The trustees were supported by a number of volunteers who assisted with the delivery of the charity's activities and events.

2. Structure, Governance and Management

ACSA is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) governed by its constitution and managed by a board of trustees. The trustees are responsible for setting the strategic direction of the charity, overseeing finances, and ensuring compliance with charity law and Charity Commission guidance.

Trustees met during the year as required to oversee activities, approve expenditure, and review operations. Governance and administration were carried out on a voluntary basis.

No trustee received remuneration, benefits, or honoraria during the period. The Treasurer managed day-to-day financial administration with trustee oversight of significant expenditure.

3. Objectives and Activities

Charitable Objectives

The objectives of ACSA are to:

- Promote community cohesion and social wellbeing
- Support religious, cultural, and community-based activities
- Provide opportunities for community members to meet, share meals, and strengthen social ties

Public Benefit Statement

The trustees confirm that they have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. All activities were carried out in furtherance of the charity's objectives and were open and accessible to the local community.

4. Review of Activities and Achievements

During the year, ACSA delivered religious, cultural, and community events aimed at strengthening social relationships and promoting inclusion. Key activities included:

- **Eid al-Fitr Community Celebration (April 2024)** – a community meal bringing families together in a welcoming setting.
- **Eid al-Adha Community Gathering (June 2024)** – a public event with affordable meals to encourage wide participation.
- **Ramadan Iftar Event (March 2025)** – a large iftar gathering, the most significant event of the year in terms of attendance and cost.
- **Community and Trustee Meetings** – held to support governance, planning, and effective management.

The trustees consider that these activities successfully advanced the charity's purposes and delivered clear public benefit.

5. Financial Review

The accounts have been prepared on a **receipts and payments basis**, in accordance with the Charities Act 2011.

- **Total income:** £1,557
- **Total expenditure:** £1912
- **Net movement:** Deficit of £355

The deficit reflects the cost of delivering subsidised community events to ensure accessibility and inclusivity. Expenditure was met from existing funds.

Reserves Policy

The trustees aim to maintain modest reserves £5230 in savings accounts to ensure continuity of activities and to meet unforeseen costs. Despite the level of activity during the year, reserves were not reduced. The trustees will seek to rebuild reserves through improved fundraising, careful budgeting, and cost control.

7. Risk Management

The trustees have reviewed the main risks facing the charity, including financial sustainability and reliance on volunteers. Basic financial controls are in place, including oversight of expenditure, maintenance of records, and regular review of cash and bank balances.

8. Plans for the Future

In the coming year, the trustees plan to **expand the charity's activities** by increasing **health and welfare awareness** within the community. ACSA also aims to **engage young people and women** in a wider range of **social, educational, and community-based activities**, supporting inclusion and long-term community development.

In the longer term, the trustees will **explore options and opportunities to secure or develop a dedicated community centre**. This would provide a stable base for the charity's activities, reduce reliance on hired venues, and support the delivery of sustainable community services.

to establish or secure the establishment of a community centre and to maintain or manage or co-operate with any statutory authority in the maintenance and management of such a centre for activities promoted by the charity in furtherance of the above objects.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE:

In planning for our activities in our trustee meetings, we have kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefits. The charity activities are open for disadvantaged people from diverse background in the inner city of London and surrounding boroughs, with focus on those originated from the Horn of Africa.

The charity's incoming resources exceeded its expenditure, and the Trustees are pleased with the results for the seven years of operation of the charity.

The Charity has successfully organised social and cultural events. We organised Eid Fitir on 6 May 2023 at local hired centre and Eid-Adha on 1 July 2023 at Battersea Park. Both Eids are Muslim social events but open to local community. It is a time of joy and blessing for the children and families. We continue to run social clubs' events for the elderly and isolated women in the community. The community centre provides local people with advice and support on ranges of issues welfare, health, housing and immigration.

Outcomes

1. Fostering Unity and Connection

These events provide opportunities for community members to come together, creating a sense of belonging and solidarity.

They help strengthen bonds among individuals, encouraging mutual support and collaboration.

2. Preserving Cultural and Religious Heritage

Celebrating religious and social traditions helps preserve the unique identity of the community.

It allows the transmission of cultural and spiritual values to younger generations, ensuring continuity and pride in their heritage.

3. Promoting Well-Being

Religious gatherings often provide spiritual support and a sense of purpose, while social events encourage relaxation and enjoyment.

Both types of events contribute to mental and emotional well-being by reducing isolation and fostering joy.

4. Encouraging Diversity and Inclusivity

These events showcase the richness of the community's traditions, promoting understanding and respect among members and with the wider society.

They offer a platform for dialogue and shared experiences, bridging generational and cultural gaps.

5. Building Community Resilience

Regular gatherings create a network of support, where members can share challenges and solutions.

They strengthen the community's capacity to address social and economic issues collectively.

6. Empowering the Next Generation

Younger members gain exposure to their cultural and religious roots, fostering a strong sense of identity and pride.

Religious and social events are more than just gatherings; they are a cornerstone of community building, offering lasting benefits to individuals and the collective.

The source of funding our current social activities and social clubs are members' subscriptions and donations.

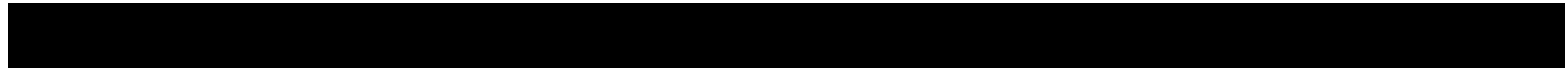

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE:

In planning for our activities in our trustee meetings, we have kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefits. The charity activities are open for disadvantaged people from diverse background in the inner city of London and surrounding boroughs, with focus on those originated from the Horn of Africa.

