CHW supports children and young people in developing parts of the world, through giving grants to partner organisations, which work with children and young people every day. Grants are given to projects which relieve financial hardship, advance education, relieve sickness and promote good health and offer recreational activities which develop the children's and young people's skills and capabilities.

**Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)**

Throughout this year, CHW raised funds to be able to give grants to our partner organisations in Argentina, Ghana, China, Romania and South Africa.

This included funding for the provision of food, care, clothing, medical treatment and therapies, educational materials, tuition fees, support for care staff and teachers, assistance with water and electricity provision for a school and shelter, and other resources and equipment for projects concerning education.

Our partner organisations around the world continue to face the challenge of rising costs and the support from CHW is greatly appreciated.

The Trustees met every three months, via video conferencing, to review requests, updates and feedback from the recipient organisations and are satisfied that CHW's grants bring benefits to poor and vulnerable children and young people in developing parts of the world. The Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission, including the guidance on public benefit and on charities working internationally.

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year**

The following grants were given during this year:

Fundación Cordobesa de Equinoterapia, Argentina: Sponsorship of ten months of horse-assisted therapy sessions for an eight-year-old boy, who has Down Syndrome: £775.

Mana Preschool, South Africa: Printer for educational needs, such as worksheets: £543.25.

Manos Abiertas, Argentina: Help towards sponsoring a caregiver and medical professionals, to work with babies and children, aged 0 to 5, who have been removed from their families due to abuse or neglect, and who are staying at Manos Abiertas's residential centre. Two instalments were sent and the total given was: £1882.

New Life International, Ghana: Assistance with an electricity bill for the centre and school: £349.57.

New Life International, Ghana: Assistance with a water bill for the centre and school: £314.68.

New Life International, Ghana: Food and supplies for a Christmas party held for 100 children from New Life's home and from the surrounding villages: £337.05.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees, accommodation and school supplies for a High School student at boarding school: £288.96.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees and basic supplies for a university student taking a Bachelor's degree in Education. Two instalments were sent and the total given was: £913.61.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees and basic supplies for a student at nursing college. Two instalments were sent and the total given was: £1251.67.

New Life International, Ghana: Basic supplies and a laptop for student taking a degree in Fashion Design. Two instalments were sent and the total given was: £611.97.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees and basic supplies for a university student taking a degree in Construction Technology and Management: £414.25.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees and basic supplies for a university student taking a degree in Hospitality Management: £417.30.

ORT SA CAPE, South Africa: Sponsoring literacy and science trainings for teachers in under-resourced communities in Cape Town and the surrounding areas. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £4868.25.

Refugiu, Romania: Sponsoring school supplies (such as books and stationery), and clothes and shoes for 12 children and teenagers at the start of the school year: £1182.86.

Refugiu, Romania: Winter coats and boots for 12 children and teenagers: £762.29.

Rooikappie Preschool Centre, South Africa: Assistance with a washing machine for use at the creche: £156.52.

Stepping Stones, China: Sponsoring teaching materials for educational programmes run for migrant children in Shanghai and also for children in rural areas. Three instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £2172.

The Future Factory, South Africa: Sponsorship of food for a programme serving families in under-resourced areas of Cape Town. This initiative was started in response to the pandemic and lockdowns. Assistance continues to be needed as food prices have risen. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £1710.

The Future Factory, South Africa: Assistance with residential costs for a university student taking a Bachelor of Commerce degree in Finance and Economics: Two instalments were sent and the total given was: £1429.07.

The following ongoing grants were given:

New Life International, Ghana: Sponsorship scheme, supporting food and educational costs for children and young people. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £5293.32.

Refugiu, Romania: Sponsorship of food and essential supplies for families in the villages of Tarlungeni and Halchiu. The total given was: £610.

CHW aims to keep in reserve sufficient funding for the charity to continue running for at least six months, in the case of no further unrestricted income being received. This covers the monthly bank charge, as well as sufficient funding to pay the bank fees to transfer any restricted funding to the recipient projects.

It should be noted we received a generous grant, of £14,588.27, close to the end of our financial year. This funding is unrestricted. It could appear that our reserves are much higher than in previous years. However, this is simply due to the timing of receiving the grant. The expenditure of the funds from this grant is expected to take place in the following financial year (2024-25).

**Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)**

Throughout this year, CHW raised funds to be able to give grants to our partner organisations in Argentina, Ghana, China, Romania and South Africa.

