- Trustee meetings are held by videoconference every 6 to 8 weeks. The agenda usually covers monthly report relating to the progress of the children, operational issues in Uganda and fundraising. The treasurer provides a financial report.
- The Trustees are supported by Permanent Consultants who have relevant professional knowledge and skillsets
- TPC Uganda is a CIO, an NGO an Approved Home in Uganda. The constitution was last amended on 1st December 2014. The appointment of new Trustees is arrived at by the existing Trustees.
- Charity's Mission Statement: Love, care and a home for Ugandan orphans.
- Objects of The Peace Centre:
 1. To promote the benefit of orphaned and vulnerable children and young people living at The Peace Centre in Bukinda, South West Uganda by:
 - a) The advancement of education and training.
 - b) The relief of poverty, sickness
 - c) The promotion of good health
 2. To advance in life and help young people through providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals.
- There should be at least one visit to TPC in Uganda each year by a Trustee or Permanent Consultant, but this will depend upon prevailing conditions.

Operational Developments during 2024-2025

- We have welcomed Anique Kruger (sponsor liaison) as our third Permanent Consultant, in addition to Kat Shkurka (child wellbeing), Mao Nakano (publicity), and they attend Trustee meetings.
- TPC continues to fully support 41 children (including 1 at nursing college, 2 at vocational college and 4 at university). There are 16 secondary boarders and 18 primary school residents.
- The trustees held 7 video conference meetings in the reporting period; including one with the directors at TPC in Uganda.
- Policies are regularly reviewed and updated.
- There are 15 children in the PEACE programme, on a school-only support basis. These children live in their local community.
- New Government regulations require that secondary children have to board at schools. This means that our costs have increased as we have 16 boarders.
- We have had to take in abandoned children, as required by the probation officer.
- 3 of our students have joined university this year
- There are now 3 students doing A-level who will possibly progress to college.

- There are 6 new children as residents.
- The main costs are now split between 35% school fees & associated costs, 21% wages, 20% meals.
- A visit took place from 18 students at Dulwich School Shanghai to The Peace Centre.
- The students from Shanghai painted many of the outside walls around the living areas, built a trampoline and took part in community visits.
- The students taught lessons at the local Primary and Secondary schools, and made a donation of science equipment. Several families became sponsors as a result of this trip.
- They undertook many activities with the children from The Peace Centre such as making robotic vehicles, decorating pencil cases, helping to write letters to sponsors and organising games and sporting activities.
- One Permanent Consultant held several business meetings with the directors of The Peace Centre.
- Despite a difficult financial environment, our income streams have been maintained, including a successful quiz night which raised £12,000



Operational Developments during 2023-2024

- ID verification requirements made by our bank on two Trustees who are based outside the UK has caused them to resign. However, we retain their expertise as consultants (Kat Shkurka in child wellbeing, Mao Nakano in publicity), and they attend Trustee meetings.
- TPC continues to fully support 37 children (including 1 at nursing college, 5 at vocational college and 2 at university). There are 16 secondary boarders and 13 resident.
- The trustees held 6 video conference meetings in the reporting period; including one with the directors at TPC in Uganda.
- Policies are regularly reviewed and updated.
- There are 21 children in the PEACE programme, on a school-only support basis. These children live in their local community.
- New Government regulations require that secondary children have to board at schools. This means that our costs have increased as we have 17 boarders.
- We have had to take in abandoned children, as required by the probation officer.
- A new custodian (male warden) has been appointed.

- 2 students have graduated in tailoring from vocational college. They received sewing machines as a graduation award. They make clothes for the children. A student finished nursing training and is buying a pharmacy.
- There are now 3 students doing A-level who will possibly progress to college.
- 2 have entered university; one doing Agriculture and one Civil Engineering.
- There have been 5 visitors; 4 sponsors and 1 volunteer.
- There are 5 new children as residents.
- The main costs are now split between 35% school fees & associated costs, 21% wages, 20% meals.
- A visit took place from 14 students at Dulwich School Shanghai to The Peace Centre. This was the first visit in 5 years due to covid.
- The students from Shanghai painted many of the outside walls around the living areas, built a trampoline and took part in community visits.
- They undertook many activities with the children from The Peace Centre such as making robotic vehicles, decorating pencil cases, helping to write letters to sponsors and organising games and sporting activities.
- Two trustees held several business meetings with the directors of The Peace Centre. One included the Probation Officer. As a result of this meeting we were told we could open TPC in the holidays to all children, including secondary boarders, if we provided a holiday school.
- Safeguarding rail around canteen and kitchen area has been built.
- Golden Magezi, the Executive Director, has retired from teaching and devotes all his time to TPC.
- Poultry/egg business has been re-instated after Covid, to help boost funds locally and provide fresh food for the residents.
- Six bicycles have been funded by a generous sponsor.
- Despite a difficult financial environment, our income streams have been maintained.