The charity's income and expenditure are modest but balanced, so the Trustees are pleased with the results and the operation of the charity since its registration in January 2016.

The charity believe this is most successful year since the community established in the since of organising so many programmes and social programmes for the community with aim of alleviating social isolation and give community members and local people a sense of belonging and cohesion.

The Charity was successful in liaising with Queens Park Community and organising a lovely summer trip for the community to Littlehampton seaside. The purpose of the trip is to bring cohesions among people from different background, and to allow people to experience places that they never travelled to in the UK. The children, young people and families enjoyed the trip thoroughly and they would like this activity to continue very summer, some members said they were prepared to contribute towards the cost of funding this kind of social trip. WE were successful in the past to run a homework project which was funded by Award For All. The homework project supported school age children of the community in core subjects-Maths, English and Science. We delivered the project using volunteering and paid tutors. When the project fund came to an end, we continued to deliver the support virtually for some children who continue to need the support.

We were able to organise Ramadan Iftar (breakfast) for the community. The aim was to bring socially isolated people together to breakfast. Ramadan is a month of spiritual reflection, self-improvement, and devotion to Allah. Fasting during Ramadan is an important act of worship that teaches self-discipline, empathy, and spiritual awareness.

The community also organised Eid-Adha in July 2022 at Battersea Park. Eid is a social Muslim event, and it is a time of joy and blessing for the children and families who were happy to see each other in open and green space.

We also managed to organise a very successful award nights in summer 2022 for our community elders and volunteers as we were displaying them as role models for the young and second generation who learned their life story, struggle to migrate make living in the UK.

We continue to run social clubs' events for older and isolated women in our community. The community centre provides local people with advice and support on ranges of issues welfare, health, housing, and immigration.

The source of funding our current social projects are members' subscriptions and donations.

The community will continue to run a regular social club in summer for the isolated people in the community. The activities involved having fun as well as providing awareness around issues related to healthy living, housing, employment, languages, outreach and other support that may be required.

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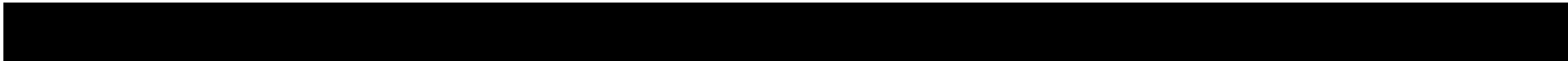

To further or benefit the horn of African British and all other residents in Westminster and surroundings in the inner city of London, without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, race or of political, religious or other opinions by associating together the said residents and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving the conditions of life for the residents.

In furtherance of these objects but not otherwise, the trustees shall have power:

to establish or secure the establishment of a community centre and to maintain or manage or co-operate with any statutory authority in the maintenance and management of such a centre for activities promoted by the charity in furtherance of the above objects.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE:

In planning for our activities in our trustee meetings, we have kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefits. The charity activities are open for disadvantaged people from diverse background in the inner city of London and surrounding boroughs, with focus on those originated from the Horn of Africa.

The charity's incoming resources exceeded its expenditure and the Trustees are pleased with the results for the five year of operation of the charity.

The Charity has successfully completed the home work project funded by Award For this financial year. The homework project supported school age children of the community in core subjects-Maths, English and Science. We delivered the project using volunteering and paid tutors. The project was delivered virtually initially and then at the community centre after lifting of the covid restrictions.

We celebrated the success of the project with the students, tutors and families after the ease of the covid lockdown. We provided the children gifts and awards to acknowledge their progress.

We were **not** able to organise the Eid Fitir this year but we organised Eid-Adha in End of July 21 at Battersea Park. Eid is a social Muslim event and it is a time of joy and blessing for the children and families who were happy to meet each other after long period of social distancing and isolation during covid.

We continue to run social clubs events for the elderly and isolated women in the community. The community centre provides local people with advice and support on ranges of issues welfare, health , housing and immigration.

The source of funding our current social projects are members' subscriptions and donations. The homework club is run from the grant we secured from Award for All whom we thank for making this funding to improve the academic performance of our school age children in core subjects.

The community will continue to run a regular social club in summer for the isolated people in the community. The activities involved having fun as well as providing awareness around issues related to healthy living, housing, employment, languages, outreach and other support that may be required.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The key objective for ACSA remains to acquire a community centre. However, the trustees has yet to secure financial assistance towards that goal. The Trustees intend to continue working with statutory, local partners and the community members to raise enough funds to establish or secure the establishment of a community to promote the charity's set objects. The charity's incoming resources exceeded its expenditure and the Trustees are pleased with the results for the five year of operation of the charity.

The Charity has been successful to secure £10,000 from Award For All to run homework project to support school age children of the community in core subjects-Maths, English and Science. We have managed to secure tutors from the community and other volunteers. The project has been delivered virtually using zoom during the lockdown with plan to be delivered at the centre when the restrictions are over.

We were able to organise the two major Eids for the community. Eid-Fitir party organised in July 2020, and Eid-Adha Party in August-both took place in the open parks after easing of Covid19 restrictions. Both social events were a time of joy and blessing for the children and families who were happy to socialise each other safely after isolation and loneliness.

We continue to run our monthly social clubs-virtually, for young people and advice and support sessions for the elderly isolated community members.

The source of funding our current social projects are members' subscriptions and donations. The homework club is run from the grant secured from Award for All whom we thank for making this funding to improve the academic performance of our school age children in core subjects.

The community will continue to run a regular social clubs in summer for the isolated people in the community. The activities involved having fun as well as providing awareness around issues related to healthy living, housing, employment, languages, outreach and other support that may be required.