This included funding for the provision of food, care, clothing, medical treatment and therapies, educational materials, shelter, skills development workshops, tuition fees, support for care and teaching staff, and other resources and equipment for projects concerning education, health and disabilities.

The needs at our partner organisations greatly increased during the pandemic, as the lockdowns around the world affected the economy, and the level of poverty rose. We have been able to respond, to continue to help the children and young people during these challenging times.

Some of our partner organisations are still running projects that were started during the pandemic, such as food relief programmes, as the levels of poverty remain high. Most have been able to reopen, following any new health and safety protocols, and we have been able to support their existing programmes again too.

Our partner organisations in Romania were affected by the crisis in Ukraine and some began to help refugee families (mostly children and their mothers). We were able to respond, to support the provision of food, shelter and other basic needs for refugee families.

The Trustees met every three months, via video conferencing, to review requests, updates and feedback from the recipient organisations and are satisfied that CHW's grants bring benefits to poor and vulnerable children and young people in developing parts of the world. The Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission, including the guidance on public benefit; charities working internationally; safeguarding in international aid; and the Ukraine humanitarian crisis.

The following grants were given during this year:

Casa Mea, Romania: Assistance with running costs since the pandemic started. Two instalments were sent and the total given was: £1231.04.

Challenging Heights, Ghana: Sponsorship of skills workshops (sewing and carpentry) for older teenagers, who had been rescued from slavery in the fishing industry: £510.

FAST, Romania: Support for Ukrainian refugee families (mostly children and their mothers), including shelter, food, medical costs and other basic needs: £2500.

Fundación Cordobesa de Equinoterapia, Argentina: Sponsorship of ten months' worth of horse-assisted therapy sessions for a three-year-old boy with tuberous sclerosis, including resources for the therapy horses, providing this service for the children: £775.

Mana Preschool, South Africa: Assistance with mattresses, pillows, a fridge, a microwave and art supplies: £510.

Mana Preschool, South Africa: A chest freezer for food supplies: £159.65.

Mana Preschool, South Africa: Further art materials for the children: £216.77.

Mana Preschool, South Africa: Teaching desk: £58.58.

Manos Abiertas, Argentina: Assistance towards treatment for a five-year-old boy at their centre. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £151.

Manos Abiertas, Argentina: Help towards sponsoring a caregiver for their home, to work with babies and children, aged 0 to 5, who have been removed from their families due to abuse or neglect. Some of the original caregivers were shielding during the pandemic. Two instalments were sent and the total given was: £1339.

Meyah Preparatory School. Ghana: Partial sponsorship of teachers to work with the children: £1010.

New Life International, Ghana: Food and supplies for a Christmas party held for 100 children from New Life's home and the surrounding villages: £487.

New Life International, Ghana: Kitchen utensils for the home and school: £497.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees for a second-year university student reading Estimation and Quantity Surveying: £438.88.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees for a second-year university student reading Tourism Management: £451.88.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees, accommodation and school supplies for a High School student at boarding school, sent in three instalments: £1078.87.

New Life International, Ghana: Two laptops for the centre: £745.

New Life International, Ghana: Two laptops for university students, whose tuition fees were already being sponsored by CHW: £730.

New Life International, Ghana: Wheelchair for a nine-year-old girl: £308.

Newness Preparatory School, Ghana (linked to New Life International): Lockers for the classrooms: £596.87.

Newness Preparatory School, Ghana (linked to New Life International): New doors and locks for the classrooms: £729.87.

Newness Preparatory School, Ghana (linked to New Life International): Teaching resources for the younger classes at the school: £392.

Newness Preparatory School, Ghana (linked to New Life International): Three televisions for teachers to show the children educational programmes: £610.87.

ORT SA CAPE, South Africa: Sponsoring science and technology workshops for children, and literacy and science trainings for teachers, in disadvantaged communities around Cape Town, as well as an additional food programme, that was started during the pandemic. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £10,084.88.

Refugiu, Romania: Sponsoring school supplies (such as books and stationery), and clothes and shoes for 22 children at the start of the school year: £1036.

Refugiu, Romania: Winter coats and boots for 22 children: £834.46.

Rooikappie Preschool Centre, South Africa: Sponsoring the staff to work with the children for one month: £397.31.

Stepping Stones, China: Sponsoring teaching materials for educational programmes run for migrant children in Shanghai and also disadvantaged children in rural areas. Three instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £2294.38.

