Our Executive Committee consists of 9 Trustees and 7 professional members. There is no specific training programme for Trustees. - The charity's organisational structure is shown in Organogram of our website www.sameerafoundation.org - We work in different areas of Pakistan through voluntary groups well known for their interest or contribution for the welfare of their local community. We work jointly with many local charities of Bangladesh, Brazil, Congo DRC, Egypt, Kenya, Lebanon, Libya, Madagascar, Syria, Uganda and Yemen to relieve poverty by giving grants to orphans and needy people. Slowly, slowly Sameera Foundation is increasing its charitable works in many developing countries. - So far we did not encounter any major risk as our grants are not very high. However, there is a possibility that we transfer some funds to our partners abroad and they do not use it properly.

The prevention or relief of poverty in Pakistan, Commonwealth and developing countries by providing grants, items, and services to individuals in need.

- Sameera Foundation constructed Sameera Welfare Institute of Information & Technology to provide free empowerment skills to financially disadvantaged females of Chach region.
- SF successfully completed the construction of a 9 m high, 10,000 gallons of water storage for the Rangoo Tajak Rural Health Centre, Pakistan. This rural centre provides free medical facilities for 10 – 12 surrounding poor villages.
- SF completely constructed two walls of the local High School measuring 350 ft which were completely damaged due a storm and heavy rain.
- SF provided welfare water wells or hand pumps in Uganda, Pakistan, Nepal and Bangladesh.
- SF started the construction of the first floor of the institute to start a Welfare Primary School.
- Provision of grants to orphans of Pakistan and Yemen.
- Ambulance service for Shamsabad and surrounding villages.
- Arranged programmes of feeding the orphans and vulnerable people of Kenya, Nepal, Pakistan, Uganda and Yemen.
- Distribution of fresh meat for needy families of Pakistan, Uganda and Yemen.
- Educational grants to financially disadvantaged students of Pakistan and Uganda.
- Distribution of food packs for needy families of Pakistan and Yemen.

- Volunteers are important element as they help the Foundation in organising charitable welfare activities in different villages of Chach and different parts of Pakistan as well as in developing countries. They collect and supply us with vital information about low income deserving people and communities in need of grants or disability appliances or food packets.
- We utilised a similar strategy in Bangladesh, Brazil, Cameroon, Gaza, Jordan, Kenya, Libya, Madagascar, Morocco, Nepal, Pakistan, Syria, Uganda, Yemen and Swansea (UK). We are working with local volunteers to provide us with vital information about deserving people or communities in need of aid. We are a small charity and cannot open an office or employ staff to do our charitable tasks in the stated countries. We use either the local charities or the local volunteers to work abroad.

Section D

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

1. INTERNATIONAL EMERGENCIES OR DISASTERS

- The Eastern Part of Libya was struck by a disastrous flood on 11th September 2023. Derna city suffered the most, a third of the city was submerged under tidal currents of the Mediterranean sea within a few hours at night. Nearly 30,000 lost their lives and nearly a third of the city had disappeared from the face of the earth.
- Sameera Foundation raised funds to help the Derna community through our partner, Libyan Helping Hands, who selected 110 deserving victim families of Derna. The [110 Washing Machines and electric heaters](#) were purchased at the cost of 55,000,000 LYD from our donation and [distributed to Derna hurricane and storm affected peoples](#) during November 2024.

The **Palestinian Community** of Swansea was allowed to raise funds under the supervision of Sameera Foundation for the displaced people of Gaza in need. We used it for providing basic necessities of the displaced families.

Al-Walidayn Islamic Centre, Bangladesh was also allowed to collect collections under the banner of Sameera Foundation from the City Mosque and Sketty Mosque. We raised £5,000 and it was sent to Bangladesh for the construction of the stated Islamic Centre.

