Low income has severely restricted CLEAR's activities.

1/. Maintain minimal services supporting waste banks, refill stations, and schools involved in the School Mentoring Program.

Two waste banks were supported throughout the year: Lebah and Geulis. Batukaras is still running independently and Cibanten has joined with government scheme.

2/. Increase fundraising to support higher level of activity and increase job security in Indonesia.

Fundraising has not increased to allow job security or increased activity. The manager has, however, maintained links with the communities working part-time.

3/. Develop and implement Business Plan for Bale Tau and through this expand community involvement.

Bale Tau has been developed as a stand-alone community centre. In the absence of increased funding, increased activity elsewhere has not been possible.

Cash reserves adequate to cover all projected expenses will be maintained.

98% of CLEAR's expenditure was in Indonesia supporting its community programmes.

None of the Trustees received any remuneration or claimed any expenses from the Charity.

£701 for Workout for Waste Warriors - thanks to all who participated

£540 in Regular donations

£470 from the Memorial Fund in memory of Maggie Bedford- Leahong, who sadly passed away in August 2023

£440 from subscriptions to online shopping sites

£88 from the sale of e-gift cards for Christmas 2023.

### **Section D. Achievements and Performance.**

(Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the period)

#### 1. Community Engagement and Participation

- Around 1,050 villagers directly benefited from CLEAR's activities during the year.
- 6 workshops, seminars, and awareness campaigns were conducted, reaching 750 residents.
- Community involvement in waste bank was increased by 25% compared to the previous year. (Data from Lebah waste bank).

#### 2. Waste Collection and Sorting

- A total of 10,886kg of recyclable materials was collected throughout the year.
- Since March 2023, a refill station has prevented some 2,776 single-use plastic sachets entering the environment. While currently, only one refill station is operational out of the four planned, the impact has been tangible and significant.

### 3. Educational Programs

- An educational program for local schools was launched, involving 350 students. They were taught methods of waste reduction and environmental conservation.
- Collaborated with local institutions to integrate waste management into the curriculum, ensuring a long-lasting impact on future generations.

## Section E. Financial Review.

CLEAR Community's policy to hold a reserve equal to 9 months expenditure was suspended in 2022 to allow the continuation of crucial work furthering our aims in Indonesia. Income levels have not improved, staff contracts could not be renewed, team members were lost and our ability to fulfil our objectives curtailed.

This year 100% of CLEAR's expenditure was in Indonesia, supporting its community programmes.

None of the Trustees received any remuneration or claimed any expenses from the Charity.

### **Section D. Achievements and Performance.**

(Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the period)

CLEAR impacted directly upon the lives of over 4,700 people, including 3,234 at Waste Banks, 735 in 3 new schools and 100 during World Clean-up Day 2022.

Increasing the cadre of committed Waste Warriors: over 100 new Waste Warriors were recruited resulting in a total of 247 active Waste Warriors, including 84 Champion Waste Warriors.

Creation of Waste Banks, self-managed village recycling centres: 9 new Waste Banks were established giving a total of 14. Together, they processed 13.154 tonnes of waste, including 4.480 tonnes of plastic, recycled since August 2021.

Improving Waste Bank efficiency and financially sustainable: 14 Waste Banks were monitored and 2 were helped to set up trial retail outlets where products that are usually sold in polluting plastic sachets were bought in bulk and sold in small quantities to members. This has the triple benefit of saving money for members, creating income for the group and reducing plastic pollution. CLEAR helped the Waste Bank villages to pool resources to plant mangroves to support the regeneration of the local ecosystems.

Developed a strong team of staff and volunteers: three new Community Mobilisers were recruited on short-term contracts in Indonesia, starting work in May 2022. Volunteers were recruited in the UK and Indonesia to assist with communications and fundraising.

Successful 'Plastic-Free February' campaign in 2022, raising awareness of plastic pollution both in the UK and abroad.

The fundraising team raised over £5,000 including £3,280 in two sponsored Workout 4 Waste Warriors events.

CLEAR Community's policy to hold a reserve equal to 9 months expenditure has not been implemented to allow the continuation of crucial work furthering our aims in Indonesia. Income targets have not been achieved and activity in Indonesia is now adjusted to match income.

98% of CLEAR's expenditure was in Indonesia, supporting its community programmes.

None of the Trustees received any remuneration or claimed any expenses from the Charity.

### **Future Plans - 2023.**

Identify 100 Waste Warriors from 12 villages who will be trained to inspire and lead local activities which reach least 2,000 direct beneficiaries.

Empower 200 village participants introducing skills linked to the waste banks and mentoring programs.

Support 12 established self-managing Waste Banks and the development of 6 new Waste Banks, measuring and reporting of weight and type of waste processed by Waste Banks to assess impact. Send for recycling 15,000kg of waste otherwise likely to be mismanaged, including 4,500kg plastic. Monitor Waste Banks and develop strategies for improved recycling rates and greater self-sufficiency.

