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# Accounts

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## 1 Introduction

This is the eleventh annual report for Redeemer King Church; a Charitable Incorporated Organisation registered with the Commission on 18<sup>th</sup> November 2014 (Nº. 1159252).

The report covers the period ending 31<sup>st</sup> July 2025.

## 2 Governance

Early in this period, both Neville Taylor and Jackie Taylor stepped down as a trustees, handing over the areas of responsibility he held. Tom Foster was then appointed as a trustee in October. The active trustees at the end of this reporting period were, Tom Foster, Daniel Hall, Joan Power and Janet Ayres and these oversaw the charitable purposes of the church.

Chris van D'Arque and Jessica van D'Arque left the leadership team in September. In addition, Neville Taylor also left the team when stepping down from the role of trustee. The leadership and trustees meetings were then combined, with day to day church operations being managed by Richard Old and Janet Ayres with oversight from remaining Trustees

Several individuals who regularly attend church events and meetings supported the Trustees and Leadership Team by taking responsibility on a voluntary basis for various functions that are crucial to achieving our charitable aims and objectives.

## 3 Activities and Objectives

The charitable purposes and objectives of Redeemer King Church are to advance Christianity in Derbyshire by means of:

- a) communicating Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.
- b) identifying and addressing with the needs of socially and economically disadvantaged members of our community through engagement with existing, and the development of new, initiatives as appropriate and in keeping with our basis of faith.

Details of how these objectives have been achieved during the reporting period are set out below.

### 3.1 Objective 3a: to communicate Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.

We initially met at the CDC Cosy Hub for the first few meetings of this reporting period due to the closure of our previous venue at the Working Men's Club. Our Sunday gatherings then moved to a larger premises and met in the Community Room within the Chesterfield Fire Station. We continued to use the Cosy Hub for mid-week Prayer Meetings.

We continued to use our social media channels to communicate the message and meaning of Christian faith for life today, to encourage and pray for each other, and to creatively use these media to expand our communications reach into the wider community of Chesterfield and beyond.

**i) Weekly meetings** of the church on Sunday mornings incorporating an element led by volunteers specifically for children aged 0 to 14yrs.

Sunday morning in-person meetings held in reporting period: 14 at The Cosy Hub and 37 times at Chesterfield Fire Station. One Sunday evening meeting was held at Ss Augustine Church (total 52 meetings)

Average attendance: Adults 19 Children 3

**ii) Connect Groups** meeting weekly in homes are the principal opportunity to gather with fellow Christians in smaller groups to study, pray, support, and grow in understanding. These groups are the

front-line for pastoral care provisions, with those leading these groups trained in up-to-date listening skills and spiritual care practice.

Connect Groups: 3

Average attendance (all groups): estimated at 5 people per group (15 per week in total)

**iii) Prayer Meetings** - Redeemer King meets monthly to pray together for each other, our shared life and activities as a Christian community, our witness, work and support for the community and the developing life, ministry, witness and activities as a local Church with a district vision.

**v) Missional Discipleship** is an interactive learning series developed by Embers UK to develop and grow those who attend Redeemer King Church with the following objectives:

- bringing Jesus into our everyday lives and see him in our everyday
- living more intentionally for him & what it means to be a disciple
- how we connect with him, other believers and the world

Our goal was to invest in our own people to help them grow in faith individually and collectively thus better equipping those involved to meet our objectives and serve the community.

The programme was delivered over 5 sessions during May and June 2025 with an average attendance of 14 people.

### 3.2 Objective 3b: reaching out in the local community and beyond.

#### The Local Context

During this reporting period, we remained a vibrant, warmly inclusive church community. We extended an open invitation to all our gatherings and meetings. Furthermore, we sought to be generous with our time, skills, experience and gifts, and serve our community meaningfully.

We developed meaningful relationships with the local community and partnered with existing initiatives, such as Gussie's Kitchen and Community Development Chesterfield, along with other church initiatives across the town. The organisations we actively partnered with are all focussed on care and support for the most vulnerable and disadvantaged within the community.

We have also been able to make financial donations to local causes such as Hope House which in turn has forged or strengthened our relationships across the community.

Many of those who attend Redeemer King also volunteer with or are employed within local third-sector organisations, including The Message Trust, Gussie's Kitchen, Community Development Chesterfield and Derby City Mission.

#### National and International

The Redeemer King church family and friends sponsor children in Ngong Kenya through a partnership with Compassion UK.