Settled among the green mountains of Pakistan's north, and with a river flowing serenely through its centre, Bishnoi was, until recently, a beautiful village. But it had rained heavily on the morning of Friday, 15 August, and when the villagers woke early and went off to work, they were unaware of how swiftly things were about to change. Sameera Foundation raised funds to provide food and blankets to the flood affected community. The education grants will be provided to the school children of flood affected areas during next academic session.

Sameera Foundation arranged a distribution of **110 ration packets, 40 bags of flour**, along with **bedding, clothes, and shoes**, to families affected by the recent floods in **Mianwal Village, Tehsil and District Chiniot, Pakistan**. The Educational Grants will be given to the flood affected students.

Gaza is a living HELL on the face of the earth and the whole world knows it. The residents are living in temporary tents and forced to move daily from one locality to another. The **Sameera Foundation** completed 134 humanitarian sessions in Gaza, delivering food, clothing, medicine, water, blankets, tents, nappies, baby milk, cash aid, and [#hope](#). 2. EDUCATION

Construction of Boundary Walls of GBHS, Shamsabad

During the heavy torrential rain and wind storm the two walls of the school were completely demolished (collapsed) in July 2024. There are 400 students in this school and mostly come from poor families. The Headmaster requested to the Education Deptt., politicians and local residents but no one came to their rescue. The demolished walls exposed the small children to many sort of dangers. The Headmaster appealed to the Sameera Foundation and we constructed both the walls to create a safe ambient for the school children. The local community appreciated the contribution of Sameera Foundation for the construction of two walls totalling 350 ft.

Gift of Educational Grants for Local Schools, Pakistan

- 1. Govt. Girls Elementary School, ShahPur:** 20 financially disadvantaged students were given education grants in the form of school bags, notebooks and stationery packs.
- 2. Govt. Boys Primary School, Shah Pur:** 20 needy students were given grants by Engr. Saeed Malik, Chairman of the Foundation on 14/12/2024.
- 3. Boys of High School, Shamsabad** were given the school bags, notebooks and stationery packs on 11/12/2024. [\[Photos\]](#) [\[Video\]](#)
- 4. 11 students of Non Formal School, Shamsabad** were given grants on 28/11/2024 by Mrs J A Malik and Bushra Malik. These grants are given by S. S. S. B.
- 5. 10 disadvantaged school students of Govt. Girls High School, Mial** and 10 deserving boys of **Govt. Boys High School, Mial** were given the school uniforms on 20/12/2024. We are grateful to Mrs. R. L. and Mr T. A. which enabled us to provide school uniforms to the financially disadvantaged school students. [\[Photos\]](#)

6. Gift of School Notebooks for 100 Orphans, Uganda: We provided notebooks to the orphans of Kauta Mpogo Orphanage on 7th October 2024. This orphanage is constructed by Sameera Foundation and it accommodates 50 boys and 50 girls. The orphanage is maintained by the Relief for Needy Foundation, a locally registered charity.

7. Nursery And Primary Welfare School

Sameera Foundation is working on the establishment of a Nursery and Welfare Primary School for orphans and financially disadvantaged families.

8. Construction of First Floor of SWIIT

(Sameera Welfare Institute of Information & Technology)

We are constructing classrooms on the first floor of SWIIT. The construction work is 70% complete and we hope this floor will be available from the next semester. The ground floor will be used for the Primary Welfare School and the First Floor will be used for Empowerment Skill courses for disadvantaged females of the Chach region.

3. HEALTH AND DISABILITY

Activation of Sughra Welfare Health Clinic and Community Centre

We completed the construction of the Welfare Health and Community Centre about 3 years ago. Unfortunately, we failed to make it active as the Medical Doctors in Pakistan are not at all interested in carrying on any medical welfare work voluntarily or on payments of reasonable cost. During this period, we started the Ambulance service to facilitate the needy communities of Shamsabad, Shah Pur and surrounding villages.

- Now, Dr Madiha Naz Malik will be available in the Health Clinic on Tuesdays and Saturdays between 10 am and 2 pm for free medical check-up and advice to the local females. She will provide this service free on a voluntary basis.

