We now employ Tina for 8.5 days p/m to support with co-ordinating our fundraising events, to apply for grants, to manage our social media and website, and other administrative tasks linked to the day-to-day running's of the charity. She keeps a log of work completed and continues to develop her skills and network by applying for free courses when available.

We are considering the option of appointing additional trustees. This is something that we are currently discussing.

We have 11 non-executive advisors that support us with keeping up to date in the various fields of microtia, including: hearing technology advancement, ear reconstruction or prosthetic methods, psychological perspectives and understanding visible difference.

Our relationship with the hearing aid technology companies (Cochlear, Oticon, and MED-EL) continues, and they have sponsored our London event again, along with the charity website and the printing of a few of our resources. We also continue working alongside of them – advertising their latest technology and events with the wider community. The hearing aid companies also send us free merchandise and information leaflets from their companies, which allowed us to post these out for free to families.

We continue having good working relationships with other charities e.g. CSSEF, Auditory Verbal UK, Changing Faces, Goldenhar, National Deaf Children's Society, CLAPA, Face Equality National (which we sponsor) and BATOD and these have led to various continued collaborations. The same applies to CAR and Aston University for research studies.

Charity members came together to hold a Bristol Mingle in a church room. It was a lovely fun day.

Charity members requested local buildings to light up in orange in November

2023. A range of families volunteered their time to ask local buildings to light up in orange for microtia awareness day. We had more buildings than before and will continue the tradition next year.

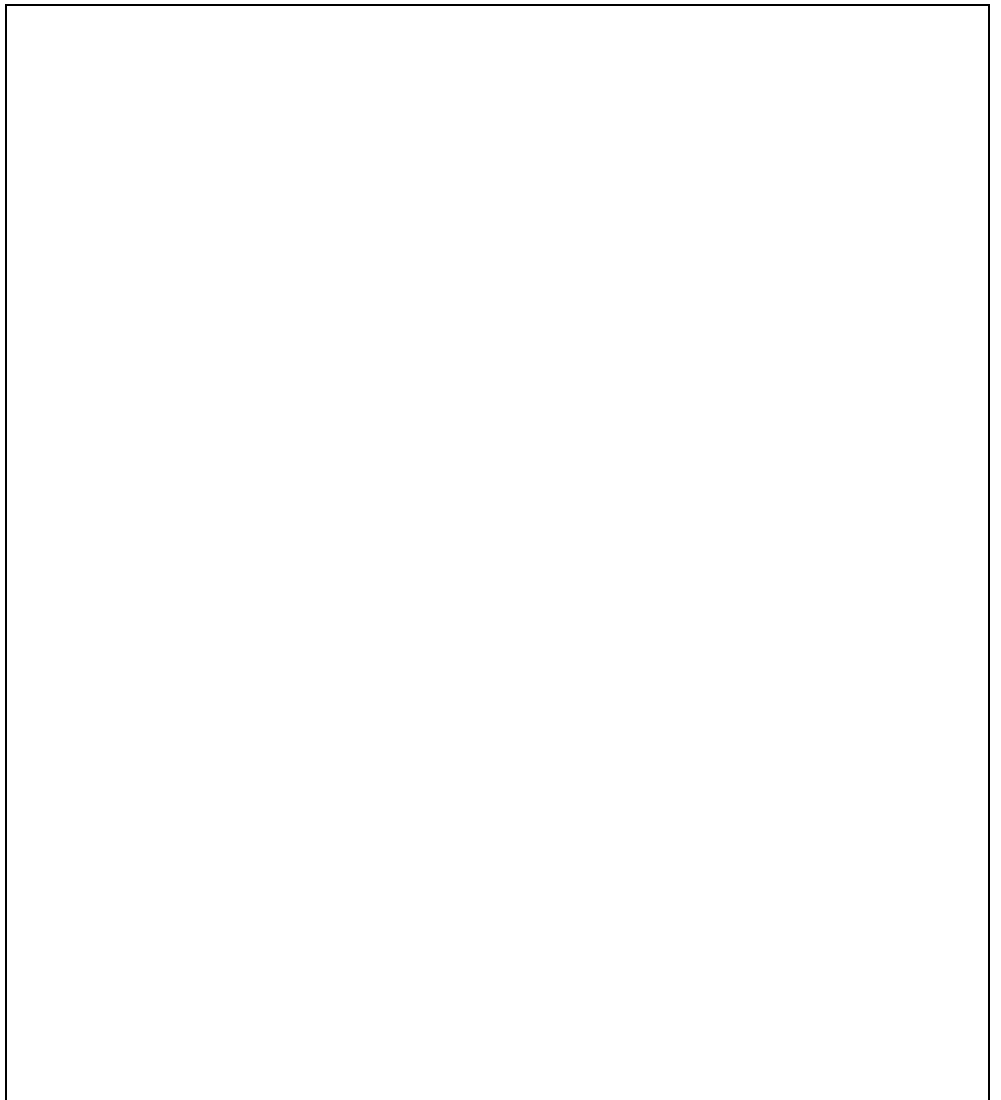
The Microtia UK website was fully updated with a whole new look and

Charity awareness raising merchandise distributed to raise awareness of the condition within the community and to raise funds for Microtia UK. The items also help to promote positive self-image (including pin badges, books, teddies, clothing, Christmas cards, bracelets, trolley coins, bags). We created new bumper stickers for cars in the shape of our charity logo.

