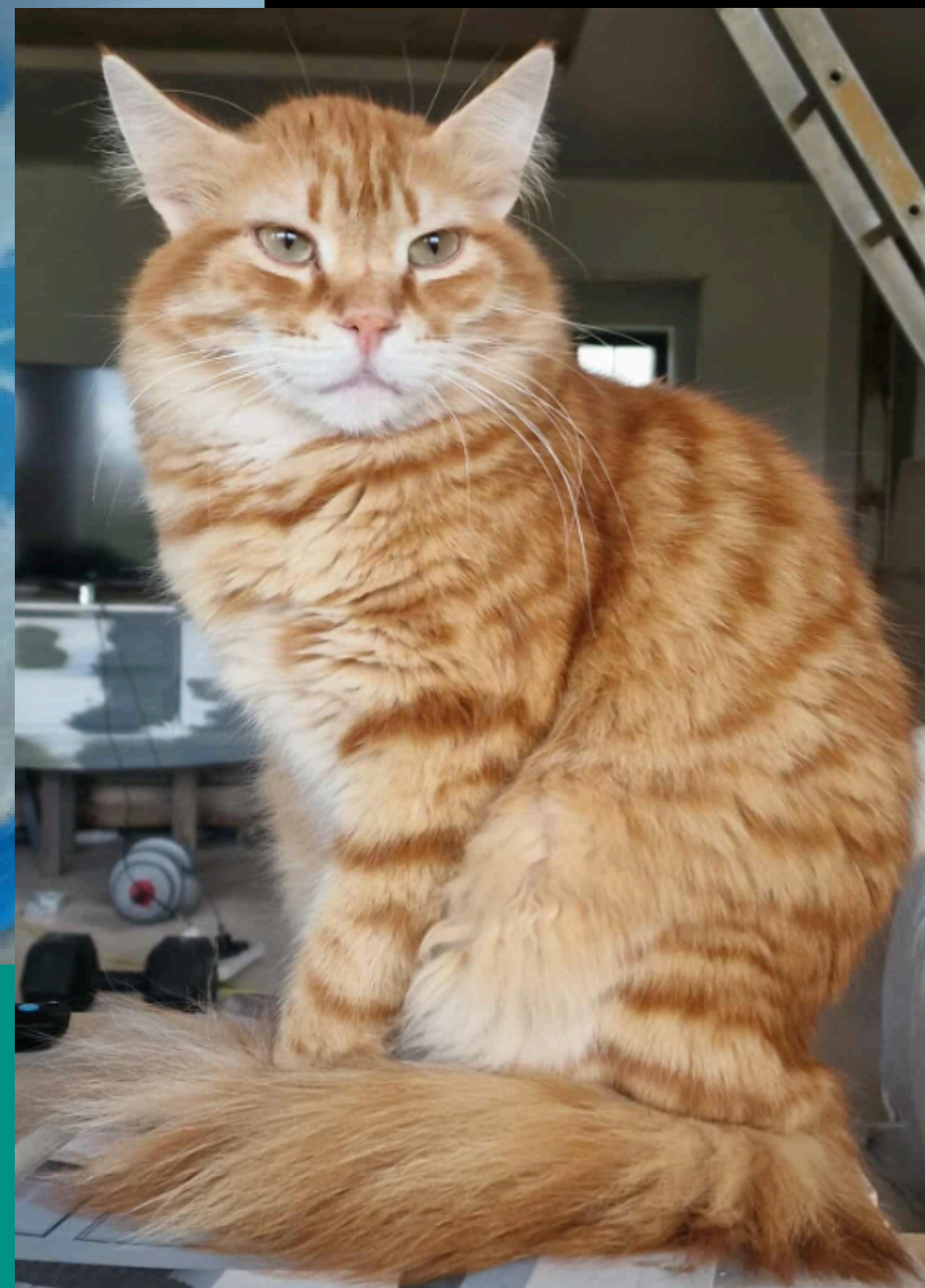
The RANA team saw his photos on a local FB group