- The trustees held 6 video conference meetings in the reporting period; including one with the directors at TPC.
- Policies are regularly reviewed and updated.
- There are 28 children in the PEACE programme, on a school-only support basis. These children live in their local community.
- A one-day youth empowerment workshop was held with career guidance and motivational talks by speakers from the community. This involved all resident children, school-only sponsored children and many schoolchildren from the community. 200 children in total attended. Previously held in 2021, this was repeated in 2022, as it had been so well received. It is good for community relations.
- New Government regulations require that secondary children have to board at schools. This means that our costs have increased as we have 17 boarders.

- We have had to take in abandoned children, as required by the probation officer.
- A new custodian (male warden) has been appointed.
- 3 students have graduated in tailoring from vocational college. They received sewing machines as a graduation award. They make clothes for the children.
- There are now 3 students at vocational college and 3 doing A-level.
- 2 students have entered university; one doing Agriculture and one Civil Engineering.
- There have been 5 visitors; 4 sponsors and 1 volunteer.
- There are 4 new children as residents. All of whom are sponsored.
- The main costs are now split between 38% school fees & associated costs, 24% wages, 19% meals.



Background

- Trustee meetings are held by videoconference every 4 to 6 weeks. The agenda usually covers monthly report relating to the progress of the children, operational issues in Uganda and fundraising. The treasurer provides a financial report.
- TPC Uganda is a CIO, an NGO and an Approved Home in Uganda. The constitution was last amended on 1st December 2014. The appointment of new Trustees is carried out by the existing Trustees.
- Charity's Mission Statement: Love, care and a home for Ugandan orphans.
- Objects of The Peace Centre:
 1. To promote the benefit of orphaned and vulnerable children and young people living at The Peace Centre in Bukinda, South West Uganda by:
 - a. The advancement of education and training;
 - b. The relief of poverty, sickness;
 - c. The promotion of good health.
 2. To advance in life and help young people through providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals.

Operational Developments during 2021-2022

- TPC continues to fully support 38 children (including 3 at nursing college and 3 at vocational college).
- There are 31 children in the PEACE programme, on a school-only support basis. These children live in their local community
- We have employed a full time co-ordinator of the PEACE programme.
- We have continued to employ all staff during this period, with their efforts being channelled into the community when the children have been absent.
- The operation of TPC continued to be disrupted during the early part of this period by the Covid-19 epidemic. TPC and schools were closed until February 2022.
- During this period when children had been moved out to carers within the community, TPC staff continuously visited them to monitor their well-being, behaviour and academic workbooks.
- Care packages including food and soap/disinfectant were delivered to children's homes during these visits.

- During lockdown children continued to develop their handicraft skills such as knitting sweaters and scarfs and making wicker baskets. The children also continued to engage in agriculture and rearing domestic animals within their community.
- Only one child failed to return to The Peace Centre after the lockdown period. He had found permanent employment.
- We continued to provide food for vulnerable people in the Bukinda communities during the lockdown. TPC staff and older children handled the food distribution logistics. Approximately 50,000 meals were provided by this initiative.
- A one-day youth empowerment workshop was held with career guidance and motivational talks by speakers from the community. These involved all resident children, school-only sponsored children and many schoolchildren from the community. 200 children in total attended. This initiative was arranged because TPC staff felt that students had spent a long time without any formal guidance.
- Inflation has had a significant effect on cash flow and trustees have been working with TPC staff to manage increases in food and living costs, fuel costs and school fees. This is exemplified by the fact that it was economically unviable to continue with the children's egg production business due to the high chicken feed costs.

