TRUSTEES REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2024

The Trustees present this extended report, together with the independently examined accounts for the year ended 31 March 2024.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Objectives and Activities

Objectives and aims

The purpose of the charity is to promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of Cleethorpes and the surrounding area of North East Lincolnshire the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship, or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life of the said inhabitants.

Our charity is founded on three pillars of which we direct our focus, these are Community, Sports and Education. Focussing on these three areas gives us direction and purpose in our strategic planning and operations.

Our activities include the following:

Community

Youth Engagement activities such as our traditional Youth Club, music sessions, cooking and programmes which include the Duke of Edinburgh project.

We run school holiday programmes for children and young people from lower socio-economic backgrounds. We work with over 200 children and families locally providing activities and food during the school holidays.

Working in partnership with local stakeholders we offer advice for young people out of education, training and employment, we offer advice for people suffering from health conditions and we also offer somewhere to go and somebody to talk to.

Sport

Our sports and exercise programmes are split between sport for recreation, competition and education.

We recognise the power of sport and exercise and how being active and involved in a sport can impact a persons life. We run a variety of sports and exercise programmes which focus on inclusivity and engagement at all levels and ages.

We run sessions for people with disabilities, free sessions for people on low-income streams and sessions for minority groups.

Our sports offer includes the mainstream sports such as football and netball but we also run sessions such as boxing and other activities including parkour, skateboarding and parasports.

Education

We are committed to help tackle the national and local issues surrounding education. With high levels of unemployment and low levels of education in our area, we support people of all ages learn new skills, offer free educational programmes and provide links into employment.

We support the Department for Work and Pensions running an Employability Programme.

We run educational projects such as cooking, music, gardening and life skills courses.

We run free English, Maths and IT courses of all levels.

Supporting the local education authority we have started to support those children and young people that have been expelled from mainstream education. To date this has been really successful as the nature of our organisation means that we can support during school hours whilst offering additional support through our Youth Services.

Trustees are appointed to ensure they meet the characteristics expected in the Charity Commission. They are given clear guidance of expectations and their duties are included within the constitution which all Trustees have access to.

Grant submissions are based/directly linked to our 5 Year Strategic Plan to ensure any grant submissions are based on its key strategic objectives, agreed by the Trustees Board and in turn subsequently linked to and reflected in our yearly operational plans.

Opportunistic grants that are made available are assessed on the local 'needs Analysis' of our target audience, linkage with our Strategic Aims and assessed on operational capacity, again which is linked to our yearly operation plan.

All our activities directly link to one of our key activities/proposes i.e.: Community, Sport, Education and our target audiences. Many examples of our programmes are described above in the Summary of Main Activities Section.

We have a team of 9 volunteers that support the day-to-day staff with projects and clubs. The commitment varies from one hour per week up to 10 hours per week. The contribution from our volunteers enables us to meet the demands and support that our community requires.

In addition to this we have extended volunteers that contribute towards the sports teams that are affiliated to our sports teams. These include committee members, coaches, safeguarding roles, secretaries and treasurers for each team.

Using the same model and process that any paid employee would be expected to go through, is the way in which we manage our volunteers.

As an organisation, we would identify a need for a volunteer then advertise the position as an official role. In recent times we have found the cost in recruiting, training and educating our volunteers has increased significantly, therefore a strong recruitment process must be followed.

Achievements and Performance

As the only community centre in Cleethorpes, the demand of serving a population of 40,000 can be overwhelming. Retrospect to this, our community members engage and support us, whilst challenging us with the line of direction and opportunities that they require.

We have over 2,000 members of which we work with on a weekly basis. The feedback from consultation with those members supports a strong case that we are identifying the support our community needs and demonstrates a clear focus towards achieving our objectives.

The number of partners and stakeholders that we work with is growing as is the need for our organisation. We continue to have an impact on reducing anti-social behaviour in our area amongst other benefits in which we record. Whilst we collect our own data and reporting, we collect information from our partners and stakeholders which confirms our need and fundamentally that we are best to deliver our projects in our community. We have collected data to identify and measure our impact within the community. We have used several methods to collect this data including surveys, discussions with the general public, discussions on social media and interacting with our partners and other stakeholders. Below are some of the most notable achievements this year:

- 1,082 people attend our community exercise provision each week
- 281 people enrolled on one of our education programmes with over 2,198 hours of education delivered
- 97% of our service users have improved confidence since engaging with us
- 39 people who were previously unemployed are now in employment since working with us
- 100% of the service users that we asked told us that they have improved their mental health since working with us

We set clear objectives and targets each year; this enables us to operate efficiently with purpose and direction. Using local data and information, fact finding and surveys/consultation with our community members we form the basis for our planning and objectives.

