REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 1ST APRIL 2025

The trustees present their report and the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 1st April 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of *Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)* (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The WAT ARUN NORFOLK objectives are to promote Theravada Buddhism for the Thai Community and the public benefit, as follows:

- a) Ultimately establishing a permanent temple where the Dhamma can be studied and taught and where meditation can be practiced.
- b) Using the teaching of Theravada Buddhism and meditation to benefit the Thai Community and public.
- c) Providing support to Buddhist Monks in their studies and pastoral duties.
- d) Raising public awareness of Theravada Buddhism and meditation.

Significant activities

The main activities undertaken in relation to the purposes of the charity are as follows

The Temple is open to the public 365 days a year.

Supporters may follow activities live by streaming on social media. Monks, Temple supporters and visitors participate in morning and evening chanting followed by meditation.

Visitors are made welcome at early lunch that is followed with a blessing by the Monks.

Several Buddhist ceremonies are held throughout the year on special Buddhist days.

There are several significant activities which attract many attendees including Kathina, Songkran (Thai New Year) and Vesak Day. These events include chanting by the Monks, some of whom will be visiting from other Temples followed by a food offering for the Monks and those attending. The events may include a celebration with a parade and music.

WAT ARUN NORFOLK have also used local restaurants for other events which would attract members of the public.

The Monks visit outside organisations to demonstrate chanting and meditation and to carry out blessings.

Volunteers

Many volunteers visit the Temple. The Trustees would like to thank the volunteers for their hard work.

Public benefit

Public benefit is at the heart of what it means to be a charity. Two key principles define this area:

1. There must be identifiable benefits.
2. The benefits must be to the public.

The trustees must state compliance:

1. Review the activities undertaken for the public benefit.
2. State whether they have complied with this duty.

The main activities undertaken to further the charities purposes for the public benefit are described in this report. The aim is to attract as many members of the public as possible to attend the Temple.

The Trustees have reviewed the activities undertaken for the public benefit and confirm their compliance with this duty.

1. Meditation Practice and Dharma Talk at WAT ARUN NORFOLK

WAT ARUN NORFOLK monks support and welcome members of public who are interested in meditation practice and Dharma talk. The Dharma talk is given by monks that is the talk about Dharma principles of the Buddha that can be followed in daily lives of people also available on social media.

Also, the meditation practice will be used in daily life of them with wisdom and consciousness for those who are interested in practicing and participating.

2. Shop/Restaurant/House blessing ceremonies supported by WAT ARUN NORFOLK Monks

Shop, Restaurant and House blessing are a Buddhist tradition that can be found in Buddhist and Thai belief in the United Kingdom. The Buddhist monks are invited to the restaurants/houses/shops (recently moved into or newly owned) where an owner wishes having their premise blessed. Usually, the ceremony is performed by the monks who do blessing and give a holy water as a head monk walks through rooms of a house, restaurant and shop accompanied by the shop or house owner. The monks requested by house or shop owners to anoint front-windows or doors of their properties for prosperity and good luck. Similarly, the blessing home and its occupants are hoped that the family occupying the home or running the shop will be healthy, in prosperity, in good luck, free from bad spirits and successful in business.

3. Vesak Day Sermon ceremony by WAT ARUN NORFOLK

Vesak Day sermon is one of the most important Buddhist festivals. It is also known as Vesak Day or Buddha Day. It is a celebration of Buddha's birthday and for some Buddhists and marks his enlightenment (when he discovered life's meaning). It is also a time to reflect on his teachings and what it means to be a Buddhist.

On the Vesak day, Thai Buddhists like to make merit and offer food to monks in the morning, also arrange sweet and savory deck to make merit and offer food to monks at the temple, including sharing the merit to deceased relatives, doing meditation, listening to sermons, keeping Buddhist precepts that may have other merits such as not doing sins, mainly doing good and following the Buddha's teachings.