Water Related Welfare Projects

Sameera Foundation is currently running drinking water projects in Pakistan, Uganda, Yemen, Nepal, Bangladesh and Gaza.

- A 10-m high water tank tower of 10,000 Gallons capacity was constructed for Rangoo Rural Health Centre, Pakistan. This rural centre provides free medical facilities for 10 – 12 surrounding poor villages.
- We made a total of 19 welfare water wells for Eastern Uganda during the period April 23 to August 25. We completed the construction of www14 to www19 during Sept. 24 to Aug 25. The details are available in our Annual Report for the period 2024-2025.
- Recently, 5 tanks of 1,000 litres capacity are gifted to 5 mosques Suqia of Taiz, Yemen. It provided clean drinking water for the community around the mosques.
- SF is providing welfare water pumps for Bangladesh, Nepal and Sindh (Pakistan).
- Clean drinking water is also being sent regularly to the displaced and homeless people of Gaza.
- Water Hand Pump for Sindh: Sameera Foundation completed the construction of 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th Hand pump for different villages of Sindh, Pakistan.
- Sameera Foundation completed the construction of a Welfare Hand Pump in Nepal on 18/8/24.
- Sameera Foundation completed the construction of Welfare Water Pumps 06 and 07 for Rohingya Refugee Camp, Bangladesh on 22/11/24.

PKLI Camp for Free Hepatitis Screening in Shamsabad

PKLI&RC is a specialized healthcare facility dedicated to patients grappling with kidney and liver diseases. Sameera Foundation arranged a Free Camp on 31st May 2025 jointly with DHQ Attock for the residents of Shamsabad, Shah Pur and surrounding villages. Total Screening was done for 186 visitors (males and females); Anti HCV for 17 and HBsAG for 2 persons and Co-Infection was NIL

White Cane Day Celebration

International White Cane Day takes place on October 15th each year and the day is observed worldwide to recognise the movement of blind people from dependency to full participation in society. the visually impaired community of Attock District organised the celebration of this event on 15 October 2024. Sameera Foundation sponsored this event and gifted white canes as well as talking watches to the visually impaired participants.

Financial Support for Emergency or for Needy Families

Seven-years old F. N. of Shamsabad was caught by the electrical wire on 5th April 25

and it burnt her left hand, damaged the arm and the leg. She suffered head injury as well. Sameera Foundation provided immediate free ambulance service and she was taken to the Peshawar for burnt body treatment. Sameera Foundation provided financial support for her medical treatment.

Marriage Grant for poor families of local villages: Sameera Foundation gives a Marriage Grant to the extremely poor local families to facilitate their marriages. Recently, four girls were given a marriage grant of Rs 20,000/- for each girl.

4. EMPOWERMENT SKILL FOR FEMALES

Sameera Welfare Institute of Information & Technology is a skill learning centre especially established for the empowerment of orphans, widows, and low-income females of poor villages. Currently, there are 60 girls learning Computer Skill, Domestic Sewing and Beautician courses. These female students come from different poor villages of Chach region. The Chach region has 87 poor villages congested within an area of 31 km x 14 km.

6th & 7th Certificates Award Ceremony of Empowerment Skill for Females

Sameera Foundation organised the Certificates Award Ceremony of 6th and 7th qualified Group on 22nd March 2025. The certificates of Advanced Information Technology, Modern Dressmaking and Beautician skill courses were given to the students who completed the courses successfully. 30 students of Computer course; 31 students of Domestic Tailoring course and 34 students of Beautician course were granted their certificates. A total of 95 students of both batches 6 and 7 were given the certificates.

Admission of 8th Academic Session for Free Empowerment Skills

A total of 46 students enrolled for this batch. 17 students received Skill Learning Grant to facilitate their travelling from other villages. This 8th batch started on 5th August 2024 and finished in December 2024.

