<p>Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year</p>	<p>The trustees of CCC UK are pleased to present this seventh Annual Report to the Charity Commission.</p> <p>At the close of the previous reporting period (i.e. 31st December 2023) CCC UK's cash funds stood at £ £12,393. CCC UK's donations during the CCC UK Annual Return reporting period have come principally from individual donors and fundraising campaigns, but also donations from faith groups and a charitable foundation. By the end of the reporting period (2024) CCC UK had received £8,296 in voluntary receipts via donations and fundraising. The CCC UK Trustees would like to express our gratitude to our supporters for their ongoing partnership in this critical work.</p> <p>CCC UK is also very grateful for any generous one-off donations.</p> <p>Given various prominent crises around the world, fundraising for this cause is becoming increasingly difficult in the UK, particularly as a small charity, but CCC UK is keen to work to support continued education for at least some of the most vulnerable South Sudanese children, especially those girls we know personally and have supported since CCC UK's foundation.</p>

	<p>In previous reporting period the CCC UK Board had decided continuing support to those South Sudanese refugee children who are at the moment being supported by Confident Children Uganda. Many of these were previously supported from a young age when they lived in Juba, South Sudan.</p> <p>CCC UK's Chair of Trustees was resident in Kampala, Uganda for part of this year, which was especially helpful for communication between trustees and the management of Confident Children Uganda. We also received school reports, photos and updates on the progress the children are making at school and those who have graduated.</p> <p>We gave a commitment to continue to fund the Support Worker for Confident Children Uganda and to continue to fund the education of the girls CCC UK has been supporting. In addition, through its contingency CCC UK was able to provide bridge funding to support other young children who needed support. The commitment was \$7,600.</p> <p>The Support Worker has supported the girls for around 11 years now, both in South Sudan and now in Uganda. She cares for the children during the holidays in the charity's house in Kampala and supports them with the co-ordination of their education during term time, as well as cares for them pastorally throughout the year. The funds for the girls cover their school fees, school materials, toiletries, medical costs and a contribution to costs of living in the main Confident Children Uganda house during holidays.</p>
Achievements continued.	At the close of the reporting period CCC UK had a balance of £20, 464 and the charity's trustees were in consultation Confident Children Uganda on support for 2025.

By the end of the reporting period CCC UK had received £8,962 in voluntary receipts via donations and fundraising. The CCC UK Trustees would like to express our gratitude to our supporters for their ongoing partnership in this critical work.</p> <p>CCC UK is also very grateful for any generous one-off donations.</p> <p>We had 5 formal meetings during this period. Given various prominent crises around the world, fundraising for this cause is becoming increasingly difficult in the UK, particularly as a small charity, but CCC UK is keen to work to support continued education for at least some of the most vulnerable South Sudanese children, especially those girls we know personally and have supported since CCC UK's foundation.</p> <p>Due to impact of the pandemic and economic developments,</p>

the number of children whose school fees CCC in Juba has supported has also reduced by almost a third in 2021. This was due to children dropping out, in addition to many pressures on education partners, and difficulties of following up on the large number of children who are out of school. CCC has also particularly struggled. The school schedule in South Sudan returned to its pre-pandemic calendar with schools starting on 9th February 2023 to align with the rest of East Africa.

During this period CCC moved to a new centre on the outskirts of Juba, with the girls and boys living at the new centre moved to schools closer to it. The education programme has changed significantly over the last few years. The original programme which supported children across Juba living in very challenging conditions, could no longer be sustained by CCC.

For 2023 CCC requested that CCC UK pay for the education of 50 children. There was a range of correspondence throughout the year regarding the education programme in Juba. Originally CCC UK were paying for the school fees of children living in deprivation in the community, as well as for those living at the CCC residential centre. The fees in 2023 were sought for children living at the new residential centre only. Board members agreed to transfer £5000 as a contribution towards these education costs. Part of this grant (up to \$1000) could be used towards overhead costs to administer the Education Programme and the Board were told there was no Education Officer on board during this period.

Due to the significant change to CCC South Sudan's education programme, CCC UK's vision to support continued education for some of the poorest of the poor and the difficulty in fundraising, CCC UK had to make the difficult decision to downscale and focus its support. The CCC UK Board decided to do so by continuing support to those children who the trustees know personally from their time in South Sudan and whom they have supported the longest, and who are at the moment being supported by Confident Children Uganda. The likelihood that support to CCC South Sudan would come to an end had been raised previously, but the final decision was communicated to CCC South Sudan and we look forward to seeing how the organisation will develop in its new home.

