Structure, governance and management

Governing document

WORSHIP 24/7 NETWORK (formerly THE BURN 24/7 UK) is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 13 Jun 2017.

Worship 24/7 Network as an organisation

Worship 24/7 Network operates primarily in the British Isles, with links with churches and Christian organisations both in the UK and internationally.

The reporting period represents a season of significant transition for the organisation. Towards the end of the reporting period, Worship 24/7 Network was still in relationship with the wider Burn 24-7 Global movement. However, as a result of a failure to resolve ongoing difficulties, primarily regarding differences in political ideology and leadership styles, in May 2024 the Trustees decided to separate the UK movement formally from the global organisation, subsequently adopting the new name of Worship 24/7 Network. Worship 24/7 Network no longer has any connection with The Burn Global.

This decision to separate formally from The Burn Global and to re-establish as Worship 24/7 Network was communicated to local Furnace Directors via live video calls with follow-up emails, and to the wider network and other stakeholders via email and social media posts. The National Directors and Core Team then made themselves available to anyone who wanted to discuss this decision privately or in more detail.

The process of separation from The Burn Global and reframing as Worship 24/7 Network provided opportunity for the Core Team, local Directors and team members to celebrate and reflect on our shared history, and to begin to explore novel approaches to facilitating extended worship and outreach events locally. The annual Summit in May 2024 was an important time of communal reflection and consideration of immediate priorities for the organisation.

Local Worship 24/7 Furnaces are at the heart of the Worship 24/7 Network. These are communities of passionate worshippers from different churches and denominations who unify around the presence of God for regular extended times of worship and prayer. At the end of the reporting period, there were around 20 Communities across the British Isles.

Discipleship and training in the theology and values underpinning Worship 24/7 Network and the practical operations of leading a Furnace are an ongoing priority for the movement. At the beginning of the reporting period, this was carried out via The Burn Global's online 'Field Training' programme. However, towards the end of the reporting period, Worship 24/7 Network launched a new pilot training programme called 'First Love.'

Our British Isles missions arm continues to develop with local street outreaches. We also have a desire to facilitate mission trips overseas, primarily via our links with people in Cyprus. However, because of the impact on leaders' capacity of the transition and change described above, it was decided not to plan a trip to Cyprus in the summer of 2024, but it is intended to resume these trips in 2025 and beyond. For now, it remains impossible to continue facilitating similar trips to the Middle East because of the ongoing security situation.

Within the British Isles an organisational structure has developed to provide this largely 'grassroots' movement with effective support for sustainable growth. Local Furnaces have at least one Director ultimately responsible for pioneering it with the Holy Spirit's help. Directors are strongly encouraged to prioritise the development of a local team that will share the vision and bring different skills to bear on its fulfillment. During the reporting period, Local Furnace Directors were supported by a Core Leadership Team, which included the National Directors, an Administrator and others providing additional support for areas such as evangelism and overseas mission, and discipleship and training.

Worship 24/7 Network as a charity

The charity was established in 2017 in support of the wider aims of the organisation. Being registered as a charity provides a context within which good practice can be applied to financial accountability and social responsibility. As such the board of Trustees aims to meet at least termly. These meetings take place online, to accommodate the constraints of one Trustee living overseas. They allow Trustees to review finances, risk management, legal issues and other matters affecting the charitable company. In setting our objectives and planning our activities, the Trustees have regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

Objectives, activities and achievements

The objectives of the charity are:

- The advancement of the Christian faith;
- The stirring of prayer and worship within the wider church;
- The facilitation of mission and evangelism in the British Isles and wider.

Local Furnaces

Local Furnaces are at the heart of Worship 24/7 Network. There is a variety in the level of activity, depending on where each local Furnace is in its development process, but the majority consistently hold extended (at least three hours, often more) worship and prayer times, with sessions led by worship leaders representing the church across their locality. Worship 24/7 Network enjoys partnering with other parts of the body of Christ, and our Directors are often found supporting other similar ventures under those ventures' own banners. During the reporting period:

- In May 2024, the Chester Furnace hosted a 50-hour worship event. This was supported by people representing other Furnaces across the nation as well as by worship teams from across the North West and North Wales.
- The new Tunbridge Wells team gained cohesion, hosted pilot worship events and planned to launch a Furnace officially in the autumn of 2025.
- Expressions of interest in launching new Furnaces in new locations in the South East and Midlands were made.

