The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 5 April 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Trust has the following charitable purposes:

1. The advancement of the Christian religion for the public benefit including by the carrying on of the service of God in accordance with the Old and New Testaments of the Holy Bible as followed by those Christians forming part of the world-wide fellowship known as the "Plymouth Brethren Christian Church (the "Brethren") whose core doctrine and whose proper practices in furtherance of some of the aspects of that core doctrine ("Faith in Practice") is summarised in the two Schedules to the New Trust Deed which is contained in the Second Schedule to the Deed of Variation dated 15 August 2014.
2. Any other charitable purposes connected with Brethren

Significant activities

The Trust provides and maintains gospel halls for the religious activities of Christians often referred to as 'Brethren'. Details of the origins, teachings and way of life of the Brethren can be found on their website - www.plymouthbrethrenchristianchurch.org.

Meetings held at these gospel halls include the Lord's Supper (Communion), Gospel preachings, Bible readings and Bible addresses. Depending on the particular meeting, between 100 and 600 people normally attend these occasions. There is a structured weekly schedule of meetings held in one or more of the gospel halls.

Spreading the Gospel Message

The Gospel Hall is a base from which a large number of preachers operate to spread the Christian gospel, in word and deed. Gospel tracts are provided free of charge by the Trust to such preachers. Many of them also preach the Christian gospel on the streets of Biggleswade most weeks of the year.

In addition to street preaching, the trust also keeps in contact with other institutions to provide gospel tracts and bibles as required. The Trust also operates a programme of providing regular packs of nutritious food and gospel literature to homeless and needy persons through local charities or homeless societies.

Visitors

The services and meetings are attended by the regular congregation and many of the services are open to other visitors who are properly disposed. The notice board outside the Hall welcomes visitors and displays times of Gospel Preachings along with a telephone number for those seeking further information or help. Gospel Tracts, which are distributed daily, also display this information.

Bibles and an extensive range of other Christian reading material is on display at the Hall, to which visitors are free to help themselves.

Public benefit

The trustees of The Rose Lane Gospel Hall Trust confirm that they have complied with their duty under section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance to charities on public benefit. The attached report provides details about some of the activities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The life of a Christian

The following points are an extract from Schedule 1 of the Trust Deed. They outline the way of life of the Brethren as supported by the Holy Scriptures and how it contributes to public benefit;

1. We seek and are encouraged to live exemplary lives in all our relationships with others in the wider community (including former Brethren), in accordance with the teachings of Holy Scripture (1 Tim 2:2)
2. We regularly go out from our homes to preach on the streets, to distribute Christian literature and engage with the wider community (including former Brethren) in order to present eternal salvation, available to all men by faith in Jesus Christ. (2 Tim 4:2).
3. We seek as members of the public to lead Christian lives as husbands and wives, parents, children, employers, employees and neighbours. (Col 3:22-25, Col 4:1).
4. The preservation and protection of the family unit is fundamental and children are prized as a blessing from God. (Psalm 127:3-5). The elderly are valued members of the community, for whom both their family and the wider community are expected to care.
5. Holy Scripture commands us to be good neighbours to others, and deal with all other people (including former Brethren) openly, honestly and fairly and consistent with these principles, we should give our time, talents and money to assist those in need in the wider community, in so far as reasonable given our abilities and our available resources. (Matt 7:12, Matt 22:39, Eph 4:28).

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The Covid-19 pandemic curtailed the normal activities of the Trust During the times of the lockdown, and other restriction the Gospel Halls under the control of the Trust were not used for congregational meetings, and were only used for marriages and burials in accordance with the government guidelines. The Trust continued to maintain the halls.

Since the government restrictions were lifted the halls have been used by the congregation.

The congregation is kept regularly informed as to particular needs for funds, and other relevant matters.

Congregational Support

The trustees also established an Emergency Needs fund for the duration of the Covid-19 pandemic and any resultant economic downturn. This was providing limited financial assistance by the way of grocery vouchers to households, who experienced a recent and significant decrease in income due to the pandemic, such that it is likely to impact on the health and/or welfare of members of the household.

The trust appointed a Local Welfare Panel to manage the application process and to administer the vouchers to qualifying applicants. The fund was wound up during the year now the lockdown restrictions have been lifted.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

In the year ended 5th April 2022 total voluntary income received this period was £514,564 compared to £131,204 in the previous year. The Trust received income from several sources including general donations and gift-aid. Gift-aid has been provided for on gift-aidable donations received during the year. There was a surplus of incoming resources over resources expended amounting to £441,923 before non-monetary items (depreciation).

All funds held were unrestricted or designated funds.

The Trust received a legacy amounting to £353,031 during the year. This consisted of a residential property and cash.

During the year the Trustees reviewed the policy for the provision for the depreciation or consumption of the gospel hall buildings, and changed it from 50 years to 25 years. This was to reflect the likelihood that the halls could need substantial alterations in future to keep them up to date with technological and environmental needs in a fast changing society. Fifty years was felt to be too long a time span. The policy was backdated to its inception.

