REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE PETER OJIAMBO FOUNDATION (POF)

2025 – 2026

During the period 2025–2026, the Peter Ojiambo Foundation (POF) focused its efforts on advancing training on global leadership and social impact. The Foundation implemented a targeted training program aimed at equipping youth leaders, executives, C-Suite and professionals with leadership skills, personal agency, and social responsibility to thrive in modern professional and societal contexts.

Preparation for the Training Module

Significant time and expertise were invested in the development of a comprehensive training manual on *Personal Agency in a Professional Environment*.

The POF team spent several hours collaboratively designing and refining the module, ensuring it addressed contemporary leadership needs and practical realities in professional environments. Key contributors to the module development included:

The preparation phase focused on:

- Aligning the content with global leadership standards
- Integrating experiential learning and reflective practice
- Addressing mental health and psychosocial well-being, identity, and advocacy
- Ensuring relevance to the young professionals, emerging leaders and professionals

Outreach and Institutional Engagement

The Peter Ojiambo Foundation conducted extensive outreach to partner institutions to facilitate the delivery of the training program. Outreach activities included engagement and collaboration with several institutions within Nairobi Metropolis and Bungoma County and in the USA namely:

- United States International University (USIU)
- Kibondeni College
- Strathmore University
- Kibabii University
- Stanford University USA

The Foundation also held several follow-up meetings with the USIU, Head of Business Development- Executive Education, Mr. Joseph Munyao, to coordinate program delivery, align institutional objectives, and strengthen collaboration.

In addition, POF hosted a visit by Ms. Milly Karimi from Stanford University, which provided valuable engagement, global perspectives, and strengthened the Foundation's international outlook and partnerships.

Engagement with Kibabii University

As part of deepening institutional collaboration, Amb. Josephine Ojiambo made two visits to Kibabii University. During these visits, she held consultative meetings with:

- Mzee Wetangula
- Prof. Nyukuri Barasa
- Dr. Rispah Wepukhulu

Following these engagements, the team further assembled at Mzee Wetangula's home, where deliberations were held on leadership development and youth empowerment. The meeting culminated in a collective agreement to conduct a training titled *"Empowering You for Global Leadership and Social Impact"* at Kibabii University.

Highlights of the Training Course

The Global Leadership and Social Impact Bootcamp delivered by POF comprised the following core modules:

- Global Leadership and Etiquette
- Building Personal Agency and Emotional Intelligence
- Mental Health
- Being Male in a Modern World
- Advocacy for Social Change

The training emphasized practical application, self-awareness, and community impact.

The 2025–2026 period marked a significant milestone in the work of the Peter Ojiambo Foundation. Through strategic outreach, intensive module development, strong institutional partnerships, and high-impact training, POF successfully advanced its mission of nurturing ethical, resilient, and socially conscious leaders.

Report on the work of the Peter Ojiambo Foundation (POF) 2023 – 2024

During the period 2023/2024, the efforts of the Peter Ojiambo Foundation largely focused on the green transition initiatives and continued its efforts in the advocacy for Sickle Cell. These steered project activities at various locations including Konza Technopolis in Machakos County, Kisumu County and work in Nairobi metropolis. All the project work addressed National themes in these local contexts.

The Green transition

As part of the African Hydrogen Partnership (AHP) Consortium, members from the Peter Ojiambo Foundation participated in the development of a meticulous literature review on exploration of natural hydrogen in Kenya and other regions. This study was envisaged to bridge the gap by consolidating existing research, pinpointing knowledge gaps, emerging trends, and future development opportunities. Additionally, it provided a clear and accessible resource for researchers, policymakers, and anyone interested in harnessing hydrogen's potential in the country.

The POF team also attended the Eastern Africa Regional Green Hydrogen Symposium was held in Nairobi, Kenya, on May 14th -15th, 2025, at Mara Ole-Sereni Hotel in Nairobi. Hosted by the governments of Kenya and Germany, in collaboration with regional partners like the East African Center for Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency (EACREEE). Additionally, it featured high-level panels, technical sessions and networking opportunities, including a pre-event day on 13th May with side events such as B2B matchmaking, a green shipping round table and a Women in Green Hydrogen cocktail.

Advocacy for Sickle Cell

The Peter Ojiambo Foundation has continued its partnership with Ms Leah Masamo, a Kenyan sickle cell disease advocate, founder of the Africa Sickle Cell Organization (ASCO), and co-founder of @10003 warriors. The team, Josephine Ojiambo and Leah Masamo also participated during the inauguration of the "Sickle Cell Diseases Afya Dhabiti Project." This project was envisaged to address the myriad challenges faced by individuals and families affected by Sickle Cell Anaemia. Collectively, Ms. Leah Masamo and Dr. Josephine Ojiambo have contributed to the filming of Sickle Cell Warriors, an initiative meant to create awareness within the community.

In addition, the Peter Ojiambo Foundation is a member of the National Ministry of Health Sickle Cell Committee and is on the Technical Working Groups (TWGs) for Advocacy and Clinical Services. The committee meets monthly with a key focus on screening, reviewing and updating the National guidelines on Sickle cell management.

Konza Technopolis

The Board, management and staff of Konza Technopolis hosted a high-level meeting with

important participants to initiate a partnership with the UN system in Kenya. Representatives from the UN, Konza Board and staff, project stakeholders and the Friends of Konza Technopolis group were present. Amb. Dr. Ojiambo led a delegation of friends of Konza which included the Peter Ojiambo Foundation team. We were privileged to take a site visit to multiple sites including the Waste Water Reclamation and Treatment Facility, the streetscape, the power plant, the National Data Centre, the nearly completed KAIST (Kenya Advanced Institute of Science and Technology) and the University infrastructure. Potential areas of collaboration highlighted by Konza included the IASP World Conference, Konza Innovation Ecosystem, Smart city leadership, Research and Development, and Environmental sustainability.

