CHAIRPERSON'S STATEMENT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

Peckham Platform's fifth year off-site has been marked by sustained resilience, focus, ambition, and commitment. During a year of recovering from the global pandemic we have continued to deliver meaningful, locally-embedded and nationally significant projects that we are known for, whilst developing plans towards our future capital project on Peckham Square.

At a time of challenge, our team, supporters and funders have responded to a changing set of demands and challenges not only ensuring our team has been safe and able to continue to do their work from home but also ensuring that communities, partners and beneficiaries have been supported by Peckham Platform.

In combination with the global crisis and our time off-site, it has been a matter of necessity and organisational viability to continue to build deep and sustained relationships. This year we have continued to work successfully with a range of community groups and schools such as Leaders of Tomorrow, Black Heroes Foundation, Golden Oldies, Highshore and Harris Peckham Park Primary as well as continuing engagement with national cultural partners to offer support and commitment to the challenges of this year.

The *Tilting the Mirror* programme encapsulates the best of what Peckham Platform does - a cross-generational and cross-cultural exchange, firmly rooted but expansive in its aims. It is the result of multi-year funding secured from Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and Creative Civic Change, and has enabled us to develop new partnerships with important local organisations.

Peckham Platform's *Youth Platform* has continued to provide opportunities for emerging artists to develop their work in co-production with our cohort of young people. The youth platform has enabled young people to access progression routes into the creative industries and higher education. Young people have faced increased challenges this year and as a result our youth offer has focused on self-care and mental health, enabling young people to connect, meet online in a safe and brave space to create new discussions and creative work.

We are progressing with our Capital programme and are on track to establish a new permanent home on the Square in 2023. Our new home will be a transformative cultural haven for our communities and for socially engaged arts practice. It is both an important and an exciting moment and a step change in the organisation's profile and potential. We are thankful for the continued support from the Council, funders and partners and are progressing confidently with the project's adapted timeline.

Connecting all of these strands of activity are our core commitments to working with communities, supporting socially engaged artists, and championing social arts practice. This work is more vital than ever, as people and communities seek to reconnect.

I would like to thank our staff and board, our freelancers and our volunteers well as those who have participated in our programmes, our communities, partners and funders for their enthusiasm, engagement and belief in our work – I look forward to continuing it with you.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

Objectives and activities

Peckham Platform's purpose is to create meaningful and accessible social arts practice for Peckham and beyond. Established in June 2010 as Peckham Space Ltd, we formally registered the new name Peckham Platform on 29 April 2014 (a requirement of the transition from our founding institution, University of the Arts London).

The charity's art gallery and physical presence at the heart of Peckham Town Centre (London SE15) is currently closed due to the redevelopment of Peckham Square. When completed, the new space will have more space and better facilities in which to host our free public programme produced in partnership with our community partners. Until the new building is complete Peckham Platform will create and display work off-site, in different venues across Peckham and wider London.

Our projects engage a range of community partners, including local residents and young people and those with mental health needs. Each group takes part in a collaborative co-commissioning process that encourages active engagement in cultural production at the gallery and off-site during this period of transition. Through this dynamic programme Peckham Platform increases access to cultural resources for a range of beneficiaries including elders and SEN schools as well as providing educational activity and progression routes for local young people.

Our specific charitable objectives are:

- a. The establishment and maintenance of an art gallery for the exhibition to the public of modern and historical fine art, design and applied art and work done by students, young people, emerging artists and local communities;
- b. The promotion and encouragement of the education of the public in the arts, both in the gallery and elsewhere;
- c. The commissioning of location-specific artworks made in partnership with community groups;
- d. The encouragement of progression routes for young people into creative higher education;
- e. Increasing access to cultural and educational activity in the London borough of Southwark and throughout Greater London.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Achievements and performance highlights in 2021/2022

Peckham Platform delivered activities of public benefit that furthered our charitable objectives during the year April 2021 - March 2022 as outlined in this section of our report.

