ANNUAL REPORT 2025

We begin our Annual Report this year with the sad news of the death of Edith Price MBE (July 23 2025), one of our Founding Trustees. Edith, or Dee as she was more familiarly known, was not only a founding trustee of the Burns Price Foundation but also its heart and guiding spirit. Throughout her life Dee had a vision, compassion, and unwavering belief in the power of children and young people to make a difference and that has shaped everything we do here at BPF. She poured her energy and love into this Foundation, helping to build a legacy of opportunity, inclusion, and hope. For us all, this loss is deeply personal - not only have we lost a remarkable trustee and leader, but we have lost our Mum/friend/wife. Her presence around the table, her wisdom, and her warmth will be profoundly missed. As we carry forward the work she began, I know she would want us to continue with the same commitment to empowering young people and fostering positive change.

As a Board, we continue to be grateful to our primary benefactor The Medlock Charitable Trust and in particular to David Medlock. David has remained faithful to his commitment to Fund the BPF to a total of £250k and at the end of January 2025, we were grateful to receive a further £50K towards this total. This leaves a further £20K to complete the original £250K commitment and we hope to draw down the final sums during the coming year or so.

The 10th anniversary of the formation of The Burns Price Foundation occurred during 2025. The generous funding awarded by The Medlock Charitable Trust at the beginning of the year enabled BPF Trustees to progress their plans to mark the anniversary by making a series of grants up to the value of £10,000 for suitable, and what we consider, legacy projects. A poster was created to advertise these legacy grants which was shared in the UK Youth newsletter towards the end of 2025. Separately, groups BPF had previously supported were contacted inviting them to apply.

In October 2025, the first legacy grant was awarded to Rise:61, a youth and community charity serving a deprived area of Salisbury. This is a group BPF first supported in 2018.

Other grants awarded during 2025 were £10K to Regenerate for a London to Venice Bike Ride where sixteen young people raised £50K to be re-invested in the Feelgood Coffee Shop and £2,000 to Birkheads Wild in Newcastle. (The table of 2025 grants is below).

Although the year appears to be quiet there have been some very good contacts and we are encouraged by the ongoing interest in the Foundation. The BPF Accounts along with Independent Examiners Report are included with this Report.

We continue to be grateful for the support and hard work of our friend and administrator Jayne Sims whose commitment to the Foundation is deeply valued and appreciated.

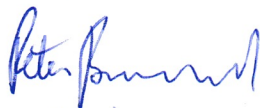

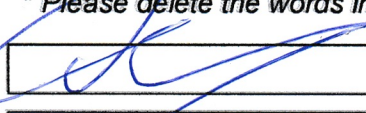

ANNUAL REPORT 2024

Another quieter year than perhaps we may have hoped for in terms of grants awarded but we have ensured that the projects are in-keeping with our overall youth led mission and we continue to turn away some applications on the basis of a lack of longevity, sustainability, overall impact or, if we have felt that young people are not central enough to the initiative. However, we are pleased to have been able to maintain our very strong link to Regenerate, who have asked for further funding for a 'Three Peaks Challenge'. Regenerate's commitment to these challenges to raise funding for projects involving young people on the Alton Estate in South West London, is inspirational and legacy-forming. It has also been pleasing to have been able to support a couple of Northern Ireland-based social-action projects (causes close to Mum and Dad's hearts).

We continue to be grateful to our primary benefactor, the Medlock Foundation and in particular to David Medlock. We are especially grateful for confirmation of his original commitment to fund the BPF to a total of £250K. Equally, we fully respect his decision that once we have reached the amount originally offered by the Medlock Foundation, there will be no renewal of grants.

Given the challenges of finding funding to support projects at the scale we have been used to, the Trustees, at the 2024 AGM, and in discussion over the course of the year, decided to respond to changed circumstances and expectations by beginning the process of 'winding down' the work of the BPF by offering grants of up to £10K with the near £100K of remaining funding. This could be linked to a celebration of the 10th Anniversary of the Foundation in 2025. The hope is that these grants can fund some potentially larger-scale, legacy projects, the results of which will be permanently associated with the funding the BPF were able to provide. I think all trustees are of the mind that a plaque, or similar marker might be displayed – where possible – to mark the foundation's involvement with the project.

