Objectives and Activities

The objects of the charity are:

- (a) The advancement of the Roman Catholic religion;
- (b) The relief of poverty;
- (c) The advancement of education.

The trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and are satisfied that the charity meets it through its residential conference, occasional retreats and the efforts of the Trust's supporters.

Achievements and Performance

1. Annual Residential Conference 11th to 15th August 2025

130 eager delegates gathered at the St John's Hotel in Solihull to ponder the Conference theme of ***“Heart speaks to Heart – Be who you were meant to be and you will set the world on fire”***

Opening Mass was celebrated by **Bishop Timothy Menezes**. Preaching on the Conference theme he invited participants to embrace “a week of grace” filled with gratitude, prayer, and openness to God's healing.

He reflected on the legacy of St John Henry Newman, whose motto (Heart speaks to heart) continues to inspire. The bishop noted that Pope Leo's recent

declaration of Newman as a Doctor of the Church highlights his teaching that faith is not only an intellectual pursuit but a living encounter with Christ in the Eucharist.

Recalling the memorial of St Clare, Bishop Menezes pointed to her friendship with St Francis as an example of Gospel-centred love in contrast to worldly values. He also shared insights from children preparing for Confirmation, who reminded him that the fruits of the Spirit — love, joy, peace, kindness and gentleness — have the power to transform the world.

He urged participants to allow “heart to speak to heart” with each other and with the Lord, so that, filled with the Holy Spirit, they may set the world ablaze by being the people God calls them to be.

Terry Quinn, a lay Catholic evangelist, author, and founder of the *Catholic Revert* ministry, lived up to his reputation as a bold, Spirit-filled teaching that empowers clergy and laity for evangelisation and renewal in the Church. Over three inspiration talks Terry shared his testimony with reference to his three books *Bring me Back Lord*, *Everybody has a story* and *7 Most Common Questions on Biblical Economics*. Terry explained that after three decades in Evangelical ministry, he returned to the Catholic Church with renewed zeal. Terry emphasised the need for Spirit-filled living, strong preaching, and the empowerment of lay people in mission. His teaching was full of energy and marked by clarity, scriptural depth, a call to personal renewal and commitment to the Church’s mission. He urged participants to know their Faith and God’s ways - *Know So*. Then proclaim God’s power – *Say So*. Then go on to *Do So!* Drawing on Ephesians Chapter 2 verse 10 Terry asked delegates to remember everyone has a purpose “*For we are God’s handiwork created in Christ Jesus to do good works which God prepared in advance for us to do*”

Daniella Stephens recalled that the Blessed Sacrament was reserved in the hotel room dedicated as a Chapel of Repose and reflected that St John’s Hotel had never had a more important guest! She said she would preach on the glory of God. She took us on a journey drawing out God’s glory in the universe, human kind, the sacraments and sacred scripture. God’s glory is experienced in His radiance of holiness, power, wisdom and love. In doing so she shared her moving testimony and how she began to see the glory of God in the suicide of her brother. God’s glory observed as the best brought out of difficult situations.

Isabel Vaughan-Spruce from 40 Days for Life and March for Life recounted her crusade to protect the unborn. Her shocking stories of the hostility and harassment she has received from local residents and the civil authorities attempting to stop her campaigns culminated in her arrest, prosecution and

subsequent acquittal for praying silently in the vicinity of abortion clinics in Birmingham. More worryingly she is under police investigation again for praying silently. Isabel concluded that abortion is a modern Calvary story.

Tom Ward might be in his 80s but his passion for promoting the Divine Mercy Devotion still burns brightly through his inspiring life story. Tom leads the Divine Mercy prayer group at St Mary and St Benedict parish in Coventry. Since 2002 he has been entrusted with a First Class Relic of St Faustina by the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in Poland. Tom spends his time travelling throughout the country offering opportunities for veneration and deeper reflection. Delegates also had the opportunity to venerate the Holy Relic and receive a personal prayer from the Divine Mercy community in Coventry.

Mark McClean led two workshops showing his passion for the Catholic faith and evangelising by focussing on the apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary over the centuries. Mark presented a detailed context of how God is preparing his people for the New Pentecost and reminded delegates of the significance of the messages of the Blessed Virgin Mary concerning the conversion of Russia.

