We raised money to give them the essentials that they needed.</p> <p>The coronavirus crisis was also pushing thousands of young people to the brink of homelessness. We raised money to support with nightly shelters to help keep them safe, and clothing to keep them warm.</p>

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		<p>people who were street homeless. This kept them in a safe environment for the night and lowered any associated anxiety they may have had due to their circumstance.</p> <p>We also provided 25 clothes and 25 sleeping bags to keep them warm.</p> <p>We raised £1050 to spend on food to donate to those young people who were struggling with buying food. This meant that they would not go hungry as they had what they needed to make a meal.</p> <p>Five young black men were funded to complete a Culture & History course. Through gaining the knowledge on this course, it empowered them, as well as inspired and built confidence.</p>

Para 1.20	<p>The COVID-19 pandemic was a difficult time, and there were specific groups of people who were experiencing disastrous implications. From speaking to parents and observing SEN children during this period, we heard and saw the breakdown and decline in behaviour and mental health of these young people. For some SEN young people it had triggered intense stress, and led to a meltdown or shut down.</p> <p>Offering respite and a safe space for these young people, gave them the freedom from feeling trapped and parents the time to relax. This resulted in them being in a better state of mind, as well as being less stressed, anxious, and disruptive.</p> <p>Both SEN young people and parents/carers benefited from the support offered and the respite.</p>

Achievements against objectives set	Para 1.41	<p>We were able to provide funding for respite for 4 young people; three with autism and one with down syndrome. At first the SEN respite services were only open during the school holidays, and then they opened up on the weekends. Each young person was granted one day in the week, and one day on the weekend.</p> <p>Special SEN equipments were brought and provided to one of the respite services, as well as 7 young people for them to keep at home. The equipment included black out tents, SEN light toys and trampolines.</p> <p>A peer support group was set up for the parents of the SEN young people. This enabled them to share, offer advice, and support to each other via a WhatsApp group during a hard time for them.</p> <p>Not only did the SEN respite offer a safe, open and great learning environment for the young people. But it also allowed the parents to have a break, which in turn improved their relationships with their children.</p>
