Report of the Trustees  
for the Year Ended 30 June 2025

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### **Objectives and activities for public benefit**

The object of the charity is to relieve hunger and promote education among the destitute children in Sri Lanka.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular its supplementary public benefit guidance on advancing education when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. There have been no material changes in the objectives or policies of the charity during the year.

### **Strategy to achieve the charity's objectives**

In keeping with the ethos of the Charity "to relieve hunger and promote education among the destitute children of Sri Lanka", the Founders and their friends sponsor a number of children on a one-to-one basis. In addition, other well-wishers and compassionate corporate entities sponsor The Midday Meals Programme and the Children's Education Programmes on a non-specific basis.

### **Review of activities**

**OUR MISSION: "To relieve hunger among the destitute children in Sri Lanka and offer education as the most effective way for them to escape their cycle of poverty"**

One Child Foundation was formed fifteen years ago after the war in Sri Lanka ended, by a small group of friends and family members keen to help the orphaned children there. Our initial aim was to provide funds from our own earnings and sponsor the education and upkeep of a handful of children. By the end of the second year, other charitable individuals joined OCF and started to sponsor more and more children. Today, what started as a private sponsorship programme has grown to benefit around 420 children in 23 Schools and over 40 young adults in 8 Universities. We foresee these numbers to grow each year.

The Midday Meals Programme we ran successfully feeding over 11,500 children in more than 100 schools was taken over by the Government of Sri Lanka in 2018. Instead, we are currently offering midday meals in a large school and nutritional meals in a nursery school, both were identified as particularly in need. In addition, we decided to offer self-help schemes for some of the orphanages and families. We funded three vegetable farms and supplied 8 cows to them which have multiplied to 18 in number and are now helping to feed 90 children without any further help from us. During 2019 to 2025, we provided over 1,200 chicken coops with 12,000 chicks to over 1,200 families free of charge. The chicks are doing well and are helping to feed these families.

OCF acquired a new Auto Rickshaw and gifted it to a poor woman with two severely differently-abled children, so she could take them to school at the same time make a living by transporting other children to their schools. OCF also funded the construction of a Tuition Centre for poor families and donated more than 1,500 school bags, shoes and various stationery to poor children in various schools.

In the last five years, OCF supplied Dry Rations to more than 9,000 families and Cooked Food to more than 8,000 families during festival times and during natural disasters such as floods & Covid-19.

Even though we currently work mainly with Catholic Schools and Orphanages, we have no religious or communal preferences in identifying the children we help. In our eyes, they are all our children. The Founders are committed to the task of relieving poverty and offering education to as many children as possible. With the help and support of our sponsors and compassionate corporate supporters, we are continuing to achieve our aim each year and are determined to increase the number of beneficiaries every year.

The Charity is administered entirely on a voluntary basis. No remuneration or administrative expenses is paid or reimbursed to the Trustees, including to those who fly to Sri Lanka to visit the schools and the children each year.

## **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

### **Our achievements in 2024/25**

Under our Midday Meals Programme, we helped to feed over 11,500 children in over 100 schools up to 2018. This programme was taken over by the Government. Currently, we provide midday meals in one school and nutritional meals in one nursery. Under our Education Programme, we currently sponsor over 420 children at 23 schools and 40 young adults in 8 universities. OCF also funded farms for three orphanages, supplied several cows, more than 1,200 chicken coops and 12,000 chicks. OCF also supplied more than 9,000 Dry Rations and 8,000 Cooked Meals to feed 17,000 families during COVID Lockdowns, floods and afterwards. OCF also donated Rs1m to those affected by the terrorists' bombs in 2019 and supplied a new Auto Rickshaw to a poor mother to enable her to take her differently-abled children to school.

In the last 4 years, OCF constructed 6 toilets for poor families and funded water and electricity supply to another 7 families, all in remote areas. We constructed a Hostel for 50 poor children in a remote area and furnished it as well. OCF is also in the process of constructing another smaller Hostel for 25 girls in another small town.

OCF Trustees are confident that the number of beneficiaries will continue to rise in the coming years.

