Annual report: April 06 2024 – April 05 2025

Mattering Press is a UK registered charity, whose charitable object is focused on advancing understandings of Science and Technology Studies via its open access books. As such, we report annually to the Charity Commission for England and Wales, in line with our financial year, which ends annually on April the 5th. We are strongly committed to being transparent about our activities as a Press and a charity. We therefore provide as much detail as we can in our reports. Past reports, as well as our accounts, and further details about Mattering Press can be accessed directly on the [Charity Commission website](#).

Below is our report for the April 2024 to April 2025 financial year. These reports are also aimed at those seeking to understand more about the Press' work, including institutions that provide the Press with annual financial support, via our Supporter Programme hosted by the [Open Book Collective](#) (OBC). As we explore in the report below, this funding is vital to the sustainability of the Press.

Aims and Purposes

Mattering Press is an Open Access publisher that is dedicated to increasing access to the social scientific study of expert-led knowledge in a field often referred to as Science and Technology Studies (STS). As an open access publisher we aim to increase access to research in the field of STS by making it widely and freely available in the form of monographs and edited collections.

Mattering Press established itself as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) on the 15th May 2013. The object of the charity as set out in our constitution is "To advance the education of the public in Science and Technology Studies, in particular by commissioning and publishing social scientific work on an open access basis". All Mattering books are, therefore, freely available as ebooks and as printed books to purchase. We also support books using formats that are experimental or difficult to publish using conventional publishing models.

Publication activity and engagement

This was a year of public recognition and engagement for the Press. Although we did not publish any books within this 12 month period (although have since, as we will mention below), we made important steps towards further anchoring the Press' reputation as a key venue for the publication of long form, peer reviewed scholarship, of the highest quality within and relating to the field of Science and Technology Studies (STS).

This came together most visibly at the [EASST 4S 2024 conference](#), which took place at Vrije Universiteit (VU) Amsterdam in July 2024. This biannual conference is the highest profile European venue for bringing together a global STS community. It also marked a symbolic return to physical scholarly co-presence, as the worst effects of the Covid-19 pandemic were receding from view, for many at least.

As we describe in a [post-event reflection](#) we authored, the standout moment from the Press' perspective was witnessing Irina Papazu collect the 2024 Chris Freeman Award for [Democratic Situations](#), which Irina edited jointly with Andreas Birkbak. It felt like an incredibly important moment for the Press, to see our work being institutionally legitimated in such a public way. Many congratulations once again to Irina, Andreas and all the book's authors.



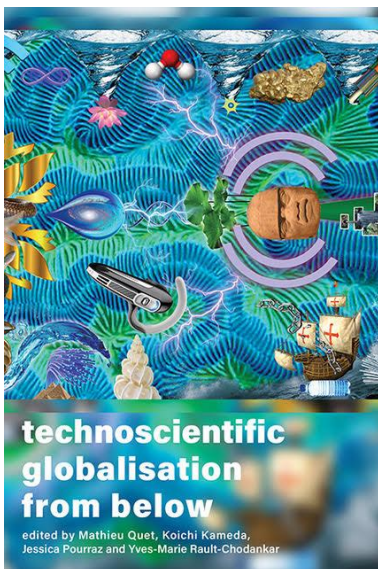
Mattering was present at the conference in many other ways. We had a stand, kindly offered to us by the conference organisers. This presented the opportunity for the Press' then [seven editors](#) (we have since expanded to eight) to engage with a range of colleagues, including readers, authors past and present. We were also pleased to be able to meet colleagues from Vrije Universiteit library itself, which is one of the institutions providing potentially renewable financial support to Mattering Press, by subscribing to our Supporter Programme the Open Book Collective. Thanks, as ever, to all our library supporters.