The proposal is to circulate a 'Grants Available' online poster via UK Youth, who have contacts with over 8,000 youth groups and their leaders through their monthly newsletter. The 'poster' is being designed by Heidi Eggleton, in discussion with all Trustees.

It is not without some sadness that this valedictory decision has been reached, but the strong feeling was that, rather than seeing a gradual whittling away of remaining funding, in small

amounts over potentially a few years, seeking to support projects of a larger impact would give the feeling of some legacy to the foundation's work and support.

ANNUAL REPORT 2023

A quieter year than perhaps we may have hoped for in terms of grants awarded but we have tried to ensure that our projects are in-keeping with our overall youth led mission and we have had to turn away some applications on the basis of a lack of longevity to the project or if we feel that young people are not central enough to the initiative. However, we are pleased to have struck up strong links with groups at Stromness Academy, Orkney and Youth Group, Regenerate, who have returned for further funding opportunities. Regenerate's 'Ride to Rome' which we awarded £5000, in turn raised over £50,000 to support projects involving young people on the Alton Estate in South West London.

We continue to be grateful to our primary benefactor, the Medlock Foundation and in particular to David Medlock. We wish to formally record our great sadness and regret after the recent death of David's wife, Jacky. We send David and all his family our thoughts, prayers and deepest sympathies at this terribly sad time.

We are ever so grateful for the funding the Charity has received but respect the decision that once we have reached the amount originally offered by the Medlock Foundation that there will not be a renewal of grants. Applications dependent, it is likely that the BPF Trustees will need to make a decision over the coming 12-18 months as to whether to pursue funding from elsewhere or consider winding down the Foundation. There have been some initial discussions amongst Trustees on this matter, but no formal decision has been reached. Trustees have taken the decision to move the Foundation's bank account to an ethical bank; this move is to be actioned as soon as all necessary paperwork is available.

The Trustees are aware of the importance of marketing the Foundation through social media but in truth have little time to pursue this area. Initial discussions with UK Youth have provided an opportunity to spread the word of the BPF to over 8,000 youth groups and their leaders through their monthly newsletter. The opportunity to piggyback on to an existing database is certainly appealing and early discussions with UK Youth have suggested much alignment with the ethos of the BPF. Trustees hope that the increased exposure of the BPF will result in an uptick in applications over the next year.

ANNUAL REPORT 2022

This has been a good year for the Burns Price Foundation. The number of applications received and grants awarded increased in 2022 for the first time since the pandemic lockdown. Six grants were awarded (*see table below*), three of which totalled almost £15,000.

We continue to be grateful to our primary benefactor the Medlock Foundation and in particular to David Medlock. Our reserves in 2022 were such that we did not apply for further funding in the financial year ending 31st March 2022. However, with the range of grants and already indicated applications, the trust will need to secure further funding and will shortly be seeking a further grant draw down.

Ellie Turner and Kate Smith took up advisory roles and facilitated discussions on:

- The pros and cons of expanding the eligible age range. This concluded with a decision to aim to generate more applications from the existing age range, by seeking connections with organisations able to broker links with groups already working with young people.
- Simplifying the application process to make it more young-person friendly. There is now the option to submit an online video application direct from the website.
- The need to identify five clear eligibility criteria to hopefully clarify communication messages and consequently result in an increased number of applications.

Trustee representatives attended the *Rotary Expo Live* event held in the National Exhibition Centre, Birmingham in May 2022. Links were made at the event which aims to connect volunteers, organisations and the charity sector.

Among the projects funded by the Burns Price Foundation in 2022 was the Fun Run Against Knife Crime in Croydon sponsored by the Shirley Park Academy (Oasis) in memory of two pupils who had been killed. In addition, we contributed to the Zain Centre, named after one of the boys killed which provides social support in Croydon.

ANNUAL REPORT 2021

Once again this past year has been a challenging one for Burns Price Foundation. The ongoing impact of Covid 19 and the cancelling of formerly funded projects have meant that our expected grant making has been less than we had hoped.