- Trustee meetings are held by Zoom every 4 to 6 weeks. The monthly report relating to the progress of the children and any issues relating to the operation of the orphanage in Uganda are discussed. The treasurer provides a financial statement with an update of accounts. Actions are classified as short/medium/long term, and are reported on.
- TPC Uganda is a CIO, and also an NGO in Uganda. The constitution was last amended on 1st December 2014. The appointment of new Trustees is carried out by the existing Trustees.
- Charity's Mission Statement: Love, care and a home for Ugandan orphans.
- Objects of The Peace Centre:
 1. To promote the benefit of orphaned and vulnerable children and young people living at The Peace Centre in Bukinda, South West Uganda by:
 - a. The advancement of education and training;
 - b. The relief of poverty, sickness and training;
 - c. The promotion of good health.
 2. To advance in life and help young people through providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals.
- There should be at least one visit to The Peace Centre in Uganda each year by a Trustee, but this will depend upon prevailing conditions.

Operational Developments during 2020-21

- The Peace Centre continues to fully support 36 children (of which 4 are in further education), and a further 30 on a school only basis during this period.
- We have continued to employ all staff during this period, with their efforts being channelled into the community when the children have been absent.
- The operation of The Peace Centre during this period has been hugely disrupted by the Covid-19 epidemic. At various points the orphanage and schools have been completely closed. Whilst the capacity of the buildings is 40 children, the occupancy has varied from 36 to zero.
- During the periods when children have been moved out to carers within the community, TPC staff have continuously visited them to monitor their well-being, behaviour and academic workbooks.
- Care packages including food and soap/disinfectant were delivered to children's homes during these visits.

- During the ongoing lockdown, children have been developing their handicraft skills such as knitting sweaters and scarfs and making wicker baskets.
- Staff have encouraged the children to engage in agriculture and rearing domestic animals within their community during these lockdowns.
- All staff have been immunised against Covid-19, and it is hoped that schools will reopen in January 2022.
- Special fundraising events were held to raise additional funds to provide food for vulnerable people in the Bukinda communities. TPC staff and older children handled the food distribution logistics. The local community are very grateful as it is the only source of such help, and hunger is their greatest problem at present. Approximately 50,000 meals were provided by this initiative.
- TPC has been approved by the Uganda Ministry of Gender Labour and Social Development to operate as an official childrens home. It is the only such home in the area, and this national recognition gives TPC opportunities to operate in other sub-counties in the Rukiga district in future. It also increases the legal protection of all the children in the home in the eyes of Ugandan law.
- A one-day youth workshop was held with career guidance and motivational talks by guest speakers. These involved all resident children, school-only sponsored children and some schoolchildren from the community. This initiative was arranged because TPC staff felt that students had spent a long time without any formal guidance.
- In partnership with an organisation called Days for Girls, training has taken place for all the girls at TPC on how to make their own sanitary products. 150 girls, both from TPC and in the community attended. This initiative provides improved sanitary hygiene and reduces school absence for girls in TPC and in the wider Bukinda community.
- The existing water supply from a well on the site as been improved by the addition of a water purification plant. There is now a supply of drinking water on tap at all times.
- A baking oven has been installed to allow all children to gain experience in cooking and breadmaking.
- It has been necessary to resurface the drive within TPC. The surface of the drive had deteriorated to the extent that it was dangerous and causing flooding in the wet season.



- The registration number is: 1160583

- Every 4 to 6 weeks a Skype meeting is held when all Trustees are present and go through the agenda which has previously been circulated by the secretary. There are actions to be addressed, short/medium/long term which are reported on. The treasurer provides a financial statement with an update of accounts. The monthly report relating to the progress of the children and any issues relating to the operation of the orphanage in Uganda are discussed.
- The Peace Centre Uganda is a CIO. The constitution was last amended on 1st December 2014. As a CIO, the appointment of new Trustees is carried out by the existing Trustees.
- Mission Statement: Love, care and a home for Ugandan orphans.
- Objects of The Peace Centre:
 1. To promote the benefit of orphaned and vulnerable children and young people living at The Peace Centre in Bukinda, South West Uganda by:
 - a. The advancement of education and training;
 - b. The relief of poverty, sickness and training;
 - c. The promotion of good health.
 2. To advance in life and help young people through providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals.