## **STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

### **Structure, governance and management constitution**

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 27 June 2014, and is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

### **Organisational structure**

The power to appoint new trustees is vested in the current board.

The chair of trustees is responsible for the induction of any new trustee, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, administrative procedures, the history and philosophical approach to the charity.

The trustees meet at various times in the year to consider which charities should receive their support.

The Chairman of the Trustees visits the schools and meets all the children each year and based on his recommendation, the Trustees meet to consider which children in which schools should receive OCF's support each year. The students' performances are reviewed quarterly by the Trustees.

OCF also funded farms for two orphanages, supplied several cows, more than 1,200 chicken coops and 12,000 chicks. OCF also supplied more than 9,000 Dry Rations and 8,000 Cooked Meals to feed 17,000 families during COVID Lockdowns, floods and afterwards. OCF also donated Rs1m to those affected by the terrorists' bombs in 2019 and supplied a new Auto Rickshaw to a poor mother to enable her to take her differently-abled children to school.

In the last 3 years, OCF constructed 5 toilets for poor families and funded water and electricity supply to another 5 families, all in remote areas. We constructed a Hostel for 50 poor children in a remote area and furnished it as well. OCF is also in the process of fund-raising for the construction of another smaller Hostel for 25 girls in another small town.

OCF Trustees are confident that the number of beneficiaries will continue to rise in the coming years.

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### **Objectives and activities for public benefit**

The object of the charity is to relieve hunger and promote education among the destitute children in Sri Lanka.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular its supplementary public benefit guidance on advancing education when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. There have been no material changes in the objectives or policies of the charity during the year.

In keeping with the ethos of the Charity "to relieve hunger and promote education among the destitute children of Sri Lanka", the Founders and their friends sponsor a number of children on a one-to-one basis. In addition, other well-wishers and compassionate corporate entities sponsor The Midday Meals Programme and the Children's Education Programmes on a non-specific basis.

### **Review of activities**

### **OUR MISSION: "To relieve hunger among the destitute children in Sri Lanka and offer education as the most effective way for them to escape their cycle of poverty"**

One Child Foundation was formed thirteen years ago after the war in Sri Lanka ended, by a small group of friends and family members keen to help the orphaned children there. Our initial aim was to provide funds from our own earnings and sponsor the education and upkeep of a handful of children. By the end of the second year, other charitable individuals joined OCF and started to sponsor more and more children. Today, what started as a private sponsorship programme has grown to benefit around 420 children in 23 Schools and over 30 young adults in 7 Universities. We foresee these numbers to grow each year.

The Midday Meals Programme we ran successfully feeding over 11,500 children in more than 100 schools was taken over by the Government of Sri Lanka in 2018. Instead, we are currently focusing on Nursery Schools and have started to offer Nutritional meals to children in nursery schools. In addition, we decided to offer self-help schemes for some of the orphanages and families. We funded a vegetable farm and supplied 8 cows to two orphanages which have multiplied to 18 in number and are helping to feed 90 children without any further help from us. During 2019 to 2022, we provided over 1,000 chicken coops with 10,000 chicks to over 1,000 families free of charge. The chicks are doing well and are helping to feed these families.

OCF acquired a new Auto Rickshaw and gifted it to a poor woman with two severely differently-abled children, so she could take them to school at the same time make a living by transporting other children to their schools. OCF also funded the construction of a Tuition Centre for poor families and donated more than 1,000 school bags, shoes and various stationery to poor children in various schools.

In the last three years, OCF supplied Dry Rations to more than 7,000 families and Cooked Food to more than 6,000 families during festival times.

Even though we currently work mainly with Catholic Schools and Orphanages, we have no religious or communal preferences in identifying the children we help. In our eyes, they are all our children. The Founders are committed to the task of relieving poverty and offering education to as many children as possible. With the help and support of our sponsors and compassionate corporate supporters, we are continuing to achieve our aim each year and are determined to increase the number of beneficiaries every year.