Donations to support national initiatives in line with our beliefs and objectives were made via gifts to the church and included CAP (Christians Against Poverty) and The Trussel Trust.

### 3.3 Future Plans

Birdholme and surrounding areas remain where we want to stay and much of the reporting period has focussed on establishing ourselves in our new home at Chesterfield Fire Station while bringing stability back into the church. Indeed, the opportunity to support other users of the building as well as the fire crews is something we are keen to explore as the relationship and trust with our hosts matures.

We continue to maintain established relationships in the area and explore new ways to engage within the community.

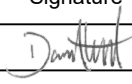

Throughout this reporting period four trustees, Neville Taylor, Daniel Hall, Joan Power and Jackie Taylor oversaw the charitable purposes of the church.

Day to day church operations continued to be managed by our Leadership Team comprising Chris van D'Arque, Jessica van D'Arque, Janet Ayres, Richard Old, and Neville Taylor.

Several individuals who regularly attend church events and meetings supported the Trustees and Leadership Team by taking responsibility on a voluntary basis for various functions that are crucial to achieving our charitable aims and objectives.

## 3 Activities and Objectives

The charitable purposes and objectives of Redeemer King Church are to advance Christianity in Derbyshire by means of:

- a) communicating Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.
- b) identifying and addressing the needs of socially and economically disadvantaged members of our community through engagement with existing, and the development of new, initiatives as appropriate and in keeping with our basis of faith.

Details of how these objectives have been achieved during the reporting period are set out below.

### 3.1 Objective 3a: to communicate Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.

We met weekly for our Sunday gatherings in the heart of our community at Birdholme Working Men's Club. We also used this space from time to time for mid-week meetings including prayer meetings and our Life Untangled Course (see below).

We continued to use our social media channels to communicate the message and meaning of Christian faith for life today, to encourage and pray for each other, and to creatively use these media to expand our communications reach into the wider community of Chesterfield and beyond.

**i) Weekly meetings** of the church on Sunday mornings; incorporating an element led by volunteers specifically for children aged 0 to 14yrs.

Sunday meetings held in reporting period – **49 meetings in-person at Birdholme and 1 off-site meeting (total 50 meetings)**

Average attendance – **Adults 27 Children 7**

**ii) Connect Groups** meeting weekly in homes are the principal opportunity to gather with fellow Christians in smaller groups to study, pray, support, and grow in understanding. These groups are the front-line for pastoral care provisions, with those leading these groups trained in up-to-date listening skills and spiritual care practice.

Connect Groups – **4 N°.**

Average attendance (all groups) – **estimated at 5 people per group (20 people)**

**iii) Prayer Meetings** - Redeemer King meets monthly to pray together for each other, our shared life and activities as a Christian community, our witness, work and support for the community and the developing life, ministry, witness and activities as a local Church with a district vision.

v) **Life Untangled** is a Redeemer King-developed apologetics event designed to give a thoughtful and compassionate Christian approach to complex issues and situations that present within society and globally today, and to resource Christian to live a thoughtful life of faith, engaged with the issues and situations that present in life today and both a personal level and as members of wider society. The course was delivered over several weekly sessions during spring 2024.

### 3.2 Objective 3b: reaching out in the local community and beyond.

#### The Local Context

During this reporting period, we remained a vibrant, warmly inclusive church community. We extended an open invitation to all our gatherings and meetings. Furthermore, we sought to be generous with our time, skills, experience and gifts, and serve our community meaningfully.

We developed meaningful relationships with the local community and leadership, and partnered with existing initiatives, such as Gussie's Kitchen and Chesterfield Food Bank. The organisations we actively partnered with are all focussed on care and support for the most vulnerable and disadvantaged within the community.

We recognised that many people within our community continued to struggle financially with the cost of living. Therefore, towards the end of the previous reporting period we applied for and received a National Lottery Awards for All grant which enabled us to set up a mobile, professional standard kitchen platform along with refectory furniture tables and seating. Between November 2023 and July 2024 Redeemer King ran a mid-week supper club (Open Table) in the Birdholme Working Men's Club, serving hot two course meals to circa forty guests of all ages. Meals were prepared to a high standard and served in an environment to which people were welcomed naturally as our guests. Open Table was funded through small locally available grants topped up as necessary from our church funds. Both kitchen and front of house were staffed voluntarily by folks from Redeemer King Church.