Virtual monthly meetings with families and professionals continued. Our monthly virtual meet continued, where families could come together to share stories, ask questions, get to know one another and speak with medical professionals. This has been a great success, and we will continue to do the virtual meets.

We received our new right-sided microtia elephant teddy. The new teddy completes our collection of right, left and bilateral microtia elephants.

Continued support and growing as a charity. We continue to grow and develop every year as a charity, supporting more families than ever before. We are keen to continue reaching more people by raising more awareness about microtia.

Our website has been updated. The website had a full revamp with new images and information. The hearing aid companies were given the opportunity to update their personal pages too.

Free information leaflet handed out for new parents/carers which outlines what to expect when you have a baby with microtia and where to go for support. Medical professionals also share this leaflet with their patients. It is downloadable from the website.

We continue using all our social media accounts with a growing number of followers. This includes the use of Instagram, YouTube, Twitter and Facebook. We also use WhatsApp as a contact method and have our own charity phone number.

We continued our link with Run For Charity to help us find new fundraising events. Linking with them means we have less unfilled places. Participants set up fundraising pages which were shared on social media. We fully support those who would like to fundraise or help raise awareness for our charity. We give out medals / trophies to thank our fundraisers.

Daily support and advice for our charity members. This is given through our online support group, social media accounts, email and telephone. We also have our monthly virtual meets.

Microtia UK have been involved with the following fundraising events in 2023-2024:

- 2 places at Skydive centre – Total raised £3,345.
- Places at the 5k Inflatable Run in Norwich – Total raised £350.
- £5,000 raised by a charity member who ran 200 miles non-stop. Fantastic effort!





To relieve the physical and psychological needs of those with microtia in the UK by helping them to make informed choices about their treatment options and by facilitating the dissemination of research results relating to the condition.

We offered 100 free MI9: The Beginning books to 100 schools. The incentive was offered to help promote our new published children's book about acceptance and inclusion to 100 schools. We're pleased that we had a good response to this offer.

A new charity mobile phone number was set up. This gave families and professionals a contact number to speak to Tina, our Non-Executive Advisor, to make us more accessible. We also set up WhatsApp for people to get in touch with us.

We received free tickets to Legoland in Manchester for October 2022 from Merlin Magic Wand. Families can apply for tickets to access the free fun day out.

We revamped and published Liz Jones' children's book about Similarities and Differences. The new version was published under our 'Proud to be Me' publishing name and the book was made available on our charity website, Amazon, and Waterstones.

Families attended our Space Centre event in Leicester. Approx. 70 families attended our first face to face meet up since the pandemic. This was an opportunity for new families who had given birth to children with microtia over the pandemic to meet others for the first time, and for our regular charity members to see each other again.

Our London event was back for the first time since the pandemic. It was great to be back with a range of professionals and the day was our biggest yet. We offered free activities, food and a range of talks from medical professionals and those born with microtia. We set up a card machine for the first time for our merchandise.

Charity members requested local buildings to light up in orange. A range of families volunteered their time to ask local

buildings to light up in orange for microtia awareness day. We hope to have more buildings do the same next year.

Discussions began in organising a zoo event down South.

We are hoping to have events throughout the UK this year so families have a chance to get together.

The Microtia UK website was updated on a regular basis and backed up which

provides free and up to date information for people with microtia. Sections include resources, frequently asked questions, inspirational life stories, and information about fundraising events. We began changing the pages to become more mobile friendly.

Free information booklets distributed. This includes our New Parents Guide and Reconstruction booklet, as well as our charity leaflets to help raise awareness and give support to families. These are also downloadable from the website for free.

Free microtia friendly facemasks were created and distributed to families as the ongoing uncertainty of the pandemic continued in early 2022.

Charity awareness raising merchandise distributed to raise awareness of the condition within the community and to raise funds for Microtia UK. The items also help to promote positive self-image (including: books, teddies, clothing, Christmas cards, bracelets, trolley coins, bags). We also created new microtia badges which were a huge success for families.

Virtual monthly meetings started with families and professionals. A new approach was discussed in reaching more families and we decided to set up a monthly virtual meet where families could come together to share stories, ask questions, get to know one another and speak with medical professionals. This has been a great success and we will continue to do the virtual meets.