Establish 4 refill stations linked to existing Waste Banks which will purchase household products in bulk and resell them to members using recycled packaging thereby preventing at least 12,000 single-use plastic sachets becoming waste (3000 pieces per year per refill station).

Introduce the School Mentoring Program to at least 3 new schools to increase awareness and kick-start self-managed recycling.

Increase fundraising to support higher level of activity and increase job security in Indonesia.

Develop and implement Business Plan for Bale Tau and through this expand community involvement

CLEAR Community is a Charitable Incorporated Organization (CIO), registered on 14th March 2017, whose only voting members are its Charity Trustees. Trustees are appointed by the Board of Trustees.

The charitable purposes of CLEAR Community are to promote sustainable development for the benefit of the public by:

(a) the preservation, conservation and the protection of the environment and the prudent use of resources;

(b) the promotion of sustainable means of achieving economic growth and regeneration;

(c) providing educational activities, workshops and resources relating to sustainable development, arts, crafts and other topics furthering the charitable purposes;

(d) working internationally to share and advance knowledge, experience and creative solutions;

Sustainable development means "development which meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs."

The main thrust for the year 2020/21 was the spread of effective and sustainable waste management systems to Indonesian villages. Building on the framework developed with the Royal

Academy of Engineering Industry-Academia Partnership Programme (IAPP) and experience gained in community waste management at Batukaras in 2019/20, CLEAR developed a community mentor training programme, recruited staff and engaged with five village communities: Cijulang - Kalenwadas, Bangunkarya, Cijulang - Barengkok, Cijulang – Nusagede, and Mekarmulya (near Barungkarya).

Operations were severely disrupted by the COVID pandemic and the frequent lockdowns enforced to prevent its spread. CLEAR adhered strictly to the guidance issued both locally and nationally and all participants were made aware of these rules and guidelines. Despite the difficulties, local groups with elected committees were established and recycling started in three of the five communities. 669kg of waste, including 273kg of plastic were processed by the groups producing income for their members. Much of this waste would otherwise have been burnt or eventually have found its way into the rivers and the ocean. Three further villages were engaged and training planned.

Investigations into the development of social enterprises to increase group incomes and decrease pollution were started. Support for the CLEAR-inspired village recycling centre at Batukaras Bengras continued. The centres are called Waste Banks. The Bale Tau community centre at Batukaras was maintained and improved despite activities there being severely curtailed by COVID restrictions. Children's eco-learning sessions recommenced in July.

The Trustees of CLEAR Community believe that these activities fulfil the requirements of the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

Section D. Achievements and Performance.

The training of villagers in a range of topics linked with issues of sustainability and the environment including work with local community groups and schools.

The establishment of five village groups with elected committees.

The construction of five village recycling stations based on the Waste Bank in Batukaras

Awareness-raising along with fundraising campaigns based in the UK on tackling plastic in the oceans and other aspects of environmental degradation and waste management.

Successful 'Plastic-Free February' campaign in 2021, raising awareness of plastic pollution both in the UK and abroad and raising funds for CLEAR.

Two successful 'Work out for Waste Warriors' fitness campaigns, primarily in the UK, raised funds for the development of Waste Banks while also raising public awareness.

Section E. Financial Review.

CLEAR Community's policy is to hold a reserve equal to 9 months expenditure. This was equal to £2,774 in 2020/21. The Trustees will keep this policy under review during the coming year.

98% of CLEAR's expenditure was in Indonesia, supporting its community programmes.

None of the Trustees received any remuneration or claimed any expenses from the Charity.

## Section F. Other optional information

### Future Plans.

#### 1. Increase the number of Waste Banks

We plan to set up at least 6 new Waste Banks serving a number of villages in Java. Depending on local resources, they will handle paper, cardboard, cans, iron, copper, aluminium, several types of plastic, cooking oil and more. We aim to process over 3,000kg of waste including 750kg of plastic.

#### 2. Help existing Waste Banks become efficient, well managed and financially sustainable

To be sustainable, Waste Banks need to be financially independent and members rewarded for their work. With this in mind we aim to:

- *Help identify opportunities for income and support waste banks in the best ways to take advantage of them.*
- *Support the existing waste banks to act as a hub for sharing knowledge and resources between villages.*
- *Monitor the waste banks to really understand their impact and to be able to share these findings with funders and supporters*

#### 3. Increase the use of Waste Banks

We will work with local organisations to explore and plan how they can tap into the Waste Bank network. We want to add significant volume to the amount of waste processed and help develop stronger local networks.

#### 4. Widen the offering made by Waste Banks

We want to expand the range of recycling activities provided by the Waste Banks wherever possible. For example, several Waste Banks are already testing refill stations to further reduce plastic use which could also generate revenue for the Waste Banks. Offering recycling services to local schools and businesses is another idea we're exploring.