Many of those who attend Redeemer King are also voluntarily or employed within local third-sector organisations, including The Message Trust, Gussie's Kitchen, Derby City Mission, and the Chesterfield Food Bank.

#### **National and International**

The Redeemer King church family and friends sponsor children in Ngong Kenya through a partnership with Compassion UK.

### 3.3 Future Plans

During the final weeks of this reporting period, for reasons outside of the control of Redeemer King Church, Birdholme Working Men's Club ceased trading. As a Church we are deeply saddened by this development not just because of the loss of our "home" but because of the wider loss to the Birdholme Community.

Whilst there is currently no similar facility in the local area, Birdholme remains our community. We will therefore find temporary premises nearby where we can store our equipment and continue to meet as a Church. We will remain open to All. As opportunities arise within the constraints we now face, we plan to re-establish a community outreach programme.

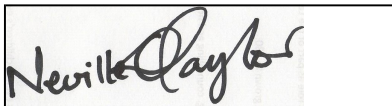

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# Accounts

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## 1 Introduction

This is the ninth annual report for Redeemer King Church; a Charitable Incorporated Organisation registered with the Commission on 18<sup>th</sup> November 2014 (N<sup>o</sup>. 1159252).

The report covers the period ending 31<sup>st</sup> July 2023.

## 2 Governance

At the start of the reporting period there were three trustees overseeing the charitable purposes of the church. Richard Kirk stepped down as Treasurer for the charity in January 2023 and as a trustee in March 2023. Arrangements for appointing trustees are set out in our constitution.

By agreement Neville Taylor took over the role of Treasurer and remained Chair of Trustees. Mr Daniel Hall and Mrs Joan Power were appointed as Trustees in February 2023.

Along with Richard Kirk, Jim McGlade stepped down from the Leadership Team in January 2023. By the end of the reporting period the leadership team consisted of Chris van D'Arque, Jessica van D'Arque, Janet Ayres, Richard Old, and Neville Taylor.

Several individuals who regularly attend church events and meetings are, along with Trustees, taking responsibility on a voluntary basis for various functions that are crucial to achieving our charitable aims and objectives.

## 3 Activities and Objectives

The charitable purposes and objectives of Redeemer King Church are to advance Christianity in Derbyshire by means of:

- a) communicating Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.
- b) identifying and addressing the needs of socially and economically disadvantaged members of our community through engagement with existing, and the development of new, initiatives as appropriate and in keeping with our basis of faith.

Details of how these objectives have been achieved during the reporting period are set out below.

### 3.1 Objective 3a: to communicate Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.

We continue to meet in the heart of our community at Birdholme Working Men's Club. Following a further exploration of our priorities as a Christian community, we have begun to purposefully redevelop our approach to using the social spaces available at the Club, to ensure that they fully support our gathered life as a Christian community of all ages.

We have continued to use our social media channels to communicate the message and meaning of Christian faith for life today, to encourage and pray for each other, and to creatively use these media to expand our communications reach into the wider community of Chesterfield and beyond.

- i) Weekly meetings of the church on Sunday mornings; incorporating an element led by volunteers specifically for children aged 0 to 14yrs.

Sunday meetings held in reporting period – **50 meetings in-person at Birdholme and 1 off-site meeting (total 51 meetings)**

Average attendance – **Adults 60 Children 12**

- ii) **Connect Groups** meeting weekly in homes are the principal opportunity to gather with fellow Christians in smaller groups to study, pray, support, and grow in understanding. These groups are the front-line for pastoral care provisions, with those leading these groups trained in up-to-date listening skills and spiritual care practice.

Connect Groups – 6 N°.

Average attendance (all groups) – **estimated at 5 people per group (30 people)**

iii) **2 N° Forging our Values** workshops promoted the collective values as a Christian community of **Authenticity, Audacity, Humility, and Compassion**. These values underpin all developments at Redeemer King today, and all proposed actions and activities are measured against these values, fully unpacked and accessible on the organisation website, to ensure that we are consistently true to them.

iv) **Prayer Night** - Redeemer King meets monthly to pray together for each other, our shared life and activities as a Christian community, our witness, work and support for the community and the developing life, ministry, witness and activities as a local Church with a district vision.

v) **Life Untangled** is a Redeemer King-developed apologetics event designed to give a thoughtful and compassionate Christian approach to complex issues and situations that present within society and globally today, and to resource Christian to live a thoughtful life of faith, engaged with the issues and situations that present in life today and both a personal level and as members of wider society.

