CLF LIFE CENTRE is governed by a board of trustees in compliance with legal and charitable obligations. The trustee board, unchanged in 2024, collaborates with the Global Executive Board (Presbytery) and the International Council of CLF Elders, representing regions where CLF LIFE CENTRE operates.

CLF LIFE CENTRE operates under the spiritual and administrative oversight of the Presbytery in conjunction with the board of trustees.

CLF LIFE CENTRE's responsibilities include:

- upholding CLF's mission, vision, doctrinal, and lifestyle standards;
- coordinating corporate events and media activities in the UK and globally;
- managing existing UK church properties and supporting ministries without separate legal status;
- overseeing ordination processes, CLTI (Bible School), and CLM Trust (our missions' arm); and
- collaborating with the International Council of CLF Elders, representing diverse regions.

disciples of Jesus Christ by equipping our members and the wider body of Christ with a Christ centred perspective to life and ministry.

CLTI offers two flagship courses – Ministerial Training Course (MTC) for the spiritually mature, and Christian Discipleship Course (CDC) for believers who desire to be equipped as Disciples of Christ. CLTI also offers other short courses in a variety of subjects and is currently established in the following countries:

- Kenya – Christian Discipleship Course

Financial Support

The Trustees

The Trustees are pleased to present their report and CLF LC's financial statement for the Year Ended 31 December 2023. The trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the governing document and the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities and the applicable accounting standard FRS102.

Structure, Governance and Management

CLF LC is registered with the Charity Commissioners (No. 1168879) and constituted by a constitution. CLF Life Centre (CLF LC) is affiliated to City Faith Ministries Trust (CFMT) (No.1045627).

CLF Life Centre is an international community of New Testament believers committed to exalt the person and revelation of Jesus Christ as revealed in the bible and living a lifestyle centered on Him and His will. We are a member of the Evangelical Alliance UK (No. 241723)

Trustee Induction and Training

All trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity having served in this capacity for over 4 years.

The charity constitution provides for a minimum of three Trustees and there is no maximum number of charity trustees that may be appointed. Where there is a need for new Trustees, these would be identified and appointed by the current Trustees. The chair of Trustees is responsible for the induction of any new Trustee which involves awareness training of a Trustee's duties and responsibilities, the governing document, administrative procedures, the history and ethos of the charity. A new Trustee will also receive a copy of the previous year's annual report and a copy of the Charity Commission leaflet 'The Essential Trustee: What You Need to Know'.

At present CLF Life Centre has five Trustees from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the activities of the charity.

The Charity employs one full time pastor.

The object of the charity as set out in the constitution is to:

Advance the Christian faith in accordance with the Statement of beliefs appearing in the Statement of Faith of the charity.

- We raise awareness and understanding of the Christian faith by various means including producing religious books, MP3s and through CLF LC channel on YouTube. We also promote the study of religious teachings and practices through various meetings.

As part of their pastoral remit our Pastor, executive team, Life Groups leaders and heads of departments look after the spiritual wellbeing of the members which includes the regular conduct of baby dedications, marriages, funerals and counselling.

Our Mission

We exist because of The Great commission of our Lord Jesus summarized in Matthew 28:18 to 20, which mandates us to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

Our Vision

Our vision is to make disciples of Christ by encouraging them to be “Difference Markers” full of the life of God and spirit filled to bring hope and deliverance to the world. We will fulfil this mandate (to make disciples of Jesus Christ) by:

- Telling (preach to) others (the lost) about Christ,
- Warning and teaching those who are saved; and,
- Ultimately present every man perfect in Christ;
 - From being youthful and immature to an individual who is full-grown and spiritually mature and living in accordance with the perfect will of God. (*Col 1:28*)

Projects in 2023

Ropolo (Sierra Leone)

- There was a pilot agricultural project of groundnut, pepper and cassava. There was also an onion plantation that was not successful
- The refurbishment and construction of the church building
- The purchase of school uniforms for the pupils in the Christian Life Primary school

Marfoki (Sierra Leone)

- The Reconstruction of Marfoki church due to its dilapidated state
- Funds were raised by Omega Mission and PMission as part of their support for the church in Marfoki. The building project has reached window level, and funds are still being raised to complete the structure

Masiaka (Sierra Leone)

- The construction of the CLF church building saw the foundation stage completed, but there are not enough funds to continue further

Leadership Development

CLF has a seven-stage discipleship strategy to equip our members from new believers to ordained ministers as part of our Membership Discipleship Program (MDP). This strategy is further enhanced through our Bible school (Christian Life Training Institute (CLTI)), and various training initiatives and seminars as outlined below:

Christian Life Training Institute (CLTI)

CLTI is the Bible School initiative of CLF. It aims to serve our mission and vision to *make disciples of Jesus Christ* by equipping our members and the wider body of Christ with a Christ centred perspective to life and ministry.