We continue to be profoundly grateful to our primary benefactor the Medlock Foundation and have valued ongoing conversations and advice from David Medlock Esq DL.

The last year has seen Maureen Bollard step-down as an adviser to the BPF board. Maureen was one of the founding members and we shall miss her wisdom and counsel. Her passion for recognising the strength of young people to empower change has meant she has been one of key drivers in establishing the work of the foundation. She will be sorely missed.

The Foundation currently maintains a healthy balance but as indicated not one with which we are satisfied. The Trustees agreed to invite Eleanor Turner and Kate Finn to act as consultants to the Board both having experience in media and funding. Eleanor and Kate are members of the extended family being the daughters of Lorna Smith (née Burns) and Edward Smith. Their addition to the work of the board holds out the possibility of future trusteeship.

In appointing Eleanor and Kate the Trustees have been particularly anxious to get their perspective on the process of application for grants currently practised by the Trust. Though it is early days as their first meeting with the Board was in January 2022 an immediate recommendation has been that we use a more accessible social media approach with applications being made on video as distinct from forms. A further recommendation is that the Board consider whether its insistence on self-motivated individuals and groups being the primary applicants is actually targeting those who would most benefit from the charity's aims and objectives.

During the past year the Board has become aware of particular challenges in the areas knife crime and violence against women and girls. Currently trustee Peter Price

is in discussion with Shirley Academy in Croydon from which school a pupil was killed earlier in the year through a knife attack. The school has been invited to develop a project addressing various issues to do with young people and is requesting the charity's help in funding in whole or in part a major event in Croydon. At the time of the report this is still in development and as later contributions in this report indicate our emphasis is increasingly moving towards cooperating with other charitable institutions, individuals and groups in seeking to make best use of the Foundations resources.

Peter also continues to make presentations to various schools and institutions promoting the possibilities of the charity's grants to young people for changing lives

As indicated the Foundation continues to value partnerships with organisations that appropriately serve its objects. Our partnership potential with African Youth Arise, Daniel Spargo Mabbs, and the Chris Donovan Trust remain open. These and other similar bodies are encouraging young people in envisioning projects in the arena of drug awareness, street-wise awareness, and the dangers of knife crime.

Additionally, JD, Heidi and Dave have been speaking with Shwetal Shah about funding for her Changemakers project, largely focused around providing grants for small-scale STEAM-based projects. Discussions are ongoing and we will link her project to our website. At the time of writing, we are able to consider the first of these grants and we have iterated our support for her project; indeed encouraging her to take things beyond the series of £100 grants she had initially proposed. We have said that we will consider any of the projects brought to us via Changemakers. Shwetal is pressing ahead with publicising her project and has a very promising meeting lined up on the 4th April with NCS (National Citizen's Service) Changemakers, an organisation very much aligned with our aims: (<https://wearencs.com/changemakers>). Dave has suggested a 'catch-up' with Shwetal after her initial meeting, so that we can see how we might be able to help. The lead at NCS has reported lots of initial interest and we are hopeful that some good projects and grant-making opportunities will arise.

ANNUAL REPORT 2020

The year 2020 saw us through the 6th, and perhaps, the hardest year for the BPF. It saw us appoint co-chairs, David and John-Daniel Price, who took over after Peter decided to 'hand over the reins'. We all thank him most sincerely for his leadership in the early years of the Foundation, and for what will no doubt be superb guidance and counsel as a trustee as we move forward.

We continue to be grateful to David Medlock and our chief benefactor The Medlock Foundation, and appreciate the friendship and support that has facilitated the initiating and continuity of Burns Price.

We were very successful in our quest for a new patron, to follow on from Ms Alex Lovell. We were delighted when Dr Mya-Rose 'Birdgirl' Craig – previously our ambassador and recipient of grants for her 'Black to Nature' project – agreed to take on the role. Furthermore, she has been happy to put a link to the BPF website on her socials and in other electronic media. We look forward to working with her in the coming years.