Also on that day, there is a ceremony for people to walk around the Buddha statue for 3 rounds in remembrance of the Buddha, Dharma and Buddhist monks where flowers, candles and incense sticks are held as worship. Whilst, walking and calming the mind and remembering the Buddha with chanting Itipiso (Round one). To remember the Dharma with chanting Savaagkhato (Round two) and remembering the Buddhist monks with the recitation of Supatipanno (Round Three).

4. Tod Phapa Ceremony (Robe-Offering ceremony in Buddhism) by WAT ARUN NORFOLK

Offering robes to Buddhist monks at the temple calls making merit known as offering robes that is to give robes to monks, it is one kind of merit making in Buddhism that has existed for long time, the offering robes can be done at any time of the year by providing and support the monastery by this activity. Moreover, this activity strengths unity and love in the community also sharing and helping each other between Thais and monks. Then monks get robes to use, afterwards those Thais receive merit and the merit given to dead relatives, then make a wish for happiness, listen to the Dharma, keep precepts, pray and do meditation either.

5. Funeral ceremony supported by WAT ARUN NORFOLK Monks

A funeral ceremony is Buddhist funeral tradition and rite for the dead persons whose relatives wish his/her soul in peace and make merit for the deceased. The ritual unique to funeral rites is an offering of robe and cloth to monks, this is called 'Pamsukula' that means 'forsaken robe'. Then monks chant and teach Dharma to people and relatives of the dead for the benefits such as the nature of life, life cycle and death called 'Samsara'. The monks support the relatives of the deceased by doing the funeral ceremony either at the Temple or at a relative's house of the deceased.

6. Prayer and meditation ceremony hosted by WAT ARUN NORFOLK

Many of Buddhist festivals such as New Year's Eve festival and so on, praying over the year is the beginning of bringing religious dimensions into the New Year's Eve activity that welcomes the new year with the sound of prosperity, Buddha's blessing and prayers for prosperity, beginning a new prosperous life. Monks at WAT ARUN NORFOLK hosted the praying and meditating ceremony for any people who are interested in the meditation.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Temple activities during the year included the following.

The Temple is functioning 365 days each year.

Each day starts with early morning chanting and meditation that is followed by a food offering to the Monks later in the morning and a blessing from the Monks. Everyone is given a warm welcome.

Evening chanting takes place that is followed by meditation.

The blessings from the Monks are chanted in the traditional Pali Buddhist language.

Events as previously detailed where food is provided free of charge.

Regular events would typically attract the following numbers

Weekday chanting / meditation average of eight participants

Weekend chanting / meditation with more participants

Kathina, Songkran and Vesak Day events 300 each ceremony participants

Financial position

During the year to 1st April 2025.

Reserves policy

The Trustees have reviewed reserves as follows:

The amounts are rounded for clarity.

Steady income is received throughout the year with more income received during April, August and October at the events held at the Temple.

Monthly fixed expenditure for premises runs at £2,500. The reserves policy keeps reserves sufficient to cover two months fixed expenditure. This amounts to £5,000.

Money is being saved to assist with the acquisition of a Temple building. This amounts to £135,000.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable incorporated organisation, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to specific headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year-end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Trustees' Report

2022/23 was a year of consolidation and stabilisation for Wat Arun. The charity has seen a successful growth in numbers and in revenue. Citizens and worshipers come to visit our temple and take part in activities throughout the year.

We have seen the return of five monks from Wat Arun, Bangkok, Thailand, a key contributor in bringing a sense of community and family to our charitable organization and helping to add to the details of our objectives and trends in the years ahead.

The temple is set in peaceful countryside which has brought benefits to the temple, but also some issues with travel and building concerns which have been mostly dealt with by the landlord.

During the past year, Wat Arun has received the support of the Royal Thai Embassy helping the Thai community with the temple. Annual Report updates

WAT ARUN NORFOLK temple in Norfolk became a registered charity with the charity commission in June of 2016. Under the Charities Act 1960, as a charity our purpose is to advance the religion of Buddhism and to create a safe and welcoming place for all cultures who wish to follow the Buddhist ways. WAT ARUN is governed by its constitution and is organisationally and financially independent from other groups with similar objectives.

