ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Liberty Annual Report 2024

Celebrating 25 Years of Impact

In 2024, Liberty marked 25 years of transforming lives—empowering communities physically, mentally, and spiritually. Over the years, the charity has grown significantly, now offering:

- A week-long Annual Outreach programme.
- Mini Liberty Outreaches in villages and towns.
- Secondary School Outreaches across multiple regions.
- Cell Groups that provide support and mentorship.
- The Liberty Academy, focused on business empowerment.
- Free education for over 400 students across one secondary school and two nursery and primary schools.

Liberty Nigeria Activities

In 2024, Liberty continued its mission of transforming lives through free education, business empowerment, secondary school outreaches, pastoral and free healthcare. Our impact spanned across rural and urban communities in Oyo, Lagos, and Osun states in Nigeria. This report highlights our achievements, growth, and the lives touched through our various initiatives.

1. Education Initiatives

1.1 Free Education Programme

Liberty Nigeria operates two schools offering free education:

Covenant Nursery and Primary School, Imini Village, Oyo State

- **Pupils Enrolled:** 217
- **Teaching Staff:** 11
- **Non-Teaching Staff:** 1

Covenant Nursery, Primary and College, Sepeteri Village, Oyo State

- **Nursery/Primary Pupils:** 183
- **College Students:** 18
- **Teaching Staff (Primary & College):** 15

1.2 Activities and Achievements

- Regular PTA meetings and evangelism activities at both schools.
- Easter Retreat at Imini School with free food distributed to attendees as part of our poverty reduction strategy.
- Participation in Oyo State Government's deworming and Vitamin A vaccination programmes.

- 15 pupils passed the State Common Entrance Examination and transitioned to secondary schools.
- Successful maize harvest at Imini School farm. This project provided the students with an insight on how to grow crops and farm management.

1.3 Infrastructure and Resource Development

- Toilet repairs and plumbing upgrades at Imini School.
- Installation of 5 computers and burglary-proofing of the computer room at Sepeteri School.
- Acquisition of textbooks and science equipment for Sepeteri School.
- Purchase of a drum set for Sepeteri School.

2. Business Empowerment

2.1 Liberty Academy year.

The academy had a great year. Two groups of students (Batch 4 and 5) completed a 6-month apprenticeship where they learned useful technical skills. Many of them have now started their own businesses or found jobs in different industries. During the graduation ceremony, a new ALUMNI team was inaugurated, led by Busayo Adesiyan. Video Animation skill for photography, web-development and digital marketing students was introduced to the curriculum. Also, **Ascion Microfinance Bank** hosted a special session to teach social skills to both current and former student.

- **Skill Acquisition Training:** 47 students trained in:
 - Web Development
 - Fashion designing
 - Photograph
 - Make-up
 - Hairdressing
 - Digital Marketing
 - Catering
- **Business Plan Awards:**
 - 1st Place: ₦25,000
 - 2nd Place: ₦20,000
 - 3rd Place: ₦10,000
- **Best Students in Discipleship by Rev. Segun Olaoluwa.**
 - 1st - ₦50,000
 - 2nd - ₦30,000
 - 3rd - ₦20,000

This year, some students teamed up to work on IT projects. One student built a website for a classmate studying digital marketing. Most students are now using the internet to grow their businesses and careers. For example, a hairdressing student got a job in Lagos after doing an online interview and presentation using the academy's laptop.

Summer Computer Class

The annual summer computer training programme was held from 5th August to 6th September 2024. A total of 48 participants, including 27 children and one teenager, were trained in essential computer skills. Key areas covered included Microsoft Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and internet usage. Notably, three graduates from Batches 2 and 3 assisted in delivering the training sessions.

Basic Computer Training for Adults

Two sessions of a six-week basic computer training programme for adults were conducted during the year. The first session ran from 13th March to 26th April 2024, with 11 participants, while the second session took place from 7th November to 14th December 2024, training 10 participants. These sessions focused on foundational digital literacy to support personal and professional development.

Discipleship and Social Skills Class

The discipleship class provided spiritual guidance and Christian teachings to students, aimed at strengthening their faith and values. Weekly lessons were delivered using materials authored by Rev. Dr. Paul Jinadu. Each session included assessments to reinforce learning, and the programme was noted for its positive spiritual impact on participants.

3. Outreach Programmes

3.1 Ikorodu Outreach (Oct 30 – Nov 3, 2024)

The annual outreach was held in Ikorodu Town Hall, Ikorodu, Lagos State. There was a huge attendance of 7,973 adults and children during the 5-day event. Details of the activities are listed below.

