment) and emergency medical kits for frontline medics, which were distributed to frontline hospitals across Myanmar.

### **(3) Support to build the Health Facility in Northern Rakhine**

A funding of £10000 was distributed towards the building of a new one-storey 30-bed hospital in Northern Rakhine area.



### **(4) Continued collaboration with Cambridge Global Health Partnership (CGHP) to improve access to health services by provision of Telehealth Services in Myanmar**

A continued support was provided for Telehealth services. By December 2022, the total number of teleconsultations had reached 106,000. An HIV/AIDS online specialist clinic opened in November, bringing the number of specialist clinics to 36, and general clinics to 4, operating with more than 200 volunteers and project staff. The population in 319 out of 330 townships are being served.

The telemedicine programme Facebook page increased the number of followers to 347,421 and health education messages and posts reached 1,450,000 people. In addition, the Tele-Kyannar YouTube channel was launched in December 2022 and four short health education videos in Burmese language were now in the channel.

### **(5) Continued collaboration with Myanmar-UK GP Alliances (MUGA) for quality improvement of General Practitioners in Myanmar**

Myanmar GPs are continued to be supported by the Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP) through different types of training and provision of medical supply. The types of training include:

1. Educational Webinars: Twice monthly webinars have been running on a wide variety of medical topics orientated to general practice, with the RCGP collaborating with the RCP including Myanmar diaspora. Almost 50% of webinars are in the Myanmar language. Feedback is taken after every webinar and the partnership is exploring the feasibility and acceptability of pre and post webinar short knowledge assessments.
2. The Quality Improvement (QI) Programme: The second QI Introduction Course of 2022 was completed at the end of September and 15 Certificates of completion awarded to participants at the beginning of October 2022.
  - 2 Consultation Skills sessions in October 2022 - **15 participants**
  - 1 Group Facilitator session - **12 participants** in preparation for the GPE/RCGP QI Workshop
  - The GP Education group QI Workshop - **100 participants, 12 Myanmar QI facilitators and 3 RCGP trainers.**

3. **Organisational Development:** The RCGP Trainers continue to work with the executive committee of the Myanmar Association of General Practice (MAGP) to provide training and support for it to develop as an organisation. The group of **13 MAGP Executives** involved in this course continue to be well engaged and have attended formal teaching sessions and monthly tutorials on topics such as:
4. **Teamwork:** Creating goals and sustaining effective teams. Exploring what makes a good team, defining team roles and how to make teams more effective. Belbin Team roles were organised for members of the MAGP team and explored how to make teams more balanced.
5. **Motivation and Change Management.**

**(6) Humanitarian support in conflict affected areas in Myanmar**

**(a) Karenni**

Following the coup in February 2021, conflicts broke out between local Karenni resistance groups and the military across Karenni State and Pehkon township of Shan State, leading to increased numbers of internally displaced people. Among the seven townships in Karenni state, Demoso townships has the highest numbers of internally displaced people at approximately 35,000, followed by Loikaw township at around 20,000 and Pruso township at around 10,000. Other townships have less than 10,000 each.

Through our local partners, a support worth of GBP 10,000 was provided to 200 households in Demoso township with food and non-food items as proposed. The areas covered were Daw Ngan Khar, Daw Tama Nge, and Ngwe Taung villages. These villages suffered some of the heaviest damages with houses, churches, and schools destroyed by the military junta's indiscriminate shelling and intentional destruction with fire. Thousands of villagers were forced to flee for refuge far away from their homes.

Rice was the main food item supported. Other food items supported included salted fish, chili, and garlic. For non-food items, we provided tarpaulins for shelter, household kits including kitchenware, mats, solar lamps, and blankets.

**(b) Rice Distribution Project for Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in Sagaing, Myanmar**

The project's successful implementation, in collaboration with dedicated implementing partners, facilitated the provision of critically needed one-time emergency rice distribution to a total of **148,507** internally displaced persons (IDPs) **across 171 villages** spanning 16 townships within the Sagaing region.





### **2.1. Structure, governance and management**

Trustee selection method: Trustees are appointed and reappointed annually at the general meeting held in June. The trustees present their annual report for the year 31 March 2022 and confirm that the accounts complied with the charity's constitution.

#### **2.1. Objectives and activities**

The aims of the charity are:

- to relieve sickness and to preserve the health and welfares of the people of Myanmar by providing and assisting in the provision of equipment, education and support services not normally provided by the government organisations,
- to advance the education of the health care professionals and public in health care in Myanmar by the provision of educational lectures and fora, and
- to support the undergraduate and post-graduate medical education and training in medical institutes of Myanmar by assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and provision of lectures, ancillary to those provided by the government authorities.