vi) **The Alpha course** is an evangelistic introduction to the Christian faith over a ten-week period. This relaxed, informal, and interactive social approach is the preferred opportunity for those who are curious about Christian faith to explore in the context of a warm and friendly setting.

vii) **Forest Fest** is the fresh expression of Redeemer King's annual social gathering. Held within woodland locally in early Summer, Forest Fest was a weekend of outdoor social gathering of over 100 people of all ages to share time together, engage in an immersive experience of the natural world, participate forest school, a drum circle, axe throwing, woodland walks and creatively cooked alfresco lunch and early evening meals, closing the weekend with gathered worship on the Sunday morning. Further initiatives connecting with the natural environments surrounding Chesterfield are in planning and development as a source of learning, a context for wellbeing, and a place of food production.

### 3.2 Objective 3b: reaching out in the local community and beyond.

#### The Local Context

During this reporting period, we have continued to develop a vibrant, warmly inclusive church community, generous and purposeful in our time and use of skills, experience, and gifts, adventurous in our faith and purposeful in serving our community meaningfully well.

We are an open and accessible Christian community who care for and support each other practically, as well as emotionally and spiritually consistent with need and consent.

We are now firmly settled in Birdholme, building meaningful relationships with the local community and leadership, forging effective partnerships with existing initiatives, such as Gussie's Community and Chesterfield Food Bank, to support and positively impact the community in Jesus' name, and seeking to fulfil Redeemer King's aspiration to enable people to thrive in life, and to demonstrate the worth and dignity of all people, both in our actions and our attention to detail. The organisations we actively partner with today are all focussed on care and support for the most vulnerable and disadvantaged within the community and are effective in their roles and mutually collaborative in their service.

As a reflection of our refreshed identity forged in our values, we have developed a new logo and allied tagline (uncommon wisdom. intelligent kindness) to reflect the forward-looking, effective, aspirational, and compassionate goals of Redeemer King.

Within this period, people in our most vulnerable communities were struggling financially in the face of the economic conditions. The inflated cost of gas and electricity meant that some were unable to afford to cook a hot meal for their family, with many parents choosing to go hungry in order to feed their children. From October 2022 through to June 2023, Redeemer King ran a mid-week supper club in collaboration with Gussie's Kitchen, serving hot two course meals to a weekly average of fifty-

three guests of all ages. Meals were prepared with imagination to a high standard, and served with the aim of creating a social community experience in which people are welcomed naturally as guests.

Many of those who attend Redeemer King are also voluntarily or employed within local third-sector organisations, including The Message Trust, Gussie's Kitchen, Derby City Mission, and the Chesterfield Food Bank.

#### **National and International**

The Redeemer King church family and friends sponsor children in Ngong Kenya through a partnership with Compassion UK. We also support the Message Trust, Gussie's Kitchen, and Chesterfield Food Bank.

### **3.3 Future Plans**

Following the work to define and implement our values as a Christian community, we have purposefully worked to follow a developmental path in line with these values, seeking to ensure they are reflected in all our initiatives and activities. Life Untangled, Forest Fest, The Supper Club all reflect our Values in their development, implementation, and experience of them, and were all realised within this reporting period.

To further develop the Supper Club and additionally serve the Birholme Community and surrounding area, we applied for, and towards the end of this reporting period received, a National Lottery Awards for All grant. This will enable us to develop a fully equipped professional kitchen platform together with refectory-style seating, so we can relocate the Supper Club to Birdholme Working Men's Club thus providing a better social space with the potential for more activities.

At the start of the reporting period there were four trustees overseeing the charitable purposes of the church. Benjamin Garstang stepped down as a trustee in April 2022. Arrangements for appointing trustees are set out in our constitution.

By agreement Mr Neville Taylor is the Chair of Trustees and Mr Richard Kirk continues in the role of Treasurer for the charity.

Chris van D'Arque, Jessica van D'Arque, Neville Taylor and Richard Old were appointed to the Leadership team in January 2022. Jim McGlade also agreed to join the Leadership Team for one year from January 2022 onwards. Joshua Botham stepped down from the Leadership Team in March 2022. Steve Parker stepped down from the Leadership Team in May 2022.

Chris van D'Arque was appointed as our new Church Leader in May 2022.