In summary, we have:

1. Adapted and adjusted our organisation and programme in response to recovering from the Covid-19 pandemic.
2. Used our fifth year without a dedicated gallery space to present and develop our off-site work, undertaking community partnerships to support this ambition.
3. Continued with a long-term programme of organisational growth, providing 110 hrs (219 in 2020-21) of Training & Development and Coaching & Mentoring across our team.
4. Demonstrated ongoing commitment to placing the voice of the artist and of young people at the heart of our organisation by recruiting dedicated Youth Trustee positions
5. Awarded 31 Arts Awards with two local schools

Co-commissioned Exhibition Programme

Peckham Platform's co-commissioning model is what makes the organisation unique. It actively engages diverse local communities through a genuinely collaborative process. For each commission Peckham Platform works with a section of the local community to jointly identify and refine the themes that artists will address, co-develop a brief, co-select artists and maintain a joint decision-making process throughout. The organisation's role is one of facilitation ensuring the community remains active in the commission and to promote engagement through to the eventual creative outcome – be it an exhibition, installation or event.

In 2021-22 Peckham Platform reached more than 45,250 audiences including 12,000 through participating in a local festival. There were 14 commissions of new artworks of which 5 were public art commissions and 7 online creative and accessible products, 3 exhibitions and 1 festival. The majority of audiences were 57% underserved and hard to reach audiences. Our largest audience group were aged between 25-34 years of age and 52% of total audiences identified as Black or Black British.

Creating Civic Change / Tilting the Mirror

In 2019, Peckham Platform was awarded funding for a 3-year inter-generational and cross-cultural project championing meaningful and creative civic change in Peckham. The project is supported by The National Lottery Community Fund, the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation, Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and Local Trust Creative Civic Change. In response to the Covid-19 pandemic we received additional support from the London Community Response Fund (LCRF) via City Bridge Trust. At the centre of this initiative is the ambition to establish a greater knowledge and understanding of community-led cultural activity and to 'tilt the mirror' on negative perceptions of Peckham.

Since 2019, the project has evolved not only to the challenges of rapid regeneration but also to the impacts of the pandemic. Since 2020, 'Tilting the Mirror' and its programmed iterations has focused on working with local community groups with differing levels of need. Current partners include activities with Walworth Golden Oldies, Black Heroes Foundation, Peckham Park Baptist Church and Leaders of Tomorrow. Activities have been developed to boost emotional and physical wellbeing and attainment through cultural visits to Tate Britain, the National Theatre and the Serpentine. Initially, the project had one "lead" commissioning artist per year; for 2021 Resolve Collective worked with elders and young people programming audio walks to collect memories rooted in locality. For the final year of the project, partners have lead on their own strand and have co-designed smaller activities with multiple artists and creatives better suited to working across resident needs. Summer 2021 saw the first public presentation of the project with the Message we bring, a celebration of community through sound based at the Palms of Peckham, an Afrocentric retail space, primarily led by working class Black and migrant women. Throughout July the Palms hosted live performances, creative activities, workshops and emotional mapping exercises. Attendees and partners received free beauty treatments along with free hot caribbean meals provided by a south London small business. The age range of attendees ranged from 3 to 75 years old.

Public Realm

In preparation Peckham Platform's 2023 move back to Peckham Square, the organisation continues to develop socially engaged public programming comprised of commissions, projects and activities that make use of familiar and vernacular spaces including shopfronts, billboards, hoardings and the role of sound based gatherings as part of community histories.

Summer 2021 and Spring 2022 saw the arrival of two public realm graphic works by the artist Azarra Amoy. Situated on the shutters of 91-93 Peckham High Street as well as the Pride of Peckham mega banner at Kumasi Market, 74 Peckham High Street; Collaborative sound works created with A.G., the DJ with local young people and elders formed the centre of a presentation in the heart of Peckham and Waum Fi Dem (WFD) co-led by the Peckham Partnership and Resolve Collective, an interdisciplinary design collective that combines architecture, engineering, technology and art to address social challenges, and the Peckham Partnership. WFD was a co-designed series of workshops that used experimental methods of storytelling, recording, and experiences, documented from different time periods in the area. This activity feeds into the upcoming summer festival on Peckham Square; a long weekend of activities with a mobile library designed by Yes Make that doubles up as a sound system at its centre and will provide a space for learning, music, reflection and celebration.