CCC UK's Chair of Trustees was resident in Kampala, Uganda for part of this year, which was especially helpful for communication between trustees and the management of Confident Children Uganda, as well as the children directly throughout the year via video calls. We also received school reports, photos and updates on the progress the children are making at school and those who have graduated.

	<p>We transferred £6,260 to continue to fund the Support Worker for Confident Children Uganda and to continue to fund the education of the girls CCC UK has been supporting. In addition, through its contingency CCC UK was able to provide bridge funding to support three other young children who were in need of a donor.</p> <p>The Support Worker who has supported the girls for around 10 years now, both in South Sudan and now in Uganda, cares for the children during the holidays in the charity's house in Kampala and supports them with the co-ordination of their education during term time, as well as cares for them pastorally throughout the year. The funds for the girls cover their school fees, school materials, toiletries, medical costs and a contribution to costs of living in the main Confident Children Uganda house during holidays.</p>
Achievements continued.	At the close of the reporting period CCC UK had a balance of £12,393 and the charity's trustees were in consultation Confident Children Uganda on support for 2024.

	<p>CCC has a centre in the South Sudanese capital Juba where it houses over 80 vulnerable young children from 18 months to 17 years old. These are mainly girls who have in the past been affected by poverty, gender-based violence and many displaced by internal conflict in the country. CCC also funds the education of several hundred other children throughout the world's newest, but poorest country. Around 40 South Sudanese children who were previously supported by CCC in Juba are now being supported in Boarding School by Confident Children Uganda.</p> <p>In addition to funding CCC, we occasionally fund organisations that support the education and training of vulnerable young people in South Sudan. At present our support is limited to South Sudanese children.</p> <p>We only fund organisations which are known to the trustees. We do not accept unsolicited requests for funding.</p> <p>All trustees have read the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and have had regard for this guidance in all decision making.</p>
<p>Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year</p>	<p>The trustees of CCC UK are pleased to present this sixth Annual Report to the Charity Commission.</p> <p>At the close of the previous reporting period (i.e. 31st December 2021) CCC UK's cash funds stood at £25,266. CCC UK's donations during the CCC UK Annual Return reporting period have come principally from individual donors and fundraising campaigns, but also donations from faith groups and a charitable foundation. By the end of the reporting period CCC UK was receiving just over £380 in regular monthly giving. The CCC UK Trustees would like to express our gratitude to our supporters for their ongoing partnership in this critical work.</p> <p>CCC UK is also very grateful for generous one-off donations (including three large anonymous donations).</p> <p>The Board of CCC UK was also encouraged to hear that other partners have continued to support the work of Confident Children out of Conflict in South Sudan in 2022 and was in communication with the two known partners who also support</p>

the education programme.

We had six formal meetings during this period, with a number of fundraising calls to support a focused Christmas fundraising challenge undertaken by Trustees and their friends. This was called Journey to Juba where the group sought to make the Journey to Juba via different means of self-propelled travel: run, walk, cycle (not sure if there was anything interesting?). Owing to logistical and security challenges, this was a virtual challenge covering the distance from London to Juba. However we were delighted to make our goal just before the New Year as planned.


The continued impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, in addition to the extremely volatile situation in South Sudan meant that Confident Children Out Of Conflict (CCC) in Juba faced very challenging circumstances. As a consequence of the long school closure many children across South Sudan dropped out of school. The largest group of out-of-school children are girls. The number of children whose school fees CCC in Juba has supported has also dropped by almost a third in 2021 due to children dropping out and with the many pressures on education partners and difficulties of following up on the large number of children who are out of school, CCC Juba has also struggled, along with all the others. CCC UK is keen to continue to work to support continued education for at least some of the most vulnerable children, especially girls.

The CCC Juba centre began the build for a new centre in Juba which was being funded by UNMISS. The church which had originally given the land for CCC in central Juba needed it back and funding was sought from different partners to continue to offer care for children who could not live with their families so a new building on the outskirts of Juba was being built during this time.

Throughout this period there were 51 girls and 17 boys in the centre. The CCC UK Chair and one Trustee met with CCC director in January 2022 who explained that costs overall have gone up and that education fees have rocketed in the last 18 months. From USD25/child/year, it is now USD150/child/year. We agreed to fund £12,000 for the education programme with a proportion of costs used for administration and costs towards employing an Education officer since the previous member of staff in this post had left. With support costs it was agreed that this funding could support 50 children. A list of names and schools was provided for trustees.

