Chair's Foreword

I am pleased to have this opportunity to present the ninth Report and Accounts for our Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) which became a registered charity on 8 July 2014.

Throughout 2022 and into 2023, older individuals faced a multitude of challenges, compounded by the unforeseeable nature of events such as the Covid pandemic and the subsequent cost-of-living crisis. From grappling with issues like fuel poverty, homelessness, and mental health struggles to navigating the strains on the NHS and the looming threats of climate change, the road ahead appears daunting. These challenges have only intensified the pressures on older individuals and the organisations dedicated to supporting them.

The year 2023 proved to be particularly arduous, marked by soaring energy bills and record-breaking inflation rates, which left many older individuals contending with precarious circumstances. Over the past year, we have heard directly from older individuals about the hardships they face, including reduced food intake, limited social engagement opportunities and increased caregiving responsibilities for their loved ones.

Amidst these trials, the local groups we have funded through Community Foundations have emerged as invaluable pillars of support for older individuals. Whether through organising lunch clubs with engaging activities, facilitating community transport programs, establishing befriending groups, or deploying Parish Nurses, these initiatives have played a vital role in providing essential support and companionship to older individuals during these challenging times.

Our Trustees each take a lead with a Community Foundation using this opportunity to learn, recognise emerging themes and better understand how we can best support our beneficiary group. In 2023, we observed a growing need to prioritise support for people's health and wellbeing. Many of the local groups we have supported have become lifelines for older individuals, delivering essential services in this area.

Often, it's the simplest gestures that have the most profound impact. Take, for instance, 'Nan,' a vibrant 95-year-old residing in a Residential Nursing Home nestled in a small village. Nan dedicated 40 years of her life to serving the community as a Special Needs teacher before retiring. Despite gradually losing her memory, Nan remains remarkably alert and spirited. However, due to the dementia of many residents in the home, communication with Nan can be challenging.

To provide Nan with a change of scenery, she attends a local lunch club regularly, which she describes as her 'lifeline.' Nan's eagerness is evident as she is always ready and waiting on time for the club. This invaluable gathering is facilitated by compassionate local volunteers. This anecdote is emblematic of the numerous projects we support, underscoring the vital role volunteers play in our communities. Without their tireless dedication, many organisations would struggle to exist.

We are pleased to report that we have continued our commitment to serving our beneficiaries by collaborating with local organisations through the Community Foundations to support older people. In 2023 we worked with 7 Community Foundations along with some independent funding supporting in excess of 20,000 community interactions for older people.

We also have a Community First Endowment Fund with the Community Foundation for Surrey, the balance of this fund as of the 31 December 2023 was £139,535. Income from this fund is used for grant making via the foundation to organisations supporting older people in Surrey.

- Using our Innovation objective, we were delighted this year to support two organisations:


In Deep – one grant payment of £4,800 towards the cost for the weekly lunch club for isolated older people in Victoria, London. The grant was a contribution towards food costs and hire of a hall for lunch club in 2024, with the aim to help 968 older people.

Kissing it Better (KIB) - Comedy Drama in Care Homes & The Community - this is a scaled-up version of our last Pargiter comedy drama programme. In weekly sessions, they read funny plays that are adapted so older people with memory and mobility challenges can take part in an uplifting project that enhances wellbeing and gives them the chance to master new skills. This time expanding KIB's offering to older people's community groups across Leeds and Yorkshire, so people who still live in their own homes can attend. In addition, running a pilot scheme at a Warwick care home.

'When Great-Granny Came to Stay' Workshops - Building on the success of 'When Great-Granny Came to Stay' workshops. Delivering additional workshops to 20 schools in East Hertfordshire, London and North Warwickshire.

Total grant payment to Kissing it Better in 2023 was £19,720.

I am as always extremely grateful to my fellow trustees for their wisdom, guidance and enthusiasm throughout this year, and we look forward to being able to help even more people in 2024.

1. Our purpose

The purpose of the organisation is to provide funding at grass roots level to benefit older people, providing value for money as far as possible. Older people are defined as being over 65 years of age.

Vision

'The vision of the Trust is a society where older people enjoy a better quality of life'.

Mission

'The mission of the Trust is to support older people to be independent, healthy and socially included and those who otherwise may be disadvantaged'.

Values

- Reflecting the wishes of the Founder
- Building long-term relationships with effective organisations
- To achieve more for less
- To remain agile in order to respond to new challenges

Strategic Imperatives:

- Grant Making – To make grants in England and Guernsey to enable older people to be independent, healthy and socially included.
- Innovation – To work collaboratively to find new ways to help older people to be independent, healthy and socially included.
- Impact – To identify, understand and measure the impact of the Trusts activities to better understand the difference being made.

