TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2025

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 5 April 2025. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011. The requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

The objective of The Marandi Foundation, as stipulated in the Trust Deed, is to apply funds and income upon trust for the public benefit of all objects which are exclusively charitable under the law of England and Wales. The Foundation delivers its charitable objects through grant-making.

The Trustees confirm that they have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

b. Activities undertaken to achieve objectives

The Charity uses grant-making to achieve its objectives and in particular makes grants to UK-registered charities which advance education.

c. Grant-making policies

The Trustees of the Foundation provide financial awards to registered charities that promote the arts, positive mental health and educational attainment.

d. Main activities undertaken to further the Charity's purposes for the public benefit

The Marandi Foundation has continued to support its existing grant recipients and has made one off grants in the year totalling £333,202 (2024 as restated - £482,667).

Grants made in the year

Acorn Community Support - £5,000 (2024: £nil)

Providing social, emotional and practical support to elderly and disabled in a part of rural Devon, this charity ensures that their clients can remain living independently, and in their own homes, for as long as possible.

Studio Voltaire - £30,000 (2024: £nil)

Studio Voltaire is a non-profit gallery and artist's studio based in Clapham, South London. The organisation focuses on contemporary arts, staging a public programme of exhibitions, performances and live events.

British Fashion Council Foundation - £15,000 (2024: £nil)

BFC champion British fashion as a creative force on the world stage by pioneering world-class programmes that unlock and elevate British creative talent. The non-profit focuses on responsible growth, innovation and amplification of the British fashion industry.

The Serpentine Trust - £150,000 (2024: £16,667)

The Serpentine is one of the most widely recognised organisations in the global contemporary art, design and architecture worlds. The Watercolour World - £120,000 (2024: £110,000)

The Watercolour World is creating a unique visual history of the world through documentary watercolours painted before 1900. The programme formally launched on 31 January 2019 at the Royal Academy of Arts. The website comprises tens of thousands of images creating a significant new source of global history. This free, new, online library includes topographical, anthropological and botanical subjects, plus observed historical events.

Ongoing multi year commitments

Relief Crew Foundation and Movement on the Ground - £141,221 paid in the year

Connecting the yachting industry with humanitarian projects around the world. Yacht crew are matched with non-profit organisations in need of skilled volunteers creating a lasting, positive impact on communities in need and on the yachting industry. Projects have including building toilets in Ghana and running hospitality trainings in refugee camps. £141,221 was paid in the year ended 5 April 2025, with £135,835 in creditors at year end.

Centrepont - £299,836 paid in year

Centrepont provides housing and support for young people in London, Manchester, Yorkshire and the North East. In the years ended 5 April 2022 and 5 April 2023, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £999,563 payable over four years. £299,836 was paid in the year ended 5 April 2025, with £95,672 included in creditors at the year end.

Achievements and performance

As noted above the Charity continued to support existing grant recipients and made some additional grants as noted in note 4 to the Accounts.

Financial review

a. Going concern

The Charity has limited fixed running costs but has grant commitments totalling £231,507 (2024 as restated - £677,031) at the year end. The Charity's sole benefactors, who are also the Trustees, have pledged donations equal to the amount of the multi year grants made and will pay these donations across at the time the grant payment is due to the recipient charities. It is not the policy of the charity to hold long term cash balances at this time. There is a formal agreement from the Trustees to provide financial support as and when required to ensure the continued operation of the Charity.

Management therefore considers that The Marandi Foundation is a going concern, as it expects the Charity to be able to meet its debts as they fall due for a period of at least 12 months from the date of signing of these financial statements.

b. Reserves policy

Once The Marandi Foundation has identified and agreed a grant amount to be provided to a beneficiary it will receive the agreed funds from its sole benefactors, Javad and Narmina Marandi, in order to pay the beneficiary at the agreed payment date. The charity therefore holds only a small level of reserves to ensure that it can comfortably meet its operating costs and pay its debts as they fall due.