Principal funding sources

Funding is sought through gifts and donations from the congregation. Grants are sometimes received from other charitable trusts with congruent objectives. Gift aid is also claimed on relevant gifts.

Reserves policy

The Trustees have considered the level of reserves they wish to retain, appropriate to the charity's needs. This is based on the charity's size and the level of financial commitments. The Trust aims to hold sufficient funds in a current account to cover day to day expenditure, plus an allowance for any urgent repairs and capital expenses that may arise. The Trustees aim to ensure that the charity will be able to continue to fulfil its charitable objectives even if there is a temporary shortfall in income or unexpected expenditure, by raising a funds appeal.

Free reserves, consisting of current assets less current liabilities, at the year end were £189,478 (2021: £163,373) less an unsecured loan of £138,000 (2021: £198,000) from the Central G H Trust. There are no binding obligations to repay this amount in the next twelve months.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

The Rose Lane Gospel Hall Trust is constituted by a Deed of Trust dated 5th May 1982, amended by various Deeds and most recently by Deed of Variation dated 15th August 2014. The Trust was registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales on 6th November 2014 under Charity Registration Number: 1159094.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Trustees who have served during the Period and since the Period end are set out on the General Information page. None of the Trustees, nor any person connected with them, received any remuneration or expenses from the Charity in the Period.

Trustees are selected according to their experience in specialised fields and are expected to use that experience in furthering the objects of the Trust. Checks are made to ensure that there are no legal or other barriers to their appointment. New Trustees are nominated by the existing trustees and appointed by unanimous resolution of the Congregation.

Induction and training of new trustees

Incoming Trustees are made fully aware of their responsibilities by the existing Trustees who ensure that new Trustees read the Trust Deed and the relevant guidance for trustees published by the Charity Commission.

Wider network

The Trustees maintain informal links with Trustees of similar Trusts with a view to pooling experience considered useful in pursuing the objects of the Trust.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Risk management

The Trustees have identified and reviewed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and confirm that they have established systems or procedures to manage and mitigate those risks.

All transactions have been reviewed and approved by two trustees.

PUBLIC BENEFIT AND OUTREACH 2021 22

One of the Trust's principal activities that further its objectives is providing a facility for the coordination of 'outreach' work into the wider community.

This report includes some of the things that we have been engaged in during 2021-22.

Gospel tracts and literature available from the Gospel Hall

The Trust maintains a stock and display of gospel tracts, literature and Bibles in the foyer of our main Gospel Hall and this fact is advertised on the sign board at the street entrance.

Street preachings and Gospel tract distribution

We have maintained regular open air preachings in the market square of Biggleswade town on Saturdays and weekdays when the restrictions due to the Covid-19 pandemic allowed this.

Supporting the Rapid Relief Team charity

The Rapid Relief Team charity, a separate charity, has a local team in Biggleswade made up from our congregation members.

Our main hall is used to store some essential provisions and equipment that would be required if RRT are requested to support the emergency services working at an incident nearby.

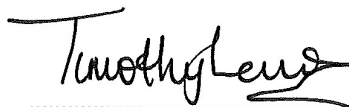
Further plans for 2022 - 23

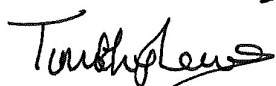

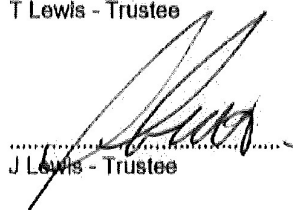

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

Donations are recognised in the year in which there is entitlement and probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty. Income is only deferred when the charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be expended in a future year. Gift aid is added to the value of the donation to which it relates.

Donated services are recognised as income and expenditure in the financial statements when organisations or individuals offer their services and support pro bono. The value of these donated services to The Rose Lane Gospel Hall Trust is considered to be equal to market value which would be paid were the service formally procured. This includes services paid for by other trusts.

Investment income is accounted for on a receivable basis.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support costs. Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and costs related to statutory requirements. Governance and support costs are allocated to charitable activities on the basis of costs incurred.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property	- not provided and At varying rates on cost
Improvements to property	- 20% on cost
Plant and Equipment	- 25% on reducing balance

During the year the Trustees reviewed the policy for the provision for the depreciation or consumption of the gospel hall buildings, and changed it from 50 years to 25 years. This was to reflect the likelihood that the halls could need substantial alterations in future to keep them up to date with technological and environmental needs in a fast changing society. Fifty years was felt to be too long a time span. The policy was backdated to its inception.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued**Fund accounting**

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Donated services

Donated services are recognised as income and expenditure in the financial statements when organisations or individuals offer their services and support pro bono. The value of these donated services to The Rose Lane Gospel Hall Trust is considered to be equal to market value which would be paid were the service formally procured. This includes services paid for by other trusts.

Going concern

From 18th March 2020, Rose Lane Gospel Hall Trust ceased using the four gospel halls, which it operates, due to the global COVID-19 pandemic and the general lockdown imposed by the government.

The trust has started using the halls again now that the government restrictions have been lifted.

The trustees do not consider that the Covid-19 pandemic will have any effect on the ability of the trust to continue as a going concern.
