Trustees Report for the year ended 31 December 2024

Objects:

THE ADVANCEMENT OF EDUCATION, RELIEF OF POVERTY AND RELIEF OF SICKNESS AND PRESERVATION OF HEALTH OF PEOPLE LIVING IN THE KANUNGU DISTRICT OF UGANDA BY THE PROVISION OF ITEMS, SERVICES AND WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP WITH KINKIZI DIOCESE, CHURCH OF UGANDA.

The Charities achievements for this year:

In 2024, we have continued to support the communities of Kanungu District where we possibly can. There have been several challenges, including an outbreak of Ebola which again resulted in restrictions on moving and selling animals. This caused great financial hardship to many families and the results are still being felt. Families have not been able to provide for their children and no meat or milk can be digested. The father of one of the sponsored students' fathers, who was a butcher, died from this disease which has caused great hardship to his widow and children. We managed to offer more support for this family.

Hope House has expanded its sponsorship program, now supporting an additional 10 children, bringing the total to 105 children who are fully sponsored for their education and training. Additionally, 200 children receive partial fee subsidies through Hope House, with the subsidy programs managed by Nyarugunda Secondary School and Kambuga Primary School, which select the beneficiaries. We are also celebrating with some of our older students as they graduate from training and university

The "Sew Much Hope" project, which provides tailoring training to women living in poverty, has successfully completed three cohorts. Thanks to this initiative, 45 women have now established their own businesses. Follow-up reports indicate that all women we have contacted have increased their income, with some running highly successful businesses. We will look to expand our training program next year.

Our "Growing Hope" project has done well this year. This agricultural program aims to teach local youth and children better land use techniques for growing nutritious food and cash crops. The bananas and coffee produced will be sold to help Hope House achieve self-sustainability in the future. Although we are struggling with the day to day effects of climate change and either too much, or not enough rain, we are pleased with the management of this project by our groundsman and his wife.

We held a big celebration where we gathered most of the families we support and gave them a fine lunch (after the Ebola restrictions were lifted) and provided families with a hen, food and school supplies. This was gratefully received.

We now have 8 cows at the farm and all have been vaccinated against Ebola. Our coffee-growing project at the farm is doing well and next year, we expect a mature

harvest from all the plants there. The land is 4 acres and now the coffee is maturing, it will fund the boys' food and managers' wages. There are 4 boys at the farm, we added another boy who was in a terrible situation this year. He has settled down and is learning agriculture. He is not yet interested in joining education, but we will give him time to settle in.

Nyarugunda Secondary School received fair results for the first time after the hall was completed in 2023. Every student passed their exams and many have now gone on to further education with our support.

We have renewed 12-month contracts for our sewing trainer and groundsman/guard, ensuring they are paid according to Ugandan salary regulations. Additionally, we employ casual labourers for farm and Hope House activities and a building contractor for infrastructure projects.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to everyone who has contributed to our efforts in Kanungu District. Your support is invaluable and makes our work possible.

Plans for the coming Year:

Looking ahead to 2025, we plan to continue to expand our work in Uganda, supporting more communities, educating more children, and making our programs even more sustainable.

The Charities achievements for this year:

In 2023, Uganda lifted the Ebola-related restrictions that had previously led to the early closure of schools. As a result, for the first time since 2019, education continued uninterrupted, allowing children to return to their regular timetables.

Hope House has expanded its sponsorship program, now supporting an additional 10 children, bringing the total to 95 children who are fully sponsored for their education and training. Additionally, 200 children receive partial fee subsidies through Hope House, with the subsidy programs managed by Nyarugunda Secondary School and Kambuga Primary School, which select the beneficiaries.

The "Sew Much Hope" project, which provides tailoring training to women living in poverty, has successfully completed three cohorts. Thanks to this initiative, 25 women have now established their own businesses. Follow-up reports indicate that all women we have contacted have increased their income, with some running highly successful businesses.

As part of the "Growing Hope" project, we fenced the land opposite the Hope House building and began establishing a banana and coffee plantation. This agricultural program aims to teach local youth and children better land use techniques for growing nutritious food and cash crops. The bananas and coffee produced will be sold to help Hope House achieve self-sustainability in the future.

We also gathered our students and their friends more regularly at Hope House on Saturdays and during school holidays for meetings, play, meals, study sessions, and sports activities.

Our coffee-growing project at the farm, which supports homeless boys and troubled young men, has been further expanded. We also increased our herd by purchasing more goats to provide families with livestock and acquired another cow to supply milk to the boys and local children.

The construction of Nyarugunda Secondary School's hall was completed, enabling the school to obtain a center number, which allows students to sit for examinations on-site rather than traveling long distances to another secondary school. The first group of 20 Senior 4 candidates took their exams, with results expected in 2024.

One generous sponsor built their sponsored a family a brand new house which was very much appreciated by the family.

We have renewed 12-month contracts for our sewing trainer and groundsman/guard, ensuring they are paid according to Ugandan salary regulations. Additionally, we employ casual laborers for farm and Hope House activities and a building contractor for infrastructure projects.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to everyone who has contributed to our efforts in Kanungu District. Your support is invaluable and makes our work possible.

Plans for the coming Year:

Looking ahead to 2024, we plan to further expand our work in Uganda, supporting more communities, educating more children, and making our programs even more sustainable.

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

Addendum to the 2023 Independent examiner's report to the Trustees of Hope House Enju Ya Masiko.