Cookery Course as an Empowerment Skill

Sameera Foundation is developing a kitchen where females can learn to cook professional dishes and bake cakes & biscuits. There is a problem with the supply of gas and electricity due to load shedding in Pakistan. Therefore, the oven will be provided with the supply of gas as well as electricity to facilitate the teaching work.

Live to Give, Sanaa, Yemen

Sameera Foundation is helping LIVE TO GIVE FOUNDATION of SANAA, YEMEN for running a domestic sewing machines course for 15 girls every year to increase their chances of employment. Currently, SF provides them a monthly grant of £100 per month.

Beautician Saloon, Aden, Yemen

Sameera Foundation is helping Ms. Shadha Shakib Ali who runs a beautician saloon in Aden, Yemen. She provides empowerment skills to 5 females for a period of six months to increase their chances of employment and livelihood. We provided them a monthly support of £100 per month.

CPR Training for Students of Sameera Welfare Institute

A Rescue 1122 First Aid Training session was held at Sameera Foundation to equip students with essential life-saving skills. [Training was held on 19-21 November 2024, Saqib and RSO Rizwan gave the training.](#) This three days training covered basic first aid techniques such as CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation), Bleeding control, handling fractures, road safety, fire safety and managing choking emergencies. Students were taught how to assess and respond effectively in medical emergencies, emphasizing the importance of remaining calm and providing immediate care until professional help arrives.

5. REDUCTION IN POVERTY

(i) Kaffara Project of Sameera Foundation, Taiz, Yemen

Sameera Foundation arranged 30 fresh hot meals (fasting breakfast) and these were distributed to the needy persons on 10/09/2024.

(ii) Lunch for 130 Students of St. Patrick's Special School, Kenya

Sameera Foundation tries to reach and feed as many orphans and vulnerable Globally as possible. We reached the Special Students of St. Patrick's School – the special school for the mentally challenged children suffering from Autism, Cerebral Palsy (CP) and Brown's Syndrome. SF arranged a fresh hot lunch consisting of meat curry, rice, bananas and milk pack.

(iii) Special Eid al-Adha Lunch for 100 Orphans of Mpogo Orphanage, Uganda

Mpogo, Uganda – On the occasion of Eid al-Adha, the Sameera Foundation organised a heartfelt and purposeful lunch in honour of 100 orphaned children at an orphanage located in the Mpogo district of Uganda ([Photos](#), [Video](#)).

(iv) Eid ul Adha Lunch for 100 orphans of Nepal

This Eid lunch was part of Sameera Foundation's Global Welfare Programme, designed not only to bring festive joy to orphaned children but also to instil in their hearts the reassuring message that there are caring hands in the World, ready to embrace them with love, protection, and compassion.

On the blessed occasion of Eid ul Adha, the Sameera Foundation took a heartfelt and purposeful initiative by hosting a special Eid lunch for 100 orphan children in Sunsari District. The event was held at Jameatul Khair, Bhokraha, Sunsari

Financial Support for Needy Persons

(i) F. N. is a seven-year-old innocent girl from Mohalla Dhakhi, village Shamsabad.

On April 5, 2025, this little fairy suddenly touched the electric wires while playing on the roof of her house, as a result of which she received a severe electric shock. In this accident, her left arm and right leg were badly burnt and she also suffered a deep wound on her head. Immediately after the accident, she was shifted to Civil Hospital Hazro by an ambulance of Sameera Welfare Foundation (Shamsabad), but due to lack of proper facilities there, she was taken to Peshawar Hospital the next day where she underwent surgery. We provided financial assistance for the medical treatment.

(ii) Mr E. A. of Mehrab Pur, Distt. Naushahro, Sindh wrote about his hard circumstances and appealed for a bag of ration only. Dr S. U. reckoned him a deserving person so Rs 10,000/- were sent to him for purchase of food items.

