The trustees present their annual report and audited financial statements for the year ended 30th September 2020 and confirm they comply with the Charities Act 2011, the constitution and the Charities SORP FRS102.

COMMENCEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

The charity was incorporated on 5 February 2015

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Penzance Hockey Club CIO is constituted as a charitable Incorporated Organisation registered with Charity Commission under charity number 1160338. It is governed by a constitution that was adopted on 1st June 2015 and has an association of 223 members.

Trustees are responsible for the general control and management of the charity. The trustees give their time freely and receive no remuneration or other financial benefits. The trustees have appointed a sub-committee to aid them in the hockey participation of the club. The sub-committee are responsible for organising training, the collection of membership fees & match fees and ensuring that the club is affiliated to the appropriate bodies.

Trustees are appointed or reappointed annually at the Annual General Meeting. Trustees are given a copy of the constitution on appointment. This ensures that new/existing trustees are aware of their responsibilities under the Charities Act.

Penzance Hockey Club CIO has the following policies in place: Saved Policy, Ethics & Equality, Disciplinary Procedures, DBS, Health & Safety Policy, FA procedures. They are affiliated to England Hockey, West Hockey Association & Cornwall Hockey Association. They are an England Hockey Clubs First Accredited Club and have been since March 2007 — this is reviewed every 3 years.

Penzance Hockey Club is also partnered with the Primary Leagues with a local secondary school, the local college and surrounding primary schools involved.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of the charity are set out in the CIOs constitution and are summarised as follows: A provision of a programme of activities aimed at attracting new and retaining the interest of regular established participants in hockey with the overall objective of growing participation in sport, sustaining participation through increased satisfaction and reducing drop off rates for 14-25 year olds and providing pathways for participants to excel in hockey regardless of age, gender, ethnicity or faith.

Management of sporting facility and promotion to other sporting groups, local businesses and community groups to participate in healthy recreation for the benefit of the community of Penzance and surrounding areas and the promotion and access to the CIO's clubhouse facilities to local community, local businesses and other groups for social functions and meeting space.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

How our activities deliver public benefit

Throughout the year the club house is available for use by the local community. The local pigeon club continues to use the facilities for meetings and discussions and Weight Watchers still continues to hire the club room for its weekly meetings. The clubhouse is also available for hire for social events.

There are four local football teams who hire the pitch throughout the year to train as they have no training facilities available to them. This enables the players to continue with their fitness and skills and train safely under floodlights in the winter months whilst having use of the changing room and shower facilities,

The availability of pitch hire also enables the local primary schools to participate in hockey- based activities and games. This helped to give the children an insight into playing hockey on Astro turf and became a basis for the primary & secondary league.

Summer league would usually resume but this year was cancelled due to Covid-19 which would have enabled junior & senior members old & new, parents and anyone who was keen to play. This usually provides a window for potential recruitment of players from the community as well as enhancing confidence, fitness and health. The Badgers teams which enables returning players and younger members to participate in game play was also affected by Covid-19 and also cancelled.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are an important resource. Coaches who run the summer league and oversee teams do so voluntarily and are affiliated to the club. Our coaches provide training sessions and we also have qualified umpires who officiate league games again on a voluntary basis. Coaches and club members running the groups have undertaken DBS checks.

Achievements & Performance

The Badgers league for both the men and women is still active.

In October 2019 the club backed the parents in sports week campaign.

In November the club hosted the county U12 tournament. The U18s start their national cup campaign.

In December the women's first team start their national tier 2 championship.

In January 2020 league games resume after the Christmas break.

In February U12 girls and boys attend liskeard tournament. The ladies' 1sts reach quarter finals of Cornwall cup.

In March a club member is selected for England U16 boys' team. U10 boys and U10 girls win the county tournament. U18 girls reach quarter finals of All England Cup. The ladies' 1sts reach semi-finals of All England Cup.

England Hockey announce that the season is postponed with immediate effect due to Covid-19.

In July training commences under the government guidelines.

In August England hockey announce that games can now be resumed in accordance with government guidelines. A new plaque is unveiled at the clubhouse made by a club member.

In September the ladies' 1sts play the semi-finals of the All-England cup against Loughborough and the new season commences.

Financial Review

The main source of income usually comes from the rental of the CIOs facilities with additional income from pitch hire to the local football teams and primary hockey. This year due to Covid-19 the club and its facilities had to close and therefore did not receive income from the lease of the bar, pitch hire and room hire, however, the club was eligible for a covid business support grant.

The club charges membership fees to its members. This helps to pay for affiliation to England Hockey, Cornwall Hockey, Verde Recreo Hockey League, West Women's Hockey League, competition fees, coaching and umpiring courses, County Schools & Youth, DBS checks and equipment purchased.

Membership also pays for players insurance and public liability insurance and training.

Match fees are charged on match days to pay for teas provided and for the hire of the pitch. The element in the cost of the pitch hire is used for the upkeep and maintenance of the pitch and floodlights. Income from match fees is lower due to the season being suspended, therefore resulting in the club losing income from the county finals day which would normally be scheduled.

Income has also been generated from the sale of the kit. We also received a grant from the hockey league towards travel.

Payments have included essential maintenance & public liability insurance for health & safety, accountancy and legal fees, insurance for players for the forthcoming season to ensure their wellbeing, affiliation fees, competition fees, equipment purchases as well as general utilities.

Reserves Policy


The trustees have considered the requirements for reserves, this review covered the nature of income and expenditure streams and the need to match variable income with fixed commitments and the nature of reserves. The trustees are aware of the need to continually monitor reserves but are satisfied that currently the CIO has adequate resources to fulfil its requirements for the foreseeable future.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Penzance Hockey Club CIO
