The Trustees present their Report along with the Financial Statements of the Charity for the Year Ended 5<sup>th</sup> April 2024. The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 9 - 10 and comply with the Trust Deed and applicable law.

**Structure, Governance and Management**

**Governing Document**

The Charity is controlled by a Deed of Trust, and constitutes an Unincorporated Charity.

Ivel Gospel Hall Trust is constituted by a Deed of Trust dated 29<sup>th</sup> November 1982, subsequent amending Deeds, and most recently by a Deed of Variation dated 15<sup>th</sup> August 2014. The Trust was registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales on 27<sup>th</sup> February 2015 under Charity Registration Number: 1160680.

**Recruitment and Appointment of New Trustees**

The Trustees who have served during the year and since the year end are set out on page 1. None of the Trustees, nor any person connected with them, received any remuneration or expenses from the Charity in the Year, nor in the preceding financial year.

The Trust operates three Gospel Halls and Trustees are chosen from among the regular congregation of the halls. New Trustees are nominated by the existing Trustees or by the congregation and must be appointed by unanimous resolution of the congregation. They are selected according to their skills and experience and are expected to use both in furthering the objects of the Charity. Checks are made to ensure the Trustees' eligibility to act and incoming Trustees are made aware of their responsibilities by the existing Trustees, who ensure that new Trustees read the Trust Deed and relevant Charity Commission guidance.

**Wider Network**

The Trustees maintain informal links with Trustees of similar Charities with a view to pooling experience considered useful in pursuing the objects of the Charity. This includes those of Yeovil Gospel Hall Trust which also operates Halls in the Yeovil area, and with which it shares members of its congregation.

**Risk Management**

The Trustees have identified and reviewed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and confirm that they have established systems or procedures to manage and mitigate those risks.

**Objectives and activities**

**Objectives and aims**

The charitable purposes of the Charity are the advancement of the Christian religion for the public benefit, including by the carrying on of the service of God in accordance with the Old and New Testaments of the Holy Bible as followed by those Christians forming part of the world-wide fellowship known as the Plymouth Brethren Christian Church (the "Brethren") and any other charitable purposes connected with Brethren. The core doctrine of the Brethren and proper practices in furtherance of certain aspects of doctrine are summarised in two schedules to the Trust Deed.

**Public benefit**

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty under section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance to charities on public benefit.

**Main Activities and achievements**

The Trust have provided and maintained 3 Gospel Halls where religious meetings are held by the local Brethren community. Details of the origins, teachings and way of life of the Brethren can be found on their website - [www.plymouthbrethrenchristianchurch.org](http://www.plymouthbrethrenchristianchurch.org) and in the schedules to the Trust Deed.

The Trust's main achievements this year have been to maintain the Gospel Halls, for the continuing use of the congregation and visitors, and encouraging works by the congregation which benefit the wider community. In addition a Property has been acquired at Triways, Martock, for the building of a further Gospel Hall in 2025/2026 subject to the necessary planning permission.

**Meetings**

Meetings normally held at the Gospel Halls include the Lord's Supper (Communion), Gospel preachings, Bible readings and Bible addresses. There is a structured weekly schedule of meetings and, depending on the particular meeting, between 30 and 60 people normally attend these occasions.

The meetings are attended by the regular congregation and most are open to other properly disposed visitors. The notice board outside the Halls welcomes visitors and displays times of Gospel preachings, along with a telephone number for those seeking further information or help. Gospel tracts, which are distributed by street preachers, also display this information.

**Spreading the Gospel message and the life of a Christian**

The Gospel Halls are a base from which the regular congregation and others who attend the meetings are encouraged to spread the Christian Gospel, in word and deed.

Members of the congregation participate in a programme of street preaching and Gospel tracts are provided free of charge by the Charity to such preachers and to be handed out to interested members of the public.

Jointly with Yeovil Gospel Hall Trust, members of the congregation have undertaken public benefit and outreach work in accord with the Public Benefit Report produced by that Trust which is attached. Such activity included making available 25 free parking spaces for Yeovil District Hospital staff for 5 days a week through the year at "The Avenue" Hall. There was also the clearing of footpaths, litter picking and cleaning road signs. Congregation members also supported a separate Charity, the Rapid Relief Team, in its charitable activities in the local area, including donations made of 1,440 water bottles for the homeless, of Early Bird Learning kits and Smart Break bars to Kingsbury Episcopi Primary School. A substantial number of meals were provided on occasions of Police and Emergency Services activity.