(iii) M. I., resident of Bhaira (Sargodha) submitted his application through Dr F. S. He has blood cancer according to the medical report. He requested some financial support. We gave him £250 from our Sadaqah Account.

(iv) M. K., is 38 years old and resides at Village Khan Muhammad Kaloi. He has disability in his left leg, and his wife has disability on both the legs. The video shows it clearly. He requested for some financial support, and we gave him Rs 20,000/- from our Sadaqah Account.

(v) We constructed MPOGO Orphanage, Uganda on the piece of land gifted by Kauta. His wife was in critical condition and diagnosed with fibroids on her uterus. She was admitted in the Mbale People's Hospital on Christmas day and needed an urgent surgery. The hospital estimated a cost of UGX4.2 millions (about £900) for the surgery to remove Uterus for treatment. We gave her a grant of £300.

(vi) Sameera Foundation gave Marriage Grants to four females of our local area from our Sadaqah account. The mother of each girl received Rs 20,000/- (about £55).

6. RAMADAN AND EID-UL-ADHA**Ramadhan Food Gift Packs for Needy Families of Mial, Pakistan**

Sameera Foundation distributed 450 Ramadhan Food Packs in Pakistan during the blessed month of Ramadhan. 80 packs were given to people with disabilities (physical, mental or visual); 173 were given to both the widows and senior citizens of the age of 60 or above; 47 food packs were given to the needy families of Attock [[video](#)]; [60 food packs were gifted to the needy families of Mial, Tehsil Chakwal](#) and 190 food packs were gifted to the deserving widows and males of ages between 40 and 59 of the Chach region.

Ramadhan Food Packs Gifted for Sanaa, Yemen

Sameera Foundation acknowledges gratefully the support of Dr Rahim Zegugu for the contribution of 20 food packs for needy families of Sanaa, Yemen. The children were also given toys as Eid gifts. [[Photos](#)]

Ramadhan Food Packs for Taiz, Yemen

Sameera Foundation team in Taiz, Yemen, worked hard to distribute 75 Ramadhan food packs for families suffering from intertwined crises of poverty and displacement due to the continuation of war and siege, as well as the insane rise in prices in all aspects of life, especially basic foodstuffs. This year's Ramadhan pack contained flour, sugar, rice, oil, potatoes and onions which are enough for one family for about 2 weeks. This gift was a reason for the happiness of the beneficiaries who came to receive it at the distribution site (Badr School - Al-Masbah) on 22/03/2024. Eid-ul Adha Qurbani in Pakistan, Yemen and Uganda

Sameera Foundation arranged Eid Ul Adha Qurbani for our members and donors for the benefit of disabled, orphans, widows and the poor sector of villages in Pakistan, Yemen, and Uganda. Five cows were slaughtered in the village Shamsabad (Pakistan). 33 goats were slaughtered in Uganda and 32 goats were slaughtered in Yemen. The healthy animals are slaughtered in the presence of local Masjid Sheikhs and committee members. The sacrificial meat was distributed for disabled, orphans, widows and poor families under the supervision of Foundation Volunteers.

7. CONSTRUCTION OF ISLAMIC CENTRE IN BANGLADESH

SF raised funds from the local mosques and transferred £5,671 for the construction work of Al-Walidayn Islamic Centre, Bangladesh.

8. Gift for the Forgotten Community of Swansea

There are about 10 shelters in Swansea accommodating about 120 homeless fellows. SF invariably tried to help them by sending fresh hot meals or packs of fruits or gift packs from time to time. We remembered them on Xmas and distributed 100 gift packs for residents 10 Swansea Shelters.






