#### ***FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2025***

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The trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 April 2025.

Legal and administrative information set up on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

#### **Structure, Governance and Management**

Care for Cambodia is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its memorandum and articles of association. Care for Cambodia is run by a team of Trustees based in both the UK and Cambodia. Project delivery in Cambodia is mostly conducted by Cambodian Nationals.

Trustees are recruited from those with an interest in developing the country of Cambodia. All have direct experience in either working, or visiting projects in Cambodia. Trustees are targeting those who have relevant skills applicable to the organisation, e.g., teachers, medical professionals, social work and safeguarding, etc.

As set out in the Articles of Association the board of trustees, will comprise of a minimum of 3 members, who meet regularly to administer the charity.

#### **Objective of Care for Cambodia**

‘We work together to care for one another so that Cambodians might be enabled to live in dignity, fulfill their own potential and achieve success’

The principal objectives of the charity during the year continued to be:

1. To act as a point of support and information for people wishing to engage in the work of Care for Cambodia.
2. To establish and support projects that lift people out of poverty through education and social care.
3. To support children and their families in order to maintain stable environments in which children can
4. thrive and achieve their potential, including direct work with families in the provinces.
5. To educate and support teachers to provide suitable education on literacy, numeracy, health, Christian
6. guidance, English and other academic subjects.
7. To support the local Church and encourage growth

#### **Review of Activities and Achievements**

During the year, Care for Cambodia continued to deliver its core programmes across multiple communities, maintaining consistent levels of service delivery. The number of children and young people attending projects remained broadly in line with the previous year, and school retention rates have stabilised close to historic norms. Retention nevertheless remains an ongoing challenge, reflecting the reality that many of the communities we serve are economically vulnerable and highly mobile. Families often relocate at short notice in response to employment opportunities, which can disrupt children’s education and participation in programs.

An ongoing observation across many projects is a disparity in participation rates between male and female students. Although wider Cambodian society often affords greater educational and employment opportunities to males, Care for Cambodia consistently observes higher levels of participation, attendance and long-term commitment among female students within its programmes. Female students are more likely to remain engaged over time, complete courses, and pursue further education where opportunities exist. This trend continues to shape programme delivery and informs ongoing discussions around access, retention and long-term impact.

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#### **Review of activities, achievements and financial activity during the year ended 30 April 2025 (Continued)**

The wider Cambodian economy remained weak throughout the year. Cambodia's heavy reliance on garment manufacturing, construction and tourism continues to present structural challenges, with recovery uneven and fragile. The imposition of US tariffs during the year created additional strain on the manufacturing sector, particularly garment factories, resulting in job losses, reduced working hours, and increased household insecurity for many of the families we serve. These pressures were further compounded by rising indebtedness and the continued prevalence of predatory micro-finance lending.

During the latter part of the year, border insecurity with Thailand increased significantly. This instability contributed to economic uncertainty and resulted in large numbers of Cambodian migrant workers returning from Thailand, often abruptly and without secure employment options. The return of these workers placed further pressure on already fragile household economies and community support systems.

Despite these challenges, the level of need for Care for Cambodia's work remains extremely high. We continue to receive requests from new communities seeking partnership and support, and we now maintain a waiting list of potential project locations. While several new initiatives were started during the year, the overall number of project locations remained stable, as a small number of existing projects were concluded where needs had reduced or where continuation was no longer viable.

During the year, Care for Cambodia also initiated a Compassion Programme, providing short-term emergency assistance to families within our existing communities who have experienced sudden tragedy or severe hardship. This support has included emergency food provision, medical assistance, and temporary financial relief, enabling families to stabilise during acute crises while longer-term solutions are explored.

#### **Financial Review**

Income for the year increased compared to the previous period. This was primarily due to the successful introduction of a new revenue stream following the engagement of a freelance fundraiser, enabling the charity to access a wider range of grant funding opportunities. This has strengthened income diversity and reduced reliance on a small number of individual donors.

Funding nevertheless remains challenging in a highly competitive international environment, particularly as many donors continue to respond to major global humanitarian crises and the removal of US AID support for many. Care for Cambodia has continued to expand its donor base geographically and now benefits from supporters in the UK, USA, Singapore, Australia New Zealand. The trustees are grateful for the continued generosity and commitment of both longstanding and new supporters.

#### **People and Organisation**

During the year, Care for Cambodia employed over 40 staff, both full-time and part-time, alongside volunteers. Staffing levels remained stable, providing continuity, experience and strong relationships within communities. As part of responsible organisational oversight, management have begun reviewing the age profile of staff in certain roles and programme areas. While valuing the commitment and experience of long serving staff, this review recognises the importance of succession planning and long-term organisational sustainability.

In this period, over 1,600 children and young people benefited daily from Care for Cambodia's programmes. The university scholarship programme supported 15 students during the year. The trustees were pleased to see several students successfully graduate and move into stable, well-paid employment, demonstrating the long-term impact of this investment in education.