By the end of the reporting period the leadership team consisted of Chris van D'Arque, Jessica van D'Arque, Richard Kirk, Janet Ayres, Richard Old, Neville Taylor and Jim McGlade.

A number of individuals who regularly attend church events and meetings are, along with trustees, taking responsibility on a voluntary basis for various functions that are crucial to achieving our charitable aims and objectives.

## 3. Activities and Objectives

The charitable purposes and objectives of Redeemer King Church are to advance Christianity in Derbyshire by means of:

- i. communicating Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith;
- ii. identifying and addressing the needs of socially and economically disadvantaged members of our community through engagement with existing, and the development of new, initiatives as appropriate and in keeping with our basis of faith.

Details of how these objectives have been achieved during the reporting period are set out below.

### 3.1 Objective 1: to communicate Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.

From June 2021, we were able to meet physically in limited numbers in the Stonegravels Parish Centre in Chesterfield and gradually increased our numbers there as COVID-19 restrictions were eased. As the main hall was small, we were unable to meet as a full church family, so we sought out a new meeting location that would allow us to meet safely in largely numbers. In February 2022, we moved to Birdholme Working Mens Club as our new home, which gave us the space to meet to worship and make use of 2 separate large spaces to support our Kids Church work.

We have continued to use our RK Family Online Facebook Group, to share, encourage and pray for each other and have been sharing short messages to church weekly by email. All of these activities have enabled us to support each other, grow as a church community and expand our reach online way beyond Chesterfield.

a) Weekly meetings of the church on Sunday mornings; incorporating an element led by volunteers specifically for children age 0 to 14yrs.

Sunday meetings held in reporting period – **45 online meetings, 6 meetings in person (total 51 meetings)**

Average attendance – **Adults 28 Children 16**

b) Encounter. Monthly meetings of the church on a Sunday evening.

Meetings held in reporting period – 6 online, 1 meeting in person

Average attendance – **13 online, 6 in person**

c) Midweek 'Home Groups' meeting weekly in homes (and online via Zoom since March 2020); an opportunity for smaller groups to study, pray, support one another and serve the community.

Number of midweek groups – **9. Average attendance (all groups) – estimated at 6 people per group (54 people)**

d) Regular Prayer & Vision nights. Meetings to gather the church family to pray and look towards the future. Prayer & Vision nights held in reporting period – **15 online meetings and 0 physical meetings.**

e) Occasional evangelistic events often with prominent guest speakers tackling a range of subjects.

f) Alpha course. An evangelistic teaching course introducing the Christian faith over a ten-week period. **2 courses held over the period with average attendance of 5 people per course.**

g) Specific events aimed at outreach including quizzes, special services and festivals.

h) Specific events aimed at men, women and those in the age range 18-30.

### **3.2 Objective 2: reaching out in the local community and beyond.**

#### **a. Local community**

During the reporting period, we have continued to build a vibrant, inclusive church community, which attracts families, couples and individuals from all backgrounds, both local to where we meet and across the wider Chesterfield and Sheffield area. As a community we are able to care for and support each other according to need.

Now that we have moved to Birdholme, we are building relationships with the local community and existing initiatives to support and impact the community in Jesus' name.

We have continued to maintain a hardship fund from which we help those in need in our church family and others known to us, for example, shopping for food and household items, kitting out families with carpets, furniture and appliances, paying transport costs to see family or attend appointments, and so on.

Many of those who attend Redeemer King are involved with local charities: The Message Trust, Gussies Kitchen, Derby City Mission and the Chesterfield Food Bank.

### **b. National and International**

The Redeemer King church family and friends sponsor 55 children (at March 2020) in Ngong Kenya through a partnership with Compassion UK. We also support the Message Trust, Hope House, Gussies Kitchen, Christians Against Poverty, the Cinnamon Network, Watoto and Christian Vision for Men.

### **3.3 Future plans**

Following the appointment of Chris van D'Arque in May 2022, a significant piece of work has been completed to define and agree our values as a church and to determine our future plans to impact the community of Birdholme and beyond in Jesus' name.

## 1. Introduction

This is the seventh annual report for Redeemer King Church; a Charitable Incorporated Organisation registered with the Commission on 18<sup>th</sup> November 2014 (N<sup>o</sup>. 1159252).

The report covers the period ending 31<sup>st</sup> July 2021.

