Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 August 2021.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The Company is a registered charity, governed by its Articles of Association.

The objects of the charity are the advancement of education and of the arts and in particular the art and science of music in all its aspects by the maintenance and support and development of youth orchestras and other music ensembles for the young people of Nottinghamshire and its environs and the fostering of public knowledge and appreciation of music by public performance.

Objectives, strategies and activities

The orchestra runs five music groups, and all of these were able to continue rehearsals online during the Covid-19 lockdowns. There were three orchestras; a training orchestra for members with a standard above grade 3, an intermediate orchestra for members who have reached a standard around grade 5 and above, and a senior orchestra for players from grade 6 to grade 8+. There are also two jazz groups operating under the name of Nottingham Youth Jazz Orchestra (NYJO).

All groups rehearse towards the presentation of public performances. After the cancellation of several concerts due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the orchestras were finally able to stage a well-attended concert at the Albert Hall, Nottingham in July 2021. Unfortunately, due to government restrictions, it was not possible for the usual residential weekends and the annual tour to take place. We did, however, do a series of "virtual" performances online, thanks to technically savvy conductor. Each student recorded their part at home, and these were all put together to make videos for parents and friends.

In addition to regular weekly rehearsals, the organisation also runs workshop training days, when groups of instruments from all three orchestras are given coaching by nationally recognised tutors with a view to enhancing the participants' appreciation and understanding of the skill of orchestral playing. Online conducting coaching was offered for the older students during lockdown, and was very popular.

All musical activities are overseen by an experienced group of music tutors, without whose enthusiasm and commitment the Company would not be able to do all it does, and their contribution is greatly valued. We have a small budget for professional development which tutors are able to access.

Particular note must be made this year of the extraordinary efforts made by the tutors, orchestra manager, administrators, and parent volunteers to ensure that the enthusiasm of the members for performing music was maintained during the pandemic. Considerable work was undertaken in maintaining online provision and, when 'in-person' rehearsals were again permitted, that COVID compliance was fully adhered to.

Public benefit

The orchestra's objects, which the trustees believe embrace any public benefit requirement, are shown above. In addition the orchestra has developed a system of bursaries to ensure that musicians, whatever their background, can join in our activities. The bursaries are means tested, and this year thirteen children (from nine families) have benefitted from the scheme.

For certain concerts, tickets are made available at a very low price specifically aimed at children attending schools in the more deprived areas of the local community.

The trustees approved a grant of £100 to the parent/guardian of every child in the orchestras, towards the cost of their private instrument lessons. Over £15,500 was paid from the accrued income from the Lorna Needham

Restricted Fund to cover this.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

Financial review

Excluding the Lorna Needham Restricted Fund, there was a deficit on unrestricted funds of £539. The Company set a budget which aimed to use £1,345 from unrestricted reserves and has managed expenditure strictly during the year. This year we again made an Orchestra Tax Relief (OTR) claim upon HMRC, which allows us to claim credits against rehearsal expenses. In this accounting year, the OTR contributed £11,227 to our income.

The Needham Fund (balance £246,905 as at 31st August 2021) considerably distorts the 'bottom line' on the balance sheet and can give an air of financial security to the organisation which is misleading—unrestricted funds were only £27,768 at the year-end. Work is ongoing to see if the restrictions placed on the Needham Fund can be interpreted more broadly but, in the meantime, the trustees are acutely aware of the need to increase unrestricted reserves. Given that operating income from membership subscriptions and ticket sales cannot be increased significantly, and costs are already well-controlled, this means that attention must be given in the coming year to raising funds from grant-making trusts and similar sources.

Nottingham Youth Orchestra has weathered the effects of the pandemic remarkably well and looks forward to a time when the full range of concerts, residential weekends, and tours can again be offered to its members.

Policy on reserves

It is the policy of the trustees to accumulate and maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity, to a level which will equate to at least four months' expenditure.

Actual unrestricted reserves at 31 August 2021 are £27,768. Restricted funds as at 31 August 2021 are £250,111.

Trustees' Report

Structure, governance and management

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The Directors whose names are shown on page 3 served from and to the dates shown on that page.