National Initiatives

As a national movement, we gathered regularly online throughout the reporting period, including monthly meetings of the Core Leadership Team and regular national and regional calls, open to Community Directors and members of local teams. These calls enable us to stay connected, provide updates and facilitate opportunities to pray together and support one another.

In addition:

- In May 2024 we held a national Summit at The Poplars in Ledbury. This was attended by a significant number of Furnace Directors and local team members. The Summit provided an opportunity for everyone to reflect together on the impact of separation from The Burn Global, for the Core Team to join in conversation with others around outstanding questions, and for collective discernment about a new name and immediate priorities for the movement.

- In July 2024, an extended worship and outreach event was held in Edinburgh to coincide with the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. This was supported by a number of people representing other local Furnaces.
- In August 2024 many local Directors and team members chose to attend the 'David's Tent' worship festival in Wiltshire. An informal Worship 24/7 Network gathering was held onsite during the event.
- In November 2024 and March 2025, the Worship 24/7 Network Core Leadership team gathered in Chester for weekends of prayer, worship and planning.

Worship 24/7 Network Missions

Worship 24/7 Network Missions seeks to:

- Put into practice the Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20) by facilitating long and short-term missions and training trips
- Train and equip local Communities to become missional – activating them in local, supernatural outreach
- Plant Communities of worship all over the world, bringing worship to the darkest places

UK mission trips

- In August 2024, a missions trip to Edinburgh, Scotland, took place to coincide with the annual Edinburgh Fringe Festival.

Overseas mission trips:

- As outlined above, it was not felt feasible to organise any overseas missions trips during the reporting period.

Equipping and Training

We are committed to building people up to be able to fulfill the calling to love God and love the world He loves. To this end we run several initiatives aimed at equipping believers through the word and practical engagement.

Field Training

This is an online course developed by The Burn Global which is no longer offered as a result of the separation of Worship 24/7 Network from The Burn Global. However, at the start of the reporting period, a British student cohort was nearing the end of the programme; students graduated with a celebratory video call in April 2024.

First Love

In March 2025, a new training programme, 'First Love' was launched, specifically geared to the needs of Worship 24/7 Network. The pilot programme ran over 6 consecutive weeks (with an Easter break) in March and April 2025 and was well subscribed, being attended by over 60 people – some of whom were already part of the network and others for whom this represented their first contact. The programme was focused around the theological basis for extended worship and prayer in the context of community and was carried out via a series of live Zoom calls supported by differentiated written teaching and learning materials. There are plans to make the call recordings and teaching materials available as a training package, as well as to develop the model further with different areas of study.

Financial Statements

A bookkeeping system exists, overseen by our Administrator. This provides accountability for local Furnaces to raise finances (through free will offerings at monthly worship events and regular giving via standing order). Funds raised are deposited in the shared bank account and registered within a 'virtual sub account.' The same accounting and bookkeeping system is also used to manage other corporate activities such as Discipleship Schools, Missions trips and the annual Summit.

An annual subscription of £120 is requested from each Community. This covers central administrative costs such as the Administrator's stipend and licence fees, for example, and is transferred from each Community's 'sub account' in April each year.

In addition, each Community is invited to make voluntary donations to centralised Worship 24/7 Network funds. These and other generous donations enable us to subsidise missions trips, provide travel expenses (e.g. for our Missions Director), and to offer bursaries for different events, for example. As a charity we monitor the payments received and claim gift aid where it is appropriate.

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

THE BURN 24-7 UNITED KINGDOM (working name WORSHIP 24/7 NETWORK) is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 13 Jun 2017.

Worship 24/7 Network as an organisation

The Worship 24/7 Network operates primarily in the United Kingdom, with links with churches and Christian organisations both in the UK and internationally. During the reporting period, Worship 24/7 Network continued to relate to the wider Burn 24-7 Global movement. However, over the course of the year, conversations with the Burn 24-7 Global Board took place around the ongoing nature of this relationship. As a result of a failure to resolve ongoing difficulties, primarily regarding differences in political ideology and leadership styles, in May 2024 the Trustees decided to separate the UK movement formally from the global organisation, and adopted the new working name of Worship 24/7 Network.

