The people with whom we work are typically in poverty and cannot contribute sufficiently in order to allow our unrestricted income to meet our full organisational costs. During this period we were aware that grants were not available from any non-NHS or Local Authority source which would fund counselling provision, and were therefore preparing our team for the potential closure of Open Minds in April 2022 if funding was not secured.



Aims and objectives

The principal objects of the charitable company are:

To provide a counselling organisation available to all clients, offering services including counselling, personal development training to children aged 8 and above and adults who are underprivileged on any issue.

This benefits the public because it is a subsidised or free service which is otherwise not available within the Doncaster area. People accessing our service would otherwise have no access to psychological support of this nature.

Review of the activities of the Company

The main activities undertaken are providing a counselling service for adults and young people from the age of 8 years, couples and relationship counselling and family therapies. Also hypnotherapy, personal development training for the public and delivery of courses for professionals.

Expanded services included providing training to adults and children on emotional awareness raising, including self-esteem building.

This benefits the public because it is a subsidised service which is otherwise not available within the doncaster area. People accessing our service would otherwise have no access to psychological support of this nature.

Summary of the main achievements during the period

Floods, Gas Leaks, Pandemics, Oh My!

To say this year has been a rollercoaster is probably an understatement! Prior to October 2019 we struggled with a key staff member being out of work for a substantial portion of the year, meaning that a key role within the organisation had to be absorbed by others, reducing our capacity to support children and young people. Due to surging numbers of children and young people on the waiting list we consulted families on what they would benefit from, and planned a new project under the lottery which would allow young people to drop in on a Saturday and have a calming, fun space, run by two of our CYP counsellors. We began a garden design and restoration project which culminated in July 2019 at our Open Day, creating an outdoor creative space for children and especially serving as a sensory space for neuro-atypical clients. The children's support group was called Saturday Space. We designed the room in consultation with young people already attending therapy, and were donated monies to make it a suitable space. This even included a PS3 and games! Unfortunately despite being designed by and with children and young people and with them in mind the Saturday Space service had no attendees at any point! We were very sorry to have no children and young people to work with, but our evaluation could not really explain why. Families and the young people themselves frequently expressed interest and professionals often contacted Open Minds about the Saturday Space, but this did not translate into attendance. We therefore redeployed the Saturday Space children's counsellors back to one to one work.

Floods!

In November 2019 we had a different type of adversity, when the rains came! Not only did large parts of Doncaster flood, but our building itself suffered minor damage due to the rains, as one of our ceilings was leaking! For client and staff safety we were closed sporadically when people could not reach us safely. We phoned all of our clients however on every occasion to check in with them and make sure if they needed support it was available to them. This lead on to the landlord scheduling a boiler replacement, and ceiling repair – causing more disruption! During this period we again couldn't see clients, for health and safety, and spent most of our time moving furniture back and forth out of the way of the workmen. One positive however was that we paid extra for the workmen to install radiators on our floor, as we have not had central heating in the building until now. When we were finally back on track, after losing nearly all of November to floods and subsequent boiler refitting we then had a ...

Gas Leak!

Actually we didn't, but after the boiler people left and we re-opened, we thought we had a gas leak, and had to close for one day as an emergency while the gas board came to check! By this point we thought we were jinxed, but thankfully our clients were incredibly understanding. We phoned, texted and wrote letters of apology to all of the clients affected, they themselves were understanding of the disruption being out of our control. Cumulatively we had been closed to the public unexpectedly and sporadically for nearly 7 weeks in November and December combined.

Once 2020 arrived, we were back on track, successfully managing the waiting list, working well with children, young people and adults, and looking at new ways of improving our services. When all of a sudden...

Pandemic!

Teaching us that you should never count your chickens, the universe brought us the collective trauma that has been COVID19 and lockdown. On 17th March 2020 we took the decision to begin remote working. We spent the day phoning every client and counsellor of Open Minds and giving them the opportunity to wait until face to face counselling could resume, or to begin working by telephone or video calling. Thankfully after the initial shock to the system of getting the systems and resources in place to let us operate effectively, we began to pick up steam. Internet problems, difficulties getting in touch with our insurers and so forth delayed us initially but after a week we were again operational. We had been frightened at first that our capacity would drop too much to allow us to be effective but we found we went from 114+ face to face clients a week, to initially 30 clients remotely, to around 70 clients aged 13 and over remotely, with referrals continuing to increase. This was achieved even in spite of a reduction in the availability of our counsellors, as many had small children or other caring responsibilities at home which prevented them being able to offer counselling, alongside others who experienced their own losses during this period, and were no longer emotionally able to provide counselling while they themselves grieved. We also lost several staff, not to death but due to choosing to leave due to personal circumstances which made their continued employment or volunteering impossible.

IMP;ACT!

At the same time as lockdown began we started to deliver an entirely new service, known as IMP;ACT. Drawing on our extensive experience working with children and adults with life distress, suicidality and complex needs, Open Minds developed the IMP;ACT service to provide a combination of practical and psychological support to individuals who had intended to die within 12 months of referral.

Providing long-term, professional led support to wrap around the individual, IMP;ACT delivers highly specialist and comprehensive care to individuals who would otherwise drop out of the system until future completion of suicide. IMP;ACT is a thorough process of unpicking all the damaging elements of an individual's life and approach to living, and rebuilding these into healthy, functional patterns of behaving and being. As such, IMP;ACT works in-depth with a tightly-controlled caseload of service users in order to maintain effective working. During the first 16 month of the service IMP;ACT received 44 referrals and worked with 20 individuals to move them into long term coping and healthy behaviours. IMP;ACT's SROI (Social Return On Investment) is £269 per £1 invested, with 10 individuals directly stating they would have completed suicide without the intervention of IMP;ACT. The 2021 IMP;ACT report is available at: Reports | IMP;ACT Team (making-an-impact.com) The budget for IMP;ACT is £52,204 per annum, for 2 years

Risks

The directors regularly review the risks that the company faces and seek to manage them accordingly.

Financial risks faced include loss of grant funding. In order to manage this risk we are continually looking for further restricted funds to continue our work and also encourage donations to build up reserves. Another risk is student counsellors leaving Open Minds. This risk is managed by working with Colleges and advertising placement opportunities for their students.

The company's policy on reserves

We have implemented a suggested minimum donation of £3 per session for both counselling and training in order to build up unrestricted reserves. With this, Open Minds will be able to continue paying its overheads when funding has expired.

Responsibilities of the trustees

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company at the end of the year and of the surplus or deficiency for the year then ended.

In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to: select suitable accounting policies, as described on page 8, and then apply them on a consistent basis, making judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable. The members of the Committee must also prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

1. Accounting policies

Basis of the preparation of the accounts

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities - Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP revised 2005), UK accounting standards applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015), and the Companies Act 2006. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible assets at the following annual rates calculated in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value over their useful economic lives.

Incoming Resources

Grants

Resources Expended

Charitable expenditure is recognised in the financial statements on an accruals basis and inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in these cost categories. Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of these resources. In the opinion of the trustees, the proportion of indirect costs relating to management and administration of the charity is not material and has therefore not been disclosed separately.

Pension Costs

The charity participates in a group personal pension arrangement. The pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the year.

Leasing Commitments

Aims and objectives

The principal objects of the charitable company are:

To provide a counselling organisation available to all clients, offering services including counselling, personal development training to children aged 8 and above and adults who are underprivileged on any issue.

This benefits the public because it is a subsidised or free service which is otherwise not available within the Doncaster area. People accessing our service would otherwise have no access to psychological support of this nature.

Review of the activities of the Company

The main activities undertaken are providing a counselling service for adults and young people from the age of 8 years, couples and relationship counselling and family therapies. Also hypnotherapy, personal development training for the public and delivery of courses for professionals.

Expanded services included providing training to adults and children on emotional awareness raising, including self-esteem building.

This benefits the public because it is a subsidised service which is otherwise not available within the doncaster area. People accessing our service would otherwise have no access to psychological support of this nature.

Summary of the main achievements during the period

Floods, Gas Leaks, Pandemics, Oh My!

To say this year has been a rollercoaster is probably an understatement! Prior to October 2019 we struggled with a key staff member being out of work for a substantial portion of the year, meaning that a key role within the organisation had to be absorbed by others, reducing our capacity to support children and young people. Due to surging numbers of children and young people on the waiting list we consulted families on what they would benefit from, and planned a new project under the lottery which would allow young people to drop in on a Saturday and have a calming, fun space, run by two of our CYP counsellors. We began a garden design and restoration project which culminated in July 2019 at our Open Day, creating an outdoor creative space for children and especially serving as a sensory space for neuro-atypical clients. The children's support group was called Saturday Space. We designed the room in consultation with young people already attending therapy, and were donated monies to make it a suitable space. This even included a PS3 and games! Unfortunately despite being designed by and with children and young people and with them in mind the Saturday Space service had no attendees at any point! We were very sorry to have no children and young people to work with, but our evaluation could not really explain why. Families and the young people themselves frequently expressed interest and professionals often contacted Open Minds about the Saturday Space, but this did not translate into attendance. We therefore redeployed the Saturday Space children's counsellors back to one to one work.

Summary of the main achievements during the period continued

Floods!

In November 2019 we had a different type of adversity, when the rains came! Not only did large parts of Doncaster flood, but our building itself suffered minor damage due to the rains, as one of our ceilings was leaking! For client and staff safety we were closed sporadically when people could not reach us safely. We phoned all of our clients however on every occasion to check in with them and make sure if they needed support it was available to them. This lead on to the landlord scheduling a boiler replacement, and ceiling repair – causing more disruption! During this period we again couldn't see clients, for health and safety, and spent most of our time moving furniture back and forth out of the way of the workmen. One positive however was that we paid extra for the workmen to install radiators on our floor, as we have not had central heating in the building until now. When we were finally back on track, after losing nearly all of November to floods and subsequent boiler refitting we then had a ...

Gas Leak!