Whilst no formal training has been undertaken, all trustees appointed have a wide and practical knowledge of the workings of musical groups and orchestras. Amongst the Directors are those with legal and accountancy backgrounds and previous charitable experience. The Company aims to have a wide range of skills amongst the Directors and representation from both parents and the musical staff, both groups being key stakeholders in the organisation.

Organisational structure

The Company is governed by a Board consisting of the Directors listed on page 3. The Board has overall responsibility for governance of the Company, approves the annual budget and oversees the finances, approves policies, appoints key personnel and develops the strategic direction of the Company.

An operations committee comprising the Orchestra Manager (who chairs this committee), Administrators, a tutor representative and parent and other volunteers meets regularly to oversee the day-to-day operations of the Company.

The Company is assisted by an Artistic Advisor, James Lowe, whose experience and wise counsel is greatly appreciated.

The orchestra values very much the time devoted to its administration and smooth running by volunteers. These are principally parents helping at concerts and other functions. In addition to the trustees, all other members of the committee give freely of their time.

Some years ago, NYO decided to appoint a paid administrator due to the very considerable amount of work generated in running an organisation involving the delivery of our activities to more than 250 children across five groups. That appointment has undoubtedly proved to be the right decision. Paula Watt is our employed administrator, and she does a superb job in handling myriad queries, keeping our records up to date, communicating with all involved and generally keeping the administration in order. We also benefit from the services of a self-employed assistant administrator, Catharine Lester (who is also one of our orchestra tutors), to support Paula. Her role focuses on recruitment, orchestra auditions and organisation of events such as residencies and socials. We owe Paula and Catharine a huge debt of gratitude for all their hard work on our behalf.

The Board provides a small annual remuneration to its Treasurer, Laurence Cunnington ACIB.

Risk management

The trustees have considered the major operational risks faced by the charity and believe that they have imposed sufficient controls to reduce these to a minimum.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors of Nottingham Youth Orchestra Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with the United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and applicable law and regulations. The report and accounts have been prepared in accordance with the provisions in the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

Trustees' Report

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. - prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

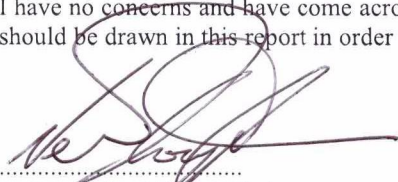

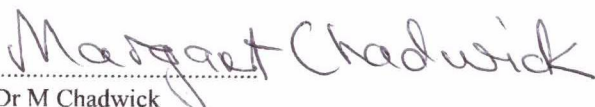

1 Charity status

The charity is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)) (issued in October 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Basis of preparation

Nottingham Youth Orchestra Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the charity.

When reviewing the overall financial position of Nottingham Youth Orchestra Ltd as a going concern, the Board excludes the Needham Fund in the light of its highly restricted nature.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Income and endowments

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations and legacies

Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the charity before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Legacy gifts are recognised on a case by case basis following the grant of probate when the administrator/executor for the estate has communicated in writing both the amount and settlement date. In the event that the gift is in the form of an asset other than cash or a financial asset traded on a recognised stock exchange, recognition is subject to the value of the gift being reliably measurable with a degree of reasonable accuracy and the title to the asset having been transferred to the charity.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £50 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Fixed asset investments

Fixed asset investments, other than programme related investments, are included at market value at the balance sheet date. Realised gains and losses on investments are calculated as the difference between sales proceeds and their market value at the start of the year, or their subsequent cost, and are charged or credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period of disposal.

Unrealised gains and losses represent the movement in market values during the year and are credited or charged to the Statement of Financial Activities based on the market value at the year end.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Pensions and other post retirement obligations

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme which is a pension plan under which fixed contributions are paid into a pension fund and the charity has no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions even if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods.

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when they are due. If contribution payments exceed the contribution due for service, the excess is recognised as a prepayment.

Financial instruments

Fair value measurement

The best evidence of fair value is a quoted price for an identical asset in an active market. When quoted prices are unavailable, the price of a recent transaction for an identical asset provides evidence of fair value as long as there has not been a significant change in economic circumstances or a significant lapse of time since the transaction took place. If the market is not active and recent transactions of an identical asset on their own are not a good estimate of fair value, the fair value is estimated by using a valuation technique.