TRIPOD KIP'S RESCUE

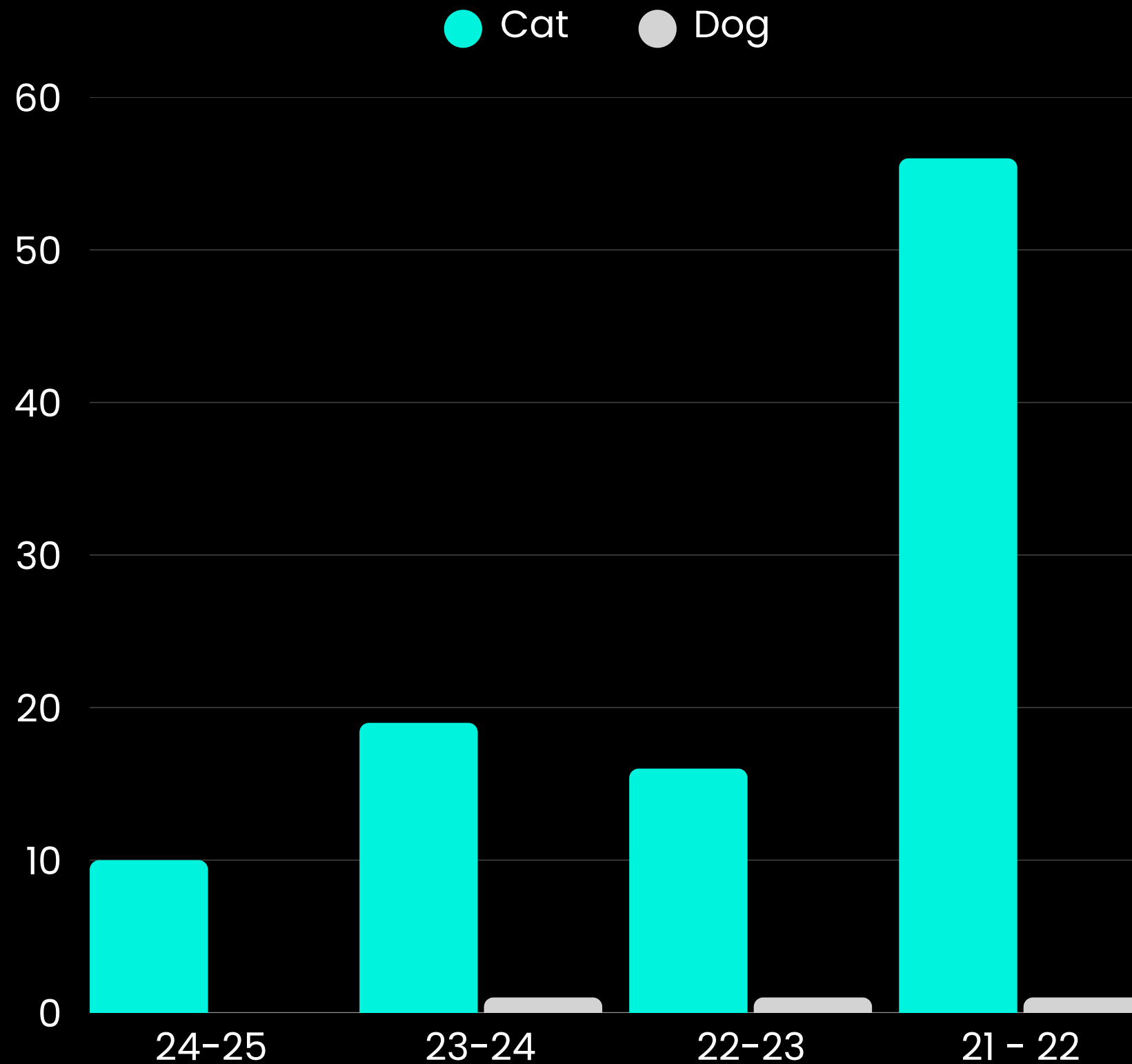
FOUND WITH HIS LEG SEVERELY MANGLED

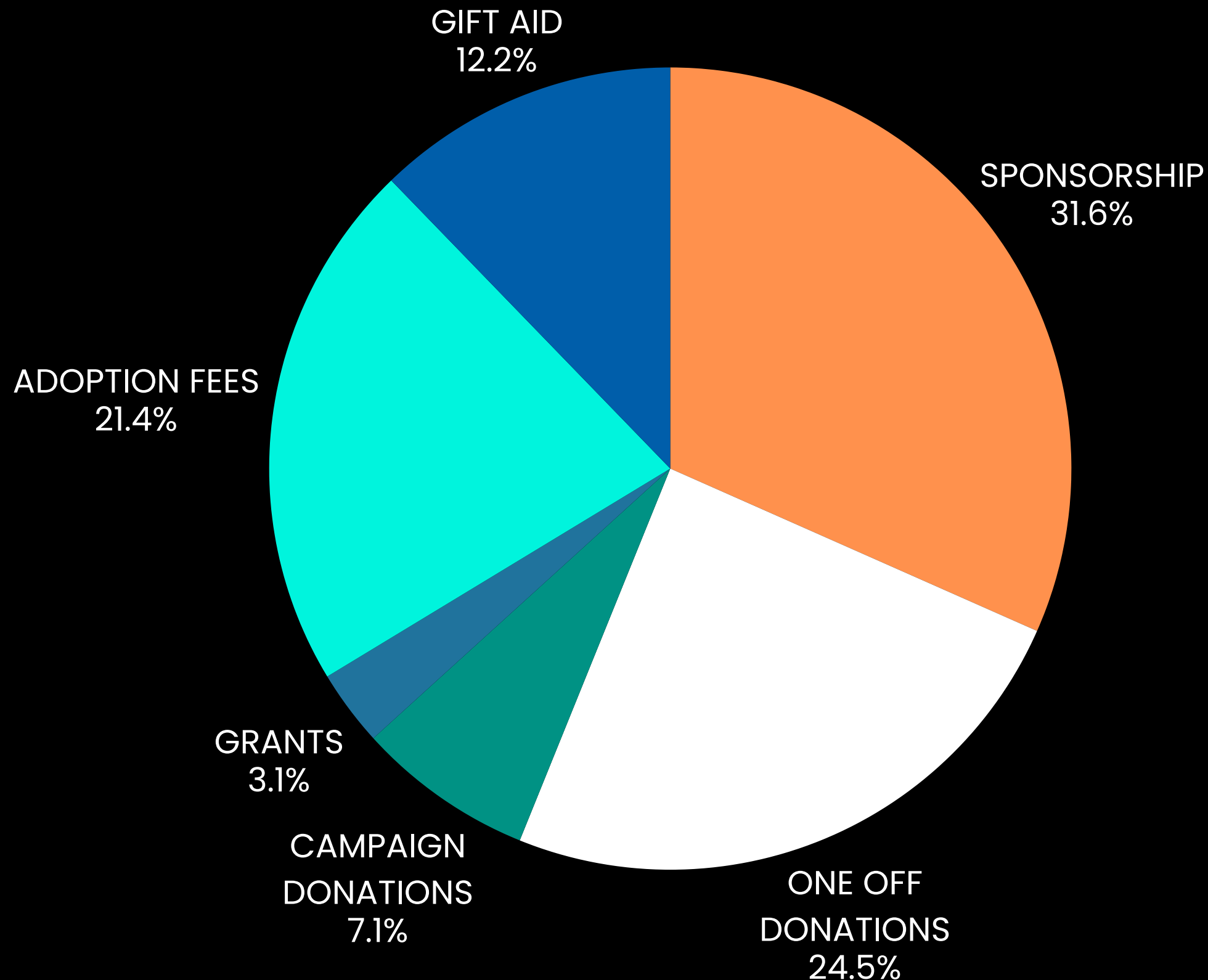
2024 INCOME

SPONSORSHIP = HIGHEST FORM OF INCOME

SPONSORSHIP REMAINS OUR LARGEST PROPORTION OF INCOME. This allows us to budget for the year and remains our most "favourable" form of donation. Allowing us to support the animals which sadly remain unadopted with boarding fees and food.

In the next few years, we want to focus on boosting our campaign donations, focusing on specific cases to bring in income and highlight the extreme cases we work with in North Africa. We plan to do this by doing more social media focused campaigns and offering multiple platforms for donations.

Grants and Gift Aid have brought in 15% of our total income for this year. We would like to focus more on this in the coming years, once a volunteer with this skill set is located.