## 2. Governance

At the start of the reporting period there were seven trustees overseeing the charitable purposes of the church. Karen Beech and Jonathan Boston stepped down as trustees in November 2020.

Benjamin Garstang was appointed as a trustee on 1<sup>st</sup> January 2020. Arrangements for appointing trustees are set out in our constitution.

By agreement Mr Neville Taylor is the Chair of Trustees and Mr Richard Kirk continues in the role of Treasurer for the charity.

Andrew Kind stepped down from the Leadership Team in March 2021. Carl Beech stepped down as Senior Leader in May 2021. Karen Beech stepped down from the Leadership Team in May 2021.

By the end of the reporting period the leadership team consisted of Joshua Botham, Richard Kirk, Janet Ayres and Steve Parker with interim support from 2 trustees, Benjamin Garstang and Neville Taylor.

A number of individuals who regularly attend church events and meetings are, along with trustees, taking responsibility on a voluntary basis for various functions that are crucial to achieving our charitable aims and objectives.

## 3. Activities and Objectives

The charitable purposes and objectives of Redeemer King Church are to advance Christianity in Derbyshire by means of:

- i. communicating Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith;
- ii. identifying and addressing the needs of socially and economically disadvantaged members of our community through engagement with existing, and the development of new, initiatives as appropriate and in keeping with our basis of faith.

Details of how these objectives have been achieved during the reporting period are set out below.

### **3.1 Objective 1: to communicate Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.**

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic we were unable to meet physically between August 2020 and May 2021 and continued to broadcast our sermons and Kids Church on our YouTube channel and meet on Zoom for home groups, Alpha courses, prayer meetings and Question and Answer sessions.

In May and June 2021, we started to meet outdoors in the gardens of church members in groups of up to 30 as COVID restrictions started to ease and were able to meet physically in limited numbers in the Stonegravels Parish Centre in Chesterfield from 20<sup>th</sup> June 2021.

We continued to use our RK Family Online Facebook Group, to share, encourage and pray for each other and have been sharing short devotionals by email. All of these activities have enabled us to support each other, grow as a church community and expand our reach online way beyond Chesterfield.

a) Weekly meetings of the church on Sunday mornings; incorporating an element led by volunteers specifically for children age 0 to 14yrs.

Sunday meetings held in reporting period – 45 online meetings, 6 meetings in person (total 51 meetings)

Average attendance – Adults 28 Children 16

b) Encounter. Monthly meetings of the church on a Sunday evening.

Meetings held in reporting period – 6 online, 1 meeting in person

Average attendance – 13 online, 6 in person

c) Midweek 'Home Groups' meeting weekly in homes (and online via Zoom since March 2020); an opportunity for smaller groups to study, pray, support one another and serve the community.

Number of midweek groups – 9. Average attendance (all groups) – estimated at 6 people per group (54 people)

d) Regular Prayer & Vision nights. Meetings to gather the church family to pray and look towards the future. Prayer & Vision nights held in reporting period – 15 online meetings and 0 physical meetings.

e) Occasional evangelistic events often with prominent guest speakers tackling a range of subjects.

f) Alpha course. An evangelistic teaching course introducing the Christian faith over a ten-week period. 2 courses held over the period with average attendance of 5 people per course.

g) Specific events aimed at outreach including quizzes, special services and festivals.

h) Specific events aimed at men, women and those in the age range 18-30.

### **3.2 Objective 2: reaching out in the local community and beyond.**

#### **a. Local community**

During the reporting period, and even despite much of this time being subject to restrictions and lockdown, we have continued to build a vibrant, inclusive church community, both physically and online, which attracts families, couples and individuals from all backgrounds, both local to where we meet and across the wider Chesterfield area. As a community we are able to care for and support each other according to need.

We continued our partnership with Christians Against Poverty (CAP) until May 2021, where for a number of reasons, we made the difficult decision to close our CAP centre. Up until this point, we had been delivering an exemplary debt help service across Chesterfield; which was free of charge to our clients. During the Covid pandemic, we had to adapt our debt help service, which has been challenging, however we have still continued to see households go debt free.

Furthermore, we maintain a hardship fund from which we help CAP clients and others in crisis by for example, shopping for food and household items, kitting out families with carpets, furniture and appliances, paying transport costs to see family or attend appointments, and so on.

Many of those who attend Redeemer King are involved with local charities: The Message Trust, Derby City Mission, the Chesterfield Food Bank.

