The main activities undertaken in relation to these objectives during the period 1 April 2024 to 31 March 2025 have been:

- Providing a grant to the Fellowship of Christians in Government (FOCIG) - an NGO in the Philippines that shares our objectives (see <https://www.facebook.com/FOCIG/>)
- Providing a grant to Peace and Hope International (<https://peaceandhopeinternational.org/>) to enable 9 Christian leaders to attend the Integrity and Good Governance Working Group at a meeting of the Initiative of the Americas for Transformation and Reconciliation (see <https://www.iaptr.com/sobrenosotros>), held in Buenos Aires, Argentina in Summer 2024.

The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The public in low and middle income countries benefits from the activities of FIG because:

- Corruption harms the public.
- Christian organizations in some low and middle income countries are helping Christians who hold positions of authority in the public and private sectors try to prevent and fight corruption in the workplace. For example, FOCIG is a government-accredited Philippine NGO that delivers training seminars on moral values and leadership for thousands of staff in the police, armed forces, and other government departments. It also works intensively with small numbers of very senior officers, encouraging them as they try to use their authority to ensure that deals are honest, extra-judicial killings are investigated and elections are fair. FIG supports the work of FOCIG financially, thereby contributing to better control of corruption in the Philippines, faster economic growth and better provision of public services.

Achievements and performance

The Trustees met online on two occasions, and corresponded several times by email, during the period 1 April 2024 to 31 March 2025. They reviewed reports from FOCIG, and approved a grant to FOCIG of £5,555. The Trustees approved a grant of £4,848 to Peace and Hope International (<https://peaceandhopeinternational.org/>) to enable 9 Christian leaders to attend the Public Integrity track of a meeting of the Initiative of the Americas for Transformation and Reconciliation, held in Buenos Aires, Argentina during the period 30 July – 3 August 2024. The Trustees approved travel scholarships totaling £3,154 to enable 2 Christian leaders to attend the Public Integrity track of the Lausanne Congress in Seoul during the period 22-28 September 2024. The Trustees approved a grant of £1,000 to support the administrative costs of the Faith and Public Integrity Network.

Financial review

FIG began the period 1 April 2024 to 31 March 2025 with a balance of £49,465. During this period FIG received no income and expenditure was £14,846, leaving a balance of £34,619 on 31 March 2025. The Trustees do not consider it necessary to hold any other reserves because FIG has no financial liabilities.

Structure, governance and management

FIG is constituted as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, and is governed by a Constitution that is closely modelled on the Charity Commission Foundation Model Constitution.

The Trustees of FIG are chaired by Martin Allaby, who also chairs the Trustees of FPIN. The Trustees of FIG have agreed that Martin's role as chair of FPIN will be noted as an interest and, in circumstances where it could be a conflict of interest (e.g. when FIG is considering grants to FPIN), Martin will provide any relevant information, but will then stand aside from the discussion and decision making process.

The methods used to recruit and appoint new charity trustees are as follows:

- (1) Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees.
- (2) In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.



- Providing grants to the Evangelical Alliance of Kenya to help fund a Consultation on Justice, Accountability and Public Integrity that was held in Nairobi in March 2023.

The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The public in low and middle income countries benefits from the activities of FIG because:

- Corruption harms the public.
- Christian organizations in some low and middle income countries are helping Christians who hold positions of authority in the public and private sectors try to prevent and fight corruption in the workplace. For example, FOCIG is a government-accredited Philippine NGO that delivers training seminars on moral values and leadership for thousands of staff in the police, armed forces, and other government departments. They reviewed reports from FOCIG, and approved a grant to FOCIG of £5,581. The Trustees approved a grant of £1,020 for legal advice to assist the FPIN with its registration with the E&W Charity Commission.

The Trustees provided funding of £24,853 towards the cost of a Consultation on Justice, Accountability and Public Integrity that was held in Nairobi in March 2023. This Consultation was jointly organized by the FPIN and the Evangelical alliance of Kenya and was attended by approximately 70 Christian leaders from 10 countries in Eastern and Southern Africa.

Financial review



Enabling and aiding Christians in public and private sectors in low and middle income countries to promote the sound administration and development of the law, according to the tenets of their faith.
2. The promotion of ethical standards of conduct and compliance with the law in the public and private sectors in low and middle income countries.

The main activities undertaken in relation to these objectives during the period 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022 have been:

- Providing a grant to the Fellowship of Christians in Government (FOCIG) - an NGO in the Philippines that shares our objectives (see <https://www.facebook.com/FOCIG/>)
- Helping the Faith and Public Integrity Network (FPIN - <https://fpinetwork.org/>) to organise webinars on anti-corruption issues.

The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The public in low and middle income countries benefits from the activities of FIG because:

- Corruption harms the public.
- Christian organizations in some low and middle income countries are helping Christians who hold positions of authority in the public and private sectors try to prevent and fight corruption in the workplace. For example, FOCIG is a government-accredited Philippine NGO that delivers training seminars on moral values and leadership for thousands of staff in the police, armed forces, and other government departments. It also works intensively with small numbers of very senior officers, encouraging them as they try to use their authority to ensure that deals are honest, extra-judicial killings are investigated and elections are fair. FIG supports the work of FOCIG financially, thereby contributing to better control of corruption in the Philippines, faster economic growth and better provision of public services.
- By bringing together Christian leaders who share our goals through the Faith and Public Integrity Network, there is potential to multiply the positive impact of Christians who want to reduce the harmful effects of corruption.

Achievements and performance

The Trustees met in person on only one occasion (because of COVID-19), and corresponded several times by email, during the period 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022. They reviewed reports from FOCIG, and approved a grant to FOCIG of £5,348.

The Trustees provided funding of £2,589 towards the costs of employing the FPIN network coordinator.

Financial review

FIG began the period 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022 with a balance of £19,650. During this period FIG's income was £33,335 and expenditure was £7,999, leaving a balance of £44,986 on 31 March 2022. The Trustees do not consider it necessary to hold any other reserves because FIG has no financial liabilities.

Structure, governance and management

FIG is constituted as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, and is governed by a Constitution that is closely modelled on the Charity Commission Foundation Model Constitution.

The methods used to recruit and appoint new charity trustees are as follows:

- (1) Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees.
- (2) In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.