The Future Factory, South Africa: Sponsorship of food for a programme serving families in disadvantaged areas of Cape Town. This initiative was started in response to the pandemic and lockdowns. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £2553.73.

The following ongoing grants were given:

New Life International, Ghana: Sponsorship scheme, supporting food or educational costs for children. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £5625.08.

Refugiu, Romania: Sponsorship of food and essential supplies for two families in the village of Tarlungeni. The fathers of both families have passed away and one of the families has eleven children. The total given was: £450.

CHW supports children and young people in developing parts of the world, through giving grants to partner organisations, which work with children and young people every day. Grants are given to projects which relieve financial hardship, advance education, relieve sickness and promote good health and offer recreational activities which develop the children's and young people's skills and capabilities.

**Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)**

Throughout this year, CHW raised funds to be able to give grants to our partner organisations in Argentina, Ghana, China, Romania and South Africa. This included funding for the provision of food, Personal Protective Equipment, hygiene products, medical treatment, educational materials, school chairs and desks, tuition fees, support for care and teaching staff, and resources for projects concerning health and disability.

The needs at our partner organisations greatly increased during the pandemic, as the lockdowns around the world affected the economy, and the level of poverty rose. We have been able to respond, to continue to help the children and young people during this challenging time. Since the pandemic started, more of our partner organisations have asked for help with ongoing programmes, such as food distribution or support for the continuing costs of care or shelter, rather than one-off projects.

The Trustees met every three months, via video conferencing, to review requests, updates and feedback from the recipient organisations and are satisfied that CHW's grants bring benefits to poor and vulnerable children and young people in developing parts of the world and places where there are high levels of inequality. The Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit and on charities working internationally.

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year**

The following grants were given during this year:

Casa Mea, Romania: Sponsorship of running costs during the lockdown. Instalments were sent and the total given was: £3081.

Casa Mea, Romania: Sponsorship of a part time social worker to work with the children for six months: £648.

FAST, Romania: Sponsorship towards buying and installing windows in a new community centre that is being built for children and families in Zizin: £1000.

Fundación Cordobesa de Equinoterapia, Argentina: Sponsoring horse-assisted therapy sessions for a child with disabilities: £650.

Manos Abiertas, Argentina: Sponsoring a caregiver for their home, to work with babies and children, aged 0 to 5, who have been removed from their families due to abuse or neglect. Some of the original caregivers were shielding during the pandemic. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £3169.

Manos Abiertas, Argentina: Treatment for a baby and a child at their home. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £304.

New Life International, Ghana: Food supplies and hygiene products for families in the local community, during the pandemic. The children of these families all attend New Life's school. The total given was: £920.

New Life International, Ghana: Food and supplies for a Christmas party held for 100 children from New Life's home and the surrounding villages: £447.

New Life International, Ghana: Assistance with water bills during the pandemic, for their home and school: £390.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees for a first-year university student reading Estimation and Quantity Surveying: £139.

New Life International, Ghana: Tuition fees for a first-year university student reading Tourism Management: £205.

Newness Preparatory School, Ghana (linked to New Life International): New desks and chairs for the school. The school had been getting overcrowded, but new desks and chairs were then even more urgently needed to set up the classrooms according to new health and safety protocols, so there was more space between the children's places. This was sent in two instalments and the total given was: £3800.

ORT SA CAPE, South Africa: Sponsoring science and technology workshops for children, and literacy and science trainings for teachers, in disadvantaged communities around Cape Town, as well as an additional food programme, that was started during the pandemic. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £3623.67

Pinocchio Creche, South Africa: Sponsorship of Personal Protective Equipment for the creche to reopen after the lockdown. This was sent in two instalments and the total given was: £1300.

The Future Factory, South Africa: Sponsorship of food for a programme serving families in disadvantaged areas of Cape Town. This initiative was started in response to the pandemic and lockdowns. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £4752.58.

Stepping Stones, China: Sponsoring teaching materials for educational programmes run for migrant children in Shanghai. Two instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £1551.33.

The following ongoing grants were given:

New Life International Children's Home, Ghana: Sponsorship scheme, supporting food or educational costs for individual children. Instalments were sent throughout the year and the total given was: £4420.

Refugiu, Romania: Sponsorship of food and essential supplies for two families in the village of Tarlungeni. The fathers of both families have passed away and one of the families has eleven children. The total given was: £150.


