Our services and worship activities put faith into practice through prayer, fasting, scripture, music, and various social actions, fostering a sense of community and togetherness.

- Educating fathers and men of African descent on respecting women, female peers, and children — raising awareness around the prevention of child and women abuse (including moral, financial, physical, sexual, and psychological abuse).
- Bible teachings and Bible meditation.
- Evangelical and missionary activities.
- Empowering women, particularly those of African descent.
- Fasting and prayer.
- Various outreach missions.
- Healing and recovery through music, praise, and worship.
- Developing individuals' knowledge of and trust in Jesus Christ.
- After-school homework club for young people in the community.
- Special youth meetings.
- Provision of pastoral care for all, with a particular focus on the most destitute and vulnerable.



Essential achievements and performance (2024-2025)

Mothers/Women of African origins special meetings.

Drawing on the positive feedback received from the previous year, regular evening meetings for women continued to be held on the first Monday of every month. Attendees are predominantly women of African origins, with a small number of exceptions. The central theme of these meetings remained focused on self-esteem and empowering women to speak out against abuse. Many women of African origins face personal mindset challenges rooted in their upbringing, often leading them to perceive themselves as inferior to men. We encouraged them to challenge any form of maltreatment, injustice, and discrimination respectfully but firmly.

During these sessions, we also encouraged women to pursue further education, explaining that greater educational attainment opens doors to better employment opportunities and, consequently, a greater positive impact on society — beginning within their own households. It is hoped that this will, in turn, foster greater mutual respect within their marriages.

Fathers/Men of African origins special meetings.

Building on the work carried out in the previous year, men continued their practice of gathering on the last Saturday of every month at church. Once again, these well-attended meetings provided an opportunity to raise further awareness around respect for women and children. Due to certain cultural and religious backgrounds, a significant number of men in African communities may not always demonstrate basic respect towards women and children. The key message conveyed to all attendees was that culture and religion cannot be used as justification for the abuse of women and children, under any circumstances. Men were strongly encouraged to engage in respectful and constructive dialogue with their wives and children, particularly in cases of disagreement or differing views. Based on feedback from women and children



within our community, there have been further positive, progressive changes in a number of households. Nevertheless, there remains more work to be done.

Education.

We continue to provide educational support to the most deprived and vulnerable members of our communities. Building on the work initiated in previous years, education remained a cornerstone of our activities this year. English is a second language for the majority of our service users. Many young people — predominantly children of refugees who have been granted indefinite leave to remain in the UK — have succeeded in gaining entry to higher education.

However, equivalently to what we successfully achieved last year, having been made aware of their need for support with academic assignments, we have introduced targeted essay assistance for those attending university or higher education institutions, including basic proofreading. This service is provided free of charge by members of our congregation who are lecturers at UK universities. Feedback has confirmed that this initiative has had a positive impact. Furthermore, during all services, we consistently encourage everyone to continue pursuing their studies upon being granted indefinite leave to remain in the UK.

The relief of poverty.

As has become a tradition for our organisation, in December 2024, service users and trustees gathered at Sackville Gardens in Manchester, where we donated free food, warm clothing, and other essentials to homeless people in Central Manchester.

Furthermore, we organised regular home visits to support the most deprived members of our organisation. During these visits, essential items were donated to families to help alleviate the pressures of the rising cost of living.



Additionally, throughout the year, the church conducted regular weekly and monthly hospital visits to pray for those who were ill, as well as for those with ill family members. Basic refreshments, such as drinks, were also donated on these occasions.

Promoting the advancement of Christianity.

In July 2024, we hosted our annual Manchester for Christ (M4C) conference. This year's conference was a beacon of hope, with nine individuals choosing to be baptised on the final day, symbolising their commitment to Jesus Christ. This profoundly moving occasion inspired all in attendance and reaffirmed our collective belief in the transformative power of faith.

In addition to the above, as in previous years, we organised a special women's gathering to celebrate International Women's Day in March 2025. At a time when the eastern region of the Democratic Republic of Congo continues to experience widespread sexual violence — with rebel groups such as the AFC/M23 using rape as a weapon of war — we sought to encourage all women to remain hopeful that the situation in the DRC will one day change. It was vital to offer a message of comfort, as a significant number of our members have themselves been victims of rape and torture. Once again, all discussions were centred on rebuilding self-confidence in the aftermath of traumatic experiences.

Fundamental achievements and performance (2023-2024)

Promoting the advancement of Christianity.

In July 2023, we hosted our annual Manchester for Christ (M4C) conference. This year, the conference was a beacon of hope, with six individuals choosing to be baptised on the final day, symbolising their commitment to Jesus Christ. This powerful moment inspired us all and reaffirmed our belief in the transformative power of faith.