The temple is pleased to know that many people have been practicing at their own time and have continued to make a very good progress on their meditation practice.

Our existing trustees are deemed to be competent in their roles, however, new ways of engaging and training existing and new trustees are being sought. Our aim as a charity is to provide support and confidence to anyone wishing to become a part of the board of trustees. We understand this is a rewarding and sometimes overwhelming role and that providing full support where we can will be of benefit to all with our future aims and objectives.

Management and running of the day to day principles of the charity are provided by the generosity of unpaid volunteers and resident monks. The vision to expand and grow in the future with the needs of the charity may require a small team of paid employees.

As new roles for a small team of paid employees are created, it is hoped, that new volunteers will be inspired to take on other duties, this will give continuity and strength of depth and position the charity for the challenges ahead.

Objectives of the charity

The objectives of the charity are to advance the Buddhist religion and to advance the education of the public in the beliefs and traditions of the Buddhist religion and Thai culture.

As set out in our constitution, the primary objective is to advance the teachings and religion of Buddhism. We can achieve this in many ways, only having been formed for a short time, the way our charity carries this out is through the guidance of our resident monks at prayer times and through monthly seminars based at the temple. Prayer books are provided in Thai and English language.

A more formal approach and strategy is to create a small group of volunteers who will take forward the ideas and link them with the values of the temple and its teachings, all ideas relating to activities will be discussed at a special meeting of the board of trustees and priorities given to those that link with the teaching and culture of Buddhism to attract a diverse range of people. Some activities that have been suggested are, Buddhism culture and values, meditation classes, language and cookery classes, provide a venue for people with social issues or those that wish to seek assistance with life issues. Suggestions have also



been put forward to work with local organisations and schools to provide a realistic view of the culture and teachings of Buddhism.

Mission and achievements during the year

As a Thai Buddhist monastery in the UK we fully support monks from Thailand to support the community locally, nationally and internationally.

In educational areas both for the Thai community and English society, monks have been taking care for two crossing cultures, the West and the East.

The charity also visits lots of children in local schools in and around Norfolk. Over 100 - 300 students have visited the Temple throughout the year.

We also provide buddhism classes free of charge throughout the year.

Other activities undertaken during the year included:

- provision of meditation and mindfulness classes.
- provision of classes on Buddhist studies.
- provision of a retreat.
- holding of festivals and Buddhist celebrations.
- school visits.
- provision of classes for special needs for both children and adults.
- training monks from other monasteries.
- provision of InterFaith meetings.
- community faith.
- support of students at university.
- chaplaincy for students.
- support all of the Thai community nationally.
- help those who need support including referring to specialists where required.

Achievements and Performance

Going in to our current year, discussions will commence on how WAT ARUN NORFOLK can offer more to the wider community and seek ways to engage with the Norfolk people, currently we are looking as successful models already being implemented by other Temples around the country, especially those temples that WAT ARUN NORFOLK have a close affiliation with.

Since operating as an established Temple, we have successfully entertained many local, national and international people at our celebrations that are held throughout the year.

Financial Review

Funding sources – WAT ARUN NORFOLK is a self-funding charity with a voluntary donation structure where all events and celebrations offered by the charity are free to attend, this allows people to purchase items, raffle tickets and donate willingly to the charity, all voluntary time is given at present free of charge with costs met for out of pocket expenses, mainly the supply and preparation of food for all events. WAT ARUN NORFOLK also offer the additional facility to donate via direct debit/standing orders monthly, donation envelopes are readily available at the temple and at our outside events. It is the intention of the committee to look at budgets in the coming year and focus on allocation for capital projects. Investment – At present, WAT ARUN NORFOLK have



limited tangible assets and no investment assets. This will be high on the agenda for discussion in the future, and the purchase of a suitable property is high on the charities priority list. This is proving more difficult than previously expected, as good quality suitable places are not currently appearing on the market.

