New Charity Trustees are appointed by unanimous agreement by the Board of Trustees.

The charity also uses the name ICY Africa to highlight the region it is focussing on. The website is termed www.icy.org.uk with ICY Africa/ICY Ministries forming part of this. The Charity is the outworking of International Christian Youthworks.

Objectives and Activities

Summary of the objects of the charity as set out in governing document

- a) the prevention or relief of poverty anywhere in the world by providing or assisting in the provision of education, training, and all the necessary support designed to enable individuals and communities to generate a sustainable income and be self-sufficient, and
- b) the development of the capacity and skills of the members of socially and economically disadvantaged communities anywhere in the world in such a way that they are better able to identify, and help meet, their needs and to participate more fully in society, including (but without limitation) by
 - delivering training for young adults in personal and leadership skills to equip them for community leadership and transformation.
 - developing or assisting in the development of social enterprises which provide employment and training opportunities, sustainability of programmes, and self-empowerment of communities.

Summary of the main activities in relation to these objects

Despite Covid affecting much of our work, ICY as a movement in Africa is committed to raise a generation of God-fearing leaders who are committed to Kingdom and Community service, believing that changed lives bring about changed communities. We want to work in partnerships that are open to adaptive methods and scalability for reaching the youth with the Gospel. Empowering them to disciple one another and work together to confront structures that promote inequality, poverty and injustice, through community service, justice, dialogue and advocacy; interventions that will win them credibility to pray, care and share with the members of their communities.

ICY has continued to partner and work with various organisations throughout the challenges of Covid 19. Partnering has enabled ICY to continue with several different programmes - training youth in sharing the gospel, personal discipleship, equipping in mission and community engagement. For example, Unbanking Self an ICY Kenya program used webair to tackle hard issues facing the youth and providing them a chance and a safe space to interact with spiritual mentorship and leaders. There have been a number of zoom conferences facilitating discussion for up to 2000 young people reaching youth across Africa. This was possible because of raising money to develop a studio for on-line training and videos.

Achievements and performance

Key Partnerships

- 1) **The Government of Kenya** has asked ICY Africa to go into every school in Kenya to provide the content for Life Skills and Personal Development starting next month. We are the only organisation given permission to do this.
- 2) **Three days training of Pastors and Youth Leaders from 70 churches**, challenging the leaders that youth matters, the development of youth ministry and training young people to reach out to their peers. This is part of a nationwide vision, the programme 'To leave no Church behind' running since December 2019. To engage with every church in Kenya, except in Islamic areas. Focussing on the importance of, and training in, youth outreach and discipleship. Planning is going on for five more
- 3) **The county government of Kisumu**, Kenya approached us to conduct training to women in the 8 sub counties. Over 10000 women to be trained in collaboration with the ministry of social services which oversees churches and all religious groups. ICY will offer the training on women in leadership and entrepreneurship and the county government will give them grants to start business. Costs are to be shared, we have been asked to cover the travel costs for the trainers, £725. While in Kisumu for the planning meeting the team did training with 50 youth leaders. In any leadership training we also focus on that it's transformed lives that transform communities.
- 4) **We now have 6 partnerships with African governments** to deliver various trainings from leadership with integrity (faith-based), youth and SDGs to women empowerment and entrepreneurship - Kenya, Uganda, Zimbabwe, Namibia, eSwatini and Lesotho

We continued to assess how to be sustainable and sought to obtain grants from trusts. One has been £5000 from the Cecil King Foundation for leadership training of young people under 30 yrs old in Sierra Leone. This was started from March 2020.

ACTIVITIES:

There are numerous projects based on the 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). For example:

- (i) To encourage the youth and the church on aspect of creation care by promoting the reduction, reuse and recycling of plastic and other waste products in order to promote responsible waste management and climate action.
 - Constructed two greenhouses with capacity to recycle over one ton of plastic
 - Targeting recycling of plastics in all major slums in Kenya
 - Targeting three beach clean-ups in the Kenyan Coast
- (ii) To promote food security and reduction of hunger and poverty among the people of faith by recycling waste materials for food production and storage.
 - Produced vegetables that fed 100 family members for three months
 - Targeting to feed 1000 family members every year through the church / Community WasteWise program

(iii) To promote women and gender empowerment on leadership, innovation, financial literacy and enterprise building in order to promote their local economics and thereby improve the living standard of their families.

- Trained 4000 women since January
- Targeting 600 by December
- Established 5 Women led programs

Towards the end of this year in February, we began to realise our plans for 2020 had to change completely and we had to begin to raise money to develop a studio for on-line training and videos.

(iv) To partner with like-minded partners to minister to refugees and provide skills for innovative ideas and social enterprises for the refugee livelihood

- Trained 50 refugees on social entrepreneurship

To create awareness and advocacy on refugee issues while providing volunteer opportunities and support for young refugees

- Targeted 30 by December 2020
- Engaged over 200 volunteers in Africa to work on refugee related ministry
- Targeted 50 more volunteers by December
- Active partner on the Refugee Highway, representing the RHP in Bangkok
- Panel in the Tearfund world refugee forum

Policy Development:

Our Health & Safety and Child policies were updated for the Trustees annual meeting
Short Term Volunteers continued to assist the work during the year.

Almost the whole of ICY Ministries is run by unpaid volunteers across the 17 countries: we ask each country to be self-sustainable apart from the core team in Kenya and the African Director who oversee everything. For example, 387 volunteers in Kenya covering everything from leadership training, mentorship and leading community events.

Financial review

The income and expenditure can be seen in the Statement of Financial Activities to follow.
There is no reserves or investment policy.

Our charity had been mainly supported out of the business of David Isgrove T/A Izzy Tours. There are no reserves as such: the monthly income determining what can be done by the African Director and his team. When the pandemic hit, this business was 'mothballed' and to date has not been able to plough any resources into ICY Africa. All funding has therefore had to come from giving by individuals and organisations/churches. For the whole year, we have seen funding come in to keep the monthly support at the same level! This has enabled us to promote stability and forward planning.






NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

1. BASIS OF PREPERATION

1.1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and with the Charities Act 2011.

1.2 Going concern

There are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions that cast significant doubt on the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

1.3 Change of accounting policy

The accounts present a true and fair view and no changes have been made to the accounting policies adopted.

1.4 Changes to accounting estimates

No changes to accounting estimates have occurred in the reporting period (3.46 FRS102 SORP).

1.5 Material prior year errors

No material prior year errors have been identified in the reporting period (3.47 FRS102 SORP).

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Income

Recognition of income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the Directors are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS102 SORP or FRS102.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS102 SORP).

Tax reclaims on donations and gifts

Gift Aid receivable is included in income when there is a valid declaration from the donor. Any Gift Aid amount recovered on a donation is considered to be part of that gift and is treated as an addition to the same fund as the initial donation unless the donor or the terms of the appeal have specified otherwise.

Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Income from interest

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Investment gains and losses

This includes any realised or unrealised gains or losses on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

2.2 Expenditure and liabilities

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants with performance conditions

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants payable without performance conditions

These are only recognised in the accounts when a commitment has been made and there are no conditions to be met relating to a grant which remain in control of the charity.

Deferred Income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life or, if held under a finance lease, over the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

The directors will endeavour not to set aside funds unnecessarily.