Furthermore, like every year, we organised a remarkable women's gathering to celebrate International Women's Day in March 2023. At a time when the Eastern part of DRC is regrettably still experiencing a high number of females being raped because rebels of the AFC/M23 rebel group and others are using rape as a war weapon, we encouraged all women to remain optimistic that things would change in DR Congo one day. It was essential to bring a message of comfort because numerous of our members have also been victims of rape and torture in the past. Once more, all topics/discussions were centred around building up self-confidence following a traumatic experience.

Mothers/Women of African origins special meetings.

In a new design based on feedback received from the previous years, every first Monday of the month was also consecrated to female meetings. These are fundamentally women of African origins, except for a few individuals. The central theme of these meetings was again all-around self-empowerment and self-belief. Most females of African origins struggle with personal mindset issues due to the backgrounds rising up, which meant that they would see themselves as being inferior to males. During these sessions, we encourage females to join educational institutions, explaining that if they are more educated, they will increase opportunities to get good employment and consequently make a greater difference in society.

Fathers/Men of African origins special meetings.

As mentioned, our organisation is predominantly made of members of African backgrounds. Our service users are (former) asylum seekers and refugees. Every last Saturday of the month was dedicated to special meetings for men of African background. During these meetings, the emphasis was on raising awareness around issues concerning respect for females and children. In fact, due essentially to cultural and religious backgrounds, a substantial number of males in African communities tend not to show any respect to females and children. The key message portrayed to all men was that culture and religion could not be an excuse to abuse females and children, no matter the circumstances. Instead, men were constantly encouraged during these conversations to opt more for respectful and constructive dialogue with their wives and children (especially in cases of disagreement or differences of views). From the feedback from women and children of our community, there have been progressive, positive changes in several homes, even though more still needs to be done.

Education.

We are providing education to the most deprived and vulnerable of our communities. Building on the work initiated last (previous) years, education was again a pillar of our work this season. English is the second language for the majority of our service users. Many young people, predominantly children of refugees who have been granted indefinite leave to remain in the UK, have managed to get into higher education. However, as we have been made aware that they need help with assignments at the university/high education level, we have started targeted essay support for all attending university/higher education (basic proofreading). Our members who are lecturers in UK universities, do this for free. This has had a positive impact, as feedback has confirmed. Moreover, during all services, as is our habit, we always encourage everyone to continue pursuing their studies when granted indefinite leave to remain in the UK.

The relief of poverty.

In the tragic conditions of continuous fighting, killing and rape in the Eastern part of the DRC, our organisations asked church members to voluntarily donate anything they could afford so that we could send the funds to people affected in Kinshasa/DR Congo. Funds were sent through a foundation operating in Eastern Congo, REPAIR who supports homeless children in Kinshasa. Also, we sent some clothes, shoes, and some food. Moreover, every year on Saturday 16th December 2023, service users plus trustees met in Piccadilly, where we donated free food, warm clothes, and others to homeless people in Central Manchester.

In fact, due essentially to cultural and religious backgrounds, a substantial number of males in African communities tend not to show any respect to females and children. The key message portrayed to all men was that culture and religion could not be an excuse to abuse females and children, no matter the circumstances. Instead, men were constantly encouraged during these conversations to opt more for respectful and constructive dialogue with both their wives and children (especially in cases of disagreement or differences of views). From the feedback received from women and children of our community, there have been progressive, positive changes in several homes, even though more still needs to be done.

Mothers/Women of African origins special meetings.

Similarly to the above, every last Saturday of the month was also consecrated to female meetings. These are fundamentally women of African origins, with the exception of a few individuals. The central theme of these meetings was all around self-empowerment and self-belief. Most females of African origins appear to struggle with personal mindset issues essentially due to the backgrounds rising up, which meant that they would see themselves as being inferior to males. During these sessions, we encourage females to join educational institutions, explaining that if they are more educated, they will increase opportunities for them to get good employment and consequently make a greater difference in society.



Promoting the advancement of Christianity.

In July 2022, we organised our usual annual Manchester for Christ (M4C) conference. It was a blessing to have at least five people commit to giving their lives to Christ and agree to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ.

Furthermore, like every year, we organised a special women's gathering to celebrate International Women's Day in March 2022. At a time when the Eastern part of DRC is still experiencing a high number of females being raped because rebels of the M23 rebel group and others are using rape as a war weapon, we encouraged all women to remain optimistic that things would change in DR Congo one day. It was essential to bring a message of comfort because numerous of our members have also been victims of rape and torture in the past. Once more, all topics/discussions were centered around building up self-confidence following a traumatic experience.