Bishop David Oakley in an afternoon talk asked delegates to reflect on two questions: who am I and why did God make me? We each have our own unique purpose. None of us are nobodies – we are all a unique somebody. Having drawn on the nourishment of sacred scripture, sacred tradition and the Catechism to answer these questions Bishop David shared two memorable quotations

1. From St John Henry Newman: *“God knows me and calls me by my name....
God has created me to do Him some definite service; He has committed some work to me which He has not committed to another. I have my mission—I never may know it in this life, but I shall be told it in the next.”*
2. Blessed Carlo Acutis: *“All people are born as originals but many die as photocopies”*

Ros Powell led the Prayer Ministry and Healing Team.

The Conference was blessed by the presence of supporters of **Mary's Meals** and the opportunity to hear about their work and support their fundraising endeavours.

There were opportunities to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Music and Youth ministries served the Conference.

Holy Mass was offered daily by:

Bishop Tim Menezes, Auxiliary Bishop of Birmingham, Patron of the Conference celebrated Holy Mass to open the Conference.

Bishop David Oakley, Bishop of Northampton;

Canon Brian McGinley, Dean of St Chad's Cathedral, Birmingham,

Father Pascal Uche, Priest in the Brentwood Diocese

Father Eamonn Corduff, Parish Priest, Our Lady of Perpetual Succour, Barton - under- Needwood, Staffordshire; Chaplain to the Conference celebrated the closing Mass.

Father John Cavanagh concelebrated at each Mass

Participants left the gathering healed in heart, empowered to live their true calling, and aflame with the Spirit to set the world on fire

2. Day of Renewal - "Pilgrims of Hope" - 22nd March 2025

Following Mass there were time of praise, worship and healing. The guest speaker was Jenny Baker. Ninety people attended this day of reflection and inspiration.

Annual Report of the Trustees 2023-24

The trustees are Frances McClean, Diane Clarke, Father Eamon Corduff, Brother Andrew Ferris, Tony Holland, Andrew Kenny, Rachel Mackenzie, Pat O'Connor, Ray Russell and Mike Weaver.

This year 130 delegates gathered at the Royal Court Hotel in Coventry from 12th to 16th August to ponder the Conference theme based on the Book of Revelation. Delegates were called to be *Ready with Zeal* - "*for the Wedding of the Lamb has come*" (Chapter 19 Verse 7).

Bishop of Northampton David Oakley posed the question: What is zeal? Words like dedication, enthusiastic, motivated and willing came to mind. A zealot can be seen as fanatical in pursuit of ideals or uncompromising when standing against cultural standards. Quoting the Old Testament prophet Elijah "with zeal have I been jealous for the Lord God of Hosts" (1 Kings 19 v14) Bishop David urged delegates to be prepared to be used for his purposes - always remembering that zeal has to be seen through the lens of Our Blessed Lord Jesus.

Canon Michael Mitton from the Anglican Diocese of Derby spoke of how the Celtic saints, full of zeal, are an inspiration for prayer and renewal – Aidan, Patrick, Brendan of Clonfert, Bridget of Kildare, Chad, Columba, Cuthbert and Boisil, Hilda and Caedmon of Whitby.

John Hesketh drew on more than 25 years in Christian Ministry as a teacher, youth minister, school chaplain and actor to share his testimony providing an inspiring story of hardships and challenges overcome – a life journey now filled with zeal for evangelisation.

Marino Restrepo passionately shared his remarkable story. Born in the mountains of Colombia he drifted from Catholicism. Rebels kidnapped him. During captivity he went through a mystical experience with God that changed his life forever. Marino was miraculously released from captivity after a miracle of God. He then returned to his Catholic faith. He is now a full-time missionary for the Catholic Church. He is constantly on mission around the world.

Mark McClean showed his passion for the Catholic faith and evangelising by focussing on the apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary over the centuries – e.g. Guadalupe, Quito Ecuador, Lourdes, Fatima, Medjugorje and presented a detailed context of how God is preparing his people for the extraordinary times in which we are living.

Ros Powell preached daily on prophecies received.

The Conference was blessed by the presence of supporters of Mary's Meals and over £1,000 was donated by delegates. Conference youngster Michael Glover told us of his planned fund raising 10-mile Three Peaks Challenge Walk in September for Mary's Meals.

There were opportunities to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Music, Healing and Youth ministries served the Conference.