The complexities of the Ugandan banking system and the need to maximise the use of the funds provided means that making payments from a personal current account using Worldremit is considered to be the best option.

In order to ensure a more robust examination process the following actions are recommended:

1. There are currently two savings accounts to which the Trustees make payments. One of the savings accounts should be designated as exclusively for the purpose of receiving payments from the Charity
2. A dedicated personal current account should be opened and used exclusively for making payments from the Charity
3. A record should be maintained showing the date of and purpose of every transaction made from this account with, as far as is practical, receipts supporting each transaction.

These arrangements should be implemented as soon as possible but, in any event, to ensure full compliance for the start of 2025.

The Charities achievements for this year:

2022 finally saw COVID restrictions lifted in Uganda and children return to school. Hope House expanded its sponsorship programme and over 80 children now are fully sponsored for their education and training. In addition to that, 100 children are subsidised, meaning that their fees are paid in part by Hope House.

As well as education resuming, we were able to begin training programmes at Hope House. "Sew Much Hope" takes women who are living in poverty and trains them in tailoring. The pilot project began in February 2022 with 5 women selected to train. Each lady attended Hope House twice a week for 6 months. They were partnered with a woman in the UK in a saving scheme. Whatever our ladies could save, over the 6 months, was matched by their partner and the money could be used as business start up capital. In addition, Hope House purchased each student a sewing machine which they trained on and then took home if they completed the course. The pilot scheme was successful and all 5 women reported that they increased their income. The second intake of students was doubled to 10 ladies and they began training in October 2022.

Hope House was securely fenced and another project "Growing Hope" began. This agricultural programme teaches local young people and children better ways of using the land available to them to grow more nutritious food. The food we have grown has been distributed to local schools and the poorest families.

We were able to gather our available students and their friends on a more regular basis at Hope House on Saturdays and in school holidays to meet, play, eat, study and take part in sports.

Other work that was able to resume this year was infrastructure support at Nyarugunda Secondary School. We began building a school hall for the students with the support of St. Mary's Church, Haughton Green. We also expanded our coffee growing project at the farm where we support homeless boys and troubled young men. We bought cows to provide milk for the boys there and the local children and provide fertilizer for the farm.

We have employed, on a 12 month contract, a sewing trainer and a groundsman/guard. These are local people who are paid in accordance with Ugandan salary regulations. We also employ casual day labourers to help at the farm and hope house and have a building contractor for any infrastructure projects.

We supported many families, businesses, schools, individuals and organisations in so many ways - our ethos being a hand up not a hand out - and saw Uganda make a tentative recovery from the devastating economic and social effects of COVID. However, by the end of 2022, the Ugandan economy again faced crisis due to a serious outbreak of Ebola which saw some restrictions come back into force, and the effects of the war in Ukraine which increased prices dramatically. Failed harvests have also put pressure on the people of Kanungu and means we must work much harder and smarter to support our families.

Plans for the coming Year:

In 2023, we hope to expand our work in Uganda further; supporting more communities, educating more children and expanding our existing programmes.



The Charities achievements for this year:

2021 was another frustrating year for Hope House due to the Covid Pandemic. Uganda has shut down all schools so our 60+ students were unable to attend their places of study. Schools have been closed all year, due to the Ugandan Government regulations, except for higher or tertiary education and to those taking final exams. Movement has been heavily restricted. We have supported our students and their families with study materials, small group outdoor studies, private tuition and family support in the form of food, agricultural supplies and medical needs. We were not allowed to start any projects or gather in large numbers at Hope House and the building remained unused although the grounds hosted some small group learning. When some of the restrictions were lifted, we built a kitchen, accomodation and store block on the site ready for projects to begin in 2022.

Plans for the coming Year:

Once restrictions are lifted in January 2022, the sponsored students will be back in school, and more will be added to their numbers. Education programmes will resume.

We also would like to expand the Hope House Community Centre site with a community kitchen, animal housing, and outdoor latrine block. We hope to start programmes to support women in the local area become financially independent, agricultural crop growing projects and expand the farm that supports young boys/men, as well as being able to fundraise once again in the UK.

The Charities achievements for this year:

Annual Statement for HOHO Dec 2019-Dec 2020

With phase one of our building programme virtually completed in December 2019, we were looking forward to beginning some small community projects using local people and our UK worker who relocated to Uganda in 2019. However, with the Covid-19 global pandemic emerging and spreading, Uganda and UK entered restrictions from March 2020 and all work and fundraising was, unfortunately, suspended. No children have attended school from March 2020 to December 2020 and no further advancement of the Hope House programmes can continue to date. Our finances and fundraising have been severely affected but we have been able to support some communities with crisis food support.

December 2020

Plans for the coming Year:

We are hoping to hold fundraising event again. The following plans have been discussed, A virtual walk to Uganda, Band concert and Christmas Fair. We will plan events as and when coronavirus restrictions lift. We also hope to continue with the building work on Hope House in order for it to be fit for purpose. A kitchen block and store room need to be built as well as a living area for a night watchman. We will also need water connecting and the latrine block built. We are hoping that some of our projects can start next year and that our sponsored children can return to school.


Charity law requires the trustees to prepare accounts for each financial year, which is a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of the profit and loss of the charity for that period. In preparing these accounts, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- Make adjustments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- Prepare accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Charities Acts. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The trustees confirm that the accounts comply with current statutory requirements and those of the Charity's trust deed.
