## 5.0 Appointment and Induction of Trustees

No new trustees have been appointed this year. If required the Trustees will recruit new trustees. Trustees will be chosen for their understanding of the community and will have earned the respect of the wider community or have the potential to do so.

When recruiting new trustees, the Trustees will seek to identify people who,

- Regularly attend events and functions organised by the Peace Institute.
- Are willing to volunteer to help in our broader community work.
- Can represent Islam as a peaceful way of life.

Potential trustees will be invited to observe board meeting where the charity's aims and activities will be outlined.

Once agreed by the Trustees they will be appointed, new trustees will be introduced to their role and given copies of key publications from the Charity Commission. They are also signposted to other resources including the guidance on charities and public benefit and the advancement of religion for the public benefit to ensure new trustees are aware of the scope of their responsibilities under the Charities Act. Initially, new trustees will work with an existing trustee assisting with particular activities and projects run by the charity.

## 6.0 Risk Management

The trustees assess risks on a project-by-project basis and satisfy themselves that adequate systems are in place to safeguard the organisation and the beneficiaries.

## 7.0 Objectives of the Organisation

Our objectives have been set out in our governing document as follows;

  - f) Engaging and interacting with the wider public and other institutions to raise awareness and understanding of the peaceful nature of Islam.
- 2) The prevention or relief of poverty or financial hardship anywhere in the world and to anyone by providing and/or assisting in the provision of food, housing, education, training, healthcare projects and all the necessary support designed to enable individuals to generate a sustainable income and be self-sufficient.
- 3) The relief of financial need and suffering among victims of war, natural disaster, trouble, catastrophe or other kinds of disaster in the form of money or other means deemed suitable for persons, bodies, organisations and/or countries affected including the provision of medical aid.
- 4) The promotion of religious and racial harmony for the public benefit through;
- a) Promoting knowledge and mutual understanding between different groups on the different belief systems and no belief systems.
  - b) Advancing education and raising awareness about different racial, religious and non-religious groups to promote good relations and highlight common ground to promote humanity and harmony.
  - c) Working towards the elimination of discrimination and mistrust on the grounds of race, religion and no religion.

## 8.0 Strategies

The trustees still have a long term aim to build a "Peace Centre" which will be a one-stop facility where all people (people of faith and no faith, Muslims and non-Muslims) or those who wish to know more about our faith can gather together to learn. This facility will be accessible to all who wish to understand real Islam in the 21st century and its compatibility with global universal values and train the next generation of youth and Imams.

## 9.0 Activities for the Financial Year

The activities of "The Peace Institute" have been curtailed. The work undertaken has been varied and mainly concerning nurturing youth and raising concerns regarding injustices and prejudices mainly in the holy lands.

Our activities and initiatives included the following;

### 9.1 Interfaith Forums

The trustees feel the interfaith forum is an excellent vehicle to portray Islam as a peaceful way of life. Following the resignation from the North Kirklees Interfaith the trustee plan to reengage with the forum in due course.

### 9.2 Faith advisory work with School, Colleges and Universities

The Peace Institute engages with various Schools, Colleges and Universities in the region for faith-related expertise to offer confidential advice and resolve conflicts / potential conflicts.

### 9.3 Plight of Muslims Globally

The Peace Institute continues to raise awareness through seminars, public meetings, collecting donations, writing to officials and holding special prayers. This year like previously, we have been active in supporting the plight of Muslims and Christians in Palestine and India.

### 9.4 Islamic Marriage and counselling

Directors continue to,

- a) Conduct Islamic marriages after appropriate due diligence. Normally marriages are conducted in Mosques.
- b) Offer marriage counselling service or couples going through difficult situation based on Islamic principles.

### **9.5 Adult Islamic Learning**

The scholars of the Peace Institute conduct weekly classes both face to face and on social media for adults from a basic to an advanced level. Subjects include;

- Quran reading with proper pronunciations,
- Quranic Exegesis (explanation).
- Belief (Aqeeda).
- Classical Arabic.
- Hadith.
- Jurisprudence.
- Islamic History and Modern Challenges.
- Discussions on related and unrelated issues.

## **10.0 Income Sources**

All the funds received by The Peace Institute are solely from Muslim donors in the form of Zakat, Sadaqa, Fitrana and Lillah. We have not received funding from any other source this year or previously.

## **11.0 Going Concerns**

The Peace Institute is a stable organisation and meets its current obligations and continue its charitable work for the foreseeable future. Its activities are run by the trustees and volunteers in a purely voluntary capacity.

## **12.0 Trustees' Responsibilities**

The Charities Act requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are

- Can represent Islam as a peaceful way of life.

Potential trustees will be invited to attend trustees' meetings as observers and will be given more details of the charity's aims and activities. Following this, if all agree, they will then be proposed as new trustees at the subsequent trustees' meeting. This process allows due consideration of the person's eligibility, personal competence, specialist knowledge and skills.