Future planning and proofing

Making the charity fit for the future is a priority which all stakeholders are willing to work Towards. This will give WAT ARUN NORFOLK a substantial acceptance within Norfolk and the local community and assist us in embedding our values and principles to those that wish to seek out and involve themselves in the Buddhist faith. The charity has made a commitment to continue with its objectives and our sponsors and spiritual home WAT ARUN BANGKOK, are assisting WAT ARUN NORFOLK 100%. The head Monk from WAT ARUN BANGKOK has made clear his aspirations for the future and the continued existence of WAT ARUN NORFOLK. His beliefs are to offer the people of Norfolk and the UK, a safe and welcoming place for people to learn and practice the faith of Buddhism.

The application for immigration sponsorship has been awarded and this enabled 2 monks to come to the temple on longer term (2 year) visas with rights to work. This is an important step forward in enabling the long-term establishment of the temple.

Moving forward, as our community becomes more diverse, we see the need to enhance the quality of English Language for our Volunteer Charity Workers to reduce the language barrier to enhance more of culture exchange. Therefore, we are planning to organise English Language course for our charity workers to attend. Also continue to improve communication channels, such as more interactive on social media for quick and effective communication.

During 2021 a founding trustee was discovered to have misappropriated significant funds. This was reported to the police and criminal prosecution has resulted. The trustee was dismissed, and a new treasurer appointed who has introduced safeguards that were previously lacking. We are sad that the trust placed in the trustee was abused but have learnt from this and now have far greater transparency.

Future planning and proofing

Over the past 5 years, the charity has seen consistent growth in the number of citizens and worshippers that visit our temple and take part in activities throughout the year. However, 2021, the year of COVID19 pandemic was a different year for us along with so many other charities, organisations and people worldwide.

We suffered from the effects of the COVID-19 epidemic. In particular, travel restrictions meant monks from Thailand were in residence for far less time throughout the year and most fundraising events and festivals could not be held due to lockdowns and other restrictions. This had a significant impact on our finances and on the community.

Our charity continues to rely on the generosity of our supporters in the UK and Thailand and we will continue to introduce additional activities to expand our reach to the local community and beyond. It includes meditation classes. cooking class Social help and support

A notable success during the year was teaming up with local people and Thai restaurants to produce free meals to support all NHS staff at the NNUH Hospital in Norwich. On seven separate occasions, 500 meals were produced and delivered to the staff to help in their time off need which led to Wat Arun being awarded winner of NNUH Charity Champion COVID-19 in 2020. We extend our thanks for the tremendous support and help that has been received.



Community Engagement

The Temple is working towards increasing activity within the community. Excellent relations have been established with the Local Police, and we consult with our local Police liaison officer prior to all events,

WAT ARUN has seen an increase in the number of different cultures coming together and wishing either to learn about Buddhism or have a history of following Buddhism, this is an area whereas an organisation we will challenge ourselves to continue to bring different cultures together.

Trustees Annual Report 2021

Structure, Governance and management

WAT ARUN NORFOLK temple in Norfolk became a registered charity with the charity commission in June of 2016.

Under the Charities Act 1960, as a charity our purpose is to advance the religion of Buddhism and to create a safe and welcoming place for all cultures who wish to follow the Buddhist ways. WAT ARUN is governed by its constitution and is organisationally and financially independent from their groups with similar objectives.

Our existing trustees are deemed to be competent in their roles, however, new ways of engaging and training existing and new trustees are being sought, our aim as a charity is to provide support and confidence to anyone wishing to become a part of the board of trustees. We understand this is a rewarding and sometimes overwhelming role and that providing full support where we can will be of benefit to all with our future aims and objectives.

Management and running of the day to day principles of the charity are provided by the generosity of unpaid volunteers and resident monks. The vision to expand and grow in to the future with the needs of the charity may require a small team of paid employees, the structure

of how this is achieved and implemented will be discussed in 2022 (date TBC)

As new roles for a small team of paid employees are created, it is hoped, that new volunteers will be inspired to take on other duties, this will give continuity and strength of depth and position the charity for the challenges ahead.

