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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

Breast Cancer Support

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document.

Main Objectives:

The relief of sickness and the preservation and protection of good health by:

- Providing educational support for women and men.
- Supporting breast cancer treatment centres and organisations by providing equipment and staffing.
- Offering additional support, including assistance for the families and carers of affected individuals, to improve treatment and care of breast cancer nationally and internationally.

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes during the period

During the reporting period, Breast Cancer Support undertook activities directly aligned to its charitable purposes of improving breast cancer awareness, facilitating early diagnosis, and supporting access to treatment and care for those affected by breast cancer and their families. The charity's activities were focused on:

1. Raising Breast Cancer Awareness and Education

Delivering and supporting education-led initiatives aimed at increasing understanding of breast cancer, challenging stigma, and encouraging early detection, particularly within underserved and vulnerable communities.

2. Facilitating Access to Screening and Diagnosis

Supporting programmes that enable access to breast cancer screening and diagnostic services, including mammography, ultrasound, clinical examinations, and pathology, for individuals who face financial, social, or geographic barriers to care.

3. Supporting Treatment and Follow-Up Care

Contributing to initiatives that support timely treatment pathways and follow-up care for individuals identified through screening programmes, ensuring continuity of care and improved health outcomes.

4. International and Community-Based Outreach

Working in partnership with established healthcare providers and charitable organisations internationally to deliver community-based outreach projects, including education, screening, and referral to specialist services.

5. Oversight and Stewardship of Projects

Monitoring and reviewing funded projects to ensure activities remained aligned with the charity's objectives, funds were used appropriately, and beneficiaries continued to receive meaningful support.

These activities collectively furthered the charity's purposes by addressing key gaps in awareness, access, and care, while ensuring that support was delivered ethically, effectively, and for the public benefit.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

Breast Cancer Support

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes during the period.

During the reporting period, Breast Cancer Support continued to advance its charitable objectives through a combination of direct support, education, and international collaboration. The charity's work remained focused on improving breast cancer awareness, enabling early diagnosis, and supporting access to treatment for those most in need. Key activities undertaken during the year included:

1. Breast Cancer Treatment and Diagnostic Support

The charity continued to support access to essential breast cancer diagnostic and treatment services, including biopsies, mammography, ultrasound imaging, and chemotherapy. These services are aimed at ensuring timely clinical intervention and improving outcomes for individuals who may otherwise face barriers to care.

2. Breast Cancer Awareness and Education

Awareness and education remained central to the charity's mission. The charity supported culturally sensitive awareness programmes designed to promote early detection and reduce fear, stigma, and misinformation surrounding breast cancer, particularly within underserved communities.

3. International Outreach and Partnerships

Breast Cancer Support sustained its international activities in Pakistan, Thailand, and Indonesia, with a continued emphasis on education, screening, and community engagement. In addition, during the year the charity successfully supported a breast cancer awareness and screening project delivered in partnership with the Queen Sirikit Centre for Breast Cancer (QSCBC) in Thailand.

4. Monitoring and Support of Existing Projects

All ongoing projects were monitored throughout the year to assess effectiveness, ensure appropriate use of funds, and respond to emerging needs. Where required, additional support and oversight were provided to maximise impact and sustainability.

The main achievements and performance of the charity during the Period

The charity's activities during the year resulted in several notable achievements aligned to its core focus areas of awareness, diagnosis, and treatment.

1. Education and Awareness

Educational initiatives in Thailand and other regions continued to empower women and communities to prioritise early detection of breast cancer. These programmes helped address cultural and educational barriers, enabling individuals to make informed decisions about their health.

2. Diagnosis and Treatment

Through the provision of free or subsidised screening and treatment services, the charity contributed to improved access to essential healthcare for individuals in underserved communities, positively influencing quality of life and clinical outcomes.

3. Successful Delivery of the QSCBC Thailand Project

During the year, Breast Cancer Support funded and supported a two-day breast cancer education and screening initiative delivered by the Queen Sirikit Centre for Breast Cancer in Bangkok.

The project combined community-based education sessions within slum areas of greater Bangkok with a dedicated screening day at the QSCBC. Women identified as most in need received free breast examinations, ultrasound imaging, mammography where appropriate, and full medical assessments.

This initiative built on QSCBC's long-standing outreach model and enabled women facing significant social and economic barriers to access life-saving early detection services in a supportive and dignified environment.

4. Global Impact

By supporting projects in underserved regions, the charity continued to bridge gaps in healthcare access, contributing to healthier communities and broader societal well-being.

Breast Cancer Support

The difference the charity's performance during the period has made to the beneficiaries of the charity.

The charity's work during the year delivered a meaningful and measurable difference to beneficiaries across multiple regions.

1. Improved Awareness and Empowerment

Education and awareness programmes enabled women to better understand breast cancer risks, symptoms, and the importance of early detection. By addressing fear and misinformation, beneficiaries were empowered to seek help earlier and engage proactively with healthcare services.

2. Enhanced Access to Medical Services

Through funded screening and treatment initiatives, including the QSCBC project in Thailand, individuals who would otherwise be unable to afford care gained access to diagnostic services and specialist assessment. Timely diagnosis significantly improves survival rates and reduces the physical and emotional burden of advanced disease.

3. Support Through and Beyond Treatment

The charity's approach recognised not only clinical needs but also the emotional and social challenges faced by patients. Post-screening follow-up and referral pathways ensured that women requiring treatment were supported and guided through next steps in their care journey.

Collectively, these efforts helped beneficiaries rebuild their lives with greater dignity, confidence, and resilience.

The degree to which the achievements and performance during the period have benefited wider society.

By focusing on early detection, education, and equitable access to care, the charity's work has generated benefits that extend beyond individual patients. Healthier individuals contribute to stronger families and more resilient communities. Improved awareness reduces late presentation of disease, easing pressure on healthcare systems and contributing to better long-term outcomes. The charity's international projects, particularly those targeting marginalised populations, also support broader societal goals by reducing health inequalities and fostering a culture of prevention and early intervention.

Future Outlook

Looking ahead, Breast Cancer Support remains committed to:

- 1.** Sustaining and strengthening existing international projects.
- 2.** Building on successful collaborations, including further engagement with QSCBC and similar partners.
- 3.** Continuing discussions with a UK hospital cancer unit regarding potential future initiatives focused on post-treatment breast cancer care. These discussions remain at an exploratory and design stage, with a view to identifying areas where the charity may support evidence-based service development and patient-centred care in the future.

With a continued focus on improving breast cancer outcomes, the charity aims to deliver lasting benefit for individuals, families, and communities both in the UK and internationally.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities Act 2011 and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008. 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.