- **Operational Developments for The Peace Centre Uganda 2015-2019:**

- The Peace Centre has 36 orphans for whom it provides a home in a secure and loving environment. We also support 2 secondary students who do not reside in The Peace Centre. They are provided with the basic needs of water, food, clothing and health care. Education is provided at either the local primary or secondary school. Their progress and academic development are monitored. Children are taught the value of a balanced lifestyle, including time for play and recreation. We seek to develop our children's life skills and wider interests, providing them with the tools to equip them for an independent future.
- Funds to provide this care are provided through a variety of ways: individual donations, money raised through specific fund-raising events; sponsorship for an individual child.
- There is a minimum of 6 months operating expenses held in The Peace Centre's account.
- The majority of the charity's funds are used to feed, clothe, educate and support the orphans.
- Children continue to make good educational progress, with all children progressing to their next academic year.
- Children's academic studies have been complemented by the provision of a more developed and comprehensive vocational training that included tailoring.
- Teacher support in the evenings has continued.
- Community service programme has become further imbedded into our practice as an organisation whereby TPC children spend one day per month helping out with the needs of the local environment and its citizens.
- The documentation and direction of our work at TPC has improved through the development and refining of our policies in order to make them better reflect what we actually do.
- Trustees continue to hold an annual meeting with the Board based in Uganda, enabling better communication and the celebration of successes and achievements.
- The annual visit in June with students from the International College Shanghai was abandoned due to Covid-19 restrictions.

- The large chicken coop continues to provide eggs for the children and is a source of income by selling the spare egg capacity.
- Phase 2 'school sponsorship model' is now in operation, whereby (primarily orphaned) children living in the region, who do not have the financial support to attend school, may do so under our sponsorship. This model helps build on our belief in family preservation, while still allowing us to care for the very neediest double orphans in the home itself. 33 children are currently under this scheme.
- Three TPC students are studying at nursing college, one at teacher training college, and one student has graduated and is teaching.
- NGO status has been achieved and that has resulted in TPC being awarded Approved Home Status by Ugandan Government.
- Total annual income still exceeds basic running costs.
- Children are being given pocket money, to help teach financial responsibility, which has had a positive impact on the children.
- Training for two students with an organisation called Days for Girls has been approved which will provide better sanitary hygiene options for girls in TPC in the wider Bukinda community. This will be undertaken once Covid restrictions are lifted.

- **Operational Developments during 2019-2020**

- In January 2020 Peace Magezi, Executive Director of The Peace Centre, died after a long and brave battle with breast cancer. Her loss is felt by all of us, but we find strength knowing that her legacy, the love and care that she stood for, lives on in all we do at The Peace Centre. Emotional support was provided to the children and staff at this time. Golden Magezi has taken over the role of Executive Director. Racheal Naamanya is now the official warden of TPC in line with Ugandan Government regulations.
- TPC was shut down at the end of March 2020 due to Covid-19 lockdown measures imposed in Uganda. All children had to leave and go to their caregiver within the community.
- Before the children left to live with the carers, health and sanitation training was carried out with the children and caregivers. They were also given soap and disinfectant.

- During lockdown the staff have undertaken an intense schedule of unannounced visits to ensure that the children are being looked after, to monitor their situation, health, wellbeing, as well as to provide them with any necessary supplies, including food.
- A motorbike has been purchased, and used to ensure that children not resident in the village are also visited.
- In addition TPC is also providing some supplies to support as many people in the local community as possible. They are supplying food and soap to those most in need, including elderly and HIV positive members of the community.
- Many of the older children are supporting their caregivers in different ways. Some have found part-time work, allowing them to help with buying food or ensuring upkeep of the home.
- New generator has been purchased which ensures that the children have light for evening studies and the water supply is maintained.
- Providing some financial support for the male warden in his studies to become a qualified teacher, in exchange for a commitment to work for two years after qualifying.
- An Educational Study Trip was undertaken by children and staff to a tea plantation at Kisoro.
