Introduction

The Mud House Children's Foundation is a UK registered charity established to support and develop opportunities for children, especially from the Maasai communities of the Loliondo area of Ngorongoro District, to access education and improve their life choices. In recognition of the need and desire to create sustainable solutions our charity works closely with relevant Tanzanian government officers, the Chiefs of Maasai villages, Headteachers of schools and wider members of the relevant communities.

Structure, governance and management

Our charity formally commenced operations in January 2015 under the title of Ngorongoro Education Project Trust. In July 2020, with the approval of the UK Charity Commission and all our Trustees, the charity changed its title to the Mud House Children's Foundation. It is now formally registered under this new name.

The Trustees appointed have been drawn from acquaintances of the charity originators providing a useful blend of senior level experience from the public, private and voluntary sectors. All Trustees have been nominated and appointed at formal charity Board meetings. This year the Board membership has remained stable with just one new addition. We were delighted to appoint Mrs Gaynor McKeown, a long term supporter of our charity who possesses a wealth of useful voluntary and charity sector experience.

To date, our charity has continued to primarily operate with the assistance of volunteers. We continue to support a range of relevant projects overseen by the Trustees, whilst delivered and managed by Mrs Nichola Jarman our Projects Director and Project Development manager, Hannah Povey.

Understandably, the Covid-19 pandemic has frustrated our travel plans this past year. In March 2020, a group of volunteers and a Trustee had to return prematurely from Tanzania in order to avoid being stranded. However, their somewhat curtailed visit still enabled meetings to be held with key stakeholders in the relevant communities and provided opportunities to review our projects and to verify the well-being of our sponsored children.

Our Partners

Without the support of key trusted, capable and committed people in Tanzania our efforts would all be in vain. We should recognise the contributions of The Loliondo District Commissioner, Government Education Officers, Headteachers and staff of schools, Chiefs of the Maasai bomas and numerous other community members, especially the charity manager, Salome Nassei, the Issuja family and countless others who have welcomed us into their lives and assisted us to help Tanzanian children.

Objectives & Activities

In accordance with our Constitution our stated objectives and activities are as follows;

- To raise educational standards in the schools in the Ngorongoro District of Tanzania and
- to improve access for children.
- To create a self-improving, self-sustaining system by developing community cohesion.

Activities: This will be achieved by;

- Maintaining a school sponsored child programme
- Providing teacher training, researching and evaluating its impact
- Supporting the government to provide appropriate boarding for Maasai school children
- Establishing a community educational resource base (Internet hub/library)
- Support to maintain educational buildings
- Providing vital school resources, materials and equipment
- Developing exchanges with local and international volunteer students

As a small charity based in the UK which is focused on delivering frontline meaningful projects in Tanzania it is not surprising that, over the years, we have encountered many challenges and learnt an enormous amount from our experiences. Notwithstanding the complexities of our operating environment, with the generosity of donors and incredible support of many volunteers and partners we are, with justifiable pride, able to point to proven successful delivery of several ongoing projects.

Achievements & Performance

Despite the challenges presented this year by the pandemic, we are still able to report and highlight the completion and ongoing development of a number of successful projects.

a) Sponsored Children Education Programme

Many Maasai children live in semi-permanent remote villages (called bomas) across the Ngorongoro region. Each day, the children often face lengthy journeys, on foot, to just reach a school. Many such journeys are of 1-2 hours duration. At the request of Maasai Chiefs and their communities our sponsored children programme was introduced to enable those children living in poverty to access boarding accommodation at the school(s). With the generous donations of UK residents, we are currently sponsoring 65

children in 10 educational establishments. These are primarily located in the Wasso, Loliondo area of Ngorongoro but college students are located in various cities in Tanzania.

To ensure fairness the sponsored children are selected by strict criteria and negotiation with individual Maasai bomas. Salome Nassei (a senior local Maasai) co-ordinates this process as well as the ongoing needs and welfare of each child in liaison with the parents or guardian. In the future we hope to attract further sponsorship opportunities to fund even more children.

b) Accommodation

The Maasai parents and guardians of the sponsored children provide a hostel for the majority of our young children. Our charity supports this venture via utilities and building maintenance costs. Last year we reported that the local government had inspected the premises for suitability and were encouraging the construction of additional accommodation to enable expansion. In our view this would be both expensive and from past experience, potentially, counter productive. Alternative options are still being scoped and there is a potential longer term solution involving a new boarding school which is under serious consideration. This could alleviate many concerns. Meanwhile, to meet safety regulations, our charity has purchased fire extinguishers and smoke alarms which have been installed in the hostel. This year, we have also arranged for the parents, guardians and volunteers to receive safeguarding/child protection training.

c) School Playground

This year a further playground was funded and installed at Sakala Primary School.

d) Health and Wellbeing Project

We have closely monitored the Covid-19 situation and despite our initial concerns, it would appear that the virus has yet to seriously impact this remote area of Tanzania. However, to assist the Maasai communities our charity has facilitated the circulation of Covid-19 safety information and provided vital hygiene products such as sanitizer, soap and suitable water containers to many bomas (a small village).

