TRUSTEES' REPORT
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) as amended by Update Bulletin 1 (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the charity qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Objectives and Activities

a. POLICIES AND OBJECTIVES

The charity's objectives are 'the relief and support of persons who have suffered, or are in danger of suffering, domestic abuse from perpetrators known to them, by the provision of services to advance the education of voluntary groups, statutory agencies and the public, in the causes, signs and effects of domestic abuse and how to support those who have been affected by domestic abuse.

b. ACTIVITIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES

Grants are received from various funding organizations, including local government and national charities, to assist the charity to achieve its objectives.

c. MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN TO FURTHER THE CHARITY'S PURPOSES FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

In setting objectives and planning activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the charity commission relating to the public benefit. The main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for public benefit are shown in the Review of Activities in these accounts.

Achievements and performance

a. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

Message from the Chair

The Emily Davison Centre's (the charity) first objective is to ensure that the centre is managed successfully and continues to contribute towards the 'Ending Violence Against Women and Girls' (EVAWG) policy, legislation, and strategy.

The purpose of the Emily Davison Centre is simple; to ensure that EVAWG services are all under one roof. Instead of survivors been told to run around different services to seek help, we believe that all victims should be able to access whatever service they require and should be able to do so in a timely manner. We also know that services that work in collaboration with each other do not only reduce overheads and cost, but that the knowledge and support shared increase the capacity of services and the quality of the services that victims receive.

This 7000 square, foot new build is home to 3 'EVAWG' charities and 1 Housing CIC. At the time of writing this, there are 33 full time, 'EVAWG' practitioners / experts based at the centre. The services respond to stalking, domestic abuse, coercive control, child sexual exploitation, housing/homelessness, children and young people, honour-based violence, legal and benefits issues and recovery, to mention a few.

The EDC's philosophy is in line with intersectional feminism. This means that we understand the importance of people's identities in relation to their lived experiences. Because of our commitment to equality, we have developed a national by-and-for service for transgender and non-binary victims of domestic abuse called Loving Me, as well as a service for women and their children who have no recourse to public funds.

The EDC launched the Loving Me service in 2021, after securing funding from Comic Relief and The Ministry of Justice. This has also led to further investment in 2022 from Lancashire Police Crime Commissioners office and Lancashire County Council. In addition, we have recently secured funding to open the first transgender refuge, in the spring of 2023.

As well as this, we supported the opening of two new safe houses for women with no recourse to public funds and we continue to provide food banks, household funds and clothing for struggling families.

The EDC recently had some external work completed, thanks to TOPE builders as well as BBC Children in Need who funded the extension of the outside space and decking area. This has created a children's area and a gardening area for our service users.

The centre has seen just over 7,000 individuals accessing support in the last twelve months. 2983 were local adult victims of domestic abuse, 3152 were victims across England and 738 children and young people. 96% of our adult service users identify as women and 4% as men. 37% of the Children and Young People that we work with identify as male.

In the last 12 months, the centre has become a vibrant hub of activity again, with the conference space and group work rooms being used on a regular basis. We have recently purchased the lodge that sits on the edge of the centre, and we are excited about these new social enterprise developments in 2023.

In November/ December 2022, we organised Accrington's first 'Reclaim the Night' march which was attended by 350 individuals. We remembered the women who had been murdered locally in the last 12 months.

Violence Against Women and Girls continues to be a prevalent issue in society, and it has profound effects on individuals and families' lives. We not only provide direct support, but we also work locally and regionally to increase the awareness of violence and abuse via our social media activity and teach Healthy Relationships Programme in all of the schools in the area.

I'm proud to have gotten this far in such a short period of time. Our success is down to several factors; firstly the team around me. We have all been working in the sector for over twenty years, we have seen the political, social, and economic changes that impact on our sector, and I am confident that we now have the knowledge, experience, behaviours, and skills to circumnavigate any crisis.

We are Women and Girls centred; this means we build services around need. We know that the experience of abuse can and does impact on every area of a victim's life and that's the reason we have all services under one roof.

Financial review

a. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees aim to accumulate reserves of between 3 and 6 months of the resources expended to enable current activities and liabilities met, in the event of delay in receipt of income. Total reserves amounted to £142,359 (2021 - £118,040), of which £138,081 (2021 - £114,422) were unrestricted funds and £4,278 (2021 - £3,618) represented restricted funds.

c. PRINCIPAL FUNDING

The principal funding of the charity was from Charity Projects and BBC Children in Need.

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The charity is constituted under a CIO - Foundation dated 13 October 2015 as amended 14 February 2019 and is a registered charity number 1163951.

The principal object of the charity is to provide relief and support for those who have, or are in danger of, suffering from domestic abuse.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the CIO.

c. POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

Trustees are inducted in line with charity commission recommendations.

d. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

The charity and its property is administered and managed in accordance with the constitution by the trustees named on Page 1 who form the Management Committee.

e. RELATED PARTY RELATIONSHIPS

The charity receives rental income from both HARV Outreach Team and Harv Housing CIC. Amanda Elwen is a member of the key personnel of HARV Outreach Team; is a director of Harv Housing CIC and is the Chair of The Emily Davison Centre.

f. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks. These major risks are the impact of short term funding, changes in funding streams, changes to key personnel and changes in local and central government policy.

Plans for future periods

a. FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

2021/22 has proven to be an unprecedented year. The pandemic, Brexit and subsequent economic downturn has brought about a number of personal and professional challenges that have and continue to impact on operational and strategic plans. We have been agile in our response, and this has enabled us thus far, to be resilient.

Our priorities for 2022 are to ensure the needs of vulnerable women and girls continue to be met, to ensure that service users can access quality support as and when it is required. We are now seeing the evidence and the impact the cost-of-living crisis is having on victims of domestic and sexual violence, we anticipate increased referrals, and we will endeavour to meet the increase in demand. This, of course, needs resourcing. We will continue to meet with funders, stakeholders, and private investors to ensure the Emily Davison Centre can sustain itself.

We are a young charity and there is a lot of national interest in the centre. Not only is it a cost-effective model but it has far better outcomes for victims of violence and abuse. We will work with the International Connect Centre at The University of Central Lancashire (UCLAN) in the provision of an external and independent evaluation. Our priorities for 22/23.

- Develop social enterprise activity including water sports activity on the lodge
- Increase income from room rentals and training
- Ensure the services in the EDC are provided with support and resources do build capacity
- Recruit a centre manager
- Continue with the same level of service delivery
- Continue to develop the charity shop
- Continue with food and clothes bank activity and the distribution of household fund
- Continue to develop by and for services

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

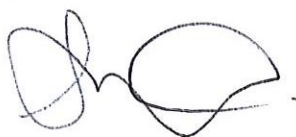

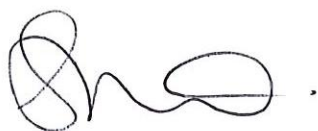
The charity's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Emily Davison Centre meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

No restatements were required.

1.3 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised and refer to the Trustees' report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the charity's operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

1.6 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.7 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.9 Pensions

Pensions are paid into personal pension plans. Any amounts outstanding at the year end are shown in creditors.

1.10 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