	<p>On the basis of the receipt of the annual education report for 2021 Board members agreed to transfer £12,000.</p> <p>Schools in Uganda were closed for most of 2021 year so we were delighted that they reopened in January 2022 for over 40 children who Confident Children are supporting at boarding school in Uganda. We sent on letters in January from the children to a range of donors and individuals who supported these children when they were in the centre in South Sudan.</p> <p>One of our trustees visited the house in Kampala in March and trustees spoke to children throughout the year via video call and received school reports, photos and updates on the progress the children are making at school.</p> <p>We contributed £500 towards travel for 40 children to the South Sudanese border to have their refugee status renewed. We transferred £7462.80 to fund the Support Worker, the 3 Children CCC UK Funds, as well as helping out 3 other young children. The Support Worker lives with the children during the holidays and supports them with co-ordination of their education during term time. The funds for the 3 girls cover their school fees, school materials, toiletries, medical costs and a contribution to costs of living the main CCC Uganda Kampala house during holidays. We were able to provide bridge funding for 3 young children who came from South Sudan to Uganda due to challenging situations in their home circumstances. CCC UK paid for two terms of tuition, medicals and educational materials.</p>

The CCC UK Trustees would like to express our gratitude to our supporters for their ongoing partnership in this critical work.</p> <p>CCC UK is also very grateful for generous one-off donations (including three large anonymous donations).</p> <p>The Board of CCC UK was also encouraged to hear that other partners have continued to support the work of Confident Children out of Conflict in South Sudan in 2021 and was in communication with the two known partners who also support the education programme.</p> <p>The continued impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, in addition to the extremely volatile situation in South Sudan meant that Confident Children Out Of Conflict (CCC) in Juba faced very challenging circumstances. Schools in South Sudan had closed in mid-March 2020 due to the pandemic and the education programmes CCC UK supports were suspended, as children were unable to attend school. In October 2020 schools temporarily re-opened for children in candidate classes, followed by a re-opening in March 2021 for all ages.</p> <p>As a consequence of the long school closure many children across South Sudan dropped out of school. There has been a significant increase in the number of out-of-school children from 2.2 million in 2018 to 2.8 million in 2021, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, as reported by UNICEF South Sudan (UNICEF South Sudan Education Briefing Note December 2021). This means that over 70 percent of school aged-children are not in school. The largest group of out-of-school children are girls. The number of children whose school fees CCC in Juba has supported has also dropped by almost a third in 2021 due to children dropping out and with the many pressures on education partners and difficulties of following up on the large number of children who are out of school, CCC Juba has also struggled, along with all the others. CCC UK is keen to continue to work to support continued education for at least some of the most vulnerable children, especially girls.</p> <p>Schools in Uganda had also closed in March 2020 and remained closed for most of the 2021 school year, with only a couple of weeks of in-person schooling in September 2021. The 40+ children who are at boarding school in Uganda continued to be at the house where they usually only spend their holidays. Confident Children Uganda organised three teachers to support the children's learning in the main subjects at primary and secondary level.</p> <p>CCC UK was able to send financial support to Uganda and South Sudan of £25,172. A significant amount was sent to South Sudan as CCC UK had been asked to hold off transferring money for school fees in 2020 when schools were closed.</p> <p>CCC UK also conducted an audit via an independent South Sudanese consultant recommended through a trusted long-term partner organisation. This exercise was completed in August, later than anticipated. Delays happened due to other competing priorities on the side of CCC Juba and due to illness on the side of the consultant. The audit did not reveal any major concerns but provided helpful recommendations for improvement for both organisations.</p> <p>A major issue that arose in 2021 as a direct consequence of the COVID pandemic and school closures was the significant increase of school fees in</p>

	<p>South Sudan, which puts the sustainability of the work in Juba at risk and this issue has been an important subject of ongoing discussions between the Director of CCC in South Sudan and the CCC UK Board.</p> <p>In Uganda the biggest issue was the continued school closure – the world’s longest. It put significant psychological strain on the South Sudanese children CCC UK supports in Kampala. CCC UK’s Chair of Trustees who was working in Kenya was able to visit Kampala in August 2021 for three weeks when travel restrictions were eased to witness the educational progress the children have been making, as well as the challenges they had faced. Other trustees have been in communication with the staff and children via video calls over the past two years.</p> <p>At the close of the reporting period CCC UK had a balance of £25,266 and the charity’s trustees were in consultation with CCC in South Sudan and CCC Uganda on support for 2022.</p> <p>The COVID-19 pandemic has increasingly made fundraising for South Sudan difficult as local needs in the UK itself increased substantially and many people have been facing economic hardship.