2. Charitable objectives

For all purposes which are charitable under the laws of England and Wales from time to time and in particular but without limitation for the relief of the older people living in England and the Bailiwick of Guernsey.

The purpose of the organisation is to provide funding at grass roots level to benefit older people, providing value for money as far as possible. Older people are defined as being over 65 years of age.

3. Structure, Governance and management Legal and administrative details

The original Pargiter Trust (the "charity") was founded by the Late Hon Mrs Isobel Cooper-Heyman in 2005. It became an unincorporated registered charity in England and Wales on 16 February 2006 (registered charity number 1113016). In consultation with the charity's legal advisers, the Trustees established this Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) in 2014 under a CIO Foundation Constitution dated 19 March 2014, registered it as a charity on 8 July 2014 and transferred the unincorporated charity's assets to the new entity on 1 January 2015. The two registered charities were merged in late 2015.

There are currently six Trustees (maximum eight) and they are responsible for directing the affairs of the charity including setting the strategic direction, the approval of key policies, the approval of business plans and budgets and any other matters which have a material impact on the charity's financial position, its strategy, reputation or risk profile. Trustees are appointed in line with the provisions set out in the Trust Deed (the "governing document").

The Trustees consider recruitment of new Trustees as the need arises. Applications from suitable candidates would be sought by identifying specific gaps in professional skills, if necessary, placing advertisements in suitable publications. A new Trustee would be provided with an information pack outlining the history of the organisation, its structure, activities and objectives together with Charity Commission guidance and codes of conduct related to the roles and responsibilities of a Trustee.

The charity owns the whole of the issued share capital of Sarnia Properties Ltd (SPL), a Guernsey based property investment company, whose sole asset, apart from cash reserves, comprises a site of light industrial units and domestic dwellings in Guernsey, which the Trustees consider to be of significance to the economic life of the island. SPL has three Directors of which currently one is also a Trustee of the charity. The fees paid by SPL to its directors are based on what would need to be paid to an external party for those services provided. Any increase in fees or payment for additional services would require approval from the Trustees and be based on the equivalent salary to be paid for someone to perform that role for the required number of hours.

The charity achieves its objectives by way of grants made to charities to help support older people in England and Guernsey.

Trustees

The Trustees met six times during the year, three Grant and Awards Committees and three Board meetings.

Grants and Awards Committee

The charity has a formal Grants and Awards Committee which has its own Terms of Reference setting out its delegated authority to consider all grant applications. The Committee comprises the Grant Committee Chair, the Chair and other serving Trustees, meeting on a regular basis throughout the year.

The Committee submits periodic reports to the Trustees during the year which set out the nature of the applications and the grants being made or considered. All grant applications need to meet specific eligibility criteria. The charity does not award grants directly to individuals and in most cases, applications are received via the charity's community partners who undertake the primary assessment of each application.

4. Strategic planning and Review of 2023 activities

4.1 Strategic Objectives

The Trustees met in October 2022 and reviewed its objectives and have three clear strategic objectives:

- i) Grant Making – To make grants in England and Guernsey to enable older people to be independent, healthy and socially included
- ii) Innovation – To work collaboratively to find new ways to help older people to be independent, healthy and socially included
- iii) Impact – To identify, understand and measure the impact of the Trust's activities to better understand the difference being made

Delivering the goals

- The Trust will continue to invest in a wide range of projects with the combined objectives of delivering short term benefit to the maximum number of beneficiaries possible and also building a greater presence to facilitate wider impact in future years.
- The Trust will continue to work with delivery partners in order to keep administrative costs low.

In addition, the trustees are keen to be active in areas of greatest need to include focus of under - represented groups with protected characteristic where possible.

4.2 Review of 2023 activities and achievement of the objectives

Investments/Investment performance

The investments held by the charity in property, listed investments and in the subsidiary have continued to provide income to enable the charity to make charitable grants.

Public benefit

The Trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on "Public Benefit" in deciding what activities the charity undertakes. All activities undertaken by The Pargiter Trust are focussed on its charitable purposes. The "Public Benefit" of The Pargiter Trust's activities is the support of older people and this is achieved principally by the award and monitoring of grants.

Safeguarding

We continue to champion safeguarding of older people through our grant giving by requiring proportionate safeguarding procedures, training and cultures to be in place before funding is agreed.

Fundraising activities

The Trust does not actively undertake any direct fundraising activities and does not engage anyone to undertake such activities on its behalf.

5. Financial Review

The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the charity's governing instrument (the Trust Deed) and the Charities SORP (FRS 102) Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued 1 October 2019.