CLTI offers two flagship courses – Ministerial Training Course (MTC) for the spiritually mature, and Christian Discipleship Course (CDC) for believers who desire to be equipped as Disciples of Christ. CLTI also offers other short courses in a variety of subjects and is currently established in the following countries:

United Kingdom:

- Ministerial Training Course
- Christian Discipleship Course
- Prophetic School of Ministry
- School of Evangelism
- Prayer School

Ghana:

- Ministerial Training Course
- Kenya – Christian Discipleship Course

Ministries

The ministries component within CLF comprises various initiatives and services whose remit and scope of operation goes beyond the CLF family to the wider body of Christ and/or the general community within society. The following were the active ministries in 2023:

- **Inside Out**
A ministry to prisoners and ex-prisoners to encourage them in their spirituality; and support them in a productive alternative after prison. In 2023, BlessUp meetings resumed on a monthly basis for ex-prisoners. The process of resuming Sunday services in Belmarsh Prison began, with dates being set for 2024. (Leader: Alison Smith)
- **International Christian Women's Network (ICWN)**
"Women of the Watch" (WOW) is an end time ministry of ICWN; raising intercessors throughout the earth to fulfil the call of standing in the gap and operating in the roll of the watchman in these last days. WOW is playing her part in preparing the (Bride) in ushering the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. In 2023 ICWN continued to host the annual "Women of the Watch" Weekend Prayer retreat at the Saint Columba's House in Surrey. During the August weekend there were approximately 23 women in attendance, mostly from the different CLF churches. We met with God in such a beautiful way, hearing God's prophetic word from Pastor Philip Ankrah and Pastor Martyn Reay. The ladies were stirred up for prayer and the call of the intercessor." (Leader: Sheron Ankrah)
- **Omega Generation**
A youth ministry empowering teenagers and young adults to a radical and relevant commitment to discipleship and missions. There were few active missions in 2023 both local and international, and funds raised to support some CLF projects. (Leader: Peter Mensah)
- **Abiding In Christ (AiC)**
Mission trips for women aimed at empowering them to impact their worlds using the tools of training, evangelism, and discipleship. In July 2023, we hosted a mission trip to Ghana and were joined by Rafiat Lawal from the UK. The AiC team carried out evangelism at a local mall, held workshops with teachers and pupils at a secondary school, delivered

training and ministered at a hospital, took part in a community project, ministered at a local prison and at church. The team also held a Healing workshop for Ladies. In October 2023, the team also facilitated a Prison Ministry visit with Fola Oyeleye from CLF Greenwich(Leader: Marilyn Mensah).

- **Neriah Nea Academy (NNA)**

This Academy seeks to provide an exceptional learning environment rooted in biblical principles. (Leader: Janet Doughan)

- **Daughters Of The King (DOTK)**

A global CLF women's ministry dedicated to empowering Christian women within the body of Christ. Our aim is to empower women to maximise their potential through wholehearted pursuit of God and His kingdom purpose for their lives. It also seeks to facilitate its mandate through Women's gatherings and prayer initiatives as well as equipping women in singleness, marriage, and leadership in the church and marketplace.

During 2023 our focus for the year was to build up the fellowship and relationship amongst the women throughout CLF. We had three organised fellowship gatherings. Throughout the year each gathering would discuss singleness, marriage, and motherhood. To include our CLF churches in Africa, Ps Marilyn Mensah ran one DOTK meeting in Ghana with Sierra Leone and Kenya taking part with interactive questions and answers online. The CLF UK DOTK's first session was held in Greenwich, the second in Medway and the 3rd a restaurant meal in Lambeth. However, the numbers of attendees throughout the year did not represent the number of ladies within our combined churches, we believe the reason for this was because of the new changes and challenges taking place within CLF in this season of transition.(Leader: Sheron Ankrah)

- **Stronger Men Ministries (SMM)**

A men's ministry to empower men to be strong in spirit, strong in leadership and stronger together. In 2023 SMM had not engaged in any major corporate activity however, there has been an increasing sense of a need for more engagement in the local branches across the CLF communities. (Leader: Peter Mensah)

- **MaryLayo Talks**

The ministry was launched in April 2023 to support, maintain and promote good mental health and spiritual wellbeing.