As at the year end, The Marandi Foundation had unrestricted reserves of £7,079 (2024 - £13,169).

c. Financial review

Income for the year ended 5 April 2025 was £358,613 (2024 as restated - £448,730) with charitable expenditure of £364,703 (2024 as restated - £464,745).

Due to its size, The Marandi Foundation is able to operate with minimal overhead costs.

d. Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustees assess the major risks and uncertainties facing the Foundation to be the financial stability of the charities the Foundation provides funding to, and to ensuring that funded programmes are delivered in accordance with the plan submitted to the Foundation upon funding application.

The Trustees will manage these risks by ensuring that appropriate processes are in place to mitigate them. These processes include conducting financial due diligence on each charity before any donation is agreed, as well as requiring that each charity submit regular progress reports on the specific programmes outlined in their application to ensure that funds provided by the Foundation are being spent in line with the funding application.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The Marandi Foundation is a registered charity, number 1172282, and is constituted under a Trust deed dated 6 March 2017.

b. Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the Charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed.

c. Organisational structure and decision-making policies

The Foundation comprises three Trustees and a Director, who carries out grant-making administration, who meet twice per year.

d. Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

New Trustees are recruited as and when required with reference to their abilities that will enhance and further the Charity's objectives. When new Trustees are appointed, training both in-house with existing Trustees or externally through appropriate trustee training courses is provided. New Trustees are appointed by deed under authority of a resolution of the Trustees.

Plans for future periods

The Trustees expect to continue to support educational charities in the medium term and will continue to build on their relationships with some of the charities they have worked with in the current year.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. General information

The Marandi Foundation is a registered charity in England and Wales, number 1172282. The address of its registered office is First Floor West, 7 Curzon Street, London, W1J 5HG.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Marandi Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

2.2 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The Trustees have reviewed the expected future cashflows of the Charity. The Charity is reliant on the continuing support of the Trustees to provide funds to allow the Charity to meet its liabilities as they fall due. As explained in the Trustees' Annual Report, the policy of the Trustees is to provide funding at the time payment is due and the charity does not currently hold significant cash reserves. The Trustees have provided a letter of support which states that they will provide such funds as are needed to allow the Charity to do so. The Trustees therefore have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, and that there is no material uncertainty relating to going concern.

2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the Charity's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

2.4 Expenditure (continued)

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.5 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

2.6 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

2.7 Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

2.8 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

9. Related party transactions

During the year J Marandi, a trustee, made payments of £800,000 (2024 - £465,000) to the Charity and pledged donations of £358,613 (2024 as restated - £448,730) to the Charity. The total of outstanding pledges as at 5 April 2025 was £231,507 (2024 as restated - £667,031). These amounts represent agreed donations which will be paid to the Charity at the time the monies are required to fulfil multi-year grant commitments.

10. Prior year adjustment

The prior year figures have been restated to reflect a grant commitment made prior to 5 April 2024. This has resulted in an increase of £238,000 to donation income and grant expenditure on the SOFA, with nil impact on the deficit for the year, and an increase in short term debtors of £138,000, long term debtors of £138,000, short term grant commitments of £138,000 and long term grant commitments of £138,000. There is no impact on overall net assets as at 5 April 2024.

Human Practice Foundation - £80,000 (2023: £nil)

The Human Practice Foundation works to raise communities out of poverty starting with education. The Marandi Foundation is providing funding to construct an additional 8 classrooms and educational facilities for the Tappu Devi School in Nepal. In addition, the existing 16 classrooms will be renovated to ensure they are a safe and comfortable learning environment for students and teachers.

In Nepal, only seven out of 10 children enrolled in grade 1, reach grade 5. Furthermore more than half of the students drop out of school before reaching secondary level. The Human Practice Foundation believe that education is the key to breaking the cycle of intergenerational deprivation. With a focus on specific districts, they are working to lift educational standards and create job opportunities thereby contributing to sustainable development.