In carrying out this work, the congregation considers itself to be living out its faith in practice, as particularly exemplified in the following extract from the schedule to the Trust Deed on living a Christian Life:-

1. We seek and are encouraged to live exemplary lives in all our relationships with others in the wider community (including former Brethren), in accordance with the teachings of Holy Scripture (1 Tim 2:2)
2. We regularly go out from our homes to preach on the streets, to distribute Christian literature and engage with the wider community (including former Brethren) in order to present eternal salvation, available to all men by faith in Jesus Christ. (2 Tim 4:2).

**Spreading the Gospel message and the life of a Christian (Continued)**

3. We seek as members of the public to lead Christian lives as husbands and wives, parents, children, employers, employees and neighbours. (Col 3:22-25, Col 4:1).
4. The preservation and protection of the family unit is fundamental and children are prized as a blessing from God. (Psalm 127:3-5). The elderly are valued members of the community, for whom both their family and the wider community are expected to care.
5. Holy Scripture commands us to be good neighbours to others, and deal with all other people (including former Brethren) openly, honestly and fairly and consistent with these principles, we should give our time, talents and money to assist those in need in the wider community, in so far as reasonable given our abilities and our available resources. (Matt 7:12, Matt 22:39, Eph 4:28).

**Volunteers**

Ivel Gospel Hall Trust relies on volunteers to carry out the management, administration and, where appropriate, general maintenance work. The Trust has no paid staff or paid Trustees.

**Funding**

Funding is sought through gifts and donations from the congregation. Grants are also received from other charitable trusts with complementary objectives.

**Financial review**

**Financial position**

In the Year ended 5<sup>th</sup> April 2024 the Trust had a deficit amounting to £4,009 of Incoming Resources against Resources Expended (after Depreciation charged of £9,403). Total voluntary Income received this Year was £36,516 compared to £18,031 in the Year to 5<sup>th</sup> April 2023. Monies held on Bank Accounts at the year ended totalled £3.

All Funds held were Unrestricted Funds.

**Reserves policy**

The Trustees have considered the level of reserves they wish to retain, appropriate to the charity's needs. This is based on the charity's size and the level of financial commitments. The Trustees have a programme of raising further funds by way of donations and collections, and if necessary loans, in order to fund intended projects. The congregation is kept regularly informed of needs accordingly. It is also being assisted by Yeovil Gospel Hall Trust as further stated below.

Free Reserves at the year end were £Nil, but Yeovil Gospel Hall Trust is committed to providing finance for ongoing costs and intended projects.

**Events since the Year End and Plans for Future Periods**

The Trust plans to continue its present activities.

In April 2024 the Freehold Property comprising the Gospel Hall at 133, West Coker Road, Yeovil has been transferred to this Trust at a value of £350,000 funded by a capital donation of that sum from that Trust. It is intended to develop the Property acquired in the year at Triways, Martock as a further Gospel Hall, subject to planning permission, in 2025/2026. Build costs are likely to be £250,000 to £350,000. The disposal of surplus property at that location should then enable the repayment of loans thereon. Once that proposed Gospel Hall is operational, the existing Hall at "The Avenue" is expected to be sold, again subject to planning permission for development.

**Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales, the Charities Act 2011, Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations and the provisions of the Trust Deed require the Trustees to prepare Financial Statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. In preparing those Financial Statements, the Trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the Financial Statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and to enable them to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations and the provisions of the Trust Deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES**

I report to the Trustees on my examination of the accounts of Ivel Gospel Hall Trust for the year ended 5<sup>th</sup> April 2024, which are set out on pages 7 to 11 and on the Trustees' Report for the year comprising Pages 2 to 5.

**RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRUSTEES AND EXAMINER**

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 ('the Act').

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5<sup>TH</sup> APRIL 2024**

**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**1.1 Basis of Financial Statements**

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Second edition of the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their Accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The functional currency of the Charity is Sterling (£).

The Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

**1.2 Incoming Resources**

Donations are recognised in the Year in which there is entitlement and probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty. Income is only deferred when the Charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be expended in a future year. Gift-aid is added to the value of the donations to which it relates.

Donated services are recognised as income and expenditure in the financial statements when organisations or individuals offer their services and support pro bono. The value of these donated services to the Ivel Gospel Hall Trust is considered to be equal to market value which would be paid were the services formally procured. Investment Income is accounted for on a receivable basis.

**1.3 Resources Expended**

Expenditure is included for this year on an accruals basis. Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources. Charitable activities comprise those costs directly attributable to the fulfilment of the Charitable objects.

**1.4 Governance costs**

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the Charity and costs related to statutory requirements.