### **b. National and International**

The Redeemer King church family and friends sponsor 55 children (at March 2020) in Ngong Kenya through a partnership with Compassion UK. We also continue to support Open Doors International, the Message Trust, the Cinnamon Network, Watoto and Christian Vision for Men.

### **3.3 Future plans**

In view of the challenges of COVID and significant changes in our Leadership Team over this period, we have reviewed our strategic plans to ensure that we remain focused on our vision to reach those in our town and ensure that our growth is managed well from a financial and personnel perspective.

Since the departure of our Senior Leader, we are looking to appoint a new Church Leader to work with the existing Leadership Team to deliver our plans to reach out to the local community and beyond and help the current church to grow in their faith.

We are continuing to look for premises that will enable us to establish ourselves in a community and have a greater impact in our town.

## **4. Public Benefit Report**

As a church we exist to communicate the life-changing message of Jesus Christ. We want people to be full of faith, hope and new life through faith in God. In all we do we point beyond ourselves to the hope we have in our God and also seek to make a practical difference to the lives of people in Chesterfield.

We will continue to:

- take this life changing message to all that we connect with;
- provide Christian teaching to our community and beyond, in accordance with our basis of faith;
- continue to develop links to best serve the people of our town, country and beyond;
- provide opportunity and access through programmes and events for people of all ages and backgrounds;
- serve and love our town, county and country through both existing and new initiatives;
- support the needs of the poor in our church and those known to us, through our hardship fund

### **5. Trustees remuneration and benefits**

No trustees received any remuneration and benefits in this reporting period.

No staff member earned over £60,000.

### **6. Financial Review**

This is the seventh financial year for Redeemer King Church covering the year 1<sup>st</sup> August 2020 to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2021. This review highlights how the church has been supported financially and the support the church has offered the local community. We have received voluntary contributions including gift aid payments of £97,768 with an expenditure of £93,992.

As a church we routinely set aside a minimum of 10% of our income which, at the discretion of the leadership team is used to help local, national and international initiatives as covered in section 3.2.

The charity has no outstanding liabilities.

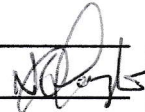

Janet Ayres and Andrew Kind were appointed to the leadership team in this period. By the end of the reporting period the leadership team consisted of Carl Beech, Karen Beech, Joshua Botham, Richard Kirk, Andrew Kind, Janet Ayres and Steve Parker.

A number of individuals who regularly attend church events and meetings are, along with trustees, taking responsibility on a voluntary basis for various functions that are crucial to achieving our charitable aims and objectives.

### 3. Activities and Objectives

The charitable purposes and objectives of Redeemer King Church are to advance Christianity in Derbyshire by means of:

- i. communicating Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith;
- ii. identifying and addressing the needs of socially and economically disadvantaged members of our community through engagement with existing, and the development of new, initiatives as appropriate and in keeping with our basis of faith.

Details of how these objectives have been achieved during the reporting period are set out below.

#### **3.1 Objective 1: to communicate Christian messages of an evangelistic and teaching nature, in accordance with our basis of faith.**

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic we have been unable to meet physically together since mid-March 2020. With the mindset of 'innovate, don't replicate', we switched immediately to broadcasting 20–30-minute sermons on Sundays on our YouTube channel. We also launched our monthly magazine-style Bonanza services, where we have a guest speaker or interview, testimonies and worship songs. Our Kids Church is also broadcast on Sunday mornings on YouTube. We placed great emphasis in getting involved in home groups and creating small communities, to the extent that 70% of our people are regularly engaged in home groups. Over Zoom, we have been able to hold a number of evangelistic meetings with guest speakers, take communion, join in prayer and worship evenings, run Alpha courses and have held quizzes, talent shows and games. We have created an RK Family Online Facebook Group, to share, encourage and pray for each other and have been sharing short devotionals by email. All of these activities have enabled us to support each other, grow as a church community and expand our reach online way beyond Chesterfield. Even despite the pandemic, we have seen an unprecedented number of people coming to faith.

a) Weekly meetings of the church on Sunday mornings; incorporating an element led by volunteers specifically for children age 0 to 14yrs.

Sunday meetings held in reporting period – 33 (no physical meetings were held since 15<sup>th</sup> March 2020 due to the Covid 19 pandemic)

Average attendance (March 2020) – Adults 90 Children 30.

b) Encounter. Monthly meetings of the church on a Sunday evening.