In the years ended 5 April 2022 and 5 April 2023, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £999,563 payable over 4 years. £247,210 was paid in the year ended 5 April 2024, with £396,031 in creditors at year end.

The Latymer Foundation - £nil paid in the year

Providing means tested bursaries for boys who would otherwise be unable to attend Latymer due to their family's financial circumstances. The children selected are able to benefit from the excellent academic, pastoral and social experience of attending Latymer. In the year ended 5 April 2021, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £104,174 payable over five years. On review of progress the trustees decided to close this partnership in the year, which resulted in a £45,060 credit to the Statement of Financial Activities.

Achievements and performance

As noted above the Charity continued to support existing grant recipients and made some additional grants as noted in note 4 to the Accounts.

Financial review

a. Going concern

The Charity has limited fixed running costs but has grant commitments totalling £401,031 (2023 - £693,301) at the year end. Once The Marandi Foundation has identified and agreed a grant amount to be provided to a beneficiary it will receive the agreed funds from its sole benefactors, Javad and Narmina Marandi, in order to pay the beneficiary at the agreed payment date. 

1. General information

The Marandi Foundation is a registered charity in England and Wales, number 1172282. The address of its registered office is 103 Mount Street, London, W1K 2TJ.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Marandi Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

2.2 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The Trustees have reviewed the expected future cashflows of the Charity. The Charity is reliant on the continuing support of the Trustees to provide funds to allow the Charity to meet its liabilities as they fall due. As explained in the Trustees' Annual Report, the policy of the Trustees is to provide funding at the time payment is due and the charity does not currently hold significant cash reserves. The Trustees have provided a letter of support which states that they will provide such funds as are needed to allow the Charity to do so. The Trustees therefore have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, and that there is no material uncertainty relating to going concern.

2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the Charity's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

2.4 Expenditure (continued)

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.5 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

2.6 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

2.7 Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.8 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2022

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 5 April 2022. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011. The requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

The objective of The Marandi Foundation, as stipulated in the Trust Deed, is to apply funds and income upon trust for the public benefit of all objects which are exclusively charitable under the law of England and Wales. The Foundation delivers its charitable objects through grant-making.

The Trustees confirm that they have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

b. Activities undertaken to achieve objectives

The Charity uses grant-making to achieve its objectives and in particular makes grants to UK-registered charities which advance education.

c. Grant-making policies

The Trustees of the Foundation provide financial awards to registered charities that promote the arts, positive mental health and educational attainment.

d. Main activities undertaken to further the Charity's purposes for the public benefit

The Marandi Foundation has made grants totalling £902,642 (2021: £254,175) to four (2021: three) charities during the year. This includes a credit of £100,000 relating to the reversal of the St Paul's School multi year commitment.

Grants made in the year

The Watercolour World - £60,000 (2021: £nil)

The Watercolour World is creating a unique visual history of the world through documentary watercolours painted before 1900. The programme formally launched on 31 January 2019 at the Royal Academy of Arts. The website comprises tens of thousands of images creating a significant new source of global history. This free, new, online library includes topographical, anthropological and botanical subjects, plus observed historical events. £40,000 was paid in the year ended 5 April 2022, with £20,000 in creditors at year end.

Walkabout Foundation - £2,378 (2021: £nil)

Providing a contribution to support the rehabilitation of 30 children in Kenya.

Centrepoint – £937,768 (2021: £nil)

Centrepoint provides housing and support for young people in London, Manchester, Yorkshire and the North East. In the year ended 5 April 2022, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £937,768 payable over 4 years. £128,150 was paid in the year ended 5 April 2022, with £809,618 in creditors at year end.

Ongoing multi year commitments

St Paul's School – £100,000 paid in the year

Providing means tested bursaries for boys who would otherwise be unable to attend St Paul's due to family financial circumstances. The children selected are able to benefit from the excellent academic, pastoral and social experience of attending St Paul's School. In the year ended 5 April 2018, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £500,000 payable over five years. During to the year, £100,000 was paid to St Paul's and the partnership was then drawn to a close. The Foundation intends to redistribute the funds for use on projects elsewhere.

