An Introduction from our chair of trustees

This year has been one of growth, resilience, and deepening impact for Nurture Through Nature. Our commitment to sustainability has taken a significant step forward through our partnership with FareShare, culminating in the introduction of the Ridan composter in September 2024. This innovative system allows us to process food waste unfit for human consumption, transforming it into compost that nourishes our growing plot.



Thanks to successful fundraising—through both grant applications and community-driven initiatives—we continue to be in a stable financial position, enabling us to plan confidently for the future. We've also expanded our volunteer base, particularly through new weekend sessions, allowing us to grow more food and reach more citizens in need of food support. Together, we are cultivating a stronger, more sustainable community.

Public Benefit

Nurture Through Nature aims to relieve poverty by donating fresh produce grown on our allotment plots with volunteers to local food banks and community kitchens. This year we donated our produce to Brighton Unemployed Families Centre, City Mission Food Bank and the Real Junk Food Cafe.

Activities

We continued to cultivate our three allotment plots at Natal Road allotments and to collect spare produce from fellow plot holders to add to our donations and reduce food waste.

We joined the community composting partnership with the Brighton and Hove Food Partnership and other local groups and were donated a Ridan Composter so that we can compost our green waste and receive out of date food from FareShare to compost. This keeps food waste out of the local refuse system and puts it to use helping us to grow more fresh produce. We also partner with FareShare to deliver our produce to food banks on an ebike that helps reduce environmental pollution and makes us more sustainable.



We continue to work with a large and varied group of volunteers from the University of Brighton, the local community and have hosted three employee volunteering sessions over the year. Our volunteer group comprises around 40 active volunteers.

Funders

We are grateful to the National Lottery Awards For All, Brighton And Hove Allotment Federation and the Yapp Charitable Trust for funding us this year and beyond.

Sincere thanks also go to all the donors, large and small, who have contributed to our ongoing fundraising campaign, launched in the summer of 2024.

The Need

The organisations that we donate to have all reported that the demand on their services continues and grows. All have reported shortages of donated food and pressure on resources so our contributions are very welcome.



Rising food prices, low wages and high rents have continued to put pressure on household budgets so that people continue to look for help to feed themselves and their families.

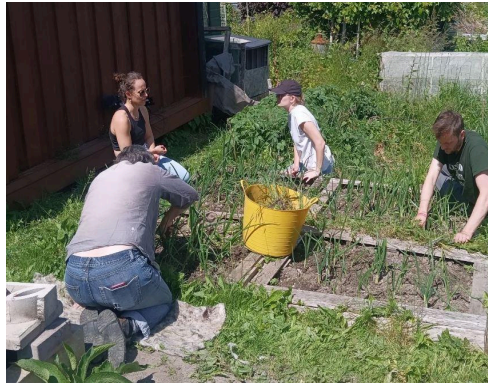
Challenges in Fundraising

Our dedicated volunteers and community partners are at the heart of this effort, and together, we are confident that we can make a significant impact on food poverty in our region.

Summary of the Main Achievements of the Charity for the Year APRIL 2023 to MARCH 2024

- This year we ran 2 volunteer growing sessions a week from April to mid-December and then from February to March.
- Sessions were attended by an average of six volunteers a session though Friday sessions remain more popular.
- We received funding from Sussex Community Foundation and by The National Lottery Awards for All.
- A big change this year was the resignation of Drew Hardy in October 2023 . Drew had chaired the organisation since it began in 2017. Drew led the organisation with clarity and compassion and also provided expertise on pollutants and toxins on those occasions when we took on clearing rubbish from new allotments. We are very grateful for Drew's leadership during those years.
- In December 2023 we welcomed our new Chair of Trustees, Luke Ashby. Luke had been a volunteer so understood the organisation and what we do. Luke's professional background is in governance.
- We continued welcoming University of Brighton students on 30 hour community placement via our links with the university's Active Student team. Long term placements such as these allow the volunteers to learn and develop gardening skills and some also assist in the planning and supervision of the plot. This year we hosted 3 students.
- In September 2023 we were invited to talk to the Brighton and Hove Allotment Holders Federation of (BHAF). BHAF is an entirely voluntary group that works to represent and further the interests of plot holders so we were happy to tell them about what we do. The talk was well received and BHAF has been looking at ways to encourage other allotment sites to use the same model to grow fresh food for food banks.

- In March 2024, we attended the Mayor's reception for food growing groups. The reception was arranged by Councillor Jacqui O'Quinn, the outgoing mayor, as she had a particular connection with the city's growing groups. The event celebrated the range and extent of food growing in the city and the contribution they make to health and wellbeing.