24 April 2023 started: Beyond the Smile podcast. Together with guests, MaryLayo discusses issues and life events that can affect mental wellbeing. 23 episodes on topics such as bereavement, perfectionism and brain tumour recovery have been published on platforms including Apple Podcasts, Spotify and Amazon music.

On 2 April, MaryLayo Talks YouTube channel launched to facilitate healing, growth and development through discussion on faith, social issues and mental health. The channel focuses on personal reflections, guest interviews and devotionals. (Leader: Mary Ogungbeje)

- Embrace 2023 December 31st.

Financial Review

CLF Life Centre ended the year with a deficit on general funds of £1,731 (2022 £1,293 deficit) the details of which can be seen in the annexed financials statements (and notes) for the period.

The Trustees are very thankful to all the members (and other stakeholders) for their' continuous generosity which enables the Charity to maintain its vast array of charitable activities (for its size) in this harsh economic climate. The Trustees will continue to consider value for money against impact when delivering the charities strategic objectives.

Investment Policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year, the Trustees will consider appropriate money-market investments over the near and medium future. Where general reserves grow beyond a target level equivalent to 9-month operation costs more long-term investments will be explored

The Trustees

The Trustees are pleased to present their report and CLF LC's financial statement for the Year Ended 31 December 2022. The trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the governing document and the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities and the applicable accounting standard FRS102.



Structure, Governance and Management

CLF LC is registered with the Charity Commissioners (No. 1168879) and constituted by a constitution. CLF Life Centre (CLF LC) is affiliated to City Faith Ministries Trust (CFMT) (No.1045627).

CLF Life Centre is an international community of New Testament believers committed to exalt the person and revelation of Jesus Christ as revealed in the bible and living a lifestyle centered on Him and His will. We are a member of the Evangelical Alliance UK (No. 241723)

Trustee Induction and Training

All trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity having served in this capacity for over 4 years.

The charity constitution provides for a minimum of three Trustees and there is no maximum number of charity trustees that may be appointed. Where there is a need for new Trustees, these would be identified and appointed by the current Trustees. The chair of Trustees is responsible for the induction of any new Trustee which involves awareness training of a Trustee's duties and responsibilities, the governing document, administrative procedures, the history and ethos of the charity. A new Trustee will also receive a copy of the previous year's annual report and a copy of the Charity Commission leaflet 'The Essential Trustee: What You Need to Know'.

At present CLF Life Centre has five Trustees from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the activities of the charity.

The Charity employs one full time pastor.

The object of the charity as set out in the constitution is to:

Advance the Christian faith in accordance with the Statement of beliefs appearing in the Statement of Faith of the charity.

- We raise awareness and understanding of the Christian faith by various means including producing religious books, MP3s and through CLF LC channel on YouTube. We also promote the study of religious teachings and practices through various meetings.

As part of their pastoral remit our Pastor, executive team, Life Groups leaders and heads of departments look after the spiritual wellbeing of the members which includes the regular conduct of baby dedications, marriages, funerals and counselling.

Our Mission

We exist because of The Great commission of our Lord Jesus summarized in Matthew 28:18 to 20, which mandates us to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

Our Vision

Our vision is to make disciples of Christ by encouraging them to be “Difference Markers” full of the life of God and spirit filled to bring hope and deliverance to the world. We will fulfil this mandate (to make disciples of Jesus Christ) by:


- Telling (preach to) others (the lost) about Christ,
- Warning and teaching those who are saved; and,
- Ultimately present every man perfect in Christ;
 - From being youthful and immature to an individual who is full-grown and spiritually mature and living in accordance with the perfect will of God. (*Col 1:28*)

Overall, 2022 was still a challenging year for the body of Christ and the nation as a whole due to COVID-19. Life Centre leadership continued to strengthen its members through prayer and life groups meetings, midweek services and online fellowships.

Challenges

- Not able to meet physically due to COVID-19 pandemic for part of the year.
- Challenge of finding a suitable location to meet.
- Galvanising and conscientising members to have a life style sharing the good news of Jesus Christ with friends, family members, work colleagues etc
- Life groups were almost non-existent.

Aside from this, beyond the normal pastoral and administrative issues of an organisation like ours, there were no other major challenges that we had to address.