In addition to this, the Press' editors took part in a range of other activities related to open access publishing. Joe Deville continued his role as Principal Investigator of the Copim [Open Book Futures](#) project, funded by Research England and Arcadia, which is developing a range of solutions, workflows and scholarly interventions for supporting longform open access publishing. He also continued his role as Managing Director of Open Book Collective, whose impact on the Press' work is documented above. Julien McHardy also contributed to the Copim project, as part of the [Experimental Publishing Group](#). This included his ongoing work as a key member of the Editorial Oversight Group of the [Experimental Publishing Compendium](#), as well as contributing to the ongoing experimental open access publication, Deep Maps: Blue Humanities, as documented in two updates, on [in October 2024](#), the other in [March 2025](#), as well as a range of other Experimental Publishing Group collective outputs.

Forthcoming publications

The end of the 2024-2025 financial year was spent working on the then forthcoming publication of [Technoscientific Globalisation from Below](#), edited by Mathieu Quet, Koichi Kameda, Jessica Pourraz and Yves-Marie Rault-Chodankar. This book was published in September 2025 and we will say more about this in the next annual report, which covers this financial year.



We are also working on eight forthcoming texts. These include [Homo Textor: Weaving as a \(Technical Mode of Existence\)](#), which we announced as a forthcoming title recently. More details of the other texts will be announced in due course, but they include a co-authored monograph on cleaning practices in Amsterdam, a three-part multi-author volume exploring predictions as a social scientific and artist practice, an experimental text exploring site specific propositions relating to archives from a UK cathedral, and an edited collection exploring what the authors call 'value economies' of diverse kinds.

Finances and accounts

This financial year, as shown in our full accounts, and summarised below, the Press generated £18,494 in revenue. This was primarily made up of direct income from institutions, covering production costs of books, and income from contributions from supporting libraries, via our OBC Supporter Programme. Our total revenue more or less precisely matched our costs, which totalled £18,186. 48% of these costs were associated with staffing, relating to the Press' first employee, our Publishing Project Manager, a major development we discussed in our last annual report. As [we noted there](#), this role has been transformational for the long term sustainability of the Press, putting us on a far more stable financial and operational footing and helping us further move away from a dependence on volunteer labour. Book production costs were the second largest category, at 16%, followed by Marketing costs at 11%.

Metrics and impact

As a small Press, we do not currently have the capacity to provide reliable quantitative measures of the impact of our books in terms of usage. This is something we are, however, continuing to work on with our partners in the [Copim](#) community.

We are able to provide some indicative citation statistics for our books (via Google Scholar, 3rd February 2026). For edited collections, this includes citations only for the book as a whole.

Governance

Mattering Press is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) whose only voting members are its charity trustees. The charity trustees are also the General Editors for the Press. The Editors, or the Board of Trustees meet quarterly to administer the business of the Press. All decisions are brought to the board either via email or during meetings. Trustees each have a portfolio that they are responsible for administering.

In the event of a retiring trustee, the board will meet to discuss the skill requirements needed to fill the position. In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees and Editors, the board has regard for the skills, knowledge and experience needed to administer the CIO.

Nominations for the new Trustee may come from the Board or the wider STS community. The Editors will vote to accept new applications at a General Meeting. New trustees are then inducted into charity business at their first Trustees meeting. During this meeting they are briefed about their legal obligations under charity law, the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit, the Mattering Press Constitution, the committee and decision-making processes, the business plan and recent financial performance of the charity. The work of administering the charity is supported by the Press' two Advisory Boards.

readers. In this new 2nd edition the editors and authors have updated the text, both in response to these comments and taking into account changing contexts in the years since the book's first publication. This edition, including a new introduction and conclusion, is not only available free to read online, but also to purchase as a hard copy.

Finances

A major development this year has been the full launch of Mattering Press' [Supporter Programme](#) on the Open Book Collective. This is a new departure for the press. Previously, like many small open access book publishers, the press has been almost wholly reliant on income from book production fees, to support its work. While we try to levy these fees in ways that are mindful of the inequities of such funding models, [as we describe](#), we have always recognised that charging book production fees is not a long term solution to the challenge of how to sustain open access book publishing.

With the launch of this supporter programme, university libraries have the opportunity to provide financial support to the press for its open access publishing work, in exchange for benefits including an annual report and public acknowledgement. This financial model is key to press' aim to become fully financially self-sustaining and less reliant on the charging of publishing fees.

