<p>Afewee Training Centre provides training in Football, Boxing and Fitness for children and young people aged 6-24 years. It also provides mentoring, guidance and discussion sessions. The extensive timetable of activities takes place mainly at Brixton Recreation Centre with up to 300 young people attending each week. All sessions are open access.</p> <p>Afewee Training Centre is a sports club with dual purposes which are of equal importance.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. To provide training to enable young people to progress to the highest levels in their chosen sport. ATC has produced national boxing champions and many professional footballers including an England team member. 2. To provide mentoring and support for young people in during their childhood, youth and during the transition to adulthood. Thus supporting, empowering and developing the underserved and disadvantaged communities which Afewee serves. <p>Afewee Training Centre works with a wide range of public, private and charitable bodies such as Lambeth Council, GLL Brixton Recreation Centre, Schools, colleges, professional football clubs, the national governing boards of Boxing and Football, youth clubs, other sports clubs, residents associations, businesses and numerous other organisations for the benefit of young people in Lambeth. Section D

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

The year 2020 -2021 proved to be the most challenging ever for Afewee Training Centre (ATC). Afewee found itself unable to deliver any of its extensive programmes at Brixton Recreation Centre due to the National Lockdown as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic which had started on 26th March. Prior to the lockdown the ATC committee had started meeting virtually every two weeks to assess the fast-moving situation and to plan how to meet the needs of its members during the pandemic.

In April both the football and boxing programmes began to communicate with the members virtually. Afewee Boxing started online kids training for 5–16-year-olds to reconnect with members and provide physical activity they could do at home. At the same time Afewee Football set remote challenges which could be carried out using household objects easily available at home. Schools throughout the UK were closed, and outdoor activity was limited to one hour a day. The lockdown hit young people who trained with Afewee 2-3 times a week particularly hard. Being confined to the house was especially difficult to those living in with overcrowding, without a laptop or both. By May Afewee Boxing had launched a service on Instagram live including for the over 18s and in July it was able to start outdoor boxing and fitness sessions in Brockwell Park whilst fully complying with government guidelines.

As the lockdown entered its last stages in June ATC was successful in its bid to join the Summer of Food and Fun funded by the Mayors Fund for London. In July- August the SOFF was delivered in The Milkwood Community Park with the help of a number of organisations including the Milkwood Road Residents Association. 35 young people from across the borough attended the programme which ran over four weeks and included boxing, fitness, football, gardening and talks: including, from Afewee UK Champion Boxer Vivien Parsons. The programme also provided prepared meals and essential groceries. The committee would like to thank Amanda Carter our volunteer co-ordinator who worked so hard to bring everything together.

Following the success of SOFF, ATC received a grant from the National Lottery Covid Response Fund to enable the club to support members during the pandemic. ATC looked forward to going back to face-to-face training during the Autumn but instead the committee found itself grappling with regulations which changed every few weeks and as volunteers the pandemic stretched the club to its very limits. In October within guidelines the Boxing Gym opened again and small group fitness and football sessions took place in the Brixton Recreation Center, only to close again when the 2nd lockdown came into force In November.

In December ATC joined up Kitchen Social the food programme funded by the Mayors Fund for London to give out food hampers over the Christmas period and it also ran a post-Christmas food giveaway outside Brixton Recreation Centre. On January 6th, 2021, the country entered the 3rd lockdown which was still in force at the

end of the financial year. As ATC prepared for the new year and the ending of the third lockdown, there was one last chance to support the community. ATC received funds from the Walcott Foundation under the London Emergency Response Fund to help children who had slipped through the net and were still unable to access laptops for their schoolwork. 21 laptops were delivered to families experiencing Digital Exclusion and this benefitted 38 young people.

Our sincere thanks to the committee, Steadman Scott, Tony Goldring, Keishana Kelly, Bobby Miltiadous, Nikki Hunt and Annette Walsh for keeping Afewee Training Centre going throughout the year which took a monumental effort and great personal sacrifice. The experiences of 20-21 underlined once again the need for Afewee to have at least a part-time paid co-ordinator as it has gone way past the stage where Afewee can support hundreds of young people in Lambeth on volunteering alone.