Use of Volunteers

Leadership Development

CLF has a seven-stage discipleship strategy to equip our members from new believers to ordained ministers as part of our Membership Discipleship Program (MDP). This strategy is further enhanced through our Bible school (Christian Life Training Institute (CLTI), and various training initiatives and seminars as outlined below:

Christian Life Training Institute (CLTI)

CLTI is the Bible School initiative of CLF. It aims to serve our mission and vision to *make disciples of Jesus Christ* by equipping our members and the wider body of Christ with a Christ centred perspective to life and ministry.

Ministries

The Ministries component within CLF consists of various initiatives and services whose remit and scope of operation goes beyond the CLF family to the wider body of Christ and/or the general community within society. The following were the active ministries in 2022:

- **Inside Out:** A ministry to prisoners and ex-prisoners to encourage them in their spirituality; and support them in a productive alternative after prison. In 2022, face to face meetings resumed although there was still no access to prison since the COVID pandemic. (Leader Alison Smith)
- **International Christian Women's Network (ICWN).** A ministry to women in the body of Christ and beyond. In 2022 ICWN continued to host Women of the Watch and mentoring groups for women. (Leader Sheron Ankrah)
- **Omega Generation.** A youth ministry empowering teenagers and young adults to a radical and relevant commitment to discipleship and missions. There were no active missions in 2022 (Leader Peter Mensah)
- **Abiding In Christ (AiC)** - Mission trips for women aimed at empowering them to empower their worlds using the tools of training, evangelism, and discipleship. In February 2022, Kim Grant (London, England) ministered alongside Elizabeth Wekesa, (Buruburu, Kenya) and Marilyn Mensah, (Accra, Ghana). A mission was held in Ghana in October 2022, under the theme "Healing, mind, body, soul and spirit". The team were joined by a UK team to carry out street evangelism, prison, and hospital outreach as well as hosting workshops. (Leader: Marilyn Mensah).
- **Neriah Nea Academy (NNA).** This Academy seeks to provide an exceptional learning environment rooted in biblical principles. (Leader Janet Doughan)
- **Tamu Missions.** A Christian social action initiative whose aim is to empower

women through skills training, business development and personal well-being.

(Leader Afriyie Donkor)

- **DOTK:** A global CLF women’s ministry dedicated to empowering Christian women within the body of Christ. Our aim is to empower women to maximize their potential through wholehearted pursuit of God and His kingdom purpose for their lives. It also seeks to facilitate its mandate through Women’s gatherings and prayer initiatives as well as equipping women in singleness, marriage, and for leadership in the Church and marketplace. (Leader Sheron Ankrah)

- **Stronger Men Ministries (SMM).** A men’s ministry to empower men to be strong in spirit, strong in leadership and stronger together. In 2022 SMM continued to host its major Summit and mentoring forums online. It also hosted online Men’s Prayer gatherings throughout the year (Leader Peter Mensah)

Missions

The primary corporate mission’s effort of CLF comes under Christian Life Mission (CLM) formerly Christian Life Ministries) in partnership with CLM Trust. CLM Trust is a registered charity committed to world evangelism, church planting, leadership development, and social action. In 2022 CLM was responsible for the following initiatives:

- **Overseas Missions:** CLM sponsored and/or hosted short-term missions to Ghana, The Gambia, Kenya, and Sierra Leone.

The remit of these missions varied from strengthening churches spiritually, ministering in church services and seminars, leadership development, to providing welfare support.

- **Child Sponsorship:** In 2022 CLM’s ministry included sponsorship towards the education of approximately 50 children in Sierra Leone.

- **Supporting churches and church leaders:** CLM continues to provide spiritual and resource support to churches and church leaders in the UK, Ghana, Kenya, India, and Sierra Leone.

The trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the governing document and the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities and the applicable accounting standard FRS102.



Structure, Governance and Management

CLF LC is registered with the Charity Commissioners (No. 1168879) and constituted by a constitution. CLF Life Centre (CLF LC) is affiliated to City Faith Ministries Trust (CFMT) (No.1045627).

CLF Life Centre is an international community of New Testament believers committed to exalt the person and revelation of Jesus Christ as revealed in the bible and living a lifestyle centered on Him and His will. We are a member of the Evangelical Alliance UK (No. 241723)

Trustee Induction and Training

All trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity having served in this capacity for over 4 years.

The charity constitution provides for a minimum of three Trustees and there is no maximum number of charity trustees that may be appointed. Where there is a need for new Trustees, these would be identified and appointed by the current Trustees. - BIG (Ballers in God). A ministry to professional footballers to talk, encourage, pray, and read the Bible together. Meetings take place online as well as annual retreats where members meet together to be strengthened and encouraged in their faith. This ministry experienced tremendous growth in 2021 (Leader, John Bostock)
- Abiding In Christ (AiC) - Mission trips for women aimed at empowering them to empower their worlds using the tools of training, evangelism, and discipleship. In February 2021, the AiC Kenya missions conference was a hybrid event.