#### 5. Develop a strong cohort of volunteers

CLEAR's UK operations are entirely run by unpaid volunteers and this will continue throughout 2022. We recognise the importance of having a well-trained and secure workforce operating within Indonesia. We aim to develop a stable, well-trained and highly-motivated group of community trainers who will be self-employed. To start, two trainers will be engaged on 6-month contracts in early 2022 and our ambition will be to increase these contracts to 1-year contracts in the medium term.

Longer-term Opportunities.

Further Waste Bank expansion and collaboration.

There are 75,000 rural villages in Indonesia lacking in waste management infrastructure. While we are focused on expanding our training in the south of West Java we also have the ambition to help spread Waste Banks far and wide. To do this we will collaborate with similar organisations in other areas and provinces, to encourage the establishment of new organisations and to investigate the feasibility of distance learning programmes for organisations, groups and villages.




- (d) working internationally to share and advance knowledge, experience and creative solutions;

During 2019-20 CLEAR continued to carry out educational workshops at Bale Tau, the environmental learning centre in Batukaras, West Java, Indonesia. These included programmes in art and craft, permaculture, gardening and technology, all with a focus on sustainability and the environment. These were supported by classes in English to facilitate learning in the other

programmes of study. Further training sessions continued in the making of eco-bricks, re-useable bag workshops and organic gardening. Local women's groups continued to work with CLEAR on waste management issues and made use of Bale Tau for activities including the making of 'loop de loop' bags from recycled coffee sachets. Work with local schools continued with a number of visits and workshops on waste, the environment and climate change. Children attended movie days, storytelling and gardening sessions at Bale Tau.

In the period from March 2020 onwards the above activities were all affected by the Covid 19 pandemic. Lockdowns and social distancing rules affected the ability of people to attend CLEAR sessions at Bale Tau and affected visits by CLEAR trainers and volunteers to schools and other local organisations. Where activities were carried out they adhered strictly to the guidance issued both locally and nationally and all visitors to Bale Tau were made aware of these rules and guidelines.

Prior to March 2020 CLEAR organised and managed several beach cleaning events with large numbers of volunteers. Batukaras remains a popular tourist destination with large numbers of people visiting from the cities of Indonesia. There are also a significant number of foreign tourists. Clear continued its links with the local tourist industry including hotels and other accommodation, working with these organisations on promoting sustainable and eco-friendly waste management practices.

During 2020 CLEAR concluded its work as a major partner in the Royal Academy of Engineering Industry-Academia Partnership Programme (IAPP) which is working towards an exemplary zero-waste system for coastal Indonesia. Training workshops for Mentors and volunteers for the IAPP Programme had been organised and conducted by CLEAR at Bale Tau and CLEAR has become instrumental in developing a framework for the dissemination of community Mentor training to facilitate the development of community waste management systems in other coastal areas of Indonesia.

The Trustees of CLEAR Community believe that these activities fulfil the requirements of the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

*(Additional details of objectives and activities (optional information))*

A key objective of CLEAR within its charitable purposes remains to promote the development of an effective and sustainable community-based waste management infrastructure in Indonesia. This continues to include the longer-term aim of significantly reducing and eventually eliminating the amount of plastic waste entering the oceans around Indonesia.

Continued education and training of local people in a range of topics linked with issues of sustainability and the environment including work with local community groups and schools.

Construction of more recycling stations and further development of an effective waste management infrastructure based on the development a waste bank in Batukaras

Anti-littering and beach cleaning campaigns, not only reducing waste on land and in the oceans but also engaging the community, raising awareness and providing examples for other communities.

Awareness-raising along with fundraising campaigns based in the UK on tackling plastic in the oceans and other aspects of environmental degradation and waste management.

Successful 'Plastic-Free February' campaign in 2020, raising awareness of plastic pollution both in the UK and abroad and raising funds for CLEAR

Successful Yoga fundraiser run by a Trustee on Zoom.

CLEAR began to support other villages in the region in setting up waste banks, including mentor training.

The Trustees continued to carry out risk assessments and the development of a Risk Management Policy.

CLEAR Community's policy is to hold a reserve of £3,600 which approximates to 8 – 9 months of operation at the levels of expenditure in 2019-20. The Trustees will keep this policy under review during the coming year.

Less than 2% of CLEAR's income in 2019-20 was spent in the UK, all the rest going towards work on the ground in Indonesia. None of the Trustees received any remuneration or claimed any expenses from the Charity.

Future Plans.

It is anticipated that a major way forward in our work will be supporting the development of waste banks in local villages. These are facilities run by local volunteers where people can bring waste for sorting for recycling, upcycling or appropriate disposal. The amounts of each type of waste can be recorded in 'bank books' and villagers can be paid small amounts for the waste as an incentive to bring it rather than burning or disposing of it in on land or in waterways. Following on from the Mentor training developed on the IAPP Programme referred to above, CLEAR anticipates a major role in training Mentors to develop and run waste banks in an increasing number of villages in the region.

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