Holy Mass was offered daily by:

- Father Andrew Richardson, Pastoral Co-ordinator and Formation Tutor at St Mary's College, Oscott, Sutton Coldfield;
- Bishop David Oakley, Bishop of Northampton;
- Father Des Devanney, Parish Priest, Our Lady of the Assumption, Coventry;
- Father Eamonn Corduff, Parish Priest, Our Lady of Perpetual Succour, Barton - under- Needwood, Staffordshire; and
- Bishop Tim Menezes, Auxiliary Bishop of Birmingham, Patron of the Conference celebrated Holy Mass to close the Conference.

Receipts for the year were £48,321. Payments for the year were £44,572. The surplus was £3,749. This was an improvement on 2023 when there was a deficit of £1,370. This improvement is due to a generous donation of £10,000 from the estate of Mr. Peter Carroll. Reserves increased to £42,595 from £38,846.

The policy to hold enough funds in reserve to cover at least 50% of forecast expenses was maintained.

Having reviewed risks, finances and commitments the trustees consider the charity to be a going concern.

The Trustees confirm that Safeguarding Procedures were in place in accordance with The Catholic Archdiocese of Birmingham guidelines.

The Trustees have considered public benefit obligations and consider the Trust meets them through its residential conference, occasional retreats and the efforts of the Trust's supporters.

The Annual Report and Financial Statements were approved by the Trustees on 11th November 2024.

The trustees are Frances Baines, Diane Clarke, Father Eamon Corduff, Brother Andrew Ferris, Victoria Hamilton, Tony Holland, Andrew Kenny, Rachel Mackenzie, Pat O'Connor, Ray Russell and Mike Weaver.

We were pleased to return to a residential conference. This was held over the weekend of 19th to 21st August 2022. The theme of the conference was based the Gospel according to St John Chapter 4 verse 14 *"Whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst."* The principal speaker was Father Pat Deegan. Over 60 attended the conference. The conference sessions were also broadcast live on our YouTube channel. Almost 300 viewers followed the conference sessions.

In December 2021 we held an advent evening of renewal led by Daniella Stephens. The theme was *Fiat "Be it done unto me according to thy word"* taken from the Gospel of St Luke Chapter 1 verse 38. The event was broadcast live on our YouTube Channel and attracted almost 600 viewings.

Trustees decided to fund part of the cost of the residential conference from its reserves. Costs for the year overall exceeded income this year by £4,532 (2021 deficit £8,038). Reserves were £40,216 on 31st October 2022 (£44,748 2021).

The policy to hold enough funds in reserve to cover at least 50% of forecast expenses was maintained.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 October 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at fair value, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Birmingham Catholic Charismatic Renewal Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

1.2 Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. Having carried out a detailed review of the Trust's resources and the challenges presented by the current operating and economic climate, the Trustees are satisfied that the Trust has enough cash flows to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least one year from the date of the approval of the accounts. There are no significant financial uncertainties which the Trustees consider are a significant risk to the ability of the Trust to operate as a going concern in the foreseeable future.

1.3 Income

All income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Trust has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

1.4 Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Trust to the expenditure. The following specific policies are applied to categories of expenditure:

- charitable activities include expenditure on providing conferences; and
- support costs relating to oversight of the affairs of the Trust.

1.5 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank includes cash and monies on short term deposit via current and deposit accounts at the bank and other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

1.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discounts offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.7 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the Trust has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.8 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. There are no critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement to note.

2. INCOME

2.1 The Trust's main sources of income this year was from contributions towards the cost of holding the weekend residential conference in August 2022 (£12,159) and donations from supporters (£4,141).

2.2 Overall income for the year increased from £3,031 to £16,664.

3. EXPENDITURE

3.1 Overall operating costs for the year increased from £11,069 to £21,196. Conference events cost £20,434.

3.2 As in previous years Trustees received no remuneration for their services.

3.3 The Trustees arranged for an Independent Examination to be carried out. No charge was made for the Independent Examination

3.4 As in previous years the Trust did not incur any fund-raising costs.

4. Assets and liabilities

4.1 The Trust's assets on 31 October 2022 amounted to £40,216 and consisted of funds held with financial institutions. The trust had no liabilities this year or last.

5. UNRESTRICTED FUNDS

5.1 On 31 October 2021 the Trust's funds had fallen by £4,532 from £44,748 to £40,216 There are no restricted funds.

6. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

6.1 Trustees recognised the long and inspiring service to the Church and Charismatic Renewal Movement of Father Eamon Corduff by commissioning a gift of a Sacred Stole with a monetary value of £125.