**1.5 Tangible Fixed Assets and Depreciation**

**Freehold Property**

The Freehold Properties at Larkhill Road, Yeovil, The Avenue, Yeovil, and at Triways, Martock are stated at cost plus any improvements. No depreciation is charged on these properties as the market value is considered to be not less than book value.

The Freehold Property at St. Michaels Avenue, Yeovil, is stated at cost including improvements to date. Depreciation has been charged at 4% per annum on the straight line basis on the value excluding the notional value of land, with effect from 6<sup>th</sup> April 2015.

**Plant, Equipment and Fittings**

Depreciation is charged at 25% per annum on the reducing balance basis.

**1.6 Taxation**

The Trust is a registered Charity and is not liable to United Kingdom taxation on charitable activities, provided Income falls within the Charitable exemptions and is spent on charitable purposes.

## Yeovil Gospel Hall Trust Public Benefit

The purpose of this factual presentation, is to show how the Yeovil Gospel Hall Trust community engage in many acts of public benefit and interact with the wider community in so many ways.

The Plymouth Brethren were established in 1828 when John Nelson Darby broke with the established Church in Dublin. Darby and others formed a fellowship based on the strict observance of Christian teachings as set out in the Holy Scriptures. Darby came to Plymouth in the early 1830s and the congregation grew rapidly. Early publications were produced in Plymouth and distributed to other congregations of followers throughout the globe.



# Introduction

There are over 18,000 Plymouth Brethren members in the UK, spread across 87 locations. These locations can be found on the Plymouth Brethren Christian Church (PBCC) UK Site.

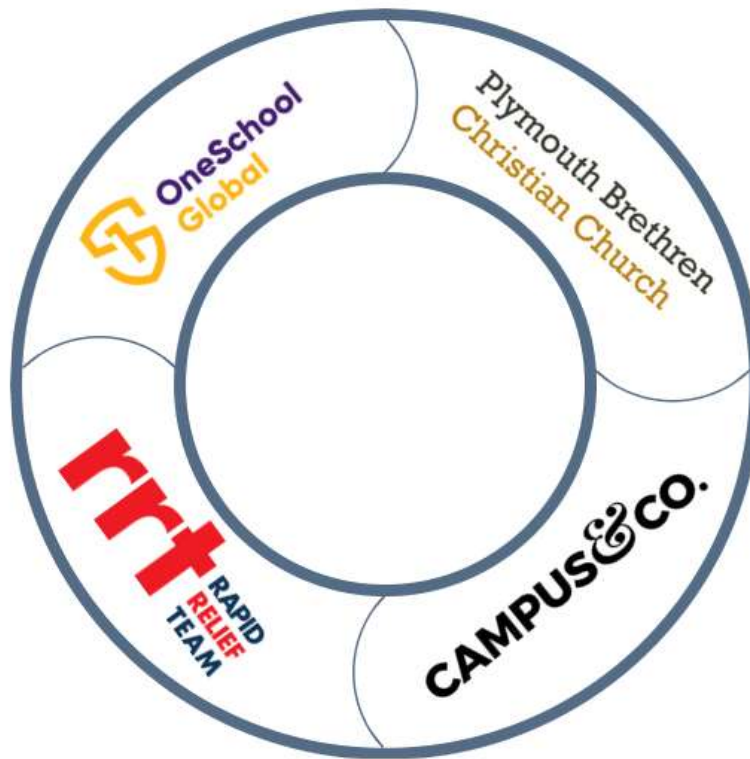


There have been Brethren Gospel, or meeting halls in Yeovil and the surrounding areas for over 150 years with Brethren meeting in Yeovil, East Coker, Langport and South Petherton as long ago as 1850. The Yeovil Gospel Hall Trust was formed in 2014 and is affiliated with The Ivel Gospel Hall Trust which was formed in 1982 to acquire buildings to be used for the advancement of the Christian religion by carrying on the service of God, including the celebration of the Lord's Supper, Gospel Preachings, Bible Readings and addresses on the Word of God and other meetings of a Christian religious character according to the injunctions contained in the Holy Scriptures and the tenets and practices of those Christians forming a worldwide fellowship known as Plymouth Brethren.

The congregation is a medium sized congregation compared to other Plymouth Brethren communities in the UK, with 245 members living in the Yeovil, Martock and South Petherton districts; however with residents from the Taunton and Bridgwater area attending services up to three times a week, together with other visitors, numbers attending services regularly exceed 400 persons, from young babies to nonagenarians.

Currently the main chosen location is in The Borough, Yeovil and street preachings have been held here since 1950.