- **Converts:** 1,367
- **Water Baptisms:** 216
- **Legal Unit Consultations:** 9
- **Healing School Attendance:** 158
- **Medical Services Provided:** 2,875 (including surgeries, tests, screenings)
- **Free Drugs Dispensed:** 2,113
- **Reading Glasses:** 748 pairs
- **Post-Surgery Glasses:** 34 pairs
- **Corrective Glasses:** 27 pairs
- **Cataract Surgeries:** 35
- **Empowerment Training Participants:** 378 (skills included Soap making, Pedicure and Manicure, Hair and wig making, Pastries making, Make-up and gele tying, Making of head bands, Tote bags, Shoe making, Bridal engagement fan, Website designing and juice making).

3.2 Secondary School Outreaches

Secondary school outreaches were held weekly across Ile-Ife, Osu, Osogbo, Lagos, Ogbomoso, Ikorodu, Oyo, Fiditi, and Jobele. Hundreds of students were reached with activities that included discipleship, free tutorials and showing of HATIMA film.

- **Total Converts:** 708
- **Holy Ghost Baptisms:** 45

3.3 Cell Groups

Cell Groups continued to grow and support rural communities in Ibadan including areas like Ode-Aje, Ode-Olo, Yemetu, Oje, and Ita Bale. Outreach events were also held in Odinjo, Atipe, and Atenda (February), with a special crusade in Ode-Olo in March.

Support for Widows and Orphans

- Around 320 widows under age 60 and 50 widows over age 60 were actively involved.
- The Cell Groups also supported 300 children, including 100 orphans, through care and mentorship provided by the older women.

Empowerment and Education

- Widows received spiritual guidance, mentorship, and financial support.
- Assistance was provided to help them:
 - Sponsor their children's education.
 - Start small businesses such as soap making and fast-food services.

Growth and Training

- The number of Cell Groups increased from 19 to 32.
- Monthly training and monitoring meetings were held for Cell Group teachers and assistants.

4. Free Medical Care

Major Surgery

A successful open heart surgery (2 holes in the heart) was performed on 2-year-old Baby Dorcas, who has recovered well. The parents are so grateful for the ample provision and prayers.

Conclusion

Liberty Nigeria's 2024 activities reflect our unwavering commitment to holistic development—educational, spiritual, economic, and medical. We are grateful to our partners, volunteers, and donors for making this impact possible.

1. Accounting policies

Basis of measurement and preparation of accounts

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of investments and in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards. The Trustees have adopted the recommendations contained within the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) applicable accounting standards, the Charities Act 2011 and the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2005.

2. Income and Expenditure

Income and expenditure are accounted for on an accrual basis.

3. Tangible fixed assets depreciation policy

Fixed assets comprise equipment costing more than £200 or have a useful life of more than a year. Depreciation is provided, after taking account of any grants receivable, at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life on the following basis:

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Liberty continued with its fivefold strategy of providing free education, business empowerment, pastoral care, free clean water, free medical care, and to people in the local communities we work in. The Board of Trustees are pleased to report as follows.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trustees of the charity having due regard for reporting the public benefit provided by the charity in line with the Charities Act 2002, are pleased to report that the charity has continued its involvement with many community focussed outreach programmes and project providing direct benefits for the public.

1. FREE EDUCATION

1.1. Covenant Nursery and Primary School, Imini, Oyo State

Imini School stand as beacons of hope and education for the local community and surrounding villages. The corridors echo with the chatter of 214 eager pupils, guided by a dedicated team of 9 teaching and 2 non-academic staff.

A new Board of Management was inaugurated in August to provide governance and oversight of its activities. Regular PTA meetings served as platforms for parents and educators to collaborate in shaping the future of the children. The school joined hands with the Oyo State Government in its Deworming exercise, ensuring the health and well-being of its pupils.

Some repairs were made to the infrastructure during the year but there is more work required to repair cracked plaster, refurbish pupils' toilets, and purchase new computers for the children and teachers' use.

During the year, a donor made school uniform for all the children. The children became stars in their villages. The donation increased enrolment by 10%.

1.2. Covenant Nursery, Primary and Secondary School, Sepeteri, Oyo State

At Sepeteri School, 158 eager learners filled the classrooms, with 12 committed teachers and one non-academic staff. A major refurbishment programme took place with new flooring, roofing, windows, and doors installed. The once-dreary toilets were now tiled and gleaming. The school now has a borehole providing clean drinking water for the school children and neighbourhood. The school's buildings got a fresh coat of paint, and additional chairs and desks were provided offering comfort and space to its growing student body.

