- to prevent and relieve poverty; and

“Sustainable Development” means development which meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

The charity is established to benefit the general public. There is no express geographical restriction in the stated objects that applies to the opportunity to benefit.

In practice the charity operates in and around The Valley of 1000 Hills near Durban in South Africa, which is where the charity's facilities are situated. However, there are not express restrictions as to who can benefit, and the charity's facilities and services are open to all.

The school children and communities that the charity works with are communities with the highest concentrated rate of HIV/ Aids in the world, extremely high unemployment rates and few prospects for young people. The charity helps this community by providing funds and facilities to support local schools and provide

equipment so that the schools can facilitate musical education to children in the community. This improves prospects for young people in the community.

The organization's long-term vision is for the communities it works with to become self-sufficient, by providing a high quality education to increase prospects of success in future employment for the communities' inhabitants.

In all of our activities we seek to ensure that they are of benefit to the community it serves and avoid activities that could be in any way detrimental or harmful.

The charity forms choirs and provides music and arts education through schools in and around The Valley of 1000 Hills near Durban in South Africa. The charity also creates opportunities for its choirs to perform in concerts. Some of the concerts will be free of charge to attend and will benefit the wider community, other concerts will be used to raise funds for the charity.

The charity also uses the funds raised to advance musical education and provide other educational resources and equipment to improve the learning environment and structural buildings of local schools. School age children and the wider community will benefit from this.

As the charity works with children, young people and vulnerable families the trustees take all reasonable measures to ensure that the risks of harm to children's welfare are minimised. We have put in place a robust safeguarding policy.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Between September 2023 and 2024, Sing Inchanga has worked towards advancing the objectives and outreach of the charity. Throughout the year, we have continued our relationship with the Steven Davison Primary School in the Valley of 1000 Hills.

This year, the school applied for two primary grants from us to fund a music teacher, Simphiwe Ngcobo. We were able to approve the applications and allocate the grants to the school. In addition to covering the cost of the music teacher, the grants also supported the school's administrative clerk who assists the choir. Her role is essential to the school's operations.

Simphiwe Ngcobo, a distinguished local musician and choir leader, has been an integral part of the school's staff since February 2022. His consistent presence has been greatly beneficial to the school. It is invaluable to have a local educator who shares similar lived experiences with the students, as this commonality serves as significant motivation for the children when they see him in a leadership role.

This year Simphiwe has led the school's choirs and they have participated in numerous competitions. While most of these competitions are local, the school is occasionally invited to compete in other cities or towns within the province. Due to the economic challenges faced by the school, they applied for a third grant to cover transportation and food expenses for students on the days of the competitions. The choir secured 3rd place and other creative subjects at the school achieved 2nd place. It is gratifying to witness the students benefiting from this creative outlet and observing their continuous improvement. These opportunities would not be possible without the support of Sing Inchanga.

Sing Inchanga is committed to continuing these grants in the upcoming year. As a result of the grants, over 400 children are taught music each week. The students are being taught songs in both Zulu and English, which is enhancing their proficiency in English. The advantages of music for the pupils at this school are substantial, and for many, it represents the most enjoyable part of their school day.

In the year from September 2022-2023, we have continued to further the charities aims and reach.

We have been very pleased to continue our relationship with the Steven Davison Primary School in the Valley of 1000 Hills.

Once again, the school applied for 2 grants from us to pay for a music teacher at the school. We were delighted to accept the application and give the grant to the school.

The music teacher, Simphiwe Ngcobo is a local musician and choir leader that has worked with the school since last year. It's been wonderful to have him as a constant member of staff at the school. It is also very important to have a local teacher who has similar lived experiences as the students. Seeing him as a leader is a big motivation for the children.

This year, as well as teaching every single child in the school, he has started a couple of school choirs. These choirs are a chance for the children, living in very difficult circumstances, to have a much-needed creative outlet. This opportunity would not be possible, if not for the support of Sing Inchanga.

This year, one of the choirs started taking part in competitions. They placed third in their first contest, which as newcomers was extremely impressive. This has spurred the school on and made Simphiwe even more determined to strive for more successes.

Through this grant, Sing Inchanga has helped to teach over 400 children every week. The children are learning songs in both Zulu and in English which is aiding their English language. The benefits of music for the pupils at this school are huge and for many it is the highlight of their school day. We hope to continue this into next year.

The organization's long-term vision is for the communities it works with to become self-sufficient, by providing a high quality education to increase prospects of success in future employment for the communities' inhabitants.

The charity forms choirs and provides music and arts education through schools in and around The Valley of 1000 Hills near Durban in South Africa. The charity also creates opportunities for its choirs to perform in concerts. Some of the concerts will be free of charge to attend and will benefit the wider community, other concerts will be used to raise funds for the charity.

This year September 2021-2022 has been a welcome return to action for Sing Inchanga after a period of inactivity for Covid.-19. Our activities coordinator went to South Africa for a short trip to ensure our projects were still in place and going well. With children in South Africa allowed to sing in school again, we were able to supply a grant to the Steven Davison School for them to employ a music teacher, Simphiwe Mncobo.

Mr Nkosi, the Principal needed some commitment from his chosen music teacher and longevity this is where Simphiwe comes in. Simphiwe Mncobo is a local man, 21 years of age, who lives a short walk over a big hill from the school. He is part of a few local choirs and metriculated (A level equivalent) from Siphesihle High School, a school Sing Inchanga has worked with before and knows very well. Simphiwe had come to lead the choir originally without any payment as he really wanted to share his skills with the children. After a full police check, as there is on all teachers, Mr Nkosi agreed to let him lead the choir. The children loved him and Mr Nkosi applied for the funding from Sing Inchanga.

He is running the choir at the school every day and we wanted to encourage his hard work further. Therefore, we asked what could make his job easier, and he asked for a Keyboard. So we purchased one for him to use, to be held and owned by the school, along with a bag to carry it, and a sustain pedal (£425). He was elated!

Our trip had a big impact on Simphiwe, he has taken to the keyboard like a duck to water and has learned to play it well, using online teaching methods. Simphiwe has also decided to further his studies and after the support we gave him on this trip, has decided to pursue teaching. We will continue to support the Steven Davison School and hope the grant funding will continue to be used as effectively. Each week Simphiwe is able to lead all the children in school for singing meaning our reach at present is 410 children a week.

During his trip our activities coordinator also visited other schools Sing Inchanga has previously worked with and is keen to work with again in future. We worked together and had early discussions about work we may do.

This project has been postponed but we hope to attempt it again in April 2023

Even when there were fewer restrictions for travel, we thought it unsafe and unethical to travel to South Africa. As most of our work includes music, and in particular, singing, we have been unable to continue our grant program for any schools as music has, on the whole, not been taught during this time.

We have kept in constant contact with the schools in and around the Valley of 1000 Hills and hope to be able to reconnect in person soon.

However, we used this year to improve our website to allow us to update donors and inform people of our work.

This year Sing Inchange accepted a grant application for the Steven Davison Primary School. This grant was for £237.40 and was used to cover the costs of a music teacher for the school for a term. This meant that 410 children were able to access music during that term and learn valuable creative skills. Music gives these children a creative outlet and without the grant, music would not have been financially viable to be taught at the school. We intend to continue this initiative when further grant applications are submitted.