The Charity is administered entirely on a voluntary basis. No remuneration or administrative expenses is paid or reimbursed to the Trustees, including to those who fly to Sri Lanka to visit the schools and the children each year.

Report of the Trustees  
for the Year Ended 30 June 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### **Objectives and activities for public benefit**

The object of the charity is to relieve hunger and promote education among the destitute children in Sri Lanka.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular its supplementary public benefit guidance on advancing education when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. There have been no material changes in the objectives or policies of the charity during the year.

### **Strategy to achieve the charity's objectives**

In keeping with the ethos of the Charity "to relieve hunger and promote education among the destitute children of Sri Lanka", the Founders and their friends sponsor a number of children on a one-to-one basis. In addition, other well-wishers and compassionate corporate entities sponsor The Midday Meals Programme and the Children's Education Programmes on a non-specific basis.

### **Review of activities**

**OUR MISSION: "To relieve hunger among the destitute children in Sri Lanka and offer education as the most effective way for them to escape their cycle of poverty"**

One Child Foundation was formed twelve years ago after the war in Sri Lanka ended, by a small group of friends and family members keen to help the orphaned children there. Our initial aim was to provide funds from our own earnings and sponsor the education and upkeep of a handful of children. By the end of the second year, other charitable individuals joined OCF and started to sponsor more and more children. Today, what started as a private sponsorship programme has grown to benefit around 450 children in 19 Schools and 18 young adults in 6 Universities. We foresee these numbers to grow each year.

The Midday Meals Programme we ran successfully feeding over 11,500 children in more than 100 schools was taken over by the Government of Sri Lanka in 2018. Instead, we are currently focusing on Nursery Schools and have started to offer Nutritional meals to children in nursery schools. In addition, we decided to offer self-help schemes for some of the orphanages and families. We funded a vegetable farm and supplied 8 cows to two orphanages which have multiplied to 18 in number and are helping to feed 80 children without any further help from us. During 2019 to 2022, we provided over 500 chicken coops with 5,000 chicks to over 400 families free of charge. The chicks are doing well and are helping to feed these families.

OCF acquired a new Auto Rickshaw and gifted it to a poor woman with two severely differently-abled children, so she could take them to school at the same time make a living by transporting other children to their schools. OCF also funded the construction of a Tuition Centre for poor families and donated more than 1,000 school bags and various stationery to the poor children in various schools.

In the last two years, OCF supplied Dry Rations to more than 6,000 families and Cooked Food to more than 3,000 families during festival times.

Even though we currently work mainly with Catholic Schools and Orphanages, we have no religious or communal preferences in identifying the children we help. In our eyes, they are all our children. The Founders are committed to the task of relieving poverty and offering education to as many children as possible. With the help and support of our sponsors and compassionate corporate supporters, we are continuing to achieve our aim each year and are determined to increase the number of beneficiaries every year.

The Charity is administered entirely on a voluntary basis. No remuneration or administrative expenses is paid or reimbursed to the Trustees, including to those who fly to Sri Lanka to visit the schools and the children each year.

## **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

### **Our achievements in 2022**

Under our Midday Meals Programme, we helped to feed over 11,500 children in over 100 schools up to 2018. This programme has been replaced by a Nutritional Meals programme for Nursery School children. Under our Education Programme, we currently sponsor over 450 children at 19 schools and 18 young adults in 6 universities. OCF also funded farms for two orphanages, supplied several cows, more than 500 chicken coops and 5,000 chicks. OCF also supplied more than 6,000 Dry Rations and Cooked Food to 3,000 families during COVID Lockdowns and afterwards. OCF also donated Rs1m to those affected by the terrorists' bombs in 2019 and supplied a new Auto Rickshaw to a poor mother to enable her to take her differently-abled children to school and also earn a living by transporting other children. OCF Trustees are confident that the number of beneficiaries will continue to rise in the coming years.

## **STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

### **Structure, governance and management constitution**

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 27 June 2014, and is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

### **Organisational structure**

The power to appoint new trustees is vested in the current board.

The chair of trustees is responsible for the induction of any new trustee, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, administrative procedures, the history and philosophical approach to the charity.