This year, 100 students of Neelam Valley were given School notebooks. School kits were given to 100 orphans of Mpogo Orphanage, Uganda. - School desks and benches were given to Govt. Girls Elementary School, Kuldathi. - The notebooks and basic stationery items were given to 69 vulnerable orphans of Madagascar. - 15 students of Mial were given jerseys and socks during winter. - We arranged Eid ul Fitr lunch for the orphans and vulnerable children of Uganda, Madagascar and Rohingya Refugee camp, Bangladesh. The Rohingya school was also provided carpets for the classroom. - A chest freezer was given to orphan school of Baluchistan, Pakistan for the use of 110 orphans. - 106 needy boys' and girls' students of Neelam valley were given school notebooks. - Sameera Foundation acquired (as a Gift) an area of 3,400 sq. m in the village Shamsabad, Attock, Pakistan. We are trying to construct a Technical Institute, a children leisure park, an adult recreation park and a welfare health centre. The <u>proposed Technical Institute</u> will offer the mostly needed skills which can facilitate the jobs for the students of the surrounding 87 poor villages of Chach region scattered within an area of 31 km by 14 km. EMPOWERMENT SKILL FOR FEMALES - Sameera Welfare Institute of Information & Technology is a skill learning centre especially established for the empowerment of orphans, widows, and low-income females of poor villages. Currently, there are 60 girls learning Computer Skill, Domestic Sewing and Beautician courses. These female students come from different poor villages of Chach region. Chach region has 87 poor villages

	<p>within an area of 31 km by 14 km.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Rescue 1122 deals with emergencies and road accidents in Pakistan. The staff of Rescue 1122 visited the Institute on 12/12/2023 to teach the lifesaving technique that are useful in many emergencies such as a heart attack or near drowning, in which someone's breathing or heartbeat has stopped. - Sameera Foundation organised the Certificates Award Ceremony of 5th Group on 6th December 2023. The certificates of Information Technology, Dress Making and Beautician skill courses were given to the students who completed the courses successfully. - Sameera Foundation organised the Certificates Award Ceremony of 6th qualified Group on 19th February 2024. The certificates of Advanced Information Technology, Modern Dress making and Beautician skill courses were given to the students who completed the courses successfully. These courses are free for the needy females of Chach area. - Sameera Foundation provides financial support to LIVE TO GIVE Charity (Yemen) from last few years. This group imparts the domestic sewing skill to needy females. Similarly, we provide monthly support for Beautician courses run by a local Hair Salon. Make up, Demobilization, Take care of hair with individuality & protein; Haircut, Hair dye, and Clean the skin and body skills are provided free to the needy females. <p><u>HEALTH AND DISABILITY</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 9 years old, Mr. A., from Kalu Khurd village has been paralysed in the lower portion of his body since the age of 5. He is given a Tricycle to facilitate his job. - O. S. a resident of Karachi was suffering from mouth cancer. He is disabled from one leg, unemployed and has 5 children below the ages of 18. He was given a financial support of Rs100,000 for the treatment of mouth cancer. - Mr. K. S. is getting treatment in Mount Elgon Hospital, Mbale, Uganda for the prostate problems. He was given a grant of UGX 1,500,000 for medical treatment. - Miss K. Z. is 35 years old and suffers from a severe kidney disease for the last 4 years. She requires dialysis twice a week. She was given a grant for her treatment. - 51-years-old M. H. of Ghorri Town, Islamabad needed support for her liver transplant. Doctors have recommended her, the stem cell therapy, and proper medication. She was given a medical grant for purchase of medicines - 7 Years old Ms. S. has mental and physical disability since birth. She was given a wheelchair. - 8 years old Ms. M. B. has disability since her birth. Her legs are paralysed, and she can neither stand nor walk. She is gifted a wheelchair and now she will be able to go to school easily. - 72 years old Mrs. M. J. has broken her right leg as well as fractured the left arm by an accidental fall in her home. She was given a self-propelled wheelchair to facilitate her life.
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Sameera Foundation arranged a free medical camp to provide free medical examination and medicines for the village of Shamsabad and surrounding villages on 1st and 2nd March 2024. Many adults, females and children were treated free and were provided free medical tests and medicines. - The Second medical camp was arranged on 4th May 2024. A total of 42 males, 63 females and 33 children were treated on this occasion. They were provided free medicines as well as the relevant medical tests. - Mr. S. Y. S. A., 8-years-old, has fractures in both mandibular condylar heads with callus formation. His both jaws were fractured, and he can't open his mouth. He was treated successfully in Alrefai Alnmothege Hospital, Yemen and it costed us £1,150. - Sameera Foundation has been providing disability appliances to people with physical disabilities since 2014. We provide this facility to the disabled residing within the Chach Region (about 87 poor villages). We gifted 73 self-propelled wheelchairs during the period 2019-2024. - The visually impaired community of Attock District organised a Rally on 15th October 2023; International White Cane day. We provided lunch for about 200 participants. - The people of Eastern region of Uganda generally uses polluted drinking water due to shortage of clean drinking water. Sameera Foundation constructed 13 deep water wells in Uganda since March 2023 and provided clean drinking water to the needy communities. - We constructed water hand pumps No. 3 – 6 for Rohingya Refugee Camp, Bangladesh. Two water hand pumps were also constructed in Sindh, Pakistan to facilitate the needy families. - Sameera Foundation started the construction of a 10 m high welfare water tank with a capacity of 10,000 Gallons on 14/02/2024 and its estimated cost is £10,000. Various donors contributed for this welfare project for Rangoo Tajak Rural Health Centre. - Sameera Foundation is running a special programme of feeding the orphans and vulnerable children of developing countries. We fed the vulnerable children of Madagascar, Cameroon, Nepal and Kenya; sent food items to Blaen y Maes, Drop-in Community Centre, UK; arranged Clean Water for IDPs Camps of Taiz, Yemen; Christmas Lunch for vulnerable minors of Saint Francis Nursery, Brazil; New Year Gift for 100 residents of Swansea shelters, and school items for orphans of Madagascar.