The charity's principal funding source is from investment income and an annual distribution from its holding in Sarnia Properties Ltd.

Income for the Group for the year, inclusive of the Sarnia Properties Ltd holding, was £799,111 (2022: £774,172) with net expenditure (before net gains on revaluation of properties and investments) £720,716 (2022: £730,458). Net gains on revaluation of properties and investments were £636,126 (2022: £913,442 loss) giving a net increase in funds for the year of £714,521 (2022: £869,728 decrease). The Group had total funds as at 31 December 2023 of £14,020,700 (2022: £13,306,179).

5.1 Reserves policy

The Trustees ensure that sufficient reserves are held to meet one year's governance costs as well as covering grants pending approval in case of a downturn in investments. The subsidiary company Sarnia Properties Ltd has free reserves, most of which were accumulated during the period before the company's shares were gifted to the charity.

In accordance with the non-binding wishes of the founding Trustee the Trustees have designated £8,080,000 of the original bequest as a capital fund for income generation.

The funds of the charity totalled £14,020,700 as at 31 December 2023 (2022: £13,306,179) of which £8,080,000 (2022: £8,080,000) is designated. Of the unrestricted funds of £5,940,700 (2022: £5,226,179), £5,730,766 (2022: £5,066,495) are held as fixed asset investments leaving free reserves of £209,934 (2022: £159,684).

5.2 Investment policy

The Trustees appointed J M Finn and Co. Ltd to manage the charity's investment portfolio on a discretionary basis; the Trustees have agreed that their investment objective is a balanced return from income and capital growth and that they have a medium risk profile, as defined by the investment advisers. Half yearly valuations and commentaries are provided to the Trustees and the investment manager meets with the Trustees from time to time as required to report on and discuss the overall performance of the portfolio.

As of the 31 December 2023 the portfolio £3,424,336, having appreciated +4.6% over the past six months and +3.9% over the year (all figures in total return).

Over the 6 months to the 31 December 2023, the portfolio appreciated +4.6% in total return terms, behind the 70% equities/30% gilts comparator return of +5.8%. Over the same period the FTSE All-Share and FTSE UK Gilt indices returned +5.2% and +7.4% respectively.

Over the year the portfolio returned +3.9%, behind the 70% equities/30% gilts comparator return of +6.6%. Over the same period the FTSE All-Share Index returned +7.9% and the FTSE UK Gilt Index +3.7%.

We are advised that the last 24-month period has certainly been one of the most challenging operating environments that multi asset portfolio managers have experienced for many decades. The high correlation of returns between credit (what was a safe asset) and equity (what remains a risk asset), has made allocating risk and constructing multi asset portfolios that much harder. Furthermore, the polarised returns within markets and the narrow market leadership, has only added to the challenge. Sentiment has certainly improved recently though as inflation has continued to fall and the prospect of a rate cutting cycle in 2024 has gathered momentum. Moderate growth, cooling inflation and less restrictive policy should be generally supportive for asset markets in 2024.

5.3 Risk management

The Trustees acknowledge their responsibilities for setting the approach and management of risk. Risk management is a standard item for discussion at all Trustee meetings with an in-depth review at least annually. This process identifies the major risks The Trust faces, the likelihood of occurrence, the significance of the risk and any mitigating facts that are in place. It also seeks to identify any actions and resources required to manage these risks further. Mitigating actions are taken for any risks perceived to be increasing, be this for reasons such as changes in the funding environment or regulatory / legal changes or government policy.

As part of this process, the Trustees maintain a risk register which sets out the key areas of risks and the mitigating controls and actions. This is reviewed regularly at all Board meetings and was the subject of a separate in-depth analysis as part of the October 2022 strategy arrangements.

During 2023 key areas of focus were:

Fraud

The Trustees acknowledge their responsibility for managing fraud and have in place a fraud response plan and policy. The risk is limited to banking, inflated expenses and fake grant requests, which are governed by a system of internal controls.

Safeguarding

The Trustees introduced a safeguarding policy in 2018 and works with its stakeholders to ensure that they provide appropriate assurances that they have the necessary controls and procedures to ensure the safeguarding of all vulnerable beneficiaries. Safeguarding is reviewed regularly.

Anti-Money laundering

The Trustees have appropriate processes in place to safeguard against money laundering with specific controls regarding its distribution income from its subsidiary based in Guernsey. These are reviewed as part of the overall risk management process.

The Board of Trustees reviews annual budgets, grants remuneration and benefits. It also oversees ownership of major property it owns through Sarnia Properties Ltd (SPL).

Oversight of SPL

The charity's ownership of Sarnia Properties Ltd (SPL) accounts for a very substantial proportion of the charity's assets. To mitigate this, the Trustees have an oversight role and receive regular reporting from Sarnia at their Board meetings.