The Latymer Foundation - £21,459 paid in the year

Providing means tested bursaries for boys who would otherwise be unable to attend Latymer due to their family's financial circumstances. The children selected are able to benefit from the excellent academic, pastoral and social experience of attending Latymer. In the year ended 5 April 2021, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £104,175 payable over five years. This was increased in the year ended 5 April 2022 by £2,496 to take account of inflationary school fee increases.

Achievements and performance

As noted above the Charity made grants totalling £902,642 (2021: £254,175) to four (2021: three) charities during the year.

Financial review

a. Going concern

The Charity has limited fixed running costs but has grant commitments totalling £893,995 (2021 - £283,340) at the year end. The Charity's sole benefactors, who are also the Trustees, have pledged donations equal to the amount of the multi year grants made and will pay these donations across at the time the grant payment is due to the recipient charities. It is not the policy of the charity to hold long term cash balances at this time. There is a formal agreement from the Trustees to provide financial support as and when required to ensure the continued operation of the Charity.

Management therefore considers that The Marandi Foundation is a going concern, as it expects the Charity to be able to meet its debts as they fall due for a period of at least 12 months from the date of signing of these financial statements.

b. Reserves policy

Once The Marandi Foundation has identified and agreed a grant amount to be provided to a beneficiary it will receive the agreed funds from its sole benefactors, Javad and Narmina Marandi, in order to pay the beneficiary at the agreed payment date. The charity therefore holds only a small level of reserves to ensure that it can comfortably meet its operating costs and pay its debts as they fall due.

As at the year end, The Marandi Foundation had unrestricted reserves of £48,257 (2021: £52,239).

c. Financial review

Income for the year ended 5 April 2022 was £925,665 (2021: £263,340) with £902,642 (2021: £254,175) of this being expended as grants.

Due to its size, The Marandi Foundation is able to operate with minimal overhead costs. As such, 97% (2021: 91%) of total expenditure in the year is in the form of grants given.

d. Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustees assess the major risks and uncertainties facing the Foundation to be the financial stability of the charities the Foundation provides funding to, and to ensuring that funded programmes are delivered in accordance with the plan submitted to the Foundation upon funding application.

The Trustees will manage these risks by ensuring that appropriate processes are in place to mitigate them. These processes include conducting financial due diligence on each charity before any donation is agreed, as well as requiring that each charity submit regular progress reports on the specific programmes outlined in their application to ensure that funds provided by the Foundation are being spent in line with the funding application.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The Marandi Foundation is a registered charity, number 1172282, and is constituted under a Trust deed dated 6 March 2017.

b. Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the Charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed.

c. Organisational structure and decision-making policies

The Foundation comprises three Trustees and a Director, who carries out grant-making administration, who meet twice per year.

d. Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

New Trustees are recruited as and when required with reference to their abilities that will enhance and further the Charity's objectives. When new Trustees are appointed, training both in-house with existing Trustees or externally through appropriate trustee training courses is provided. New Trustees are appointed by deed under authority of a resolution of the Trustees.

Plans for future periods

The Trustees expect to continue to support educational charities in the medium term and will continue to build on their relationships with some of the charities they have worked with in the current year.

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 5 April 2021. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011. The requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

The objective of The Marandi Foundation, as stipulated in the Trust Deed, is to apply funds and income upon trust for the public benefit of all objects which are exclusively charitable under the law of England and Wales. The Foundation delivers its charitable objects through grant-making.

The Trustees confirm that they have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

b. Activities undertaken to achieve objectives

The Charity uses grant-making to achieve its objectives and in particular makes grants to UK-registered charities which advance education.

c. Grant-making policies

The Trustees of the Foundation provide financial awards to registered charities that promote the arts, positive mental health and educational attainment.

d. Main activities undertaken to further the Charity's purposes for the public benefit

The Marandi Foundation has made grants totalling £254,175 (2020: £613,499) to three (2020: four) charities during the year.