Meetings held in reporting period – 5 (no meetings have taken place since 1<sup>st</sup> March 2020 due to the Covid 19 pandemic).

Average attendance (prior to March 2020) - 30.

c) Midweek 'Home Groups' meeting weekly in homes (and online via Zoom since March 2020); an opportunity for smaller groups to study, pray, support one another and serve the community.

Number of midweek groups – 9. Average attendance (all groups – July 2020) – 65.

g) Freedom in Christ Course. A course aimed at furthering the Christian faith and discipleship over a 10 week period. Average attendance - 55

g) Specific events aimed at outreach including quizzes, special services and festivals.

h) Specific events aimed at men, women and those in the age range 18-30.

### **3.2 Objective 2: reaching out in the local community and beyond.**

#### **a. Local community**

During the reporting period, and even despite much of this time being subject to restrictions and lockdown, we have continued to build a vibrant, inclusive church community, both physically and online, which attracts families, couples and individuals from all backgrounds, both local to where we meet and across the wider Chesterfield area. As a community we are able to care for and support each other according to need.

We have continued our partnership with Christians Against Poverty (CAP), delivering an exemplary debt help service across Chesterfield; this service will always be free of charge to our Clients. In order to protect our Debt Coach, Volunteers and Clients, and to secure compliance with government restrictions introduced in response to the Covid pandemic, we have had to adapt our debt help service. This period has been challenging and unfortunately we have been unable to help as many Clients. Nevertheless, we continue to see households go debt free. Furthermore, we maintain a

hardship fund from which we help CAP clients and others in crisis by for example, shopping for food and household items, topping up pre-payment meters, paying transport costs to see family or attend appointments, and so on.

Many of those who attend Redeemer King are involved with local charities: The Message Trust, Derby City Mission, the Chesterfield Food Bank and the Elderfriends visiting scheme. Over the winter months we supported the Christians Together in Chesterfield (CTC) night shelter.

### **b. National and International**

The Redeemer King church family and friends sponsor 61 children (at March 2020) in Ngong Kenya through a partnership with Compassion UK. We also continue to support Open Doors International, the Message Trust, the Cinnamon Network, Watoto and Christian Vision for Men.

### **3.3 Future plans**

Our church is now a year into our five-year strategic plan which the leadership are working towards so that our growth is managed well from a financial and personnel perspective. We will continue to flex and adapt our plans to tackle the challenges of living in a COVID-19 world.

Lifepoint church in Lowedges in Sheffield continued to meet until late 2019, however there are no plans to start again when COVID restrictions cease. Redeemer King are looking to plant a new work in Sheffield in the near future.

We have continued to explore various meeting and office space options, however nothing suitable was found. We are continuing to look for premises so that we have the ability to work more efficiently as a team and have a greater impact in our town, especially when we emerge from the pandemic.

## **4. Public Benefit Report**

As a church we exist to communicate the life-changing message of Jesus Christ. We want people to be full of faith, hope and new life through faith in God. In all we do we point beyond ourselves to the hope we have in our God and also seek to make a practical difference to the lives of people in Chesterfield.

We will continue to:

- take this life changing message to all that we connect with;
- provide Christian teaching to our community and beyond, in accordance with our basis of faith;
- continue to develop links to best serve the people of our town, country and beyond;
- provide opportunity and access through programmes and events for people of all ages and backgrounds;
- serve and love our town, county and country through both existing and new initiatives;
- develop and grow our new debt centre which is part of an award-winning charity called CAP (Christians Against Poverty).

### 5. Trustees remuneration and benefits

Mr Carl Beech received remuneration of £10,416 during the year for his role as senior leader of the Church. He did not receive any expenses payments.

Mrs Karen Beech received remuneration of £1266.97 and stepped down from her role as Operations Manager, safe guarding officer and pastoral care coordinator at the end of August 2019. She did not receive any expenses payments. No staff member earned over £60,000.

### 6. Financial Review

This is the sixth financial year for Redeemer King Church covering the year 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019 to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2020. This review highlights how the church has been supported financially and the support the church has offered the local community. We have received voluntary contributions including gift aid payments of £125,225 with an expenditure of £119,398.

As a church we routinely set aside a minimum of 10% of our income which, at the discretion of the leadership team is used to help local, national and international initiatives as covered in section 3.2.

The charity has no outstanding liabilities.