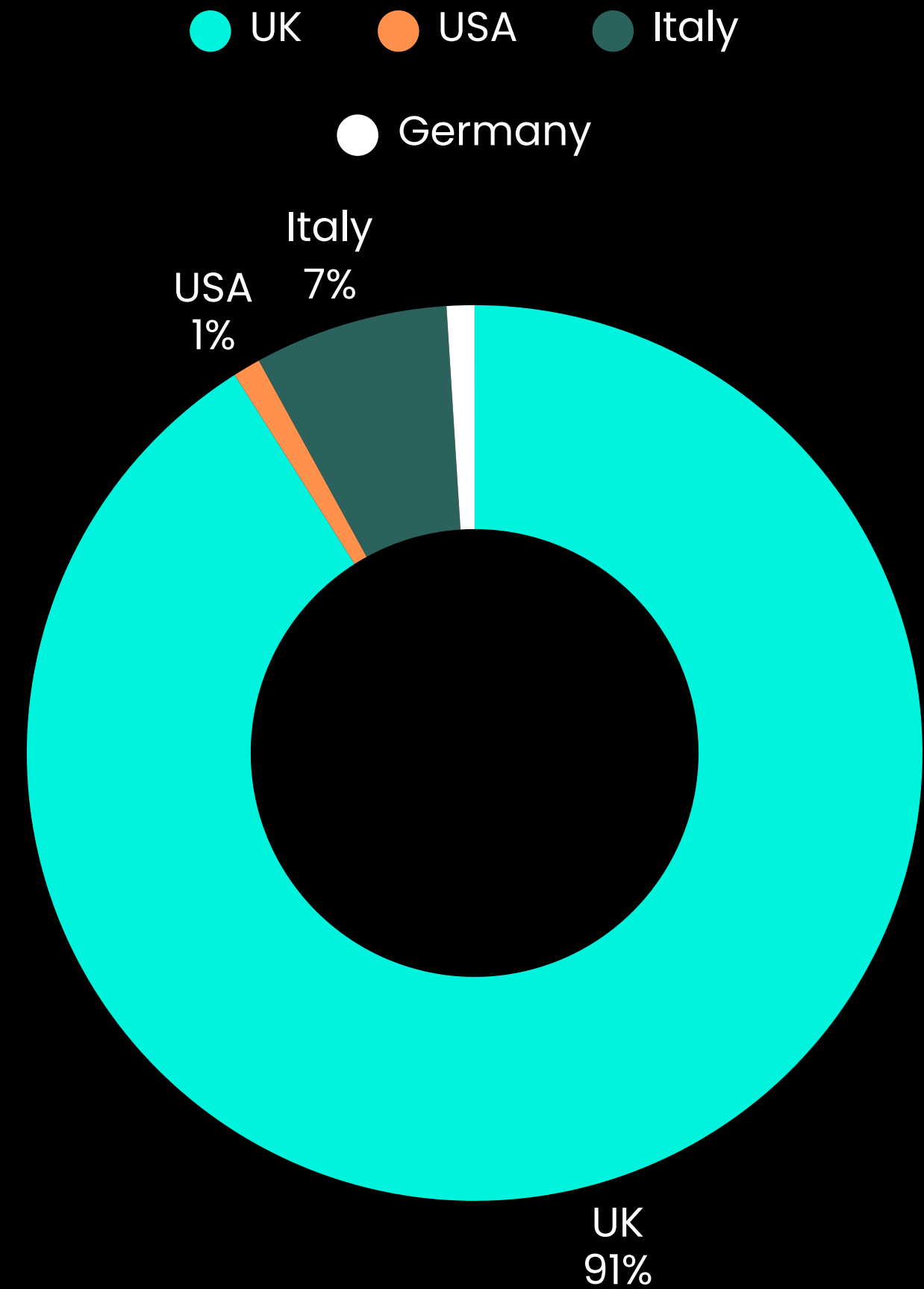
DONATION INCOME BY COUNTRY

THE UK REMAINS OUR LEADER

We are a UK registered Charity, our rehoming efforts are based in the UK. Our website and social media are all in English, so it is not unexpected that our UK reach, and therefore the donations received, are mostly from British supporters.

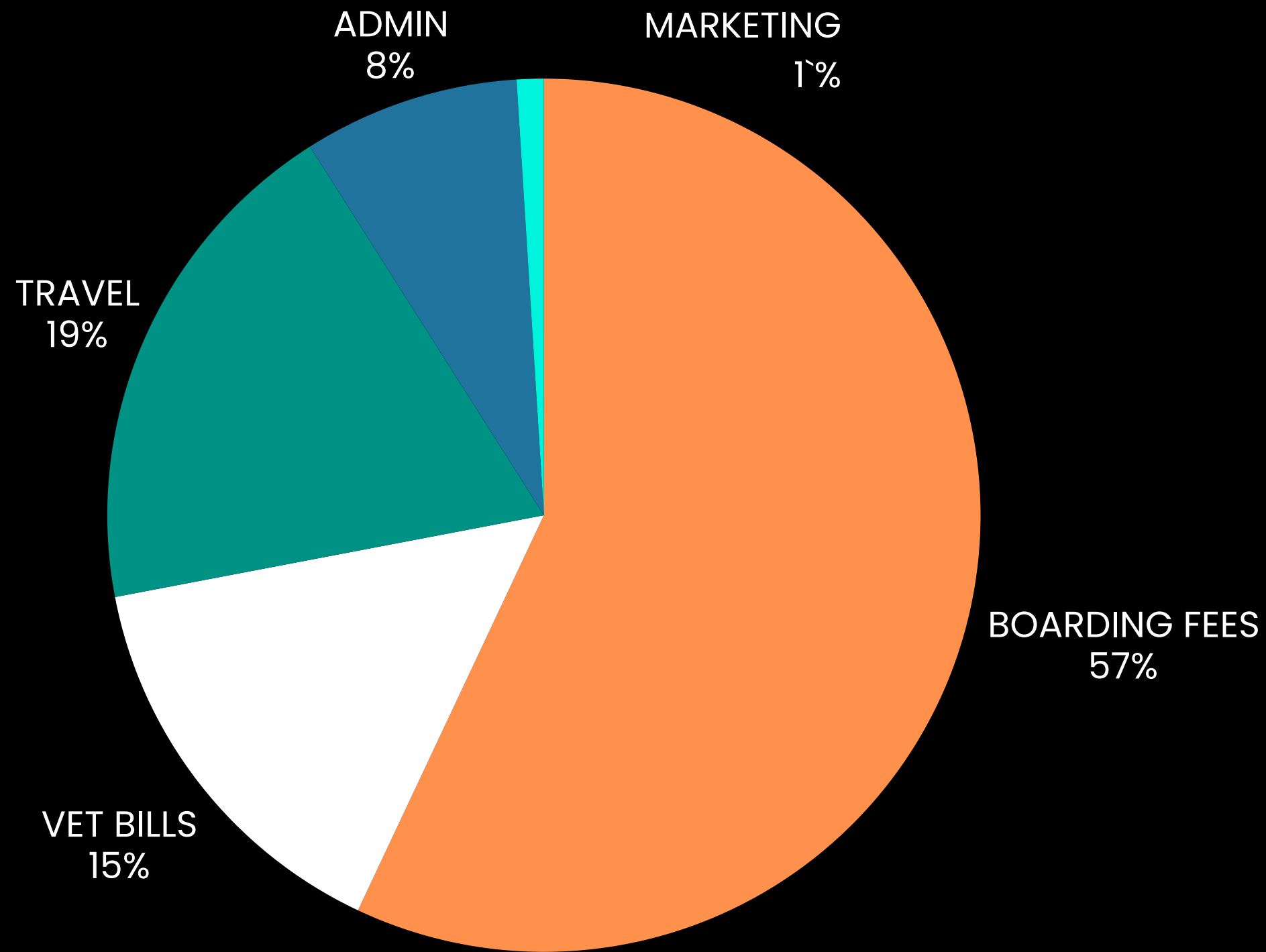
However, the donations from secondary countries vary year on year, showing reliance on campaigns and their social media reach.