Following the appointment, new trustees will be introduced to their role and given copies of the trust deed and a guide to the policies and procedures adopted by our charity. Several publications from the Charity Commission are also signposted including the guidance on charities and public benefit and the advancement of religion for the public benefit. This ensures that new trustees are aware of the scope of their responsibilities under the Charities Act. Initially, new trustees will work with an existing trustee assisting with particular activities and projects run by the charity.

The trustees felt the forum was not supportive of this suffering and the trustees resigned from the interfaith earlier in the year due to its insensitivities towards the plight of the Palestinians people and other local factors.

- b) Offer marriage counselling service or couples going through difficult situation based on Islamic principles.

The Peace Institute continued to offer students pastoral support during the lockdown and supported the University Student Services to develop the new faith centre.

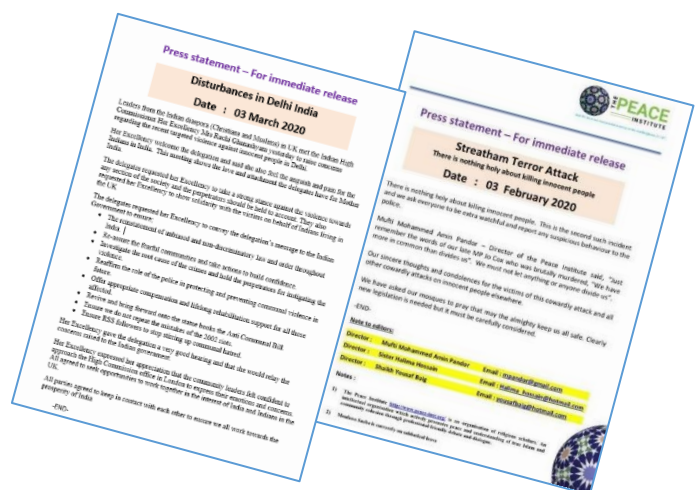


At the fresher’s week “The Peace Institute worked alongside the University to ensure maximum take-up of Covid 19 vaccination.

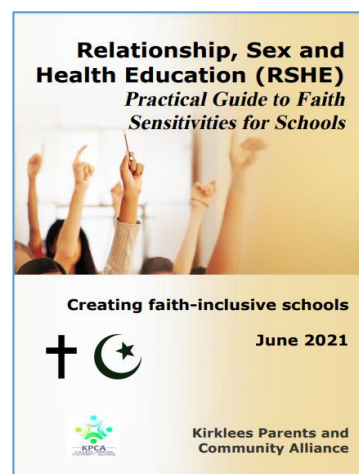

## 7.6 Relationship, Sex and Health Education (RSHE)

Directors of the Peace Institute were involved with Christian clergy to develop RSHE guidance titled, "Relationship, Sex and Health Education (RSHE) *Practical Guide to Faith Sensitivities for Schools*"<sup>1</sup>, to help parents and schools to ensure schools understood faith sensitivities and avoid adverse publicity outside schools.

The guidance summarises evidence based sensitivities relating to Islam and Christianity from the Quran and the Bible.

Schools and parents welcomed this easy to read guidance and commented very positively on the scenario and the FAQs which they found very useful.



## 7.7 Mosque Open Day

Following the successful Mosque Open Day in 2019, the Peace Institute had planned a Mosque Open Day which could not go ahead due to Covid 19 lockdown. The Directors had planned a visit from students at Istanbul University to learn from the Peace Institute on how to project manage a successful Mosque Open day.

## 7.11 Combating Racism – “I Cannot Breathe”

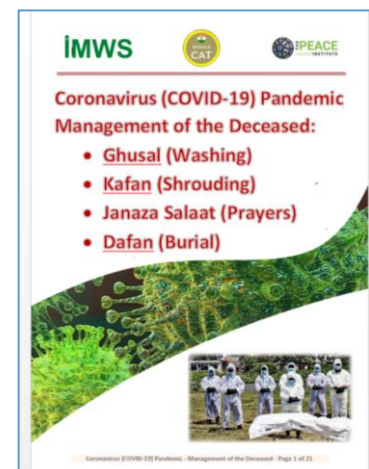
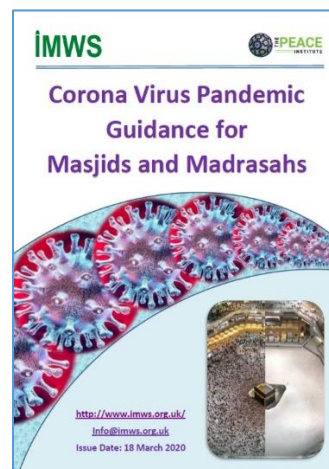
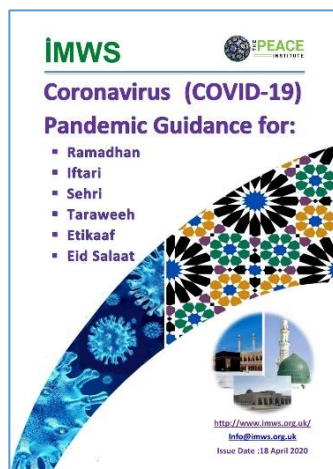
The Directors of The Peace Institute joined with other organisations and young people to peacefully combat racist demonstrations held in Kirklees against Muslims.