Local Worship 24/7 Communities are at the heart of the Worship 24/7 Network. These are communities of passionate worshippers from different churches and denominations who unify around the presence of God for regular extended times of worship and prayer.

At the end of the reporting period, there were around 25 Communities across the UK. The movement is growing as new Communities are launched. There is a hunger stirring across the nation for the presence of God and to see night and day worship established.

Discipleship and training in the values underpinning Worship 24/7 Network, and the practical operations of leading a Community, were carried out via the online 'Field Training' programme during the reporting year.

Our UK missions arm continues to develop with local street outreaches and extended outreaches during large cultural or sporting events. We also facilitate mission trips overseas, primarily via our links with people in Cyprus and the Middle East. (Trips to the Middle East have not been possible since the onset of the Israel-Hamas war which was precipitated by the events of 7th October 2023.)

Within the British Isles an organisational structure has developed to provide this largely 'grassroots' movement with effective support for sustainable growth. Local Communities have at least one Director ultimately responsible for pioneering it with the

Holy Spirit's help. Directors are strongly encouraged to prioritise the development of a local team that will share the vision and bring different skills to bear on its fulfillment. During the reporting period, Local Community Directors were supported by a Core Leadership Team, which included the National Directors, an Administrator and others providing additional support for areas such as evangelism and overseas mission, and discipleship and training.

During the reporting period a worship event was held in Coventry as a precursor to the potential of a new Furnace being launched, and a team began to form in Tunbridge Wells with the intention of relaunching a Furnace in the town. Interest is also being expressed in additional locations.

There is a variety in the level of activity, depending on where each local Community is in its development process, but the majority consistently hold extended (at least three hours, often more) worship and prayer times, with sessions led by worship leaders representing the church across their locality. Worship 24/7 Network enjoys partnering with other parts of the body of Christ, and our Directors are often found supporting other similar ventures under those ventures' own banners.

National Initiatives

As a national movement, we gathered regularly online throughout the reporting period, including monthly meetings of the Core Leadership Team and regular national and regional calls, open to Community Directors and members of local teams, to provide updates and opportunities to pray together and support one another.

In addition:

- In May 2023 we held a national Summit at The Poplars in Ledbury. This was attended by nearly all UK Community Directors and others interested in finding out more about the movement. We were joined by Jamie Dickson, representing the Burn 24-7 Global Board, and by British worship leader, Steve Tebb.
- In July 2023, the Worship 24/7 Network Core Leadership team gathered in Durham for a weekend of prayer, worship and planning.
- In August 2023 many local Directors and team members chose to attend the 'David's Tent' worship festival in West Sussex. Some of them represented Worship 24/7 Network at a stall in the festival's resource tent to promote awareness of the organisation. An informal Worship 24/7 Network gathering was also held onsite during the event.
- In November 2023, the Community in Dover, England, celebrated its 10-year anniversary with over 24 hours of worship. This event was attended by several Directors and team members from other UK Communities.

Worship 24/7 Network Missions

Worship 24/7 Network Missions seeks to:

- Put into practice the Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20) by facilitating long and short-term missions and training trips
- Train and equip local Communities to become missional – activating them in local, supernatural outreach
- Plant Communities of worship all over the world, bringing worship to the darkest places

UK mission trips

- In August 2023, a missions trip to Edinburgh, Scotland, took place to coincide with the annual Edinburgh Fringe Festival.

Overseas mission trips:

- A missions trip to Bethlehem and Jerusalem took place in April 2023. Our primary partnership was with local Christians already known to us. Our team visited different houses of prayer, participated in times of worship, and engaged in outreach activities.

Equipping and Training

We are committed to building people up to be able to fulfill the calling to love God and love the world He loves. To this end we run several initiatives aimed at equipping believers through the word and practical engagement.

Field Training

This is an online course developed by Burn 24-7 Global with an orientation towards establishing people in its core values and principles. During the reporting period, Field Training was recommended to local Community directors and members of their teams, and was open and available to anyone interested in developing a fuller understanding of the worship and prayer movement.