We remain confident that UK donations will always be the backbone of our RANA income.

Boarding fees occupy almost 60% of our expenses. Boarding payments have always been the largest proportion of our RANA annual expenditure.

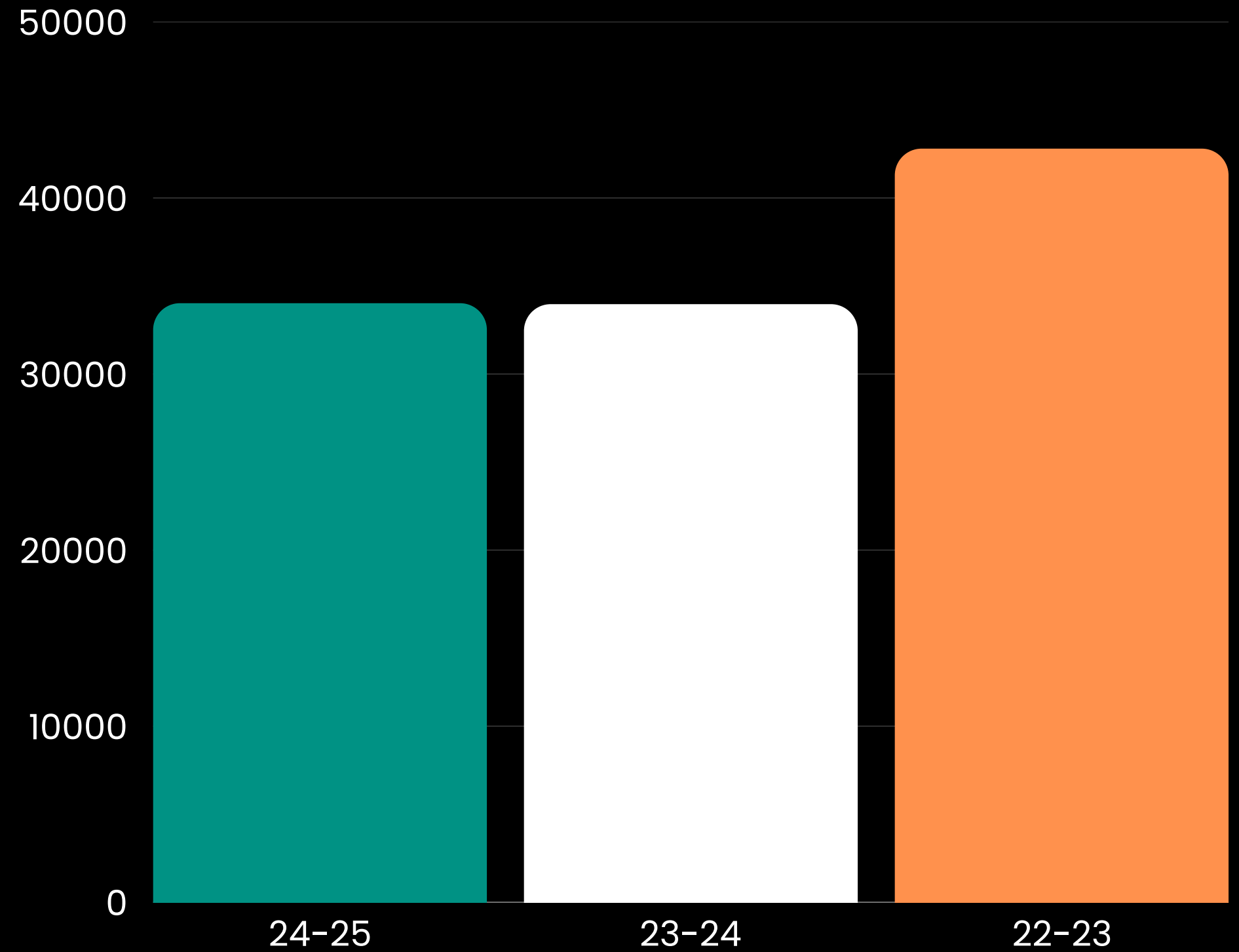
The preparation period for animals to be allowed to travel is 4 months and many animals remain unadopted (specifically dogs) which means boarding fees every month. It is the only way to keep animals safe. We see dogs being slaughtered every month, even those with tags in their ears and collars on. These animals are not safe unless they are off the streets and we are happy to be able to support the animals we do.

Travel and vet bills make up the rest of our expenditure, this is very much inline with previous annual expenditure.

2024 - 2025 (£34,022) annual accounts saw a slight increase in donations received from 23-24 (£33,968), but definite room for an increase back to 22-23 levels, where we had consistent social media activity (£42,801)

WE WERE SADLY £2756 IN DEFICIT DURING THIS YEAR DUE TO BOARDING COSTS AND ANIMALS NOT BEING ADOPTED AS QUICKLY AS WE WOULD LIKE.

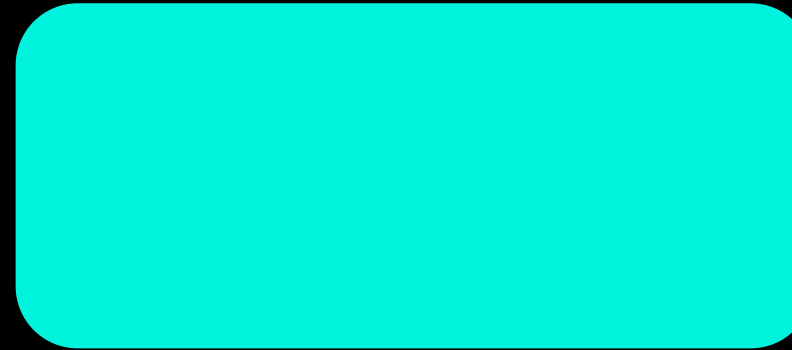
ANIMAL FLIGHT TICKETS ALSO INCREASED

- 1. FLIGHT BUDDIES** – we always try to find people who are already travelling. This keeps expenses low and avoids any increase in carbon footprint – we need more offers of flight buddies!
- 2. DRIVING BUDDIES:** we love volunteers who get involved, donating their time, use of their vehicles, which all help us save lives – we just need more driving volunteers
- 3. DOG FOSTER HOMES IN THE UK** – stats from this year alone show that once the dog is in the UK, the chance of adoption increases substantially. Therefore UK based fosterers are an integral part of securing more adoptions. We are desperate for more support .

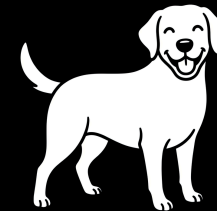

RANA'S TRUSTEES & ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

as set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

The RANA Charity is overseen by a board of trustees who are approved by the current serving board, none of these trustees are paid for their trusteeship (except for expenses related directly to the charity's activities). It is usually expected that at least one of our trustees travels to Tunisia to meet with fosters, rescuers and vets annually. These visits are important as the board of trustees are responsible for setting the strategic plan and direction of the charity. The trustees are responsible under the law of England and Wales for the correct & lawful operation of RANA. The board of Trustees operates and manages the RANA charity as a non-governmental, non-political, non-religious organisation established in 2013.