In this financial period, contributions from supporting institutions generated over £4,000 in income, as shown in our separate accounts. While this is still less than a single book publishing fee of £6,000, this accounted for over 40% of our income between the 6th April 2023 and the 5th April 2024.

This new income stream has had an immediate effect. For most of its existence, the day to day work of running Mattering Press has been undertaken by the press' now seven [Editors and Trustees](#). This work is voluntary and unpaid. It has been, and continues to be supplemented by paid work undertaken by external contractors, such as [Tetragon](#), which provides typesetting services, and our talented group of copy editors and proofreaders.

However, in March 2024 we were delighted to welcome Mattering Press' first ever employee: Jennifer Horsley, who works as our Publishing Project Manager. One of our Trustees, Joe

Deville, [has written about](#) how much of a revelation it has been to have Jennifer on the team. Jennifer helps support our production workflow, as well as undertaking a range of back office activities, all of which have helped improve the way we work and engage with current and prospective authors. We simply would not have had the financial security without the new income stream from the Open Book Collective.

We would therefore like to take the opportunity to sincerely thank both the Open Book Collective and all our [supporting institutions](#) for helping support a more sustainable future for small open access, scholar-led publishers such as our own.

Activities & community engagement

Our Trustees were involved in a range of activities during the period in line with the press' mission to support open access publishing in and related to STS.

A particularly important event of the year for the press' Trustees was a workshop we convened in Wavre, Belgium. The aim of the workshop was to discuss publishing futures, including, crucially, the futures of the press itself. The event brought together almost all of the press' Trustees in person for the first time in many years, including Endre Dányi, Joe Deville, Anna Dowrick, Natalie Gill, Julien McHardy, and Michaela Spencer.

Amongst many other topics, we discussed what the press' efforts and energies should be focused on, and how, practically, to sustain our work. One of the key outputs of these conversations was a shared agreement that the press' future depended on having additional support in the form of a Publishing Project Manager. As discussed above, this was to materialise later in the year with Jennifer Horsley joining the team. More generally, we left the workshop with a renewed commitment and conviction that Mattering Press .. matters.



Julien McHardy was centrally involved in the successful launch, in December 2023, of the [Experimental Publishing Compendium](#). This resource “gathers and links tools, examples of experimental books, and experimental publishing practices with a focus on free and open-source software, platforms, and digital publishing tools that presses and authors can either use freely or can adapt to their research and publishing workflows”. We very much

support this resource, and encourage others to use it, to further embed experimental publishing practices within the scholarly system.

Julien also continued to advance the work of [ScholarLed](#), a collective of seven small academic-led open access publishers. This includes regular ‘salons’ aimed at sharing resources and information amongst participating publishers. During this period, this includes sessions on topics such as metadata management and fair use/fair dealing.

Joe Deville began his work leading a new project to support diamond open access publishing, supported by Arcadia and Research England. This project will further develop infrastructures and workflows for supporting open access books, as described in the project [press release](#). This includes working to ensure the financial sustainability of the Open Book Collective, which he leads as Managing Director, as well as contributing to the associated [Copim](#) community.

Joe also [introduced the work of the press](#) in September 2023 at a ‘Meet the Publishers and Authors’ session at the AsSIST-UK (UK Association for Studies in Innovation, Science and Technology) biannual conference at Manchester University. Mattering Press also set up a stand in the main hall.

Mattering Press is an Open Access publisher that is dedicated to increasing access to the social scientific study of expert-led knowledge in a field often referred to as Science and Technology Studies (STS). As an open access publisher we aim to increase access to research in the field of STS by making it widely and freely available in the form of monographs and edited collections.

Mattering Press established itself as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) on 15-05-2013. The object of the charity as set out in our constitution is

To advance the education of the public in Science and Technology Studies, in particular by commissioning and publishing social scientific work on an open access basis.

All Mattering books will, therefore, be available freely as ebooks and as printed books to purchase. We also support books using formats that are experimental or difficult to publish using conventional publishing models.

