Chairman's Report 2024

UDVET was formed by SOS (Save Our Scissett), SCAN (Skelmanthorpe Community Action Network) and KORS (Keep Our Rural Spaces) in June 2014, for the benefit of our local communities, mainly, but not exclusively, in the Kirklees Denby Dale Ward. As described on the Charities Commission website UDVET exists "for the public benefit, conservation and, where possible, the enhancement of the natural and architectural beauty of the area known as the Upper Dearne Valley, and in particular to conserve for the benefit of those who live in, work in, or otherwise derive pleasure from this area, the open green spaces and flora and fauna, for this and future generations."

Thus we are working with the local CEWG (Climate Emergency Working Group) in helping local residents work for a sustainable future. As part of this we took part in the local authority "Eco-Festival" at Emley First School this autumn, with our particular focus on wildlife gardening, thereby encouraging local residents to aid biodiversity and combat the extremes of climate change. Previously we had a stand at the 2022 "Eco-Fest" at Denby Dale Pie \hall, and the 2023 event at Skelmanthorpe Methodist Church. We are in the process of creating a "gardening for wildlife" leaflet to be delivered to Denby Dale Ward residents during 2025. CEWG and UDVET are also supporting the development of a reed bed waste water treatment facility outside Clayton West which is anticipated will increase the biodiversity of the area as well as returning cleaner, chemical free water to the River Dearne. A public talk on the project has been arranged for December, 2024.

UDVET welcomes positive support and information from local residents, and cooperates with other local groups and charities including CPRE (Council for the Protection of Rural England) to which we are affiliated. UDVET also links in with KORS in its activity supporting local wildlife and the habitats that are essential for the needs of wild creatures.

UDVET's community work is non-party political. We welcome good relationships with local politicians across party lines whenever possible; and are delighted to have support from people of all shades of political opinion and none.

Monitoring the various developments in Scissett, Skelmanthorpe, Denby Dale and so on also take up some time and energy. Some of these projects are not providing for the actual needs of local residents, ie, affordable housing suitable for young families and also for a growing elderly population. Unfortunately some of these developments were passed by the local authority before stronger quality conditions to be found in the 2021 House Builders Guide came into law.

Far too many undischarged planning conditions, as found in Kirklees Planning websites, exist despite building going ahead on many sites. It is possible that developers are trying to save money, in the knowledge that an understaffed planning team will not check that conditions are fulfilled. Since, due to a lack of staff, when Kirklees has put conditions on building consent, they do not then always follow up the application of those conditions.

As far as possible UDVET does inform the local authority of contraventions of planning condition permissions. Thus, eg, UDVET has given support to local councillors and residents in their concerns about inadequate drainage on the Cumberworth Road building site in Skelmanthorpe; the potential destruction of mature trees in Wood Street, Skelmanthorpe; and various other developments in the Denby Dale Ward.

UDVET continues to be particularly concerned with the proposal to build housing on a site in Denby Dale, not only because of the effect on biodiversity, schools, doctors, roads, sewage and drainage, but because this particular development would extraction of coal in the centre of Denby Dale. We supported local residents in their concerns, and have supplied Kirklees with a detailed critical analysis of the application, and kept some statutory consultees informed of matters that they did not seem cognisant of.

Many other on-going issues included, but re not limited to: the future of the former Chartist Pub in Skelmanthorpe; waste tipping; protection of trees on Wood Street, Skelmanthorpe; Place Standard for Skelmanthorpe; Bromley Farm quarry extension proposal, Upper Cumberworth; land adjacent to Inkerman Court, Denby Dale; remaining issues at the Pilling Lane development, Scissett; problems with Cumberworth Road development, Skelmanthorpe; Greenside mills development (aka Dawsons site); air pollution; future Local Plan and national NPPF revision; Kirklees draft statement including community involvement; tree preservation orders; proposed Calder Grove development affecting traffic from our area; etc.

We anticipate the revision of the Kirklees Local Plan will take up a fair proportion of our efforts in 2025.

Though our remit is not providing finance to those in need, we do raise money for UDVET expenses, thus we recently held a successful Pie & Peas and Quiz evening in Scissett Working Men's Club. Providing such events helps enhance community cohesion, which is perhaps even more important than fundraising for our charity. We thank all who supported our Quiz Evening including those who kindly brought raffle prizes.