#### **2.3. Achievement and Performance**

##### **(1) Provision of Essential Health Care Services in Myanmar**

Myanmar (Burma) faced two emergencies - a military coup and the COVID-19 pandemic in 2021. Its health system struggled to contain the COVID-19 pandemic. As of February 9, 2021, the country officially recorded more than 141,000 cases and over 3,100 deaths. Prior to the coup, millions of people in Myanmar already lacked access to affordable quality health care. In 2018, 76.4% of health expenditure was covered by out-of-pocket payments and government health expenditure represented just 16.7 % of total health expenditure (Ministry of Health and Sports, 2020).

In the wake of the coup, the civil servants, including doctors and nurses, went on strike known as civil disobedience movement, in defiance of military coup. The medical professionals were refusing to work for the military, leaving hospitals and other health facilities understaffed. COVID-19 response activities, including prevention, treatment, and vaccination programs, faced significant disruptions. To respond to this crisis, Brighter Future Foundation received funding from Citizens of Burma to help deliver essential medicine and services to poor and vulnerable communities.

With our funding, we supported a network of 10 community clinics across Myanmar to provide financial support to the community clinics for the initial refurbishment and set up of the clinic facilities, procurement of medicines and supplies for essential health care services and subsistence support for medical doctors, nurses, midwives and volunteers in each clinic. This project has enabled the local community clinics to serve up to 62000 patients during the grant period.

### **(2) Support to build the Operation theatre in a Kachin hospital, Myanmar**

A funding of £21000 was distributed to establish a new operation theatre complex at the Laiza General Hospital in Kachin state. This donation was used to procure a new operation table, operating theatre lamp, operating instruments, and a new portable X-ray machine.



### **(3) Funding to purchase COVID-19 vaccines for 100 people**

Myanmar was hit with a third wave of COVID-19 in July 2021, resulting in thousands of deaths with shortage of COVID-19 vaccines in the country. We donated funds to vaccinate 100 adult population in Karen state, Myanmar.

### **(4) Humanitarian and emergency medical supplies support to IDPs in Karenni state, Myanmar**

Following the coup in February 2021, conflicts broke out between local Karenni resistance groups and the military across Karenni State and Pehkon township of Shan State, leading to increased numbers of internally displaced people. Among the seven townships in Karenni state, Demoso townships has the highest numbers of IDPs at approximately 35,000, followed by Loikaw township at around 20,000 and Pruso township at around 10,000.

Shadaw township has about 1200 displaced persons, or 208 households taking refuge in the border area near Thailand. In August 2021, we were requested to fund the urgent humanitarian needs in Shadaw township, Karenni state by Karenni Health Organization. With the funds donated by AMFA, a support was provided to 208 households in Shadaw township with 200 sacks of rice at 45 kilogram per sack, salted fish, canned fish, dried chili, garlic, onion, noodles, cooking oil, and salt, tarpaulins for shelter, household kits including kitchenware, mats, solar lamps, blankets, and medical and hygiene items such as Covid 19 test kits, antibiotics, and hand soaps.

### **(5) Collaboration with Cambridge Global Health Partnership (CGHP) to improve access to health services**

A partnership was agreed with Cambridge Global Health Partnership to support the setting up of online Tele-health services in Myanmar in June 2021. It helped with the development of virtual digital platforms and to recruit specialists and medical volunteers. The Tele- health services provided general clinics and 23 specialist clinics. The service has reached the population residing in 319 out of 330 townships in the country.

### **(6) Collaboration with Myanmar UK GP Alliances (MUGA)**

General Practitioners from Myanmar and UK have been working together for over a decade for the capacity building and quality improvement of GP practices. In 2021, two groups formed an alliance called MUGA, which received funding from the UKAID. Brighter Future Foundation served as an intermediary for the effective and transparent funding flow from the UK to Myanmar GPs for various training activities. Using this funding, twice monthly webinars were organised where 200-300 Myanmar GPs joined and also provided the quality improvement training to 343 GP. In addition, more advanced QI facilitator training was delivered to 12 GPs and 6 months Organisational Development Training to 22 GPs.

All activities carried out by Brighter Future Foundation were carefully planned and implemented with an interest in healthcare delivery improvement for the people of the Union of Myanmar. In addition, trustees believe that the UK counterparts would gain global health experience by volunteering in Myanmar and would bring back their experience to daily work practice in the UK for improvement of the patients care in the UK.





## **2. Trustees' report**

### **2.1 Structure, governance and management**

The name of the organisation is Brighter Future Foundation. The organisation is an unincorporated body. It was governed by a trust deed dating from 23 September 2012.

Trustee selection method: Trustees are appointed and reappointed annually at the general meeting held in June.

The trustees present their annual report for the year 31 March 2021 and confirm that the accounts are comply with the charity's constitution.

### **2.2 Objectives and activities**

The aims of the charity are

- to relieve sickness and to preserve the health of the patients of public hospital in Myanmar by providing and assisting in the provision of equipment and support services not normally provided by the statutory authority
- to advance the education of the health care professionals and public in health care in Myanmar by the provision of educational lectures and fora
- to support the undergraduate and postgraduate medical education and training in medical institutes of Myanmar by assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and provision of lectures, ancillary to those provided by the statutory authorities

## 2.3 Achievement and Performance

Brighter Future Foundation's activities in 2020-2021 were mostly related to COVID-19 support to healthcare professionals and patients in Myanmar.

