Ehsas Carers is affiliated to Dudley Council for Voluntary Service which provides advice and support.

Ehsas has a complaints and a day trip policy in place.

Ehsas has a partnership agreement with Diverse Support Limited (care provider for people with learning disabilities from black and Asian minority ethnic communities) with whom we share and manage the premises called Meeting Place. This enables black and Asian minority ethnic (BAME) family carers to have a community based drop in centre where they can seek information and support. Diverse Support provides 'in kind' support with their manager available to provide advice and support to family carers, coordinates carer support activities, assists with fund raising and provides administrative support to the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no remuneration or other benefits.

For the public benefit, the relief and assistance of members of the Asian community and other ethnic minorities in Dudley borough and the surrounding areas, who provide unpaid care to family members with disabilities or additional needs, through the provision of accessible information, peer support, social and emotional help and services that will improve their quality of life; and through communicating between carers, policy makers and other services that support carers, enabling carers to have an effective voice and an informed representation in policy making and service development.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)

In planning our activities we are mindful of the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit at our trustee meetings.

Our activities focus on four themes:

1. Increasing knowledge: we provide advice surgeries for carers, training and information workshops.
2. Advocacy: Raising issues and concerns affecting ethnic minority family carers with statutory organisations.
3. Outreach support to isolated carers: We receive referrals from black and Asian minority ethnic (BAME) carers and offer an outreach service particularly if there are language and cultural barriers. This includes home visiting those that need support, liaising with social services and other statutory agencies and assisting with advocacy/ interpretation.
4. Respite and social interaction: We recognise that carers struggle to get out so provide respite days out just for carers. We also provide day trips for families - the carer and the cared for person - with the option for them to bring other family members. This gives carers the opportunity to take a break from the stresses of their lives and to feel less isolated. Where possible, we facilitate carer social interaction by providing 'coffee mornings' and cultural events.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Ehsas Carers was established as an unincorporated association (carers support group) in 2004 and became a Charitable Incorporated Organisation in 2016.

With the emergence of Coronavirus last year, Ehsas had to realign its work to support vulnerable families during the pandemic.

We worked closely with Dudley Council for Voluntary Service's Integrated Plus locality link worker(s) who could make referrals of families who have children with complex health needs and disabilities.

These families have loved ones who were often classed as 'clinically extremely vulnerable' and had received the Government's shielding letters. We provided the following assistance:

- Well-being support calls, and provided befriending support to families who were socially isolated & feeling stressed about Covid-19
- We received a grant to buy two laptops to support families to continue having appointments/ meetings with various health, social services and other public authority professionals via online video calls.
- The project co-ordinator, however, was nonetheless available to field enquiries and offer support to family carers in significant need.
- The project co-ordinator joined Dudley's Covid-19 Community Champions network to be aware of the latest developments, and to provide information to families as required.

Research increasingly emerged of public health evidence of higher health risks relating to Covid-19 for people from Black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) communities.

Due to Covid restrictions, greater risks for BAME communities particularly our beneficiaries being parent-carers of children/ adult children classed as 'clinically extremely vulnerable', Ehsas agreed to suspend the Carers Link Worker project and group activities, with due regard to reduce risk of Covid infections posed by gatherings, meetings and families getting together for day trips etc.

Independent Examiner's Report