All trustees serve until they feel they can no longer give the required time and commitment to the charity, as each trustee takes their responsibility to the governance very seriously. Due to the long distances involved to travel to meet face to face, most Trustee meetings are held via online video conferencing (usually Zoom or Whats App video) & recorded, although face to face meetings are arranged where possible.



RANA'S MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

in relation to the objectives set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

Throughout the year we have successfully rescued many animals (dogs and cats) from the streets of Tunisia who were starving and at risk of being shot or poisoned. In removing stray unwanted animals from the street we have provided a public benefit by reducing the risk of strays potentially causing car accidents, attacking the public when they are in their large packs and minimising the risk of disease, such as rabies (a huge concern in Africa) spreading.

We have also provided a public benefit to those people who have contacted us in distress at what they have seen, and have taken an interest in wanting to adopt, or save the animal.

We have also provided assistance to those few animal loving volunteers on the ground in Tunisia who frequently give up rooms in their homes to house stray animals, sacrifice feeding themselves in order to feed animals on the streets and who are in desperate need of support in a country which dedicates no Government funding or support to rescuing stray animals.

RANA'S FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's policy on reserves:

The RANA board of Trustees would like to hold £5,000 in reserve funds as back up for emergency vet bills, which we have managed to achieve this year.

Investment Policy:

The RANA board of trustees have no plans for an investment policy to be put in place as we do not hold funds for investment purposes.

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees Report and the financial statements in accordance with the applicable law and United Kingdom accounting standards. Achievements and performance During 2024-25 the charity continued its core rescue work in Tunisia and Libya, focusing on boarding, veterinary care, and facilitating adoptions to the UK.

No payments were made to trustees or any persons connected with them during this financial period other than for reimbursement of expenses incurred.

6. RISK ASSESSMENT

Due to the long distances involved to travel to meet face to face, most Trustee meetings are held via online video conferencing (usually Zoom or Whats App video) & recorded, although face to face meetings are arranged where possible.

RANA'S MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

in relation to the objectives set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

Throughout the year we have continued to support the costs of animals we previously agreed to rescue from the streets of Tunisia who were starving and at risk of being shot or poisoned. We have also increased the proportion of our donations towards TNR efforts. We have always believed and continue to do so, that neutering animals is key to decreasing the number of unwanted animals on the streets. It provides a solution to a problem which never seems to end. By reducing stray numbers we continue to provide a public benefit as there is less risks of rabies being passed to humans and less chance of strays roaming & causing car accidents

We have also provided a public benefit to those people who have contacted us in distress at what they have seen, and have taken an interest in wanting to adopt, or save the animal.

As well as supporting members of the public how need support in finding homes for the animals they have saved.

RANA'S MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

throughout 2023- 2024

2023 - 2024 brought with it lots of administrative issues, which were both time consuming and all consuming. Like many other small Charities, our bank was closed, which led to us losing thousands in donations, regular monthly donations were never set up again and the cost of living crisis has also led to regular supporters, reducing their regular giving. The knock on effect to our overall income has been huge and we have had to focus on supporting the animals we agreed to rescue in previous years, ensuring their board is paid for and we support the fosters. This has resulted in us having to say no to many pleas to save animals from the streets. Heartbreaking and further reminding us, what invaluable, great work RANA does as a Charity.

As during 22-23, the animal adoption market is still extremely slow. Unwanted animals which were bought during Lockdown continue to saturate the shelters in the UK and across the world. Our database which was once set to a cap of 100 applications a month, now receives around 3 applications, our adoption rate has therefore plummeted compared with previous years.

On a positive note, we are now registered for Gift Aid and we have a new Bank Account with the Co-op. We have also rehomed animals which are notoriously tricky to find homes for, large dogs, blind cats, black cats and older animals. We also brought a cat to the UK that was originally saved from Somalia where it was due to be poisoned. We have had new volunteers join our team, helping with Social Media posts and wanting to begin a Newsletter and Blog which we hope will help us reach new supporters and adopters.

We have also carried out the most TNR sterilisations to date. Something we are very proud of.

RANA'S FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's policy on reserves:

The RANA board of Trustees would like to hold £5,000 in reserve funds as back up for emergency vet bills, which we have managed to achieve this year.

Investment Policy:

throughout 2023- 2024

2023 - 2024 brought with it lots of administrative issues, which were both time consuming and all consuming. Like many other small Charities, our bank was closed, which led to us losing thousands in donations, regular monthly donations were never set up again and the cost of living crisis has also led to regular supporters, reducing their regular giving. The knock on effect to our overall income has been huge and we have had to focus on supporting the animals we agreed to rescue in previous years, ensuring their board is paid for and we support the fosters. This has resulted in us having to say no to many pleas to save animals from the streets. Heartbreaking and further reminding us, what invaluable, great work RANA does as a Charity.

As during 22-23, the animal adoption market is still extremely slow. Unwanted animals which were bought during Lockdown continue to saturate the shelters in the UK and across the world. Our database which was once set to a cap of 100 applications a month, now receives around 3 applications, our adoption rate has therefore plummeted compared with previous years.

On a positive note, we are now registered for Gift Aid and we have a new Bank Account with the Co-op. We have also rehomed animals which are notoriously tricky to find homes for, large dogs, blind cats, black cats and older animals. We also brought a cat to the UK that was originally saved from Somalia where it was due to be poisoned. We have had new volunteers join our team, helping with Social Media posts and wanting to begin a Newsletter and Blog which we hope will help us reach new supporters and adopters.

We have also carried out the most TNR sterilisations to date. Something we are very proud of.

2023 - 2024 brought with it lots of administrative issues, which were both time consuming and all consuming. Like many other small Charities, our bank was closed, which led to us losing thousands in donations, regular monthly donations were never set up again and the cost of living crisis has also led to regular supporters, reducing their regular giving. The knock on effect to our overall income has been huge and we have had to focus on supporting the animals we agreed to rescue in previous years, ensuring their board is paid for and we support the fosters. This has resulted in us having to say no to many pleas to save animals from the streets. Heartbreaking and further reminding us, what invaluable, great work RANA does as a Charity.

As during 22-23, the animal adoption market is still extremely slow. Unwanted animals which were bought during Lockdown continue to saturate the shelters in the UK and across the world. Our database which was once set to a cap of 100 applications a month, now receives around 3 applications, our adoption rate has therefore plummeted compared with previous years.

On a positive note, we are now registered for Gift Aid and we have a new Bank Account with the Co-op. We have also rehomed animals which are notoriously tricky to find homes for, large dogs, blind cats, black cats and older animals. We also brought a cat to the UK that was originally saved from Somalia where it was due to be poisoned. We have had new volunteers join our team, helping with Social Media posts and wanting to begin a Newsletter and Blog which we hope will help us reach new supporters and adopters.