As part of the future development plan, the school requires a playground with appropriate equipment to nurture the holistic development of its pupils. Desktop computers, more teachers to navigate the digital realm, and Bibles to enrich the spiritual journey of those in higher classes are all required.

1.3 Students becomes teacher

We are happy to report that one of our past student Miss Janet Olabintan who finished her primary education Covenant Nursery and Primary school, Sepeteri in 2009 is now a teacher in the same school after completing her university education.

Miss Oyedoyin Ayanleke, a former student of Imini School, is now a graduate of Marketing from Kwara State Polytechnic. Her journey from pupil to a graduate stood as a testament to the transformative power of education and hope to the children to dream big.

2. BUSINESS EMPOWERMENT

2.1. Liberty Academy

Liberty in its steadfast commitment to community development, has undertaken a series of impactful initiatives aimed at empowering individuals and enhancing the well-being of the community at large through Liberty Academy.

During the summer, a cohort of 60 students were trained to attain proficiency in the use of computers, a fundamental skill set in today's digital age. The vocational training programme covered training in Photography, Web Development, Fashion Designing, and Cosmetology. 43 students graduate with the necessary expertise to carve out promising careers in their chosen fields. The academy also ran discipleship programmes and social skills/empowerment sessions.

2.2. Liberty Business Empowerment training

During the Osogbo Outreach, business empowerment training covered Gele tying, make up, cake and snack production, shoe and bag making, soap making and sewing. Many of the participants left the outreach with skills to start small scale businesses.

3. PASTORAL CARE

3.1. Liberty Osogbo Outreach

There was a great harvest of souls at our Osogbo Outreach. 2,337 people attended the crusade where the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ was preached. 1,070 people responded to the gospel during the main crusade. Another outreach to the Palace had another fruitful harvest of 23 people professing Jesus as their Lord and Saviour. The house to house evangelism also brought in 111 new converts. We give the Lord all the praise.

3.2. Secondary School Outreach

Recognising the pivotal role of young people in shaping the future of the nation, Liberty extended its outreach to secondary schools in Osun, Ondo, Oyo, and Lagos States. A series of career talks on topics such as Mental Health, Drug Abuse and Academic Excellence film; were held. Film screenings, and health discussions were also used at these outreaches. The Film – Hatima has been used as an evangelism tool to reach this audience. Many people have responded to the gospel by watching the film. After school classes in Mathematic, English and sciences were also provided free in some schools.

3.3. Cell Groups

There are 32 functional cell groups with a total membership of over 600 people in Ibadan, Oyo State that meet weekly. We also organized quarterly crusades. Adult education classes are taking place to teach participants to read their bibles.

4. WATER

Liberty sank a Borehole in our Sepeteri school providing clean water to the students and those who lived in the neighbourhood.

5. MEDICAL CARE

To address pressing healthcare needs in the community, Liberty organised a medical outreach at Osogbo City Stadium, Osun State, Nigeria. 590 volunteers of which 74 were medical personnel (Doctors, Nurses, Pharmacists, Physiotherapists and laboratory scientists) met the needs of over 2000 attendees. This project significantly improved the health outcomes of the community.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trustees of the charity having due regard for reporting the public benefit provided by the charity in line with the Charities Act 2002, are pleased to report that company has continued its involvement with many community focussed outreach programmes and project providing direct benefits for the public.

Liberty Apprenticeship Programme

In 2021, we started the Liberty Apprenticeship Programme which was designed to equip young adults with skills relevant for the 21st Century marketplace. Through this programme, we are setting young adults free from the captivity of unemployment and a hopeless future.

The scope of this project was to develop what is essentially a social enterprise where young people will learn skills that they could immediately put into use to earn a living in the gig economy. The first intake of 23 participants graduated in October 2021 after three months of training in vocational courses such as Fashion Design, digital marketing, Online Marketing, Web Designing, and Web Development

Cell Group & Food Poverty Relief Project

The Lockdown Palliative Scheme that we started in 2020 was assimilated into the Cell Group & Food Poverty Relief Project. Throughout 2021, we have continued with our food relief programme. Raw food was distributed from a centre for poor people who found the pandemic and its aftermath a challenging experience. In 2021, 2500 food parcels were given out. We now have a total of 32 cell groups with over 600 members in Ibadan.

Medical Grants and Treatment

Our medical outreach programme resumed in Fiditi in 2021. This year the approach focused on three areas - house to house evangelism, outreach to secondary schools and medical care (eye clinic). We had approximately 200 volunteers over the five-day programme visiting villages in and around Fiditi and led over 550 people to Christ. The Medical Team carried out 34 cataract surgeries and over 350 reading glasses were distributed. The newly-crowned king of the town gave his full support and attended one of the programmes with his courtiers.