UDVET was formed by SOS (Save Our Scissett), SCAN (Skelmanthorpe Community Action Network) and KORS (Keep Our Rural Spaces) in June 2014, for the benefit of our local communities, mainly, but not exclusively, in the Kirklees Denby Dale Ward. As described on the Charities Commission website UDVET exists "for the public benefit, conservation and, where possible, the enhancement of the natural and architectural beauty of the area known as the Upper Dearne Valley, and in particular to conserve for the benefit of those who live in, work in, or otherwise derive pleasure from this area, the open green spaces and flora and fauna, for this and future generations."

UDVET is in the process of helping some local groups consider the protection and planting of trees, including recommending Tree Preservation Orders, as in our recent support of the "Green Canopy" of Our Late Sovereign Queen Elizabeth II with the purchase and planting disease resistant 6 metre high Elm tree planted in Clayton West Millennium Green.

For the same reasons we are working with the local CEWG (Climate Emergency Working Group) in helping local residents work for a sustainable future. As part of this we took part in the local authority "Eco-Festival" at Skelmanthorpe Methodist Church this autumn, with our particular focus on wildlife gardening, thereby encouraging local residents to aid biodiversity and combat the extremes of climate change. We are in the process of creating a "gardening for wildlife" leaflet to be delivered to Denby Dale Ward residents during 2024

UDVET cooperates with KORS in its activity supporting local wildlife and the habitats that are essential for the needs of wild creatures. Thus Tanner Wood in Denby Dale has now been awarded 'ancient woodland' status.

Unfortunately, some of these developments were passed by the local authority before stronger quality conditions to be found in the 2021 House Builders Guide came into law.

We supported local residents in their concerns, and have supplied Kirklees with a detailed critical analysis of the application, and kept some statutory consultees informed of matters that they did not seem cognisant of.

Various other on-going issues such as, e.g. the future of the former Chartist Pub in Skelmanthorpe; various other developments in Skelmanthorpe and Denby Dale; the planning conditions required before building on the Greenside "Dawsons" Mills site, and the necessary repairs to the bridge over the River Dearne, and so on, etc, continue to receive our attention. We have encouraged and then supported Kirklees Council in a legal case to preventing a potential permanent footpath closure thus ensuring that the footpath adjacent to the Greenside site is preserved for the future. UDVET is investigating the tipping of building waste in the greenbelt.

UDVET welcomes positive support and information from local residents, other local groups and charities, from CPRE (Council for the Protection of Rural England), to which we are affiliated. UDVET is non-party political. We welcome good relationships with local politicians across party lines whenever possible; and are delighted to have support from people of all shades of political opinion and none.

Though our remit is not providing finance to those in need, we do raise money for UDVET expenses, thus we recently held a successful Pie & Peas and Quiz evening in Scissett Working Men's Club. Providing such events helps enhance community cohesion, which is perhaps even more important than fundraising for our charity. UDVET is in the process of helping some local groups fund the planting of trees, thereby aiding biodiversity and combating the extremes of climate change, which also joins the "Green Canopy" of Our Late Sovereign Queen Elizabeth II – including the disease resistant 6 metre high Elm tree planted in Clayton West Millennium Green.

For the same reasons we are working with the local CEWG (Climate Emergency Working Group) in helping local residents work for a sustainable future. As part of this we took part in the local authority "Eco-Festival" in Denby Dale Pie Hall, with our particular focus on wildlife gardening.

UDVET cooperates with KORS in its activity supporting local wildlife and the habitats that are essential for the needs of wild creatures.

UDVET has been particularly concerned with the proposal to build a housing estate in Denby Dale, not only because of the effect on biodiversity, schools, doctors, roads, sewage and drainage, but because this particular development would include open cast mining in the centre of Denby Dale. We supported local residents in their concerns, and have supplied Kirklees with a detailed critical analysis of the application, and kept some statutory consultees informed of matters that they did not seem cognisant of.

Information supplied, or supported by, UDVET, also formed part of the decision of Kirklees to refuse development on Open Green Space in the Denby Dale Ward. We also supported the action to give some protection to Tanner Wood within the Ward. As a result, Tanner Wood has now been awarded 'ancient woodland' status.

Various other on-going issues such as, eg, the future of the former Chartist Pub in Skelmanthorpe, the planning conditions required before building on the Greenside "Dawsons" Mills site, and the necessary repairs to the bridge over the River Dearne, and so on, etc, continue to receive our attention.

UDVET welcomes positive support and information from local residents, other local groups and charities, from CPRE (Council for the Protection of Rural England). UDVET is non-party political. We welcome good relationships with local politicians across party lines whenever possible; and are delighted to have support from people of all shades of political opinion and none.