We have also carried out the most TNR sterilisations to date. Something we are very proud of.

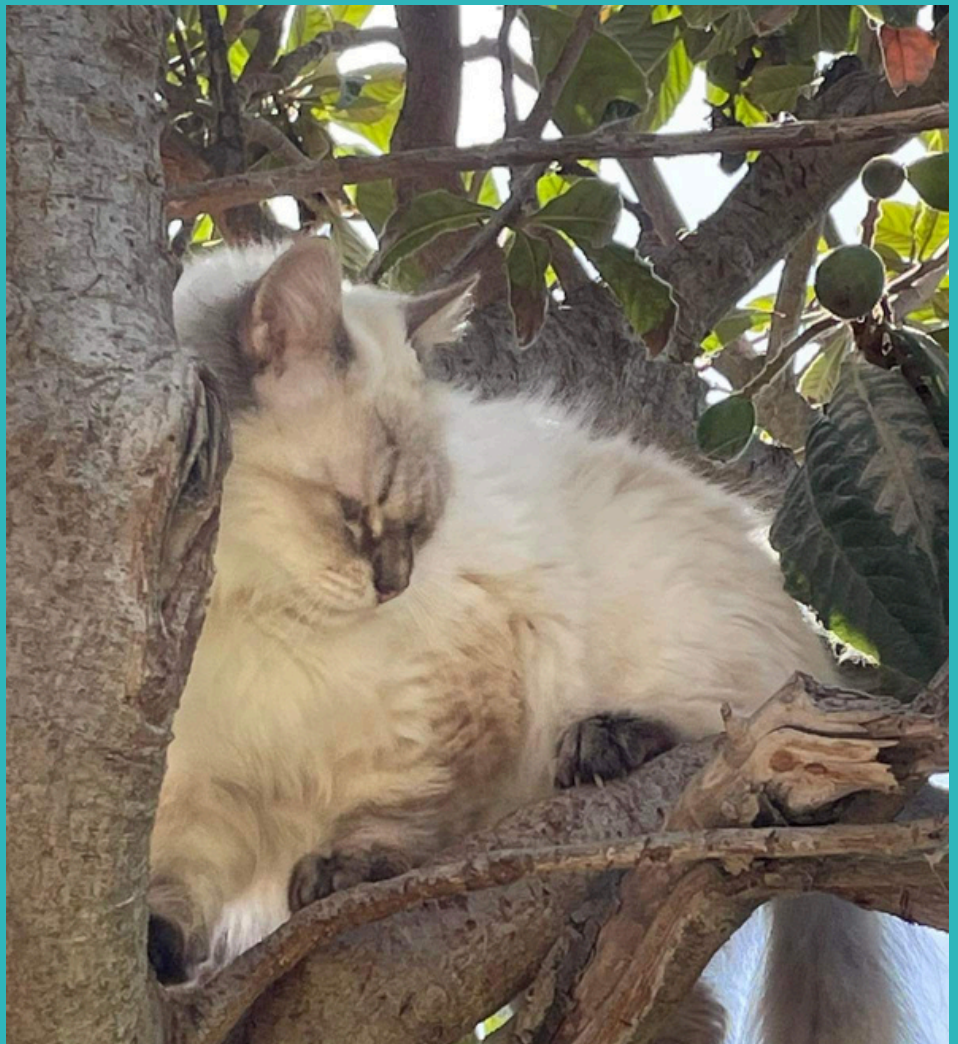
We know Panda would have lived his entire life in the overcrowded shelter if it were not for them, taking a chance on this Gentle Giant.

All trustees serve until they feel they can no longer give the required time and commitment to the charity, as each trustee takes their responsibility to the governance very seriously. Due to the long distances involved to travel to meet face to face, most Trustee meetings are held via online video conferencing (usually Zoom or Whats App video) & recorded, although face to face meetings are arranged where possible.

RANA'S MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

in relation to the objectives set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

Throughout the year we have continued to support the costs of animals we previously agreed to rescue from the streets of Tunisia who were starving and at risk of being shot or poisoned. We have also increased the proportion of our donations on In removing stray unwanted animals from the street we have provided a public benefit by reducing the risk of strays potentially causing car accidents, attacking the public when they are in their large packs and minimising the risk of disease, such as rabies (a huge concern in Africa) spreading.

We have also provided a public benefit to those people who have contacted us in distress at what they have seen, and have taken an interest in wanting to adopt, or save the animal.

We have also provided assistance to those few animal loving volunteers on the ground in Tunisia who frequently give up rooms in their homes to house stray animals, sacrifice feeding themselves in order to feed animals on the streets and who are in desperate need of support in a country which dedicates no Government funding or support to rescuing stray animals.

RANA'S MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

throughout 2022- 2023

2022 - 2023 proved to be another challenging year for RANA.

Covid-19 and Brexit continued to impact heavily on our RANA rescue work. The "Rehoming Market" is very different to one we have ever experienced since RANA was established almost 10 years ago. Unwanted animals which were bought during Lockdown, now saturate the shelters in the UK. People did not think ahead to life beyond lockdown and realised on returning to work, they did not have the time to look after the pets they had purchased, or due to lack of training and exposure to people, dogs were deemed unruly and difficult to handle. This has meant adopters are overwhelmed with the choice of animals they can adopt in the UK.

The Cost of Living Crisis has also impacted on donations and people's ability to adopt and pay to feed another mouth. The adoption rate has therefore plummeted compared with previous years.

We used this year to adapt to a new team of Trustees, setting goals for the next few years and working out how best to 'ride the storm'. We want to ensure RANA survives, we believe as ever we are doing great, important work. We know from our inbox being contacted daily how much people who live in Tunisia, or are on holiday, want to help save animals they see suffering.

We were really proud that we managed to rehome animals this year, even though it was our trickiest year yet. Something we are aware was said last year, but to those animals who have been adopted, saved from the streets, it has changed their lives. We have also reduced suffering in the future by sterilising animals with our TNR campaign.