The year was nevertheless full of challenges:

The last AGM took place online during the first Covid-19 lockdown and this has really dominated proceedings for the year. Whilst the BPF has continued to make progress in publicising its work, the health crisis inevitably led to the cancellation or postponement of several projects we had allotted funds for, and made it very difficult for new projects to get off the ground. We did set up and publicise a series of small grants for more immediate, Covid-related projects. The full list of cancelled/postponed and supported projects for the financial year is as follows:

Publicising the Burns Price Foundation remains a priority for the Trustees and one of first things the crisis highlighted was the need to get our online 'presence' on a surer and more visible footing. The website had a major visual and structural 're-vamp' – a process headed by Heidi and Mo, with help from Pat Price, a Price family member and director of a graphic design

company. A family friend, Tim Eveleigh, kindly agreed to look at other aspects of our presence on social media; principally Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. As reported in last year's annual report, whilst being very grateful for the web-support we had enjoyed, we wanted to bring things onto a more 'local' footing in terms of being quickly able to update our website and 'socials'. This work is still ongoing, and I am happy to admit that progress has not been what we would have hoped for. Due to issues regarding the ability to meet face-to-face and some personal issues, we are still at a regrettably embryonic stage with some of this work. Thanks to us now having a central Google account for all information, the process should be pretty straightforward from here. The appropriate accounts have been set up and now that face-to-face meetings are more possible, this will be a priority for David in very short-term.

In the 'getting the word out' vein, The Volunteering Expo we had booked a stand at in May was cancelled and a virtual version of it will be running this year. We have taken a virtual stand – the hope would be that the event will be able to run 'for real' next year – and Heidi, JD, Dave and Mya-Rose have contributed to a BPF Intro Video – splendidly stitched together by JD from some shonky home-video footage! – which will be attached to our 'stand'. The various web-based media WILL be updated in time for this event so that interested parties can apply for grants.

Again, with regard to bringing more of our work online, Peter B has been looking at doing our banking on the internet. Lockdown has prevented progress so far, but Peter and Dave will set up the online accounts once we are able to do business more normally again. This might well involve a change of bank, if it is easier to undertake online banking elsewhere. We had discussed this possibility and trustees are happy for this to happen if need be.

Up to now, reimbursements to trustees and to other officers of the BPF have been limited to travel and other minor expenses. With the intention to perhaps attend more events like the Volunteer Expo, trustees did feel the need for a more formal reimbursement policy, particularly as overnight stays and per diem rates might apply for some of these events. Dave has drafted a policy (many thanks to Peter P for providing a template in the form of the CR reimbursement form) which, when formally agreed, will form the basis of future BPF reimbursements.

We have decided to continue the tradition of appointing an Ambassador for the Foundation and to replace Mya-Rose as an ambassador for the BPF, Mehetabel Chidumo – a recipient for funds for her 'Homeless Packs' project, has kindly agreed to fill the role.

2020 marked a slightly new direction for the BPF. Having undertaken a detailed assessment of applications, grants and reports for these projects over our first 4 years, and having been sufficiently concerned about the benefit balance related to costs, contributions to local projects and safeguarding, we had already agreed a moratorium on these types of grant, pending a decision about the future direction of the BPF. At the 2020 AGM, we decided to stop awarding grants for the type of 'volunteering abroad' projects which have been a large part of our

funding to date. Whilst remaining committed to the projects we have agreed to fund, when and if they are able to run – we took a (unanimous) decision to focus our efforts on more homegrown projects, based in the UK. We felt that, overall, we had been most pleased with the success of projects like Black2Nature, and the Community Garden, in terms of their local and wider impact which, we felt, was far more measurable than most of the overseas projects funded hitherto.

The Foundation continues to value partnerships with organisations that appropriately serve its objects. Our relationship with PeaceJam UK remains fruitful, and individual trustees are in discussion with African Youth Arise, Daniel Spargo Mabbs, and the Chris Donovan Trust. These and other similar bodies are encouraging young people in envisioning projects in the arena of drug awareness, street-wise awareness, and the dangers of knife crime. With a thought to broadening the expertise of the board, David and JD have spoken to Ellie Turner, and Kate Finn – family members with their own areas of expertise, and in different areas of the UK (the Northeast and Northern Ireland, respectively) – with regard to joining the board. Both are very receptive to the idea. We still need to meet formally with them to have their agreed support, but this meeting is imminent, and we should have news soon.