Chairman's Report 2021

UDVET was formed by SOS (Save Our Scissett), SCAN (Skelmanthorpe Community Action Network) and KORS (Keep Our Rural Spaces) in June 2014, for the benefit of our local communities, mainly, but not exclusively, in the Kirklees Denby Dale Ward. As described on the Charities Commission website UDVET exists "for the public benefit, conservation and, where possible, the enhancement of the natural and architectural beauty of the area known as the Upper Dearne Valley, and in particular to conserve for the benefit of those who live in, work in, or otherwise derive pleasure from this area, the open green spaces and flora and fauna, for this and future generations."

A major aim is to help preserve the green belt and green fields around our villages, and to encourage a more sensible approach to development: building what is required in the places that are suitable - rather than allowing more-or-less uncontrolled massive commuter estates and huge warehouses to swamp our green spaces and green belt.

In the right place we welcome truly affordable homes, not least for local residents; and also homes that are suited and affordable for a growing older population

We keep an eye on situations that are unhelpful to the local community; but we also welcome and encourage positive things that enhance our villages.

The earlier part of this year continued to be marked by the coronavirus pandemic, which did restrict meetings and other activities –affected the work of Kirklees Council, local charitable and environmental agencies, community and cultural action, and so on.

Following UDVET's work with a planning lawyer in recent years, we continue to check the outcomes of the current Local Plan in the Denby Dale ward area. KORS (Keep Our Rural Spaces) sent a response to "The Kirklees Open Space Supplementary Planning Document" on behalf of UDVET.

As far as possible UDVET continues to respond to the issues of planning procedures, housing needs including potential sites, industrial and commercial requirements and potential sites, greenbelt release, and so on. We continue to work with and support other organizations, such as KCAN

(Kirklees Community Action Network), CPRE and various other similar groups from Holmfirth, Hade Edge, Mirfield, etc; including advice given to, and making detailed representations on behalf of, the "Cumberworth Road Action Group" (CRAG) in Skelmanthorpe, and the "Denby Dale Inkerman 100 New Houses - Planning Application" group in Denby Dale.

We were in the process of joining CoVoP (Community Voice on Planning) but sadly this organization became defunct.

UDVET continues to monitor Discharge of Conditions for the proposed 190 house development off Cumberworth Road, Skelmanthorpe. Unfortunately some of the conditions were not met before work on site was allowed to commence; despite Kirklees Planning Department being alerted to any such breaches. Among other issues we have concerns about the spacing between houses, the effectiveness of drains and flood mitigation, provision for carparking, the loss of habitat through the removal of old hedging and the lack of new hedge boundaries within the development.

As previously stated, Kirklees often appear reluctant to enforce their own planning conditions, which in part (but only in part) may be due to the loss of personnel within the Council over the last few years, and the pandemic problems this year – thus the long-term problems of resolving the 'ransom strip' situation with Kirklees Council, as Trustee of the Clayton West Baths Charity (Scissett Baths), lacking some openness and transparency, with properly detailed accounts, concerning the sale of a ransom strip to Redrow that they required to allow building on the Pilling Lane site.

UDVET continues to monitor the development off Pilling Lane, Scissett. Apart from the overall effect on the wildlife and green spaces around Scissett, UDVET has concerns about the nature of the houses being build, their design and spacing, drainage and flooding issues, heavy vehicles on roads before the agreed times to start work, and many other issues (which can be read in UDVET minutes).

We are glad to note that Kirklees has taken some responsibility for the damaged bridge over the River Dearne in Clayton West (off the A636).

Our support cooperating with local residents to ensure that local firms do not pollute air, and water courses, has made slow progress with the statutory authorities.

We are hoping to work with the "Greener Kirklees" officials in a 'Keep it Green – Stop the Chop' initiative and have already encouraged a firmer response from the local authority in protecting various trees that have a tree preservation order (TPO); as well as promoting more room for wildlife and wild plants in relevant spaces. We welcomed the planting of a small orchard off Huddersfield Road, Skelmanthorpe (opposite "The Triangle")

Other issues of importance that UDVET has considered, and/or that UDVET members have been active with, include: litter picking in Scissett hedgerows and green spaces; monitoring heavy good wagons in local villages. We hope that there will be a satisfactory community resolution to the sale of the old Baptist Chapel in Clayton West but recognise that financial and legal issues may not bring about such an outcome.