Objectives of the charity

As set out in our constitution, the primary objective is to advance the teachings and religion of Buddhism. We can achieve this in many ways, only having been formed for a short time, the way our charity carry this out is through the guidance of our resident monks at prayer times and through monthly seminars based at the temple. Prayer books are provided in Thai and English language.

A more formal approach and strategy is to create a small group of volunteers who will take forward the ideas and link them with the values of the temple and its teachings, all ideas relating to activities will be discussed at a special meeting of the board of trustees (date TBC) and priorities given to those that link with the teaching and culture of Buddhism to attract a diverse range of people, some activities that have been suggested are, Buddhism culture and values, meditation classes, language and cookery classes, provide a venue for people with social issues or those that wish to seek assistance with life issues, suggestions have also been put forward to work with local organisations and schools to provide a realistic view of the culture and teachings of Buddhism.

Achievements and Performance

During our last year of operating as a charity, our achievements have been limited by the pandemic. Going in to our current year, discussions will commence on how WAT ARUN NORFOLK can offer more to the wider community and seek ways to engage with the Norfolk people, currently we are looking as successful models already being implemented by other Temples around the country, especially those temples that WAT ARUN NORFOLK have a close affiliation with. We have been invited by a number of schools to talk to students about the Buddhist faith, this we are currently encouraging and benefiting from in an outreach method.

Since operating as an established Temple, we have successfully entertained many local, national and international people at our celebrations that are held throughout the year to

celebrate Khatina and Songkran festivals.

We are currently applying for a status which will allow a permanent monk to reside at the temple (2 year minimum) this will create more stability for our worshippers and ensure continuity in our activities.

Financial Review

Funding sources – WAT ARUN NORFOLK is a self-funding charity with a voluntary donation structure where all events and celebrations offered by the charity are free to attend, this allows people to purchase items, raffle tickets and donate willingly to the charity, all voluntary time is given at present free of charge with costs met for out of pocket expenses, mainly the supply and preparation of food for all events. WAT ARUN NORFOLK also offer the additional facility to donate via direct debit/standing orders monthly, donation envelopes are readily available at the temple and at our outside events.

This is our fifth financial year and due to the pandemic, unsurprisingly revenue was significantly reduced while fixed costs remained fairly static. No national or local government financial assistance was available to the charity during the 2020/21 period.

Future planning and proofing

Making the charity fit for the future is a priority which all stakeholders are willing to work towards, this will give WAT ARUN NORFOLK a substantial acceptance within Norfolk and the local community, and assist us in embedding our values and principles to those that wish to seek out and involve themselves in the Buddhist faith. The charity has made a commitment to continue with its objectives and our sponsors and spiritual home WAT ARUN BANGKOK, are assisting WAT ARUN NORFOLK 100%. The head Monk from WAT ARUN BANGKOK has made clear his aspirations for the future and future existence of WAT ARUN NORFOLK, his beliefs are to offer the people of Norfolk and the UK, a safe and welcoming place for people to learn and practice the faith of Buddhism.

Risk Management

The recommendations from the charity commission are that all affiliated charities carry out a risk assessment to ensure and satisfy themselves that all manageable risks have been identified where reasonably practicable, and sufficient management plans are structured and

put in place to negate any risk to the charity. The following need reviewing and implementing for the following years ahead.

- Financial record keeping – already improved in 2021 and further improvements using a
- Public liability
- Safeguarding
- Risk Assessment policies

Volunteers

Volunteers are the backbone of the charity, without whom WAT ARUN NORFOLK could not operate or function, a priority for 2021 is to engage with and recruit more volunteers in greater numbers, this will ensure the longevity of the charity and engage with more people at a local level, it is the intention of the charity to bring closer together those that wish to follow the Buddhist faith, by bringing on board volunteers this will, encourage confidence and help spread the message of the principle objectives of the charity.

Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The trustees of WAT ARUN NORFOLK are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and UK accounting standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

The law that applies to charities in (England & Wales/Northern Ireland) requires trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which provide a true account of the charities financial affairs, the incoming resources and application of resources for the financial year. In the preparation of financial statements, the trustees are required to:


