



The charity carries out a wide range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The trustees consider that these activities, summarised below, provide benefit both to those who uses our community centre and the wider community of Greater Manchester and neighbouring cities.

WATER WELLS

We are digging water wells in different parts of the world where fresh water is scarce, predominantly in African countries.

Statistically, 86% of people living in sub-Saharan Africa are deprived from healthy and clean water. Water is an essential part of our lives, and without it, there is no life. Therefore, as Suleymaniye Aid, we have initiated the 'Water of Life' project and evaluated the countries and regions that are arid and where clean water could not be obtained. Our mission is to dig water wells with a professional team and maintain them in any case of malfunction.

EDUCATION

It is possible for a person to achieve success and development in life through good education. Education in poor countries is crucial to keeping a child there alive. We develop projects that will provide permanent solutions for education, which is the biggest problem in the African continent as well as many more economically troubled countries. Children, especially orphans in need of food and shelter, live in our Educational school institutions built by our philanthropists. Thousands of African children have the opportunity to receive education through the efforts of philanthropists who have donated through our organisation.

FOOD

In the places where we try to solve people's problems and meet their needs; we are aware that long-term, permanent solutions can be achieved through education. Because educated generations form the basis of a happy future.

QURBANI

As Suleymaniye Aid, we have been continually offering our services to needy people in the poor countries for many years. And one of our major projects include the Qurbani service - where we deliver your Qurbanis to needy families around the world, predominantly in the African and Asian continents. Since Qurbani is a very sensitive matter that requires certain hygienic and religious guidelines, we have established a professional team who have had years of experience in handling Qurbani.

DISASTER AID

We provide disaster aid with the mission to:


1. Respond to disasters with the supply of humanitarian aid to the affected communities and/or individuals.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Suleymaniye Humanitarian Trust is a London-based international charity, established in 2015 as a non-profit organisation providing social communication in the United Kingdom, it has been contributing to the increase in social consciousness, cooperation, solidarity, quality of education as well as creating cultural unity.

Over time, we have expanded our operations, working with volunteers from the community from all ages and walks of life. With this fact we decided to establish our London based charity where we can increase our performance of volunteer activity and concentrate more on additional projects.

The assistance and services that we offer is not limited to a region or population. For this reason, our goal is to help everyone without any discrimination in terms of the aid and services that we provide.

In February 2023, 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck southern Turkey and northern Syria. There was a widespread damage in the area and millions of were affected. It is estimated that 1.5 million people were left homeless.

During the year, Suleymaniye Humanitarian Trust collected donations to commit package of support to address urgent humanitarian needs in Turkey and Syria. Our support to Turkey and Syria included deliveries of containerised homes, family tents and blankets, and ongoing deployment of our expertise in disaster support, helping communities ravaged by this national adversity, as well as the recovery effort in Turkey led by the government.