We welcome the renewal of the former Chartist Pub in Skelmanthorpe as a space for industrial employment but have objected to the removal of several trees behind this building, and have concerns about the proposed design and layout of the new industrial buildings next to the area of trees (especially since it seems this may not provide much additional employment).

Local residents have raised problems of bad parking, and examples of poor driving in the area. We have begun the process of looking at how a Traffic Warden, dedicated to the Denby Dale ward, might be funded.

Some of our activities concern Kirklees Council and its Cabinet and thus it is important to reiterate that UDVET is non-party political. We welcome good relationships with local politicians across party lines whenever possible; and are delighted to have support from people of all shades of political opinion and none. Mark Eastwood MP joined one of our sessions to discuss various issues relating to the work of our charity.

UDVET is in the process of creating a new website.

UDVET has put into place procedures and policies concerning Data Protection and Data Audits in line with the GDPR (General Data Protection Regulation) of May 2018. A copy of our policy may be requested.

Though our remit is not providing finance to those in need, we do need to raise money for UDVET expenses, thus we recently held a successful Pie & Peas and Quiz evening in Scissett Working Men's Club. Providing such events helps enhance community cohesion, which is perhaps even more important than fundraising for our charity. It seems that the Denby Dale Pie Hall may be reopened for some sort of community use.

2020 Report

UDVET was formed by SOS (Save Our Scissett), SCAN (Skelmanthorpe Community Action Network) and KORS (Keep Our Rural Spaces) in June 2014, for the benefit of our local communities, mainly, but not exclusively, in the Kirklees Denby Dale Ward.

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A major aim is to help preserve the green belt and green fields around our villages, and to encourage a more sensible approach to development: building what is required in the places that are suitable - rather than allowing more-or-less uncontrolled massive commuter estates and huge warehouses to swamp our green spaces and green belt.

We keep an eye on situations that are unhelpful to the local community; but we also welcome and encourage positive things that enhance our villages.

This year, of course, has been sadly marked by the coronavirus pandemic, with its subsequent restrictions of meetings and other activities – which have affected the work of Kirklees Council, local charitable and environmental agencies, community and cultural action, among numerous other groups.

Following UDVET's work with a planning lawyer in recent years, we continue to check in detail the outcomes of Kirklees current Local Plan in the Denby Dale ward area; and also, thanks to Helen France, we sent a comprehensive response to the government's "Draft Response to Planning for the Future v.1" This took into account the work of CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England)

As far as possible UDVET continues to respond to such issues such as planning procedures, housing needs and potential sites, industrial and commercial needs and potential sites, quarrying applications (especially those in our area), greenbelt release, and so on. Within the constraints of coronavirus we have worked with and supported other organizations, such as KCAN (Kirklees Community Action Network), CPRE and various other similar groups from Holmfirth, Hade Edge, Mirfield, etc; including advice given to the "Cumberworth Road Action Group" (CRAG) in Skelmanthorpe, and the "Denby Dale Inkerman 100 New Houses - Planning Application" group in Denby Dale.

UDVET continues to monitor Discharge of Conditions for the proposed 190 house development off Cumberworth Road, Skelmanthorpe. A total of 14 separate conditions have to be met before any work on site will be allowed to commence.

As previously stated Kirklees often appear reluctant to enforce their own planning conditions, which in part (but only in part) may be due to the loss of personnel within the Council over the last few years, and the pandemic problems this year – thus the long term problems of resolving the

'ransom strip' situation with Kirklees Council, as Trustee of the Clayton West Baths Charity (Scissett Baths), lacking some openness and transparency, with properly detailed accounts, concerning the sale of a ransom strip to Redrow that they required to allow building on the Pilling Lane site.

We are glad that Kirklees have taken some responsibility for the damaged bridge over the River Dearne in Clayton West (off the A636)..

Our support cooperating with local residents to ensure that local firms do not pollute air, and water courses, has made slow progress with the statutory authorities.

UDVET has also actively opposed further development on Station Road, Skelmanthorpe on both traffic and environmental issues and loss of bird nesting habitat. Major trees on the proposed site have been preserved and are now subject to Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs). Drainage remains a major issue in the area too.

Other issues of importance that UDVET has considered, and/or that UDVET members have been active with, include: litter picking in Scissett hedgerows and green spaces; monitoring heavy good wagons in local villages; also UDVET members have lent support to other local groups in removing weeds from pavements and curbs and clearing Ponker Lane to ensure sufficient space for pedestrians to walk safely; and so on

Since some of our activities concern Kirklees Council and its Cabinet it is important to reiterate that UDVET is non-party political.