The event was well attended and very successful. (Leader, Marilyn Mensah).

- Neriah Nea Academy (NNA). This Academy seeks to provide an exceptional learning environment rooted in biblical principles. The activities of NNA were limited in 2021 due to COVID 19. (Leader, Janet Doughan)
- Tamu Missions. A Christian social action initiative whose aim is to empower women through skills training, business development and personal well-being. The activities of Tamu were limited in 2021 due to COVID 19. (Leader, Afriyie Donkor)
- Daughters Of The King (DOTK): A global CLF women's ministry dedicated to empowering Christian women within the body of Christ. Our aim is to empower women to maximise their potential through wholehearted pursuit of God and His kingdom purpose for their lives. It also seeks to facilitate its mandate through Women's gatherings and prayer initiatives as well as equipping women in singleness, marriage, and for leadership in the church and marketplace. (Leader, Sheron Ankrah)
- Stronger Men Ministries (SMM). A men's ministry to empower men to be strong in spirit, strong in leadership and stronger together. In 2021 SMM continued to host its major Summit and mentoring forums online. It also hosted online Men's Prayer gatherings throughout the year (Leader, Peter Mensah)

Missions

- The primary corporate mission's effort of CLF comes under Christian Life Mission (CLM) formerly Christian Life Ministries) in partnership with CLM Trust. CLM Trust is a registered charity committed to world evangelism, church planting, leadership development, and social action. In 2021 CLM was responsible for the following initiatives:
- Overseas Missions: CLM sponsored and/or hosted short-term missions to Ghana, The Gambia, Kenya, and Sierra Leone. The remit of these missions varied from strengthening Churches spiritually, ministering in Church services and seminars, leadership development, to providing welfare support.

- Child Sponsorship: In 2021 CLM's ministry included sponsorship towards the education of approximately 126 children in Ghana and 50 children in Sierra Leone.
- Supporting churches and church leaders: CLM continues to provide support to churches and church leaders in the UK, Ghana, Kenya, India, and Sierra Leone. In 2021 CLM also supported Church leaders financially on a monthly basis due to the impact COVID 19 in their local Churches. This support stopped in 2022.

Highlights of 2021

The highlights of 2021 are those achievements and activities in 2021 within the UK that we felt emphasised the corporate progress of CLF during that year. These included:

- Prayer night throughout 2021 on the last Friday of each month.

- Anniversary Weekend hosted Online "*Kingdom Come*" with Pastors Tim Grant, Kwame J Dompok, and Philip Ankrah
- Apostolic Forum - (Kenya, Sierra Leone, Liberia, Zambia) With Pastors Peter Mensah, Philip Ankrah, Kwame J Dompok & Tim Grant
- DOTK

- Mission 2021 Conference “*The Great Commission*” with Pastors Tim Grant, Kwame J Dompseh, Peter Mensah, Philip Ankrah
- Embrace 2021 December 31st held at Halley Academy (Watchnight Service)

We are also blessed to have Pastor John Dompseh who will be leading the organisation with the Eldership as our new General Overseer, we wish him and his dear family the best of our Lord’s grace, wisdom, and favour in this calling.

Other Notable Events in 2021

- 2021 also saw other individuals and teams go on missions in partnership with or on behalf of CLF to Sierra Leone, The Gambia, Republic of South Africa, and Ghana.
- Kudzai and Liz Mundora along with their children Zachary and Zara-Grace went to Cambodia for a long-term mission.
- Pastors Peter and Marilyn Mensah along with their children Ioanna and Othniel went to Ghana on long-term mission.
- We had the pleasure of welcoming several babies and newly-weds into our fellowship.

Major Challenges in 2021

We experienced the sad passing of our Founder, General Overseer and Faithful Servant of over three decades Pastor Joseph Boadu on 23rd June 2021. Pastor Joseph by inspiration of Almighty God established CFMT with a vision to obey the Great Commission for Jesus Christ through world evangelism and the discipleship of every born-again believer within the context of a church community.

As an organization we have suffered profound loss in his passing as we have grown immeasurably by the grace of God through his faithful servant to what we are now as a global movement. As we pay tribute and mark his pilgrimage, we take some comfort in knowing that we shall meet again as expounded in 1 Thessalonians 4:13-14. We also extend our deep love and appreciation to his beloved wife Ayshea and children Daniel, Charis and Joel and assure them of our support and honour.