Over the years we have grown concerned about the living environment of the Maasai children. The mud houses have open wood fires and little ventilation. This causes health problems from smoke inhalation and children occasionally suffering horrendous burn injuries. In consequence, our charity has trialled a brick oven with chimney in a Maasai mud house. The results were promising and following extensive research we have identified more efficient and effective options. Recently, a few of our UK grant bids have been successful and we hope, in the coming year, to commence the installation of 100 chimneys and cookers.

e) Food Programme

Last year we reported that owing to a dramatic shortage of crops and subsequent inability to feed the sponsored children that an emergency food programme was rapidly introduced. In addition, an alternative irrigation and farming project was subsequently scoped with a view to providing a more sustainable solution. This led to maize, beans, potatoes, tomatoes and other vegetables being farmed and the first crop harvested providing vital food for the children. We are pleased to report that this year it has not been necessary to implement a food shortage response.

Fundraising

This year the Covid-19 pandemic frustrated several fundraising events, especially our annual weekend music festival. Despite these disappointments, the charity has been successful in raising funds via several UK Grant bids.

The Mud House Club

The Mud House Club was launched last year and has a healthy growing membership. It now plays a vital role, enabling us to communicate our important work to a wider audience which is also attracting new volunteers.

Financial review

Our existing projects have sufficient specific fundraising support. However, it is hoped that the development of our new project “Looking Beyond” which hopes to support children through further education and university will attract fresh sponsors and enable us to continue to improve the life chances of Maasai children.

TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year from 1 January 2020 to 31 December 2020.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's trust deed dated 22 January 2015, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

The Mudhouse Children's Foundation is a UK registered charity established to support and develop opportunities for children, especially from the Maasai communities of the Loliondo area of Ngorongoro District, to access education and improve their life choices. In recognition of the need and desire to create sustainable solutions our charity works closely with relevant Tanzanian government officers, the Chiefs of Maasai villages, Headteachers of schools and wider members of the relevant communities.

Objectives and activities

In accordance with our Constitution our stated objectives and activities are as follows;

- To raise educational standards in the schools in the Ngorongoro District of Tanzania and to improve access to education for children.
- To create a self-improving, self-sustaining system by developing community cohesion.

Activities: This will be achieved by:

- Establishing a school sponsored child programme
- Providing teacher training, researching and evaluating its impact
- Supporting the government to provide appropriate boarding for Maasai school children
- Establishing a community educational resource base (Internet hub/library)
- Support to maintain educational buildings
- Providing vital school resources, materials and equipment
- Developing exchanges with local and international volunteer students

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Accommodation

In our view this would be expensive and from past experience, potentially, counter-productive. Alternative options are still being scoped and there is a potential longer term solution involving a new boarding school which is under serious consideration. This could alleviate many concerns. Meanwhile, to meet safety regulations, our charity has purchased fire extinguishers and smoke alarms which have been installed in the hostel. This year, we have also arranged for the parents, guardians and volunteers to receive safeguarding/child protection training.

Food Programme

We reported last year that owing to a dramatic shortage of crops and subsequent inability to feed the sponsored children an emergency food programme was rapidly introduced. In addition, an alternative irrigation and farming project was subsequently scoped with a view to providing a more sustainable solution. This has led to maize and beans being farmed and the first crop harvested providing vital food for the children. We are pleased to report that this year it has not been necessary to implement a food shortage response.

Volunteer Programmes

The charity has continued to support, by way of arrangements and co-ordination, several visits by volunteers from the UK. An experienced recently retired headteacher has visited four times, at her own expense. She has introduced a teacher training and monitoring programme in two local schools.

Healthy Water Project

A generous donation, from Alton Rotary Club led to our charity commissioning the installation of a new bore well and solar pump on Massai land adjacent to the boarding hostel. A new water tower and tanks have since been installed which, during the recent drought, enabled us to support our sponsored children, the crops and importantly the wider community to access vital clean water.

School Playground

This year a further playground was funded and installed at Sakala Primary School.

New operational name and logo

Following a period of consolidation, last year the Trustees agreed that a new operational brand name and logo should be introduced. In consultation with Maasai Chiefs it was agreed that the new operational name for our charity would be "The Mudhouse Children's Foundation". The UK Charity Commission were informed of this new development.

Fundraising

This year the Covid-19 pandemic frustrated several fundraising events, especially our annual weekend music festival. Despite these disappointments, the charity has been successful in raising funds via several UK grant bids.

The Mudhouse Club

The Mudhouse Club was launched last year and has a healthy growing membership. It now plays a vital role, enabling us to communicate our important work, attract new volunteers and enable us to continue to grow and develop.

Financial review

Our existing projects have sufficient specific fundraising support. However, it is hoped that the development of new project "Looking Beyond" which hopes to support children through further education and university will attract fresh sponsors and enable us to continue to improve the life chances of Maasai children.

Risk

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Reserves

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

Structure, governance and management

The charity was established by a charitable trust deed on 22 January 2015.



Independent examiner's statement



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The Mudhouse Children's Foundation is a charitable incorporated organisation registered 22 January 2015. The registered charity number is 1160089. The registered office is The Drift, Hall Lane, Upper Farringdon, Alton, Hampshire, GU34 3EA.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

The trustees have assessed whether the going concern basis of preparation continues to be appropriate, based on whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. This assessment has been required in the light of the significant uncertainty around the short to medium impact of the Covid-19 virus.

At the time of approving the financial statements the trustees believe that all appropriate measures have been or will be taken to ensure that the company will be able to continue its operations for at least the next 12 months and thus conclude that the going concern basis remains appropriate.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

1 Accounting policies

1.5 Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses, including support costs and governance costs, are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings in the statement of financial activities.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Independent examiner's statement