This information will then be communicated with staff and volunteers through group work and individual appraisals and one to ones. The objectives are then logged on the charity HR portal with all staff and volunteers have access to. Quarterly reviews of these objectives are monitored by the Senior Leadership Team and discussed at the Trustee Board meetings.

Our strategic focus for fundraising is determined by our objectives set out in our annual planning. The planning is created after community consultation, consultation with other VCSE groups locally and local authority objectives and targets identified in the 5-year plan.

We are currently managing several large grants that are supporting our developments in capital projects, revenue and support with individual projects.

The largest project we are currently managing is construction of a new Sports Facility funded by the Youth Investment Fund. This project will enable us to grow each pillar of our organisation with more focus on our youth provision.

At the beginning of each year our charity CEO will establish our annual objectives in support of the Trustee Board. Other large projects include grants received from the National Lottery and Children In Need, both for three year projects. We have recently submitted our first year report back to both funders, we have received good feedback from both.

The nature of our organisation will always require grant funding to support much of our provision. Whilst this is something that we will continue to manage, we are now planning our next five year strategy that will enable the charity to become less reliant on grant funding and more sustainable on charitable services.

We have investments at the current value of £21,549 which are distributed between several businesses across the UK, Asia, Europe and North America.

Before investing we measure each company against the criteria contained within our Investment Policy. We receive expert advice from a Financial Advisor at St. James Place to ensure that our investments are monitored and managed accordingly.

Financial review

The charity made an unrestricted surplus during the year ending 31 March 2024 of £78,661 (2023: £6,757) and a restricted surplus of £404,263 (2023: £35,525). For the year ended 31 March 2024 unrestricted reserves stood at £138,311 (2023: £59,651). For the year ended 31 March 2024 restricted reserves stood at £439,788 (2023: £35,525).

CCSE does not believe that 'holding reserves is unnecessary'. Such a position would not allow CCSE to successfully mitigate any identified risks. Hence the position outlined above.

CCSE is not in a deficit situation.

We generate income from subscriptions to access activities, facility hire, partnership work through the local education authorities, schools and colleges and also from fundraising through campaigns such as crowdfunding and events.

Our Investment Policy, including Objectives, and key performance indicators have been developed and 'signed-off' / approved Quarter 4 2023/2024.

The ongoing risks facing the charity are:

Local: Increased demand due to previously identified social, health and economic reasons and the risk is can we upscale capacity in a timely fashion.

Regional: Limited regional grants available. This could limit the resource the charity could apply for.

National: Availability of grants. Change in Government Policy.

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

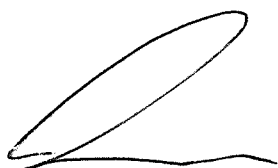

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Cleethorpes Community Sports and Education CIO is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The charity number is 1172903.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP FRS 102 applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The Charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

The Funds held by the charity are:

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

1.5 Tangible and intangible fixed assets

Non-Current Assets are to be depreciated to reflect the recoverable amount in the financial statements, over the useful life of the asset.

The depreciation will be calculated on an annual basis for preparation of the year end accounts.

Groups of assets will use the same method of depreciation. There may very occasionally be an asset that does not completely fit into one of the categories below and the Finance, Resource and Premises Committee will discuss these items on an individual basis.

Fixtures, fittings & equipment;	20% straight line
Motor vehicles;	25% straight line
Computer equipment;	33.5% straight line
Land & Buildings Leasehold	2% straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

Intangible fixed assets

Non-Current Assets are to be depreciated to reflect the recoverable amount in the financial statements, over the useful life of the asset.

The depreciation will be calculated on an annual basis for preparation of the year end accounts.

Groups of assets will use the same method of depreciation. There may very occasionally be an asset that does not completely fit into one of the categories below and the Finance, Resource and Premises Committee will discuss these items on an individual basis.

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method. Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