- Aqeeqa lunch for 100 orphans of MPOGO, orphanage, Uganda. Lunch for 45 orphans of Rohingya Refugee Camp, Bangladesh. Lunch for 122 orphans in Taiz, 40 orphans in Sanaa, 15 orphans in Aden and 40 orphans of Berain Refugee Camp, Yemen.

- Financial supports are provided to desperately poor people. The transportation vehicle of M. A. of Shamsabad was burnt accidentally, and he was provided financial support. Mrs. R. B. was given financial support for medical treatment of Hepatic Steatosis (Grade 1). Dr. S. K. was passing through extremely hard circumstances, so he was given a loan of Rs500,000 to solve his problem. 23 years old M. N. was given financial support for treatment of tumour in his brain.

- Four financially disadvantaged girls were given marriage grants. Ms. F. N. was given financial support for the school fee of her children. Mrs. H. D. from Jordan was passing through extremely hard circumstances and she was given a financial support of £250.

- Ramadhan Food Gift packs were given to a few hundred needy families of Syria, Pakistan and Yemen. A food packet worth £20 containing basic food items for a month is given to the most deserving and poor families of Syria, Pakistan and Yemen during the month of Fasting. The visually impaired of Attock (Pakistan) were also given food packs.

- Support for Syria/Turkey Earth Quake victims. Food packs were given to 100 families of North Western Syria.

- Sameera Foundation is running a Global Programme for feeding the orphans and vulnerable children of developing countries. We arranged the Eid Lunches for 100 orphans in Uganda on 10th April 2024; 140 Rohingya refugee students, Bangladesh; 140 orphans of Madagascar. Feeding of 80 orphans of Kenya and potable water for 3 IDPs camps, Christmas lunch for 40 vulnerable minors of Brasilia-DF, Brazil; lunch for 145 orphans of Cameroon; for 135 vulnerable students of Nepal.

- Eid Gifts were given to 54 widows and 69 disabled registered with us.

- 12,000 litre of potable water was provided to 12 religious centres of Taiz, Yemen. Each centre was given 1,000 litres.