September 2021 also saw our first partnership with Gala as part of our offsite programme. Youth Platform co-designed and curated a bespoke pergola in Peckham Rye Park. Inspired by communities local to Peckham and South London the arched structure was layered with Batik, Ankara and textures with histories in storytelling and craft based traditions. Visitors were invited to explore themes of community, mental health, and art. Over the course of three days 22,000 people attended the festival encountering the artwork, with many leaving a message in response to the question "How Do the Arts Help Us Find a Community?". In June 2022, Youth Platform, supported by partners Flat Time House and co-designed with artist Melanie Issaka will create an installation that combines Cyanotype (a slow-reacting, economic and distinctively blue photographic printing technique) with large sensory objects made from recycled materials.

Social Art Research

This year sees Peckham Platform's continued development in fulfilling the core organisational aim of 'excellence in commissioning and researching social art'. Under the new stewardship of new Artistic Director, Nephertiti Schandorf partnerships are being developed with the Social Art Network with whom Peckham Platform commissioned and co-hosted two meet-ups over the spring of 2022. The first explored EDI from three perspectives: working class students, digitised oppression and policy for arts organisations. Part of the research was developed from the AHRC funded fellowship Social Art For Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (SAFEDI) held in partnership with Axis and Manchester Metropolitan University. The second was for Latinx artists. One of the fastest growing migrant communities in the UK, negotiating invisibility and a lack of space to connect, especially for those working within the cultural sector. This meet up was a pilot to create a space where social artists can gather and create community. Nephertiti has also been a panel member for London Borough of Southwark's Public Art Policy Renewal and the Black Cultural Centre engagement process. She has also spoken at Space Studios' Symposium 'Who Cares?' with a focus on audience engagement. In spring 2022 Nephertiti became a trustee of Artichoke and also joined the panel for Art on the Underground.

Learning

Youth Platform

Our youth programme Youth Platform engaged young people aged between 16-22 years of age and particularly supported those who are underrepresented in the arts to realise their creative ambitions. Peckham Platform's Youth Platform was awarded funding from Portal Trust, Art Fund and Charterhouse Southwark to continue our work with young people, ensuring those who were particularly affected by the crisis were offered creative and wellbeing support.

Youth Platform participants have received more than 25 hours of personalised mentoring, skills and professional development as well as social and wellbeing support to help with portfolio development. They also received advice and connections towards entry points into the creative industries. As a result, our cohort of young people has progressed to 3 paid work opportunities and 4 people have been accepted to further education.

Communications

The past year has seen us continue to work off site in a variety of different contexts, by experimenting with new approaches and creating new partnerships we have achieved some excellent communications outcomes. Our social media presence continues to be strong and engages with relevant audiences, with a total of 68,352 social followers and subscribers. We have established productive partnerships with other cultural organisations on our social media campaigns - gaining access to new audiences and mutually supporting each other's work.

Extensive work has been undertaken to develop Peckham Platform's new brand identity with the aim to align to our communications with our core audiences and beneficiaries. This has been made possible by the generous support in kind by Culture Shock Media. The new brand design will be launched with a new accessible website in 2021.

Highlights include: Young people worked with Artist Barbara Majek over a 12-week online programme which explored textiles, collaborative making and art and wellbeing, alongside receiving support for their individual professional development. Youth Platform hosted an online creative professional development event with artist Zuleika Lebow, which brought together early career artists and other young adults in a workshop around creative approaches that engage with issues of accessibility, race, disability and language. Over the summer of 2021, one Youth Platform member led a successful artist takeover on Peckham Platform's social media, reaching over 4000 followers. As we develop our new home on Peckham Square, our programme continues to deliver events and installations in different venues across Peckham, celebrating and connecting with its unique heritage and identity. In February, Youth Platform collaborated with artist Azarra Amoy to create the The Pride of Peckham Mega Banner and a series of artworks displayed on shop-front buildings on Peckham High Street.

Following the success of the previous year's 'Digital Tapestry' – and online project with artist Meera Shakti Osborne and producer A.G worked centred around self-care, activism, healing and individual expression – Youth Platform developed the project into a interactive installation showcased at the 2021 Gala Festival in Peckham's Rye Park. The piece created a space for reflection and engagement, and asking visitors "How do the arts help us find a community?", and was contributed to over 300 members of the public.

