The relief of suffering amongst wildlife in need of care and attention and in particular by the provision of a rescue and rehabilitation service for abandoned, neglected or injured wildlife and the advancement of public education in the needs and care of British wildlife.

Each year, the centre admits and cares for over 1,000 sick, injured and orphaned animals and birds from in and around Staffordshire. The aim is to rescue, rehabilitate and release. The rescue centre consists of a hospital with veterinary cover, a pool for the rehabilitation of water birds, spacious aviaries and enclosures.

The centre operates all year round, though the greatest proportion of out work involves caring for orphaned animals and birds in the spring and summer months. This could not do this without the support of a team of dedicated volunteers.

The centre also has a number of unwanted and rescued domestic animals from birds of prey to rabbits. All residents are cared for at the centre by a small team of permanent staff and volunteers who nurture them and give them lots of tender loving care. These animals then provide a valuable resource in educational talks and lectures to school children and other groups.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Another busy year for The British Wildlife Rescue Centre with total admissions at 1778. This number is increasing each year and we are finding that we are taking admissions from wider areas than ever before.

We operate in the summer months from 9am-6pm with staff and volunteers taking home orphans which need early morning and late evening feeds. After these hours we operate a messaging service via Facebook where we are on hand to offer advice out of hours.

Our 2 staff members and volunteers worked relentlessly, as always, caring for all admissions and answering the many phone calls, emails and messages each day.

Fundraising in a national lockdown has been difficult as all external fundraising was cancelled including our school visits. However, we took the opportunity to make use of online fundraising on our social media platforms which is always successful.

We held a virtual baby shower where supporters could donate items via our Amazon Wishlist which helped to stock our shelves ready for orphan season, along with £1 days and other appeals for help. We have amazing supporters who are always very kind and generous.

We had a total of £2064 donated from a lovely supporter who makes handmade bags and cushions and donates the sales to us.

We were also chosen by a local company who sponsored the printing of our first ever charity Calander. We sold these to supporters and raised £1640.

Thankfully towards the end of the year schools were open and we have now started to book in school visits once again with Hoglets Wildlife Education. In addition to our wildlife education programme, we have added on a wildlife photography experience. Here we offer small groups of 6 an opportunity to photograph some of our resident animals such as our Eagle Owl, Kara and our Polecat ferret, Polo in natural surroundings on a private site. These are very popular and we have 4 dates booked for 2022.

We are also hoping to organise a Fun Dog show next year which proved very successful in past years.

We were able to build a new small bird rehabilitation pen which was much needed and next year we are hopeful that we can raise the funds to build a new shed which will act as a third hospital room.