- In addition to donating vegetables that we have grown, we also collect surplus crops from fellow plot holders to reduce food waste and this year we began using a decommissioned fridge as a donation point so that people can donate when we are not available.
- We continued to donate most of our produce to the City Food Bank and the Real Junk Food Project.
- A few words about the context in which we work. Brighton may seem like a prosperous city however a Brighton and Hove Food Partnership report produced in October 2023 noted that 6,441 people in the city rely on emergency food services every week, equivalent to 2.3% of the population and an increase of 25% since 2021. And that our regional level of food poverty is slightly higher than the national average at 11.3 - Overall, 59% of all households believe that they will have to cut back on food bills to pay their utility bills going forward. BAME people and students are increasingly affected



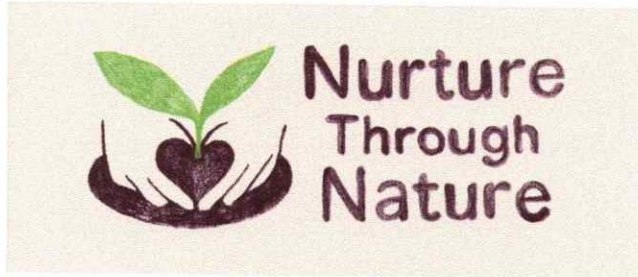



Summary of the Main Achievements of the Charity for the Year APRIL 2022 to MARCH 2023

- In the period from 1st April 2022 to 31st March 2023, we ran two weekly volunteering sessions cultivating three allotment plots.
- We received funding from Sussex Community Foundation, Homity Trust, National Lottery Awards for All, Enjoolat Foundation and Brighton and Hove City Council.
- We continue to run our session with 10 volunteers including our session supervisor to ensure the safety of our volunteers and to avoid inconveniencing people working on neighbouring plots.
- We grew potatoes, carrots, onions, spinach, beetroot, courgettes, salad, apples, beans, and pears. In total we produced 295 kilograms of fruit and vegetables.
- We were delighted to be nominated for the Radio Sussex and Surrey Make A difference Awards 2022 and were highly commended.
- We received plenty of volunteer support with a core group of five volunteers at most sessions and almost all sessions had the full complement of 9 volunteers.
- We continued to work with the Active student team to host students from University of Brighton on 30 hour community placements.
- The project took its usual winter break from Mid December to end January 2021 though this year we trialled having the administrator work half time and this was useful as we received volunteer applications and were able to apply for funding with a January deadline.
- We continued to work as part of Brighton and Hove Food Partnership and are represented on the Moulsecoomb Allotments Committee.

Basis of independent examiner's report



Summary of the Main Achievements of the Charity for the Year **APRIL 2021 to MARCH 2022**


- In the period from 1st April 2021 to 31st March 2022, we ran three weekly volunteering sessions cultivating three allotment plots, one more session a week compared to the previous year. The additional session was organised to grow extra produce on our third plot for the Fareshare e-bike project that ran from March to November 2021.
- We received funding from Sussex Community Foundation, National Lottery Awards for All, Enjoolat Foundation, Lennox Hannay Charitable Trust and Chalkhill Community Trust fund.
- This year we operated under lighter Covid 19 pandemic restrictions on the plot with our session number restricted to 10 including our session supervisor to ensure the safety of our volunteers and anyone working on neighbouring plots.
- Our e-bike project was a partnership project with FareShare Brighton to test sustainable delivery. We grew produce and they distributed it using an e-bike and delivered it to 18 different community food outlets and food banks.
- We received plenty of volunteer support with a core group of five volunteers at most sessions and almost all sessions had the full complement of 9 volunteers.
- We continued to work with the Active student team to host students from University of Brighton on 30 hour community placements.
- The project took its usual winter break from Mid December to end January 2021
- We continued to work as part of Brighton and Hove Food Partnership and are represented on the Moulsecomb Allotments Committee.
- We grew vegetables on our plots to the approximate retail value of £5000. In addition we add value by delivering produce to food banks as and when they need it as few

have storage facilities for fresh vegetables. Without our donations many food bank users would receive no fresh vegetables with their food parcel. In addition our volunteers often use their new produce growing skills at home and some go on to study horticulture.

Summary of the Main Achievements of the Charity for the Year APRIL 2020 to MARCH 2021

- In the period from 1st April 2020 to 31st March 2021, we ran three volunteering sessions a week. The project took its usual winter break from Mid December to End January 2021
- We produced enough vegetables from our allotments to donate large sacks and crates of produce to food banks on 26 occasions this year. All donations were delivered to the Brighton Food Bank operated by the Brighton & Hove City Mission, and the Brighton Unemployed Families Centre.
- We received donations of surplus food from other allotments on 13 occasions.
- We began working in partnership with FareShare Brighton and Hove. We took on our third plot and grew vegetables for Fareshare who distribute and donate them to food banks using an eBike.
- Over the year 124 people registered to volunteer at the plot.
- We operated under Covid 19 pandemic restrictions throughout the year. We carried out risk assessments of our activities and adapted our working practices to enable us to continue operating and providing vegetables to our beneficiaries.
- We were one of the few volunteer hosting organisations able to continue throughout the pandemic but we worked in smaller groups to maintain the safety of volunteers and people on neighbouring plots. We continued to receive plenty of volunteer support and offered a rare opportunity for people to get out of the house and socialise safely.

- We continued to work as part of Brighton and Hove Food Partnership and were part of the Brighton and Hove Emergency Food Distribution committee.
- Project workers are Nick Blewitt, Gardening Supervisor and Kate Honeyford, administrator.