Education & Training

13 pupils at our school in Imini sat for the State Common Entrance examination and all passed, securing places to their secondary schools of choice. Two of them have received scholarships from one of our sponsors. We also bought a bus for the Imini school in 2021.

15 pupils from our Sepeteri School took the National Association of Proprietors of Private Schools (NAPPS) Testimonial and Oyo State Placement Entrance examinations. All of the students passed and gained entry to their secondary schools of choice. We have continued to support the welfare of the teachers including provision of training for their professional and personal development and payment of their salaries.

Schools Outreach

We started a new project in 2021. Offering mentoring and discipleship for secondary school students in their environment, the Schools Outreach Project also holds seminars on topics such as Mental Health, Drug Abuse and Academic Excellence. We now have six of these teams operating in five towns.

To further support the work with the students, a teacher has been commissioned by Liberty to engage with the secondary schools in Fiditi and oversee the classes on a full-time basis.

Rural Water Supply Scheme

We have continued to sustain our clean water programme to enable the villagers of Imini to have access to potable water to prevent outbreak of water borne disease such as cholera and typhoid fever.

Sahel Project

Our project in Mali has continued to grow. A perimeter fence is being erected to secure the land that was recently purchased.

The Board of Trustees, also acting as Council of Management and with other advisers promotes the objectives of the charity.

The Board of Trustees hold meetings throughout the year to promote the policies, strategies and processes of implementation for the various programmes and projects. These are subject to constant reviews to assess outcomes.

Risk Management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurances against fraud and error.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES;

The Objectives of the Company is set out in the Declaration of Trust.

- The advancement of Christian Faith in the United Kingdom and abroad
- To promote any charitable activity for the benefit of the local people
- Support for other charities and Christian events
- Providing overseas aid and relief of poverty.

The activities for achieving its objectives include:

- Rural Community outreach events
- Business and vocational training
- Health checks and interventions including minor and cataract surgeries and cervical screening.
- Education of children in rural communities with building and running of schools.
- Sinking wells and bore holes to provide potable water source for rural communities.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The Board of Trustees are pleased to report as follows

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trustees of the charity having due regard for reporting the public benefit provided by the charity in line with the Charities Act 2002, are pleased to report that company has continued its involvement with many community focussed outreach programmes and project providing direct benefits for the public.

Food Poverty Relief Scheme (Palliative Care)

The hall mark achievement for Liberty in 2020 was the food poverty relief scheme that was carried out in communities in Ibadan, Oyo State Western Nigeria during the pandemic lockdown period. The conditions of the lockdown resulted in an escalating of those affected by food poverty. These schemes named Palliative Care catered for the needs of the community via distribution of uncooked food items. Three of these food distribution events took place in May, June and July 2020 respectively with over 1500 food packs handed out.

Medical Grants and Treatment

In 2020 as a result of the pandemic and lockdown, Liberty did not carry out the annual medical outreach as in previous years. There were however a couple of medical grants to individuals for their treatment. A middle-aged lady had a hip replacement surgery and after care paid for.

A University undergraduate with multiple compound fracture of his leg had a series of sequential surgical procedures and metal insertions paid for by Liberty.

Education & Training

- We continue to provide education and training for pupils through our primary schools in Sepeteri and Imini villages of Oyo State, Nigeria.
- Our school at Imini was certified COVID-19 compliant by the Oyo State government in June 2020. As a result, our students in year 6 were allowed back to school to prepare for and sit their school leaving common entrance examinations.
- Many of our pupils at Imini Primary School walk several miles from surrounding villages to get to and from the school. Liberty purchased a minibus for the school to relieve these children of the burden of travelling to school. The bus was shipped from the UK to Nigeria in the autumn of 2020. A consignment of educational and learning resources including books, toys and laptops was sent to our schools at Imini and Sepeteri along with the bus.
- Liberty continues to cater for the welfare of the teachers including provision of training for their professional and personal development.
- We started the Liberty Apprenticeship Programme in 2020 to assist young people to acquire skills that will enable them to position themselves for the marketplace.

Liberty Sponsor A Child Programme

- The sponsor a child program which is supported by individual donors who have committed to provide support for orphaned children continues to grow.

Rural Water Supply Scheme

- We have continued to sustain our clean water programmed to enable the villagers of Imini to have access to potable water to prevent outbreak of water borne disease such as cholera and typhoid fever.

- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