SPL, the Guernsey based property investment company, lets sites to a number of tenants from light industrial Units, storage and distribution and residential lettings. One of the more significant is engaged in the business of storage and distribution of petroleum products. The Trustees ensure that all necessary steps are taken to maintain the safety of the site and to mitigate the risks associated with the tenancy.

6. Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards including Financial Report Standard 102: The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the income and expenditure of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the Trust deed. They are also responsible for the safeguarding of the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

7. Auditors

All of the current Trustees have taken steps that they should have taken to make themselves aware of any information needed by the group and charity's auditors for the purposes of their audit and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information. The Trustees are not aware of any other relevant information of which the auditors should be aware.

In keeping with recognised practice, the charity reviewed its external audit arrangements and undertook a tender process which resulted in A C Mole LLP being appointed as new auditors in 2020. The Trustees have a commitment to review all of its external providers as part of ensuring quality and value for money.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Pargiter Trust CIO (the 'charitable parent company') and its subsidiary (the group) for the year ended 31 December 2023 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, the Consolidated Balance Sheet, the Balance Sheet, the Consolidated Statement of Cashflows and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102: The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

- the results of our enquiries of management about their identification and assessment of risks of irregularities
- discussions with the audit engagement team and component auditors about where fraud might occur



2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (issued October 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Basis of preparation

The Pargiter Trust CIO meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest pound.

Basis of consolidation

These financial statements consolidate the results of the Charity and its wholly owned trading subsidiary, Sarnia Properties Limited on a line by line basis. The "Consolidated" balance sheet refers to the consolidated accounts of The Pargiter Trust and Sarnia Holdings Limited. All intra-group transactions are eliminated on consolidation.

The charity made a profit after tax for the financial year of £714,521 (2022: loss of £869,728).

2 Accounting policies (continued)

Going concern

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity or group's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the group or charity.

We have paid particular attention to the likely effect on the business of the current COVID-19 outbreak. The Trustees remain confident that sufficient funding is in place and that the group and charity has adequate resources to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires Trustees to make judgements, estimates and assumptions. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates, assumptions and Trustee judgements that carry a significant risk of material adjustments to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are outlined below.

Estimation of fair value of investment properties (group)

The fair value of investment properties is determined by the Trustees after consulting with property professionals. Fair value represents the best estimate of the amount a third party would pay for the properties. In the event of a sale actual prices received could be materially different from those estimates.

Estimation of fair value of investment in subsidiaries (charity)

The fair value of investments in subsidiaries is determined by reference to the net assets of the subsidiary undertaking, Sarnia Properties Limited, which include Sarnia Properties Limited's investment properties held at fair value. Accordingly, the actual value of this investment could be materially different from the valued included within the accounts.

Income

All income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

Investment income

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis for the financial year. Income from other trading activities comprises property rental income and is recognised when receivable.

Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenditure including support and governance costs are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure heading in the Statement of Financial Activities.

2 Accounting policies (continued)

Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Grant expenditure

Grants are payable out of the Parent Charity's unrestricted funds, which are derived from income arising on the Fund investments, comprising distributions received from the subsidiary. Expenditure on grants is recorded once the trust has made an unconditional commitment to pay the grant and this is communicated to the beneficiary or the grant has been paid, whichever is the earlier.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees' meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Taxation

Guernsey income tax is charged on the rental profits of the subsidiary company, Sarnia Properties Limited.

The Pargiter Trust is a registered charity and is thus exempt from tax on income and gains falling within sections 521 to 536 of the Income Tax Act 2007 or s256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects. No tax charge has arisen in the Parent Charity. Guernsey income tax of £45,369 is payable by Sarnia Properties Limited (2022: £43,142).

Investment properties

Investment properties for which fair value can be measured reliably without undue cost or effort are measured at fair value at each reporting date with changes in fair value recognised in 'net gains / (losses) on investments' in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Investments – Other

Investments are recognised initially at fair value which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value through the unrestricted fund if the shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably. Investments in subsidiaries, recognised in the parent charity's own balance sheet, are measured at fair value which is considered to be equal to the value of the subsidiary's net assets.

Programme related investments

Programme Related Investments are those investments which provide investment funding to organisations in order to directly further the charitable purposes of The Trust. They are recognised initially at cost and are assessed for evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting period.

Trade Debtors and Creditors

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Fund structure

Unrestricted general funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general charitable objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

The designated fund comprises those assets initially gifted from the estate of the founding Trustee in recognition of the donor's non-legally binding wish that the capital be retained.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at amortised cost, with the exception of fixed asset investments as noted above.