#### **Projects and Social Enterprise**

The charity's plastic recycling project continued to operate, transforming waste plastic into practical educational resources. We expanded this project to include recycling wooden and glass waste. While production capacity is strong, marketing and sales remain challenging due to limited specialist skills within the existing workforce, and we continue to explore options to strengthen this aspect of the work.

##### **Plans for the future**

For the year to 30<sup>th</sup> April 2026, the trustees have set the following priorities:

- To nurture and maintain existing project locations, continually assessing need and, where appropriate, planning a responsible withdrawal as communities become more self-sustaining.
- To identify new project locations where there is demonstrable need and sufficient human resources to support effective delivery. Especially those impacted by the recent border conflict.
- To continue developing the university scholarship programme and supporting students into sustainable employment.
- To further develop recycling initiatives so that they can contribute modestly towards the ongoing operational costs of the charity.
- To address emerging risks associated with an aging workforce in certain programme areas through succession planning, skills development and recruitment where necessary.

The trustees remain committed to responding to need with compassion and flexibility, while ensuring that Care for Cambodia continues to operate with strong governance, accountability and long-term sustainability

##### **Public benefit**

The trustees acknowledge the requirement to demonstrate clearly that it must have charitable purposes that are for the public benefit. Details of activities for the public benefit are described in the above paragraphs. The trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit before deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

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#### **Financial review**

##### **Reserves and Investment policies**

General Fund £17,477 (2024: £26,262)

All monies received are given for the purpose of meeting the charities objectives set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Edukid (Restricted) Fund £16,497 (2024: £22,001)

During the year Care for Cambodia received donations of £22,239 from Edukid. Edukid has been a trusted partner of Care for Cambodia for over 10 years. Their primary focus is on providing funds to purchase school packs for children, however they also provide funds to provide for university students. In addition to this direct support, Edukid also provides a small amount of support to fund the back end of school pack provision (staff salaries, distribution etc.)

The team in Cambodia hold funds separately to cover any emergency needs and salary costs, so the Trustees feel that a minimum of £2,000 in reserves to cover any closure costs are adequate. Free reserves are above the level set by the trustees, and they are satisfied with the current situation.

##### **Risk assessment**

The Trustees do not believe that Care for Cambodia is subject to any substantial risks beyond the liabilities disclosed in the financial statements. Directors overscas ensure appropriate use of funds, and their safeguard policy is up to date. A risk assessment policy and risk assessment register have been prepared and are reviewed on a regular basis.

##### **Accountants**

A resolution will be proposed at the AGM that Mark Hjertzen of HW Associates Limited be re-appointed as Independent Examiner for the ensuing year.

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#### Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities



I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of Care for Cambodia (the charity) for the year ended 30 April 2025.





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#### **1 Accounting policies**

##### **1.1 Company status and information**

Care for Cambodia is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Unit 1, The Orbital Centre, Cockerell Close, SG1 2NB. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member.

##### **1.2 Basis of preparation**

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006. The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these accounts are rounded to the nearest £.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at cost value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The charity has taken advantage of the concession available to smaller charities in the Statement of Recommended Practice which permits the analysis of incoming resources and resources expended by natural categories rather than by activity.

##### **1.3 Going concern**

The trustees are confident that the charity is able to continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due for the foreseeable future and that the accounts should be prepared on a going concern basis.

##### **1.4 Income**

###### Donations

Donations represent the total donations received from any fundraising or direct to the bank account during the year, including any associated Gift Aid reclaims.

###### Interest receivable

Interest receivable is included in the financial statements on an accruals basis.

##### **1.5 Expenditure**

###### Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be recovered.

###### Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

#### 1.6 Fund Accounting

<i>Unrestricted funds</i>	These are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.
<i>Designated funds</i>	These are unrestricted funds which have been earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.
<i>Restricted funds</i>	These are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the Charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

The Student Sponsorship restricted fund relates to donations received towards the cost of education for individually identified students. Trustees ensure that money donated is used for the stated purpose on that specific students' education.

The Edukid funding restricted fund relates to donations received towards the cost of purchasing school packs for children, including costs involved in the distribution. Trustees ensure that money donated is used for the stated purpose.

The Family Project restricted funds relates to donations received towards the various family schemes including micro-financing, business generation, positive parenting and first aid training. Trustees ensure that money donated is used for the stated purpose.

The Teacher Sponsorship restricted fund relates to donations received towards the cost of salaries and teaching resources for the Provincial teachers. Trustees ensure that money donated is used for the stated purpose

The Living Support (Cambodia) Fund relates to donations received towards the essential living expenses of an individual within the Care for Cambodia community. Trustees ensure that money donated is used for the stated purpose.

The Classroom Build restricted fund relates to donations received towards the cost of maintaining the classrooms. Trustees ensure that money donated is used for the stated purpose.

#### 1.7 Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.
