are being tutored via charity institutions. Overall, we provided loans to 50 parents for a revolving period of 6 months. These loans were Conditional Cash Transfers (CCT). Loans are provided on the condition that parents support their children to undertake a minimum of 4 hours of study a day and attend the Saturday tutorial classes in the local neighbourhood. Also, the parents MUST agree that the school-going child does not embark on street trading or any child labour.

- WASH (CWP): we also embarked on digging wells in local communities that struggle for safe drinking water. A good CWP involves a huge amount of human, physical, environmental, social, and economic resources. The land must be purchased or leased, and the cost of materials was a challenge. Labour reliability was a very difficult issue. In 2022 we dug one well and refurbished one community Barray.

#### VALUES AND WAYS OF WORKING

Our values are equally important in reviewing our progress and in setting future targets.

- We listen to the voices of traditional leaders, beneficiaries and their families.
- We support professionals working in the education, financial and health sectors, rather than criticise them; and
- We foster a culture of learning by doing. We collaborate with community professionals and other local charities, and we do engage directly with the public. We will be gathering detailed feedback from our stakeholders through the forthcoming perception survey.

We employ staff with the necessary knowledge, experience and skills to be able to represent the charity at the highest levels. We pay staff salaries at the level they would receive if they were undertaking a similar role in the private sector or the government. Actual costs of salaries are disclosed in our financial statement.

#### OPERATING MODEL AND RISKS

We fund our work with income from donors and grants.

Our main costs are staff salaries, with minor expenditure on office costs and costs for raising funds.

The founders wanted to ensure the charity could operate independently without the need for constant fundraising, or loans so we intend to create an endowment fund in 2025, which will be invested to generate income. This removes the need for reserves as the charity will manage its operations within its income.

The trustees acknowledge that there is a risk that investments lose value. Investment managers would be appointed to act within a sustainable policy that diversifies investments and aims to achieve a total return from capital growth and income that exceeds the rate of CPI inflation by at least 3 per cent.

When the trustees consider that the goals have been achieved, the charity's assets will be distributed to other charities with similar purposes.

#### GOVERNANCE AND DECISION-MAKING

Trustees meet four times a year and hold an all-day annual awayday with staff. They review all charity policies on a rolling three-year cycle and request an annual report from the Chief Executive on how policies are adhered to within the charity's values and risk inclinations.

We aim to apply the Charity Governance Code and have an agreed action plan, available on request, along with details of our trustees and how they are appointed, and our staff team.

## ANNUAL REPORTS AND ACCOUNTS

*The Trustees present their annual report on Alliance for International Development (A-fID) together with the financial statement of A-fID funds to apply them for the purpose of overseas development projects in Sierra Leone for the year ending 28 February 2020.*

### PURPOSE AND IMPACT

A-fID was set up in March 2015 by a group of concerned individuals from poor West African countries who wanted to help poor people use skills and knowledge to challenge poverty. Their experience growing up in poor communities convinced them that when peoples' capabilities are strengthened, they could significantly improve their livelihoods and move out of poverty.

Our vision is that:

- Everyone gets the opportunity to develop their skills.
- Everyone uses the knowledge they have to challenge poverty.
- Everyone receives the financial support they need to start income-generating activities.
- Everyone has access to factual information.
- Every child under 5 years old receives good healthy nutrition.
- Everyone has access to quality education.

We work to influence national poverty eradication policy and improve training for stakeholders in established and unorthodox settings. We aim to make a meaningful impact – our goal is that sufficient progress will have been made by 2035 such that the poverty level in Sierra Leone is below 10%. We will have reached this goal when we can see that the majority of people in rural areas are able to engage in income-generating activities and have the basic skills to engage with political, social and economic actors to improve their lives. We have a detailed roadmap (see our website: [afidsl.org](http://afidsl.org)) that sets out how we plan to reach our goal, and the indicators we monitor to tell us whether we are making progress.

We have made less progress than planned in recent years due to too much bureaucracy, COVID, and government policies which adversely affected our Micro-credit program in rural areas, hitting our operations financially and rent-seeking by government institutions and the attitude of beneficiaries, which has impeded our ability to influence policy.

We launched a ten-year Education for Social Transformation (E4ST) program on 01 August 2019. The objective is to support 50 students from Junior Secondary School thru university, providing learning aid, private tuition, coaching and mentoring to enable them to acquire quality education for a better community and national development.

While some of our recommendations, such as improvements in training and outreach do not require additional resources, we recognise that some changes do require additional staffing or other resources. At a time when our budget is already stretched and the impact of COVID-19 on fundraising, the competition for resources is a significant threat to the success of our programmes. Key to our work for the next five years is the scaling up of our Small Enterprise Finance Programme, which is assessing the impact of access to finance in reducing poverty in rural and urban areas and progress against our overall goal. From the outcome of this, we will set new target for our work for the next five years.

Immediately covid restrictions were lifted the charity redesigned its Micro-Credit model and introduced a WASH (Community Well Project) CWP.

- The Micro-credit: we remodelled the micro-credit to provide affordable loans to mothers whose children