**The aim of the street preaching is not to recruit additional members for the Plymouth Brethren but to present eternal salvation as available to all men by faith in Jesus Christ and His blood and His work of atonement.**

- Donation of the RRT early Bird Learning Program to Kingsbury Episcopi Primary School, including 18 Family Food Boxes, 4 Classroom resource packs and 4 boxes of Smarrt Nutrition Food Bars
- Donated water bottles to homeless persons in Yeovil supporting Home Group for the Homeless in Yeovil on 6 occasions during the year with a total of 1440 bottles of water
- Litter Picking in Highway, Stapleton and Martock
- Supporting Somerset Fire and Rescue on the scene of emergency with food and refreshments
- Supporting Dorset Police with food and refreshments over a 3 day period during a missing person search.
- Monthly food donations to the value of £2600.00 to Home charity for the homeless.

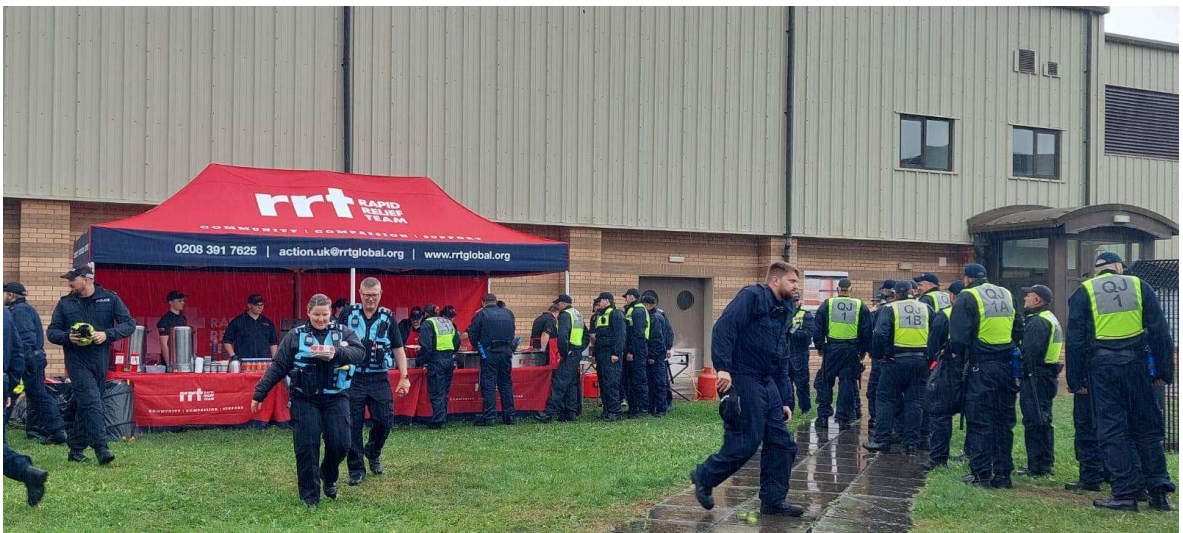

The trust has also purchased and donated 13 Early Bird Learning programme kits. Early Bird Learning is aimed to assist a flying start for primary school-aged children in difficult

circumstances and challenging household conditions. Supporting 4 key OFSTED principles. healthy eating, physical wellbeing, resilience and confidence.



The trust sees that the work carried out by it's members as Volunteers of the Rapid Relief Team (RRT) is of the utmost importance in the community and has been pleased again to allow its external facilities to be used as a meeting/gathering point for these volunteers prior to deployment or community support. Equipment and trailers are stored in the secure ground of the gospel hall where volunteers can freely access them as much of the work of RRT is done out of normal operating hours.





## Case Study – Dorset Police Missing Person Search

Members of the congregation volunteered for RRT when they had an emergency call out mid morning on a Wednesday. A person had been reported missing in Dorset and emergency services were conducting a missing persons search. RRT were called to help Dorset Police and the emergency services as a large number of emergency personnel were involved.

RRT were quickly mobilised and by 2.30pm were fully set up so they were able to provide the teams with hot food, teas, coffees, soft drinks and snacks. During the course of the afternoon and evening they served 61 hot burger meals along with the other refreshments.

The search lasted for three days in total and RRT were asked to remain at the site to support. Over the course of the three days our team of 16 volunteers were able to serve more than 130 meals.



## Case Study – The Link Yeovil

Members of the congregation have volunteered for a number of years to support The Link in Yeovil a charity providing Home for the Homeless. Over the long time RRT have been involved they provided hot meals, sleeping bags, food donations and water bottles.

Throughout the year, and particularly in the hotter months we have enabled the charity to ensure their beneficiaries remain hydrated. This year we have donated 1440 bottles of water.