Actually we didn't, but after the boiler people left and we re-opened, we thought we had a gas leak, and had to close for one day as an emergency while the gas board came to check! By this point we thought we were jinxed, but thankfully our clients were incredibly understanding. We phoned, texted and wrote letters of apology to all of the clients affected, they themselves were understanding of the disruption being out of our control. Cumulatively we had been closed to the public unexpectedly and sporadically for nearly 7 weeks in November and December combined.

Once 2020 arrived, we were back on track, successfully managing the waiting list, working well with children, young people and adults, and looking at new ways of improving our services. When all of a sudden...

Pandemic!

Teaching us that you should never count your chickens, the universe brought us the collective trauma that has been COVID19 and lockdown. On 17th March 2020 we took the decision to begin remote working. We spent the day phoning every client and counsellor of Open Minds and giving them the opportunity to wait until face to face counselling could resume, or to begin working by telephone or video calling. Thankfully after the initial shock to the system of getting the systems and resources in place to let us operate effectively, we began to pick up steam. Internet problems, difficulties getting in touch with our insurers and so forth delayed us initially but after a week we were again operational. We had been frightened at first that our capacity would drop too much to allow us to be effective but we found we went from 114+ face to face clients a week, to initially 30 clients remotely, to around 70 clients aged 13 and over remotely, with referrals continuing to increase. This was achieved even in spite of a reduction in the availability of our counsellors, as many had small children or other caring responsibilities at home which prevented them being able to offer counselling, alongside others who experienced their own losses during this period, and were no longer emotionally able to provide counselling while they themselves grieved. We also lost several staff, not to death but due to choosing to leave due to personal circumstances which made their continued employment or volunteering impossible.

Summary of the main achievements during the period continued

IMP;ACT!

At the same time as lockdown began we started to deliver an entirely new service, known as IMP;ACT. Drawing on our extensive experience working with children and adults with life distress, suicidality and complex needs, Open Minds developed the IMP;ACT service to provide a combination of practical and psychological support to individuals who had intended to die within 12 months of referral.

Providing long-term, professional led support to wrap around the individual, IMP;ACT delivers highly specialist and comprehensive care to individuals who would otherwise drop out of the system until future completion of suicide. IMP;ACT is a thorough process of unpicking all the damaging elements of an individual's life and approach to living, and rebuilding these into healthy, functional patterns of behaving and being. As such, IMP;ACT works in-depth with a tightly-controlled caseload of service users in order to maintain effective working. During the first 16 month of the service IMP;ACT received 44 referrals and worked with 20 individuals to move them into long term coping and healthy behaviours. IMP;ACT's SROI (Social Return On Investment) is £269 per £1 invested, with 10 individuals directly stating they would have completed suicide without the intervention of IMP;ACT. The 2021 IMP;ACT report is available at: Reports | IMP;ACT Team (making-an-impact.com) The budget for IMP;ACT is £52,204 per annum, for 2 years

Risks

The directors regularly review the risks that the company faces and seek to manage them accordingly.

Financial risks faced include loss of grant funding. In order to manage this risk we are continually looking for further restricted funds to continue our work and also encourage donations to build up reserves. Another risk is student counsellors leaving Open Minds. This risk is managed by working with Colleges and advertising placement opportunities for their students.

The company's policy on reserves

We have implemented a suggested minimum donation of £3 per session for both counselling and training in order to build up unrestricted reserves. With this, Open Minds will be able to continue paying its overheads when funding has expired.

Responsibilities of the trustees

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company at the end of the year and of the surplus or deficiency for the year then ended.

1. Accounting policies

Basis of the preparation of the accounts

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities - Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP revised 2005), UK accounting standards applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015), and the Companies Act 2006. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible assets at the following annual rates calculated in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value over their useful economic lives.

General equipment	20% on cost
Computer equipment (IT)	33.3% on cost
Furniture, Fixtures and fittings	20% on cost

Incoming Resources

All material incoming resources have been included on a receivable basis – i.e. they are included if the date receivable falls within the period covered by these accounts.

Grants

Grants receivable funding the general activities of the company are included in the year in which they are receivable, except where the funders specify that they must be used in future accounting periods or funders conditions have not been fulfilled; then the income is deferred.

Resources Expended

Charitable expenditure is recognised in the financial statements on an accruals basis and inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in these cost categories. Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of these resources. In the opinion of the trustees, the proportion of indirect costs relating to management and administration of the charity is not material and has therefore not been disclosed separately.

Pension Costs

The charity participates in a group personal pension arrangement. The pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the year.

Leasing Commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged in the SoFA as incurred.

Donated Assets

Donated assets are treated as incoming resources and capitalised as fixed assets at a value estimated by the trustees.

Restricted and Unrestricted Funds

Restricted funds are funds received from donors which are subject to restrictions on the purposes for which they may be used. Unrestricted funds are those where there are no externally imposed restrictions. These include funds freely available to the charity for expenditure or appropriation to reserves for internally designated purposes.

Designated Funds

The charity's designated funds are established as a result of regular review of its ongoing needs by the Board of Trustees, and are intended to fully cover significant identifiable financial commitments.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and capital taxes on its charitable activities.