### (1) Donation of PPE, masks, alcohol gels and anti-bacterial wipes for healthcare professionals in Myanmar

The Ministry of Health and Sports have limited resources and the provision of personal protective materials such as masks and gowns was inadequate for healthcare professionals. Brighter Future Foundation raised funds and donated KN-95 masks, N-95 masks, surgical masks and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to healthcare staff at different hospitals.

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In addition to above protective materials, anti-bacterial hand gels and bacterial wipes were donated to above hospitals.

## **(2) Donation of funds to set up oxygen plants in different parts of Myanmar in collaboration with Witharkhar Foundation, Myanmar**

Brighter Future Foundation raised funds together with the diaspora around the world and the local charity Witharkhar to address the shortage of oxygen supply in hospitals around the country by purchasing and setting up oxygen plants. Together we raised £38223.57 (in UK and abroad). Witharkhar Foundation carried out the needs assessment at each hospital to set up a suitable sized oxygen plant for corresponding bed-sized hospitals in different parts of the country. Together, we have managed to set up 16 oxygen plants in the country.

## **(4) Donation of portable ventilator and repair of four ventilators at ICU, Yangon General Hospital**

Newport HT 70 Plus (COVIDEN) portable ventilator was donated to the Intensive Care Unit, Yangon General Hospital on 9<sup>th</sup> October 2020. We learned that there were four Drager ventilators which were broken down and left to no use. Therefore, we funded the parts to replace those ventilators and now those ventilators are now in use.



#### **(5) Donation of high flow nasal oxygen concentrators and accessories**

Two high flow nasal oxygen concentrators and accessories (air circuit and Optiflow interface) were procured from UK based Fisher and Paykel company on 09/11/20 and were sent to Myanmar. Those were donated to Yangon General Hospital and South Okkalapa Hospital to manage severely ill COVID-19 patients.

#### **(6) Donation of oxygen cylinder trolleys**

Most hospitals in Myanmar do not have liquid oxygen plants. They heavily rely on portable oxygen cylinders to treat patients who need oxygen. With an increasing number of patients requiring oxygen therapy during COVID-19, the traffic of oxygen cylinder transport around hospitals was escalating. There were some hospitals where cylinders had to be carried around. For both health and safety and logistic reasons, Brighter Future Foundation designed the cylinders carriers using a local manufacturer and donated 50 single-cylinder carriers to Yangon General Hospital as a start-up project. These carriers have eased the oxygen cylinders transport process and improved patient safety.



**(6) Donation of cleaning equipment**

Due to the COVID-19 outbreak, the number of patients turnover in Yangon General Hospital, the biggest tertiary hospital in Myanmar, became significantly high. The hospital faced a shortage of cleaning staff and cleaning equipment. Brighter Future Foundation helped the hospital by donating following cleaning equipment worth £6770.

### **(7) Donation of meals to healthcare professionals managing COVID-19 in Yangon**

Since the COVID-19 outbreak started in Myanmar, almost all healthcare professionals stayed in hospital provided accommodations to avoid the spread of the virus to their families. They have limited time and space to solve for their meal's requirements. Brighter Future Foundation sponsored part of the health care workers meals at Yangon General Hospital from 16<sup>th</sup> September 2020 to 6<sup>th</sup> February 2021. We supported 100-160 meal boxes per time, 3 times per week with a total meals of 8312.

### **(8) Development of MSc (Family Medicine) course in Myanmar in collaboration with the Ministry of Health & Sports, Myanmar, Royal College of General Practitioners, UK and Brighter Future Foundation**

With an aid of Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCDO), UK, Brighter Future Foundation funded £19,000 to support MoHS-RCGP collaborative work for the development of MSc (Family Medicine) course, which is to be launched first time in Myanmar in April 2020. The team from RCGP visited Myanmar for the baseline assessment and provided the recommendations to the MSc Family Medicine development committee.

### **(9) Health of Older People in Yangon: A systems approach (HOPE-YGN)**

This project completed quantitative data collection and one in-country visit to commence qualitative data collection. Since February 2021, this project has been on hold due to the situation in Myanmar. The UK-based research team is

in the process of analysing the data previously collected for reporting and publication.

## 2.4 Public benefits

All activities carried out by Brighter Future Foundation were carefully planned and implemented with an interest in healthcare delivery improvement for the people of the Union of Myanmar. In addition, trustees believe that the UK counterparts would gain global health experience by volunteering in Myanmar and would bring back their experience to daily work practice in the UK for improvement of the patients care in the UK.

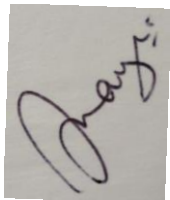