Grants made in the year

The European Funding Circle - £50,000 (2020: £nil)

Providing a contribution to support the building and strengthening of holdings of key work by artists and philanthropists will lead Tate in realising transformative acquisitions that will both challenge and complement familiar narratives of modern and contemporary artistic practice.

The Serpentine Trust - £50,000 (2020: £13,667)

Providing a contribution to support an exhibition of James Barnor's work at The Serpentine Gallery entitled "Portraits of the Future: A Celebration of James Barnor".

The Latymer Foundation - £154,175 (2020: £nil)

Providing means tested bursaries for boys who would otherwise be unable to attend Latymer due to their family's financial circumstances. The children selected are able to benefit from the excellent academic, pastoral and social experience of attending Latymer. In the year ended 5 April 2021, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £104,175 payable over five years.

Grants made in the comparative period

The Watercolour World - £nil (2020: £395,000)

The Watercolour World is creating a unique visual history of the world through documentary watercolours painted before 1900. The programme formally launched on 31 January 2019 at the Royal Academy of Arts. The website comprises tens of thousands of images creating a significant new source of global history. This free, new, online library includes topographical, anthropological and botanical subjects, plus observed historical events.

Ongoing multi year commitments

The Royal Foundation – Third tranche of £100,000 (2020: £100,000) paid in the year

The Royal Foundation supports a broad and ambitious spectrum of activity looking to support innovations in mental health, early years, young people and conservation. In the year ended 5 April 2019, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £300,000 payable over three years.

St Paul's School – Nil (2020: £100,000) paid in the year

Providing means tested bursaries for boys who would otherwise be unable to attend St Paul's due to family financial circumstances. The children selected are able to benefit from the excellent academic, pastoral and social experience of attending St Paul's School. In the year ended 5 April 2018, The Marandi Foundation made a commitment of £500,000 payable over five years and at 5 April 2021 a grant commitment of £200,000 exists. Subsequent to the year end, £100,000 was paid to St Paul's and the partnership was then drawn to a close. The Foundation intends to redistribute the funds for use on projects elsewhere.

Achievements and performance

Financial review

a. Going concern

The Charity has limited fixed running costs but has grant commitments totalling £283,340 (2020 - £300,000) at the year end. The Charity's sole benefactors, who are also the Trustees, have pledged donations equal to the amount of the multi year grants made and will pay these donations across at the time the grant payment is due to the recipient charities. It is not the policy of the charity to hold long term cash balances at this time. There is a formal agreement from the Trustees to provide financial support as and when required to ensure the continued operation of the Charity.

Management therefore considers that The Marandi Foundation is a going concern, as it expects the Charity to be able to meet its debts as they fall due for a period of at least 12 months from the date of signing of these financial statements.

Just before the start of the financial year, COVID-19 was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organisation and various social and economic restrictions were applied in the UK and across the world. This impacted financial markets but has not been considered to impact the Foundation due to its limited assets being held as cash.

b. Reserves policy

Once The Marandi Foundation has identified and agreed a grant amount to be provided to a beneficiary it will receive the agreed funds from its sole benefactors, Javad and Narmina Marandi, in order to pay the beneficiary at the agreed payment date. The charity therefore holds only a small level of reserves to ensure that it can comfortably meet its operating costs and pay its debts as they fall due.

As at the year end, The Marandi Foundation had unrestricted reserves of £52,239 (2020: £67,583).

c. Financial review

Income for the year ended 5 April 2021 was £263,340 (2020: £679,869) with £254,175 (2020: £613,499) of this being expended as grants.

Due to its size, The Marandi Foundation is able to operate with minimal overhead costs. As such, 91% (2020: 96%) of total expenditure in the year is in the form of grants given.