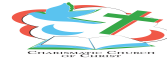
We are providing education to the most deprived and vulnerable of our communities.

Building on the work initiated last (previous) years, education was again a pillar of our work this season. English is the second language for the majority of our service users. Many young people—children of refugees who have been granted indefinite leave to remain in the UK have managed to get into higher education. However, as we have been made aware that they need help with assignments at the university/high education level, we have started targeted essay support for all attending university/higher education (basic proofreading). This is done free of charge by three of our members who have thankfully managed to become lecturers in UK universities. This has made a positive impact, as feedback has confirmed.

Moreover, during all services—as this is our habit—we always encourage everyone to continue pursuing their studies as soon as they are granted their indefinite leave to remain in the UK.

The relief of poverty

In the circumstances of continuous fighting, killing and rape in the Eastern part of the DRC, our organisations asked church members to voluntarily donate anything they could afford so that we could send the funds to people affected in DR Congo. Funds were sent through a foundation operating in Eastern Congo, led by the Nobel Prize, Dr Denis Mukwege (The Mukwege Foundation is an international rights-based, survivor-centred organisation working to change the global response to conflict-related sexual violence.). Also, we sent some clothes, shoes, and some food. Priority was given to females who were victims of rape by soldiers/militia/etc. Moreover, on Saturday, 24th December 2022, church members met in Piccadilly, where we donated free food, warm clothes, and others to homeless people in Central Manchester.



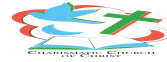

This is done free of charge by two of our members who have thankfully managed to become lecturers in UK universities and are competent in this field. This has made a positive impact as feedback have confirmed.

We are looking forward to carrying on with this project next year.

Moreover, during all services, we always encourage everyone to continue pursuing their studies as soon as they are granted their uncertain immigration status in the UK.

The relief of poverty

In the circumstances of the fighting, killing and rape in the Eastern part of the DRC, our organisations asked church members to voluntarily donate anything they could afford so that we could send the funds to people affected in DR Congo and Cameroon. All funds collected were sent to deprived persons in DR Congo and Cameroon. Priority was given to females who were victims of rape by soldiers/militia/etc.

Promoting the advancement of Christian religion/Worship and Prayer

Once more, like every year, to celebrate International Women's day in March 2021, we organised a women gathering for two days (13-14 March 2021). In the context of Covid-19 still affecting life, it was a blended activity at church (with a small number) and the majority following on Facebook.

At a time when the Eastern part of DRC was experiencing a high number of females being raped because rebels and others are using rape as a war weapon, we encouraged all women to remain optimistic that things would change in DR Congo one day. It was essential to bring a message of comfort because numerous of our members have also been victims of rape and torture in the past. All topics/discussions were centered around building up self-confidence following a traumatic experience. Moreover, we signed post women to organisations such as FREEDOM FROM TORTURE where they could get additional professional support. Overall, even though there were some issues with the online connection, the event was a great success.

In July 2021, we organised our usual Manchester for Christ (M4C) conference as things were timidly re-opening. We used the same blended approach as the Women's conference. The feedback from the majority was that they would



prefer the event to occur face-to-face. However, on the positive side, it was a blessing to have at least nine people who committed to giving their lives to Jesus Christ. We are now looking forward to getting back to normal next year.

Some of the CCC's achievements and performance (2020 – 2021)

The relief of poverty

The unforeseen start of the Covid-19 pandemic at the commencement of 2020, especially with the very first lockdown in March 2020 rendered conducting our activities as usual very difficult. Instead a significant majority of interaction took place online. Following the women's annual conference which took place in March 2020, our organisation created different groups on ZOOM to keep in touch with all members. Furthermore, we put in place a small team of 7 people holding full driving licenses to deliver food and drinks to those who were self-isolating. Beneficiaries included not only members of our church, but also the general public, especially communities of African backgrounds living in Greater Manchester region. As it was not possible to hold day out in Piccadilly as we did in previous years, these one-to-one home visits made a huge difference in the mental health of hundreds of individuals already negatively affected by past trauma issues.

Providing 'online' education to the most deprived and vulnerable.

As many education providers (schools, colleges, etc) closed and moved all their activities online, we similarly introduced a new service of supporting young people online (on ZOOM). Additionally, we took time to train and explain to the most advanced in aged who were not familiar with using computers and/or similar, or not accustomed with communicating on platforms such as Skype, Zoom, Google meets, etc, how to do so appropriately. It might be important de signal that most of our service users are individuals with low literacy knowledge. So, this project has made a huge difference, especially withing the challenging contexts of Covid-19.

- (2) to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.