Art Awards

The Arts Awards focused on developing the interests, knowledge and skills of the participating students through their active participation in arts, reviewing their experience, and researching the career and work of an artist or craftsperson that inspires them. Through a total of 46 hours of learning time they developed and created their own digital portfolios and used audio, video, writing and photography to develop their planning and communication skills.

The offer of the Arts Awards was highly appreciated by the two participating schools. Staff reported that the project significantly supported their own and the students' well-being and mental health during a time of challenge and pandemic recovery. In total Peckham Platform delivered 23 sessions. We are proud of the students who participated and are pleased to report that 15 students successfully received an Explore level Arts Award and 16 students successfully received a Discover level Arts Awards.

Financial review

Peckham Platform's finances are robust and managed effectively. Incoming resources for the year decreased by £38,107 to £309,536. Expenditure increased by £27,350 to £271,943 (excluding gifts in kind of services of rent £18,000, marketing £90,000 and fundraising £10,000) . The net result is a surplus of £37,593 (2021: £103,050 surplus), of which £6,892 relates to unrestricted funds. Total reserves at 31/3/22 are £85,172 (general), £29,769 designated and £190,817 restricted funds.

The reserves are represented by current assets of £318,882 fixed assets £49,726, creditors of £(62,850). £55,000 of creditors is "deferred income", funds received in advance of the delivery of projects in future accounting periods.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's operating expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This is the level of reserves, which the Trustees will work towards achieving in future periods.

Plans for the future

Progress is being made to launch our new home on Peckham Square, working in partnership with London Borough of Southwark (LBS) who have committed major initial investment to the plans for Peckham Platform's new venue. The new gallery will be at the heart of an ambitious vision for Peckham Platform which will see expanded activities, audiences and participation opportunities; increasing our ability to create transformational artistic opportunities for communities facing the greatest need in Peckham and beyond. The redeveloped gallery will welcome all communities to a permanent and resilient home for our ground-breaking work, building on over 10 years at the forefront of social art.

We are working to secure funds to match LBS's commitment ensuring the creation of a new Peckham Platform that meets future ambitions for the benefit of all our audiences.

In the coming year further emphasis will be placed on our Public Commissioning programme, engaging artists who represent the communities Peckham Platform serves. A continued focus on partnerships – fostering new ones and deepening those established will take place. Continue emphasis will be placed on finding ways to reach and work with different audiences. Peckham Platform has developed a strong partnership with LBS, which is vital to the Charity's long-term future on Peckham Square, this partnership which is strengthened by a 25-year lease for the new venue.

Peckham Platform is committed to ensuring that a changing Peckham is responsive to all of its communities and will work to highlight the voices of those that can be marginalised within the framework of regeneration. The organisations' co-commissioning model will continue to be essential for the development of meaningful artistic responses from local communities. Work will continue with local groups and arts organisations and deliver strategic commissions.

Peckham Platform has successfully secured multi-year funding for the intergenerational programme 'Tilting the Mirror' via Create Civic Change and the Local Trust. Alongside funding from Esmée Fairbairn Foundation to deliver the programme, as well as multi-year funding for the Youth Platform work from Portal Trust; next year will see the organisation develop and deepen this work as it moves towards the new home on Peckham Square. Continued work on strengthening research and thinking towards the formation of a Social Arts Resource and Social Arts Network.

Financial challenges are a central consideration in running a new charity. Reflecting this, there are sub-committees of the board which include:

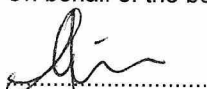
- Finance and General Purposes Subcommittee

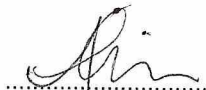

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Peckham Platform Limited is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Quay House, Kings Grove, 2c Peckham Platform, Peckham, London, SE15 2NB.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)". The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts.

1.5 Resources expended

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Overheads are apportioned to activities on a reasonable basis for example, hours engaged in different activities for staff costs or floor area for premises costs.

Irrecoverable VAT is allocated in the same way as the cost which it is associated with.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

IT equipment	25% straight line
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The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in income/ (expenditure for the year, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease.

Recognised impairment losses are reversed if, and only if, the reasons for the impairment loss have ceased to apply. Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately, unless the relevant asset is carried in at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase.

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