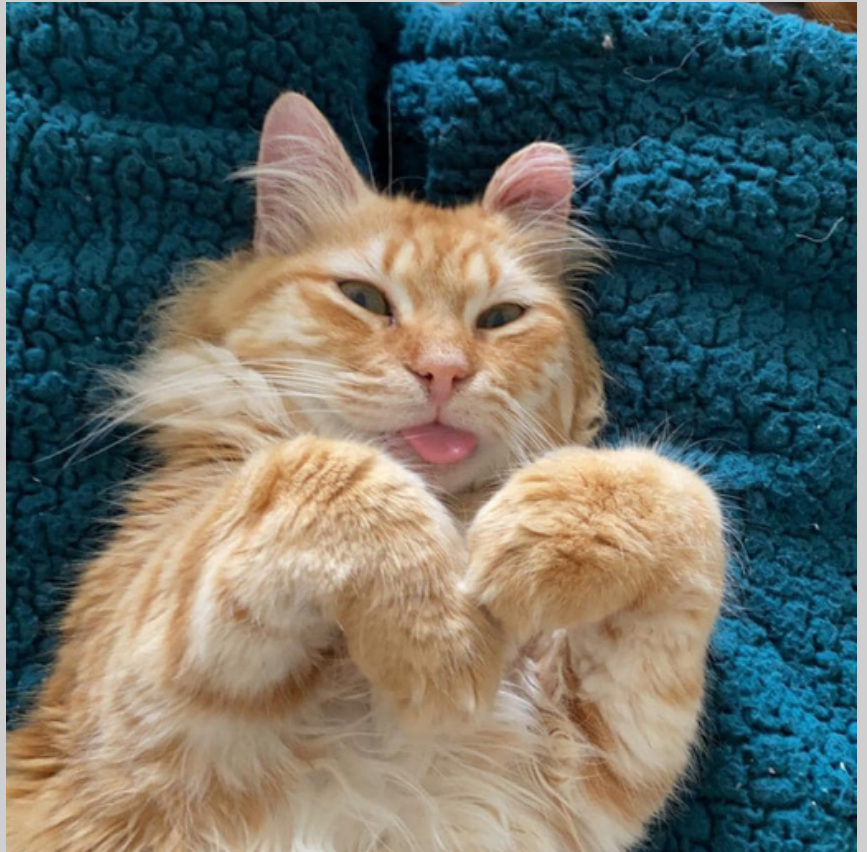
We knew we had to help, so we did just that. Our RANA team on the ground rushed to her aid and with the support of our RANA donators we were able to pay for her large vet bills.

For the benefit of the public to relieve the suffering of animals, in particular dogs and cats, in Libya and Tunisia in need of care and attention and to promote humane behaviour towards such animals by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for such animals which are in need of care and attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animal welfare in general and the prevention of cruelty and suffering among such animals in North Africa."

RANA'S TRUSTEES & ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

as set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

The RANA Charity is overseen by a board of trustees who are approved by the current serving board, none of these trustees are paid for their trusteeship (except for expenses related directly to the charity's activities). It is usually expected that at least one of our trustees travels to Tunisia to meet with fosters, rescuers and vets annually. These visits are important as the board of trustees are responsible for setting the strategic plan and direction of the charity. The trustees are responsible under the law of England and Wales for the correct & lawful operation of RANA. The board of Trustees operates and manages the RANA charity as a non-governmental, non-political, non-religious organisation established in 2013.

All trustees serve until they feel they can no longer give the required time and commitment to the charity, as each trustee takes their responsibility to the governance very seriously. Due to the long distances involved to travel to meet face to face, most Trustee meetings are held via online video conferencing (usually Zoom or Whats App video) & recorded, although face to face meetings are arranged where possible.

RANA'S MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

in relation to the objectives set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

Throughout the year we have successfully rescued many animals (dogs and cats) from the streets of Tunisia who were starving and at risk of being shot or poisoned. In removing stray unwanted animals from the street we have provided a public benefit by reducing the risk of strays potentially causing car accidents, attacking the public when they are in their large packs and minimising the risk of disease, such as rabies (a huge concern in Africa) spreading.

We have also provided a public benefit to those people who have contacted us in distress at what they have seen, and have taken an interest in wanting to adopt, or save the animal.

We have also provided assistance to those few animal loving volunteers on the ground in Tunisia who frequently give up rooms in their homes to house stray animals, sacrifice feeding themselves in order to feed animals on the streets and who are in desperate need of support in a country which dedicates no Government funding or support to rescuing stray animals.

RANA'S MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

throughout 2021- 2022

2021 - 2022 proved to be a really challenging year for RANA.

Covid-19 and Brexit continued to impact heavily on our logistics & Volunteer Team, both privately and in a volunteer capacity. We used this year to focus on prepping animals for travel and fundraising during a very difficult time. We worked on our database to ensure we are organised & fully prepared for when our team grows in the future. We also gained a valuable team member who has been working through the Gift Aid process; a task which will bring in more donations in that can be used to sterilise animals on the ground.

We were really proud that we managed to rehome 57 animals this year, even though it was our trickiest year yet.

We worked with different transporters, with varying degrees of success, but most importantly we refused to give up. With every set back, our committed team focused on the animals and rose to the next challenge.

We are working on a new range of Merchandise to bring in donations and widen our team of Social Media Coordinators so more people will know about our hardworking team and the difference we are making.

RANA'S FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's policy on reserves:

The RANA board of Trustees would like to hold £5,000 in reserve funds as back up for emergency vet bills, which we have managed to achieve this year.

Investment Policy:

The RANA board of trustees have no plans for an investment policy to be put in place as we do not hold funds for investment purposes.



1. Accounting Policies

Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102 1A) in accordance with company law.

Incoming Resources

Donations and legacies are recognised as income when received except where any restrictions on expenditure demand that a proportion be carried forward as deferred income. The donations under Gift Aid are recognised when receivable. Grants and other incoming resources are the actual amounts received in the year.

Resources Expanded

Resources expanded are recognised on an accrual basis. They are allocated to activities based on actual usage. Staff support costs are allocated to the appropriate activity based on the relative amount of time spent on such activities. Premises and other costs are also allocated based on salary costs.

Cost of the activities of the charity's objects comprise those costs incurred by the charity as a result of the delivery of service. Costs of raising funds are associated with attracting voluntary income. Governance costs comprise of costs incurred by the charity in meeting its constitutional and statutory requirements.

Funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purposes and are available as general funds.

6. Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital.

7. Corporation Tax

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable activities.

8. Trustees Declaration

Between 2014 - 2018, in order to assist the Charity with early cash-flow difficulties, one of the RANA Trustees agreed to use their personal bank account to pay for a large number of charitable expenses, and also used their personal car for many charitable missions.

The Trustees agreed that these expenses could be reclaimed from the Charity in an orderly way once donations came in and the Trustees collectively considered the Charity to be on a financially secure footing.

During 2019-2021 a number of these charitable expenses were offset by arranging for personal expenses to be paid from the Charity to the Trustee in question. A number of these expenses have since been declared by the accountant as non-allowable expenses. The accountant has also advised that the attempt to offset in this way against the Trustee's claims against the Charity was improper and impermissible. The Trustee in question is standing down at the conclusion of these accounts.

The remaining Trustees are satisfied that there was no deliberate intention to misuse charity finances and have implemented Charity Expense Guidance into their Governing Document going forward, to prevent any future misinterpretations.

The departing Trustee has agreed to repay the full amount of the non-allowable expenses and has agreed a deadline with the remaining Trustees for this to be repaid in full before the 28th February 2023.