The trustees meet at various times in the year to consider which charities should receive their support.

The Chairman of the Trustees visits the schools and meets all the children each year and based on his recommendation, the Trustees meet to consider which children in which schools should receive OCF's support each year. The students' performances are reviewed quarterly by the Trustees.



Our initial aim was to provide funds from our own earnings and sponsor the education and upkeep of a handful of children. By the end of the second year, other charitable individuals joined OCF and started to sponsor more and more children. Today, what started as a private sponsorship programme has grown to benefit more than 400 children in 18 Schools and 12 young adults in 5 Universities. We foresee these numbers to grow each year.

The midday Meals Programme we ran successfully feeding over 11,500 children in more than 100 schools was taken over by the Government of Sri Lanka in 2018. Instead, we are currently focusing on Nursery Schools and have started to offer Nutritional meals to children in nursery schools. In addition, we decided to offer self-help schemes for some of the orphanages and families. We funded a vegetable farm and supplied 8 cows to two orphanages which have multiplied to 18 in number and are helping to feed 80 children without any further help from us. In 2019 & 2020, we provided over 300 chicken coops with 3,000 chicks to 298 families free of charge. The chicks are doing well and are helping to feed these families. Unfortunately, we could not extend this activity in 2021 due to the spread of COVID-19.

During 2019, terrorists bombed three churches in Sri Lanka and killed and maimed a few hundred people. OCF promptly sent over Rs 1 million to help those who lost their lives or suffered injuries and visited many of them in their homes in 2020. OCF also acquired in 2020 a brand new Auto Rickshaw and donated it to a poor woman with two severely differently-abled children, so she could take them to school at the same time make a living by transporting other children to their schools. OCF also funded the construction of a Tuition Centre for poor families. In addition, OCF donated more than 800 school bags and much needed stationery to the poor children in various schools.

Sadly, COVID-19 curtailed many of our activities during 2020 and 2021. Despite those restrictions, OCF supplied Dry Rations to more than 5,000 families and Cooked Food to more than 2,000 families during the lockdown. The Trustees are confident OCF's full activities would begin again in 2022.

Even though we currently work mainly with Catholic Schools and Orphanages, we have no religious or communal preferences in identifying the children we help. In our eyes, they are all our children. The Founders are committed to the task of relieving poverty and offering education to as many children as possible. With the help and support of our sponsors and compassionate corporate supporters, we are continuing to achieve our aim each year and are determined to increase the number of beneficiaries every year.

The Charity is administered entirely on a voluntary basis. No remuneration or administrative expenses is paid or reimbursed to the Trustees, including to those who fly to Sri Lanka to visit the schools and the children each year.

## **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

### **Our achievements in 2021**

Under our Midday Meals Programme, we helped to feed over 11,500 children in over 100 schools up to 2018. This programme has been replaced by a Nutritional Meals programme for Nursery School children. Under our Education Programme, we currently sponsor over 400 children at 18 schools and 12 young adults in 5 universities. OCF also funded farms for two orphanages, supplied several cows, more than 300 chicken coops and 3,000 chicks. OCF also supplied more than 5,000 Dry Rations and Cooked Food to 2,000 families during COVID Lockdowns. OCF also donated Rs1m to those affected by the terrorists' bombs in 2019 and also supplied a new Auto Rickshaw to a poor mother to enable her to take her differently-abled children to school and also earn a living from transporting other children. OCF Trustees are confident that the number of beneficiaries will continue to rise in the coming years.

## **STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

### **Structure, governance and management constitution**

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 27 June 2014, and is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

### **Organisational structure**

The power to appoint new trustees is vested in the current board.

The chair of trustees is responsible for the induction of any new trustee, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, administrative procedures, the history and philosophical approach to the charity.

The trustees meet at various times in the year to consider which charities should receive their support.

The Chairman of the Trustees visits the schools and meets all the children each year and based on his recommendation, the Trustees meet to consider which children in which schools should receive OCF's support each year. The students' performances are reviewed quarterly by the Trustees.

### **Income**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