We also experienced the passing away of our long-term friend and ministry partner, Dr Joseph Moses, of Gospel Mission who passed away in May 2021.

2021 also saw the sad passing of many CLF members: Shelley Lee, Vicky Amaning and her sons Ezra and Joseph, Jordan Viera, Diane Acheampong, Sharon Allen-Harper (Worship leader for Greenwich and CLF corporate) and Fitzroy Anthony Williams as well as several close and dear family members and friends.

COVID 19 did indeed prove to be a major challenge for CLF and the rest of the world in 2021. However, CLF enjoyed the grace and favour of God during this period and experienced a greater sense of unity and divine provision.

Financial Review

CLF LC ended the year with a deficit on general funds of **£ 10,546** the details of which can be seen in annexed financial statements (and notes) for the period.

The Trustees are very thankful to all the members (and other stakeholders) for their' continuous generosity which enables the Charity to maintain its vast array of charitable activities (for its size) in this harsh economic climate. The Trustees will continue to consider value for money against impact when delivering the charities strategic objectives.

Investment Policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year, the Trustees will consider appropriate money-market investments over the near and medium future. Where general reserves grow beyond a target level equivalent to 9-month operation costs more long-term investments will be explored.



TRUSTEES REPORT 2020

The Trustees are pleased to present their report and CLF LC's financial statement for the Year Ended 31 December 2020. The trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the governing document and the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities and the applicable accounting standard FRS102.

1.0 Structure, governance and management

CLF LC is registered with the Charity Commissioners (No. 1168879) and constituted by a constitution. CLF LC is affiliated to City Faith Ministries Trust (CFMT) (No.1045627) aka Christian Life Fellowship (CLF).

CLF LC is an international community of New Testament believers committed to exalt the person and revelation of Jesus Christ as revealed in the bible and living a lifestyle centered on Him and His will. We are a member of the evangelical alliance (UK).

The Charity employs one full time pastor

Our Mission

We exist because of The Great commission of our Lord Jesus summarized in Matthew 28:18 to 20, which mandates us to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

Our Vision

Our vision is to be a church that is vibrant, full of the life of God, spirit filled to bring hope and deliverance to the world. We will fulfil this mandate (to make disciples of Jesus Christ) by;

1. Telling (preach to) others (the lost) about Christ;
2. warning and teaching those who are saved; and,
3. ultimately present every man perfect in Christ;
4. from being youthful and immature;
5. to an individual who is full-grown and spiritually mature;
6. living in accordance with the perfect will of God. (*Col 1:28*)

Our core values

Our core values are those ideals we are unwilling to compromise as we fulfil our vision. They are derived from our mission and embrace the following:

- Live with God's **PURPOSE**.
- **LOVE** God supremely and, my neighbour as myself.
- Be **EXCELLENT** in all I think and do.
- Make **JESUS** the *centre* of my heart and life.
- Always **TEAMWORK** thereby bringing, and keeping unity of the faith.
- Be **HOLY** even as God is Holy.
- Keep, maintain and guard my **INTEGRITY** at all times.
- **STE-WARD-SHIP**; that is eternity will be at forefront in all I do. Because I will one day stand before God to give an account of what He gave me, and did with my life.

2.0 Trustee Induction and Training

All trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity having served in this capacity for at least one year.

The charity constitution provides for a minimum of three Trustees and a maximum of eight Trustees. Where there is a need for new Trustees, these would be identified and appointed by the current Trustees. The chair of Trustees is responsible for the induction of any new Trustee which involves awareness training of a Trustee's duties and responsibilities, the governing document, administrative procedures, the history and ethos of the charity. A new Trustee will also receive a copy of the previous year's annual report and a copy of the Charity Commission leaflet 'The Essential Trustee: What You Need to Know'. At present CLF LC have five Trustees from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the activities of the charity.

3.0 The objects of the Trust as set out in the constitution are, for the public benefit, to:

Advance the Christian faith in accordance with the Statement of beliefs appearing in the Statement of Faith of the charity.

We raise awareness and understanding of the Christian faith by various means including producing religious books, MP3s and through CLF LC channel on YouTube. We also promote the study of religious teachings and practices with various meetings.

As part of their pastoral remit our Pastor, executive team, Life Groups leaders and heads of departments look after the spiritual wellbeing of the members which includes the regular conduct of christening ceremonies, marriages and funerals.

4.0 Use of Volunteers

CLF LC considers its volunteers as one of its main resources in both faith and community work.