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance on fee-charging. Open Access book publishing is still a relatively new phenomenon and the Open Access community is still experimenting with ways to make this form of publishing economically sustainable. The Press is partly funded through general donations, donations made for accessing books online and book sales. Mattering Press does charge fees to costs of publication, although discounts on this range from 25% to 100%. At the same time, we are working with partners in the ScholarLed consortium to develop new infrastructures and partnerships that will enable us to move away from a dependence on these fees.

During the financial year that this document reports on – 06-04-2022 to 05-04-2023 - the Press continued to participate in events and projects that have been building the Open Access infrastructures.

ACTIVITIES

Books Published

- [Democratic Situations](#) was published on May 18th 2022. The book offers an urgently needed renewal of our understanding of democratic politics. The contributors study democracy as a rapidly shifting and techno-scientifically moving target, analysing it in the same way STS has treated other objects of science and technology. They take common sites of Euro-American participatory democracy - elections, bureaucracies, public debate and citizen participation - and examine them as fluctuating democratic situations where supposedly untouchable democratic ideals are shaped and contested in practice.
- [Concealing for Freedom](#) was published on April 19th 2022. The book explores the most politically charged of all internet technologies: encryption. Encrypted messaging enables users to conceal private communications + online activities, often with specific 'adversaries' in mind. The authors invite us into the technical and political world of secure messaging, revealing the interplay between design choices and imaginaries of digital civil liberties. They offer an analytical portrait of the development of this field, following crises, debates and controversies. They examine three applications with different technical architectures as they grew, transformed and were reconfigured through use – Signal, LEAP/Pixelated and Briar. Opening up the social and political implications of design choices, they show how these platforms became subjects of controversy and contestation.

Project Involvement

- Mattering Press editors, Joe Deville and Julien McHardy, continued to be involved as a Co-Investigator and Consultant in the COPIM (Community-led Open Publication Infrastructures for Monographs) project funded by Research England and the Arcadia Fund (the project ended in April 2023).
- This project work included a number of significant developments, including:
 - The launch of Mattering Press' Supporter Programme via the Open Book Collective, which [launched in December 2022](#). The launch of the Supporter Programme marks a significant moment in the press' history. It aims ultimately to enable the press to move away from charging fees for the publication of its books. In time, this has the potential to enable the press to become more sustainable, enabling it to continue to publish books on a fully Open Access basis for the benefit of public.
 - Julien McHardy's involvement in a number of experimental publishing conversations and initiatives, including contributing to discussions associated with the [Books Contain Multitudes](#) report (by Janneke Adema, Marcell Mars, and Tobias Steiner) and working towards the release of the Experimental Publishing

Compendium (which was not launched in this accounting period, but is linked nonetheless)

- Joe Deville, in his role as a Senior Lecturer at Lancaster University, led a successful funding application to the Arcadia Fund and the Research England Development Fund. This new project is titled [Open Book Futures](#), and the award of the grant was announced in March 2023. The project's work will provide crucial ongoing support for the Open Book Collective, which is key to Mattering Press' long term sustainability.

Presentations

- Joe Deville delivered a keynote presentation (jointly with Dr Janneke Adema) at the London Book Fair in April 2022, titled "[The case for open Open Access book infrastructures](#)".

We resumed production on new books and engaging with our stakeholders. Indeed, it was a busy year, including the publication of five new books.

ACTIVITIES

Books Published

- [Energy Worlds in Experiment](#) was published on 29th April 2021. The book is an experiment in writing about energy and an exploration of energy infrastructures as experiments. Twenty authors have written collaborative chapters that examine energy politics and practices, from electricity cables and energy monitors to swamps and estuaries.
- [Sensing In/Security](#) was published on 24th August 2021. The book investigates how sensors and sensing practices enact regimes of security and insecurity. It extends long-standing concerns with infrastructuring to emergent modes of surveillance and control by exploring how digitally networked sensors shape securitisation practices

We spent this period focusing our much reduced availability on any outstanding books and we decided to put a temporary hold on all new contracts. It was very difficult to meet our aims and objectives beyond this bare minimum. Thus we have little to report as activities during this financial period.

ACTIVITIES