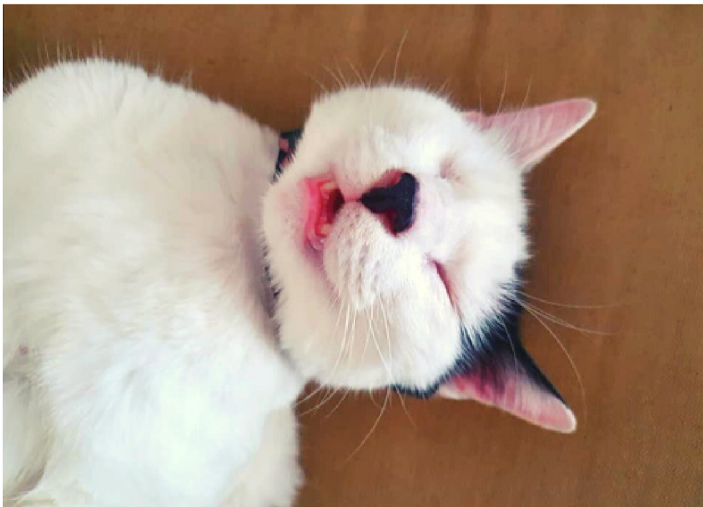

For the benefit of the public to relieve the suffering of animals, in particular dogs and cats, in Libya and Tunisia in need of care and attention and to promote humane behaviour towards such animals by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for such animals which are in need of care and attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animal welfare in general and the prevention of cruelty and suffering among such animals in North Africa."

RANA'S TRUSTEES & ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

as set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

The RANA Charity is overseen by a board of trustees who are approved by the current serving board, none of these trustees are paid for their trusteeship (except for expenses related directly to the charity's activities). It is usually expected that at least one of our trustees travels to Tunisia to meet with fosters, rescuers and vets annually. These visits are important as the board of trustees are responsible for setting the strategic plan and direction of the charity. The trustees are responsible under the law of England and Wales for the correct & lawful operation of RANA. The board of Trustees operates and manages the RANA charity as a non-governmental, non-political, non-religious organisation established in 2013.

All trustees serve until they feel they can no longer give the required time and commitment to the charity as each trustee takes their responsibility to the governance very seriously. Due to the long distances involved to travel to meet face to face, most Trustee meetings are held via online video conferencing (usually Zoom or Whats App video) & recorded, although face to face meetings are arranged where possible.

RANA'S MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

in relation to the objectives set out in our Charity's Governing Document:

Throughout the year we have successfully rescued many animals (dogs and cats) from the streets of Tunisia who were starving and at risk of being shot or poisoned. In removing stray unwanted animals from the street we have provided a public benefit by reducing the risk of strays potentially causing car accidents, attacking the public when they are in their large packs and minimising the risk of disease, such as rabies (a huge concern in Africa) spreading.

We have also provided a public benefit to those people who have contacted us in distress at what they have seen, and have taken an interest in wanting to adopt, or save the animal.

We have also provided assistance to those few animal loving volunteers on the ground in Tunisia who frequently give up rooms in their homes to house stray animals, sacrifice feeding themselves in order to feed animals on the streets and who are in desperate need of support in a country which dedicates no Government funding or support to rescuing stray animals.

RANA'S MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

throughout 2020- 2021

RANA activities were impacted heavily throughout this year by Covid-19 so our adoption rate dropped significantly from previous years.

A lot of our volunteer time during the year was spent updating adopters to ensure they were engaged and committed for their reserved pet . Many of the adopters were hugely supportive & covered their reserved pets additional boarding costs which meant we were able to save other unwanted animals. The number of stray animals on the streets increased daily with people leaving the country, or being concerned that they were at risk of contracting Covid from their animals, so throwing them on the streets. We are very proud of the number of animals we were able to support throughout Covid, which ensured they didn't die from starvation or where shot or poisoned on the street. We hope in the coming years, these animals will also be adopted.

Throughout 2020 - 2021, we also diversified and worked with rescuers in Portugal and Cyprus who had cats waiting to be adopted. These countries faced less Covid restrictions and animals could gain entry to the UK easier. These animals were also living in over crowded, basic conditions and are now enjoying their lives as spoilt British pets.

We had a few adopters take on fundraising projects which raised significant amounts and helped us cover the cost of the additional boarding fees for those animals rescued during lockdown



Due to the lack of flights we also worked with a driver who drove all the donations we received on the ground in the UK out to Tunisia. The boxes were filled full of cat and dog food, medication, flea and tick treatments, blankets, wormers, toys, travel boxes and a cat scratching post.

RANA'S FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's policy on reserves:

The RANA board of Trustees would like to hold £10,000 in reserve funds as back up for emergency vet bills, but currently we are still aiming to pay off loans which were taken out when the charity was first established.

Investment Policy:

The RANA board of trustees have no plans for an investment policy to be put in place as we do not hold funds for investment purposes.

1. Accounting Policies

Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102 1A) in accordance with company law.

Incoming Resources

Donations and legacies are recognised as income when received except where any restrictions on expenditure demand that a proportion be carried forward as deferred income. The donations under Gift Aid are recognised when receivable. Grants and other incoming resources are the actual amounts received in the year.

Resources Expended

Resources expended are recognised on an accrual basis. They are allocated to activities based on actual usage. Staff support costs are allocated to the appropriate activity based on the relative amount of time spent on such activities. Premises and other costs are also allocated based on salary costs.

Cost of the activities of the charity's objects comprise those costs incurred by the charity as a result of the delivery of service. Costs of raising funds are associated with attracting voluntary income. Governance costs comprise of costs incurred by the charity in meeting its constitutional and statutory requirements.

Funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purposes and are available as general funds.

6. Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital.

7. Corporation Tax

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable activities.

8. Trustees Declaration

Between 2014 - 2018, in order to assist the Charity with early cash-flow difficulties, one of the RANA Trustees agreed to use their personal bank account to pay for a large number of charitable expenses, and also used their personal car for many charitable missions.

The Trustees agreed that these expenses could be reclaimed from the Charity in an orderly way once donations came in and the Trustees collectively considered the Charity to be on a financially secure footing.

During 2019-2021 a number of these charitable expenses were offset by arranging for personal expenses to be paid from the Charity to the Trustee in question. A number of these expenses have since been declared by the accountant as non-allowable expenses. The accountant has also advised that the attempt to offset in this way against the Trustee's claims against the Charity was improper and impermissible. The Trustee in question is standing down at the conclusion of these accounts.

The remaining Trustees are satisfied that there was no deliberate intention to misuse charity finances and have implemented Charity Expense Guidance into their Governing Document going forward, to prevent any future misinterpretations.

The departing Trustee has agreed to repay the full amount of the non-allowable expenses and has agreed a deadline with the remaining Trustees for this to be repaid in full before the 28th February 2023.