The Charity encourages all its members to be involved in voluntary activities and now have over thirty volunteers (including all the trustees) who regularly give of their time. All members who work with children and vulnerable groups are always DBS checked.

5.0 Activities and achievements and their public benefit

The charity carries out a wide range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The

Trustees consider that these activities, summarised below, provide valuable benefits to the public both in the U.K and abroad.

All CLF LC activities are available to Christians and non-Christians, members and non-members alike; there is no bar to attendance.

Emphasis and focus in 2020

Continuing our theme of *Blessed to IMPACT* from 2019, our emphasis for 2020 was “*Kingdom IMPACT*”. We believe that God has blessed us in order for us to impact our world with His kingdom. We sought to pursue this mandate in the same vein as we did the previous year as follows:

- As Disciples of Christ. By equipping our members to be disciples of Christ
- In the community. Through a focus on our immediate communities where we gather to worship every week
- To the nations. By fulfilling our global mandate of world missions

Our emphasis was pursued through our UK corporate activities and our Main active components as outlined in this document.

Key text used for our emphasis throughout 2020 was found in Matthew 6:33 But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you.

UK corporate activities

- Prayer and fasting for twenty-one days – 1st to 21st March and 1st to 21st July
- Anniversary weekend from 20th to 22nd March
- Refresh 2020 from 24th to 26th July
- Mission 2020 from 23rd to 25th October

All these events were hosted online due to the COVID 19 pandemic resulting in a national lockdown in the UK and around the world.

CLF Global activities and initiatives

CLF’s Bible School, Christian Life Training Institute (CLTI) continued to function throughout the year in the UK, Ghana, and Kenya. Our faculty in Sierra Leone was suspended due to leadership challenges. Apostolic Forums took place for leaders in Sierra Leone, Kenya, Liberia and Zambia. Pastors and leaders Forum took place in Sierra Leone.

Two youth conferences took place in Sierra Leone under the banner of Kingdom Impact.

Mission to Sierra Leone December 2019 to February 2020. We planted our first Youth Church in Sierra Leone from this mission.

Mission to Republic of South Africa January 2020 to March 2020. We planted our first Church in Sada, Eastern Cape, South Africa as a result of this mission.

Child sponsorship. Through our missions’ arm Christian Life Mission (CLM) formerly Christian Life Ministries, we continue to sponsor the education of 126 children in Ghana and 20 children in Sierra Leone.

Supporting Churches and Church leaders. Due to the COVID Pandemic, CLF UK decided to

provide financial stipends to over 35 Church leaders within CLF globally. This provision has been on going throughout 2020.

Projects in 2020

CLF began the construction of CLF Masiaka (Sierra Leone) Church building that also serves as a primary school.

CLF continued to support of our first primary school in Ghana, Crystal Preparatory with 75 pupils.

Church Planting

We believe Church planting to be the most effective method of obeying the Great Commission of Jesus Christ through world evangelism and the discipleship of every born-again believer within the context of a Church community. 2020 saw the following Churches planted:

CLF continues to have affiliations with the Sierra Leone Armed Forces Chaplaincy.

- Stage 5 – Leadership Orientation course
- Stage 6 – Ministerial Training course
- Stage 7 – Ordination Process

Every CLF Church should endeavour to ensure that each stage of discipleship is being expressed within the life of their local congregation

Christian Life Training Institute (CLTI)

CLTI is the Bible School initiative of CLF. It aims to serve our mission and vision to *make disciples of Jesus Christ* by equipping our members and the wider body of Christ with a Christ centred perspective to life and ministry.

CLTI offers two flagship courses – Ministerial Training Course (MTC) for the spiritually mature, and Christian Discipleship Course (CDC) for believers who desire to be equipped as Disciples of Christ. The Ministries component within CLF consists of various initiatives and services whose remit and scope of operation goes beyond the CLF family to the wider body of Christ and/or the general community within society. The following were the active ministries in 2020:

- Youth Totally Devoted (YTD): A ministry to teenagers in London encouraging spiritual development. YTD hosts Youth Church services for teenagers and other youth-oriented events. In 2020 YTD continued to provide Church services and emotional support to teenagers. (Leader Olu Oyerinde)
- InsideOut: A ministry to prisoners and ex-prisoners to encourage them in their spirituality; and support them in a productive alternative after prison. 2020 a limited service from InsideOut due to COVID 19. (Leader Alison Smith)
- International Christian Women’s Network (ICWN). A ministry to women in the body of Christ and beyond. In 2020 ICWN continued to host Women of the Watch and mentoring groups for women. (Leader Sheron Ankrah)
- Omega Generation. A youth ministry empowering teenagers and young adults to a radical and relevant commitment to discipleship and missions. In July 2020, Omega had its annual conference IN CHRIST ALONE (ICA) was held virtually and recorded about 100 delegates in attendance from Kenya, Sierra Leone, Ghana, UK, America and Liberia. The Omega team also supported the education of 20 students in Sierra Leone for a year. They raised about £60 to support the Masiaka Church in Sierra Leone and donated toys to Masiaka children's church (Leader Peter Mensah)
- BIG (Ballers in God). A ministry to professional footballers to talk, encourage, pray, and read the Bible together. Meetings take place online as well as annual retreats where members meet together to be strengthened and encouraged in their faith. This ministry experienced tremendous growth in 2020 (Leader John Bostock)

- Two out of 3. This ministry provides two out of three household needs to under privileged people, families, and communities in Accra, Ghana. Throughout the year, other initiatives include a Health Day, Big Brother Mentorship School program, and an annual Christmas Homeless Feast. The activities of this ministry were limited in 2020 due to COVID 19. (Leader Sekeena Banful)
- Mature Women's Ministry (MWM). A ministry to mature women in the body of Christ and beyond. The activities of MWM were limited in 2020 due to COVID 19. (Leader Esther Amaning)
- Abiding In Christ (AiC) - Mission trips for women aimed at empowering them to empower their worlds using the tools of training, evangelism and discipleship. In February 2020, the Inaugural AiC mission to Kenya took place. (Leader: Marilyn Mensah)
- Neriah Nea Academy (NNA). This Academy seeks to provide an exceptional learning

environment rooted in biblical principles. The activities of NNA were limited in 2020 due to COVID 19. (Leader Janet Doughan)

- Tamu Missions. A Christian social action initiative whose aim is to empower women through skills training, business development and personal well-being. The activities of Tamu were limited in 2020 due to COVID 19. (Leader Afriyie Donkor)
- DOTK: A global CLF women's ministry dedicated to empowering Christian women within the body of Christ. Our aim is to empower women to maximise their potential through wholehearted pursuit of God and His kingdom purpose for their lives. It also seeks to facilitate its mandate through Women's gatherings and prayer initiatives as well as equipping women in singleness, marriage, and for leadership in the Church and marketplace.
- Stronger Men Ministries (SMM). A men's ministry to empower men to be strong in spirit, strong in leadership and stronger together. In 2020 SMM continued to host its major Summit and mentoring forums online. It also hosted online Men's Prayer gatherings throughout the year (Leader Joseph Boadu)

Missions

The primary corporate mission's effort of CLF comes under Christian Life Mission ((CLM) formerly Christian Life Ministries) in partnership with CLM Trust. CLM Trust is a registered charity committed to world evangelism, Church planting, leadership development, and social action. In 2020 CLM was responsible for the following initiatives:

- Overseas Missions: CLM sponsored and/or hosted short-term missions to Ghana, The Gambia, Kenya, and Sierra Leone. The remit of these missions varied from strengthening Churches spiritually, ministering in Church services and seminars, leadership development, to providing welfare support.
- Child Sponsorship: In 2020 CLM's ministry included sponsorship towards the education of approximately 126 children in Ghana and 50 children in Sierra Leone.
- Supporting Churches and Church leaders: CLM continues to provide spiritual and resource support to Churches and Church leaders in the UK, Ghana, Kenya, India and Sierra Leone. In 2020 CLM also supported over 35 Church leaders financially on a

monthly basis due to the impact COVID 19 in their local Churches. This support continues to date.

6.0. Financial review

CLF LC ended the year with a surplus on general funds of **£22,725.85** the details of which can be seen in annexed financial statements (and notes) for the period.

The Trustees are very thankful to all the members (and other stakeholders) for their' continuous generosity which enables the Charity to maintain its vast array of charitable activities (for its size) in this harsh economic climate. The Trustees will continue to take into account value for money against impact when delivering the charities strategic objectives.

6.1. Investment Policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year, the Trustees will consider appropriate money-market investments over the near and medium future. Where general reserves grow beyond a target level equivalent to 9-month operational costs more long-term investments will be explored.

Each Church is however encouraged to contextualise this emphasis locally. By the end of 2020 our vision is that every CLF church is to plant another CLF church. CLF churches in the UK are encourage to plant a CLF church in a new overseas territory as the Holy Spirit leads.