We continued our relationships with audiology departments to inform them of our charity and to encourage them to sign post patients to our charity and support group. We also sent out more copies of our New Parent Guide,

BAHA book and Similarities and Differences book across clinics in England, Scotland and Ireland and this is something that we will continue doing.

MED-EL are now our sponsor of our adult fundraising vests as well. We continue working alongside of them – advertising their latest technology and events with the wider community. The hearing aid companies also send us free merchandise from their companies which allowed us to post out hearing awareness information for free to families. Our main event was cancelled again in June 2021 due to the pandemic so the free information from the hearing aid companies enabled us to continue supporting families.

We have developed good working relationships with other charities e.g. Auditory Verbal UK, Changing Faces, National Deaf Children's Society, CLAPA, Face Equality National and BATOD and these have led to various continued collaborations.

We received funding from The National Lottery and Community Grant. We were awarded £9,678 in March 2021 which will be used to create a new booklet for those starting in education. This is an ongoing project which we aim to complete Spring 2022. The new resource will be a valuable additional.

We spent the remainder of the COVID-19 grant on hand sanitiser, face Masks and 2 x ukulele sessions. The grant has been extremely helpful to ensure our charity members are taking extra precautions during the pandemic.

The creation of a new children's book was completed. Our new and exciting children's book was published in 2021. It was made available on our charity website, Amazon, and Waterstones.

Large scale events held in London for children and adults with microtia were sadly cancelled again due to the pandemic. We have begun discussions about holding our main event in London in June 2022. To replace the loss of the events, we upped our support online by engaging more with the community and checking in on them. In December 2020 we held an online Christmas party for the children and adults and we also held a charity raffle. Our support to families has been available throughout the pandemic and we continue to supply free PPE. We are also arranging a smaller event aimed at the teenagers and adults born with microtia to encourage them to engage with each other and the charity.

The Microtia UK website was updated and backed up which provides free and up to date information for people with microtia. Sections include resources, frequently asked questions, inspirational life stories, information about fundraising events.

Free information leaflet distributed for new parents/carers. It outlines what to expect when you have a baby with microtia and where to go for support. It is also downloadable from the website for free.

Charity awareness raising merchandise distributed to raise awareness of the condition within the community and to raise funds for Microtia UK (including: Christmas cards, bracelets, trolley coins, bags).

Toy elephant mascot distributed to raise awareness of microtia and to promote positive self-image. Our new larger microtia elephant with hearing aids has been well received by our community.

Children’s books about Bone Anchored Hearing Aid Surgery and introducing microtia to young children distributed to parents and medical professionals. Printing was funded by two private hearing aid technology companies. We are starting talks about tweaking one of the books and officially publishing it. To be continued in our next annual report.

We continued our relationships with audiology departments to inform them of our charity and to encourage them to sign post patients to our charity and support group. We also sent out more copies of our New Parent Guide, BAHA book and Similarities and Differences book across clinics in England, Scotland and Ireland and this is something that we will continue doing.

We have applied for the following grants:

- Applied to the Big Lottery Community for £9,678 to help us create a new school booklet aimed at those starting in education and what to do once you leave. We received this grant.
- Applied for the Work for Good charity for a grant for the school booklet but we were unsuccessful with them.

Aftershokz have donated another bone conduction headset for the community to trial. Members of the community can trial the headphones for a period of time and then be given a discount code if they wish to purchase some.

We ordered more medals. We have continued using our new machine to make our own charity branded clothing throughout the year.

Daily support and advice for our members given through our online support group, social media accounts and email. We have also introduced a mobile

Microtia UK have been involved with the following fundraising events in 2020-2021:

- 1 place at The Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park – Total raised £180. After deductions - £132.
- 31 places at the 5k Inflatable Run, held all over the UK – Total raised £4,707. After deductions - £3,870.
- 5 places at the ASICS event – Total raised £619. After deductions - £379.

We have had continuous support, and this has grown during 2021 as restrictions from COVID-19 were lifted. 



We have funded research projects linked to our main objectives: hearing, reconstruction and psychological.

- Evelina London, Dr Orla Fehily and Melinda Edwards are creating an audio-visual resource for young people who have microtia and atresia. Lead by the 'experts by experience', the film will provide an invaluable resource for young people, their friends and family, and professionals involved in their welfare, from healthcare to education.

We finalised our talks with two audiology projects which we indicated funding for (as previously mentioned):

1) Aston University, Saira Hussain and GOSH, Robert Nash, Neil Bulstrode and Lindsey Edwards are aiming to understand the patient experiences of those with microtia and improving their clinical decision-making processes. The two institutions will be working in parallel to help enhance the knowledge currently available on this population to help improve outcomes for those with microtia.

2) GOSH, Robert Nash, Neil Bulstrode and Lindsey Edwards for a study to compare academic attainments in literacy and numeracy with those predicted on the basis of intellectual ability, in children with unilateral microtia.