The Sixth session of the United Nations Environmental Assembly

In 2025, members of the Peter Ojiambo Foundation also attended the high-level delegate meetings including the Sixth session of the United Nation Environmental Assembly (UNEA-6). The main theme of the session was effective, inclusive and sustainable multilateral choices to tackle the triple planetary crisis of climate change, biodiversity loss and pollution. The team attended multiple sessions and side events including Multilateral Environment Agreements, Accelerating implementation of the Kennington Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework supporting countries early action, Decarbonization and detoxification, plastic poison and womens' health among others.

Global Peace Leadership Conference

The Global Peace Leadership Conference (GPLC) 2024, held at the Radisson Blu Hotel in Nairobi, Kenya, convened delegates from Africa and across the globe to explore pathways towards peace, development, and cooperation. The conference centered around the theme "One Family Under God." The key objectives of the conference included: promoting an African Renaissance that draws on Africa's unique heritage and the strength of its spirituality and traditional values; empowering African leadership; strengthening intracontinental partnerships and cultivating ethical global citizenship. The conference preceded with the launch of the Chandaria tree nursery. Further, the event began with an opening plenary, followed by various discussions in thematic tracks, and was followed by a closing plenary which served to inspire, unify, and empower Africans to shape a future characterized by prosperity and peace.

Report on the work of the Peter Ojiambo Foundation 2024 - 2025.

During the elapsing period 2024 to 2025, the efforts of the Peter Ojiambo Foundation were largely focused on the Green transition and on Advocacy for Sickle Cell. These two work streams provided for project activities at locations including Konza Technopolis in Machakos County, Kisumu, the Maragoli hills, Kisumu city in Kisumu County, and work in Nairobi metropolis.

All the project work addressed National themes in these local contexts.

The Green transition

Members of the Foundation worked in a consortium with staff from the Faculty of Science and Technology, Chiromo campus of the University of Nairobi, an International NGO called One Health Lessons, and members of the County Government of Nyamira County. The consortium drafted a proposal on planting and growing Botanical gardens, including Fruit trees, and linking the same to young mothers' cooperatives. These cooperatives are the vehicle to coordinate the efforts of the young mothers in planting and growing lines of fruit trees and herbs among lines of indigenous trees. The mothers are trained to extract the raw botanical products from the trees. These are oranges, lemon grass and dark green vegetables and factor these into their families' nutrition. Any surplus produce is aggregated by the women in their cooperatives and sold to local and neighbouring markets. The Peter Ojiambo Foundation team worked alongside the consortium's members to ensure that the perspectives of children with disability are factored into the project at all levels. The health of these children is catered for at the community level by Health promoters who are trained to monitor the growth and cognitive development of the children. The project's initial focus is young mothers and their children under 6 years of age in 5 wards in Nyamira County of the Lake Region Economic Bloc. However, it is hoped to extend the project to cover the 16 neighbouring counties of the entire Lake Region Economic Bloc. The consortium has submitted a comprehensive grant Proposal to a Canadian government call for proposals and awaits feedback.

Advocacy for Sickle Cell

Over the last two years, the Peter Ojiambo Foundation worked in a partnership with Ms Leah Masamo and with support from Novartis, a pharmaceutical company, on Advocacy for Sickle cell. The team, Josephine Ojiambo and Leah Masamo, participated in a national conference held at the Ciala resort on the Maragoli foothills of Kisumu County at the end of 2024. At the conference, the duo spoke on the plight of Sickle Cell warriors in the face of scientific advancements. The two advocates brought perspectives on Advocacy and Caregiving to the conference. The duo organised a get-together for several warriors from the sickle cell community, on the margins of the conference. The get-together served to affirm, share best practices, and encourage the warriors. While in Kisumu County, Josephine visited a hospital site in disrepair within Kisumu city that the County Government wished to revamp and dedicate as a regional centre for excellence for Sickle cell care. Over the last 18 months, together with Dr. Joy Muyonga, Dr. Akoth, the County medical officer, Dr. Leisampayi, and related health staff, the team has mobilized resources from various agencies and revamped the site. Today, the Centre for Excellence for Sickle Cell is functional. It was launched by the Kisumu Governor in May 2025. There are still various requirements to provide a range of services, and we are reaching out to persons of goodwill for these.

The Foundation is a member of the National Ministry of Health Sickle Cell Committee and is on the Technical Working Groups (TWGs) for Advocacy and Clinical Services. The committee meets once every quarter and is currently working on celebrations to mark World Sickle Cell Day, and also on reviewing and updating the National guidelines on Sickle cell management.

Busia summit

The Peter Ojiambo Foundation provided secretariat support during the 12th Lake Region Economic Bloc (LREB) Summit, held in Busia County in 2024. The theme of the summit was “*Food Security in the Face of Climate Change: Building Partnerships towards Resilience among Communities in the Lake Region Economic Bloc.*” The summit brought together dignitaries and delegates from all 14 counties of the LREB. Key discussions focused on Entrepreneurial Universities, Climate Action, and Food Security, with particular emphasis on strengthening the role of universities in driving effective responses to climate change. A dedicated session led by the First Spouses explored the intersections of food and nutritional security, climate change, and their impacts on child development.
