Following the FCDO 'Tools For Teachers' project completed in 2022, feedback continues to remain positive and skills learned continue to be shared amongst local teachers and the children are forging ahead with their literacy skills. Schools in UK are sharing their surplus resources which LFLG have sent to be shared in Ghanaian schools. The Ghanaian pupils learning experience has been enhanced and lending libraries have been established in several schools. Ghana Education Service personnel monitoring these schools have been impressed that the Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE) results in these schools have improved year on year over the last 4 years. English Maths and Science Examination grades previously sat in the lower ranges of 5, 6 and 7 and this year grades of 1-4 have been achieved in all three subjects. The profile of these schools has risen, resulting in happy children, happy parents, proud teachers, satisfied GES inspectors, and more guardians wanting to enrol their wards. This in turn brings more funds into the school and makes it self-sustaining.

LFLG volunteers in Ghana and UK continue to oversee the establishment of young learners into further and higher education training opportunities.

LFLG have a strong policy portfolio in place that is reviewed annually by the trustees.

The FCDO 'Tools For Teachers' project completed in 2022, trained 180 Ghanaian teachers in how to support children with SEN in their classroom. The training was from a literacy perspective and gave guidance, advice and resources to each teacher. Identifying local 'hub teachers' to promote new teaching techniques has made the training locally sustainable. Feedback continues to advise that skills learned are still being shared amongst local teachers and children are continuing to improve their literacy skills through these approaches to learning.

The FCDO project 'Tools For Teachers' was finally completed this year and given an A+ grading. Outcomes exceeded expectations with all targeted outputs achieved. UKAid noted, that due to interventions shared in the training, there was a significant improvement in primary reading age of more than 6 months (Initial testing of over two thousand children identified most children's reading age was less than half their actual age).

The project trained 180 Ghanaian teachers in how to support children with SEN in their classroom. The training was from a literacy perspective and gave guidance, advice and resources to each teacher. Identifying local 'hub teachers' to promote new teaching techniques has made the training locally sustainable.

LFLG have a strong policy portfolio in place that is reviewed annually by the trustees.