During the report period, further revisions to course materials were made by Robin and Claire Dillamore, who oversaw the course globally. Teaching and learning took place via pre-recorded videos, Bible study, and required reading by a wide variety of authors. The course included opportunities for differentiation, such as resources for 'going deeper' in areas of study and suggestions for extended reading.

In the UK, 2023-4 saw another highly successful mentoring group run with a British leader. This group worked through the materials together at a manageable pace, with opportunities to discuss learning facilitated by fortnightly Zoom calls. Much positive feedback was received from participants.

It is intended to launch and develop a new training programme in the spring of 2025, which is more specifically geared to the needs of Worship 24/7 Network.

Financial Statements

A bookkeeping system exists, overseen by our Administrator. This provides accountability for local Furnaces to raise finances (through free will offerings at monthly worship events and regular giving via standing order). Funds raised are deposited in the shared bank account and registered within a 'virtual sub account.' The same account and bookkeeping system is also used to manage other corporate activities such as Discipleship Schools, Missions trips and the annual Summit.

An annual subscription of £120 is requested from each Community. This covers central administrative costs such as the Administrator's stipend and licence fees, for example, and is transferred from each Community's 'sub account' in April each year.

The Burn 24-7 as an organisation

The Burn 24-7 UK operates primarily in the United Kingdom, with links with churches and Christian organisations both in the UK and internationally. In particular, Burn 24-7 UK relates to the Burn 24-7 as a global movement, operating in several nations worldwide including the USA, continental Europe, especially Eastern Europe, India and South Africa. Burn 24-7 is a movement of burning hearts across the world returning to their first love for Jesus and then taking that love to the nations.

Local Burn Furnaces are at the heart of the movement. These are communities of passionate worshippers from different churches and denominations who unify around the presence of God for 'Burns' – regular extended times of worship and prayer.

Burn 24-7 UK started in 2009 and has grown since to around 25 Burns across the UK. The movement is growing as new Burn Furnaces are launched. There is a hunger stirring across the nation for the presence of God and to see night and day worship established.

Discipleship and training are carried out via the online 'Field Training' programme. We sometimes host a summer residential discipleship school and are looking to develop an apprenticeship programme.

Our UK missions arm is developing with local street outreaches and other, extended outreaches during large cultural or sporting events. We also facilitate mission trips overseas, primarily via our links with people in Cyprus and the Middle East.

Within the United Kingdom an organisational structure has developed to provide this largely 'grassroots' movement with effective support for sustainable growth. Local Furnaces have at least one Director ultimately responsible for pioneering it with the Holy Spirit's help. Directors are strongly encouraged to prioritise the development of a local team that will share the vision and bring different skills to bear on its fulfillment. During the reporting period, Local Furnace Directors were supported by a National Core Leadership Team, which included the National Directors, and a wider Leader Team comprising Regional Directors, an Administrator and others providing additional support for areas such as evangelism and overseas mission, and discipleship and training.

The Burn24-7 as a charity

The charity was established in 2017 in support of the wider aims of the organisation. Being registered as a charity provides a context within which good practice can be applied to financial accountability and social responsibility. As such the board of Trustees aims to meet at least quarterly. These meetings take place online, to accommodate the constraints of one Trustee living overseas. They allow Trustees to review finances, risk management, legal issues and other matters affecting the charitable company. In setting our objectives and planning our activities, the Trustees have regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

Objectives, activities and achievements

The objectives of the charity are:

- The advancement of the Christian faith;
- The stirring of prayer and worship within the wider church;
- The facilitation of mission and evangelism in the UK and wider.

Local Furnaces

Local Furnaces are at the heart of Burn 24-7. We are convinced that everything in life should flow from a place of first love for God. There are currently around twenty-five Burn furnaces in the UK, with interest being expressed about more starting. During the reporting period a Burn Furnace in Teesside was relaunched and is pioneering a highly successful model of worshipping in each of six defined areas in the borough for two consecutive months before moving on.

There is a variety in the level of activity, depending on where each local Furnace is in its development process, but the majority consistently hold extended (at least three hours, often more) worship and prayer times, with sessions led by worship leaders representing the church across their locality. Burn 24-7 UK has a rising profile within the UK church, which is helping connections with local leaders, and an increasing sense of favour for what we are doing. We love to partner with other parts of the body of Christ, and our Directors are often found supporting other similar ventures under those ventures' own banners.

The reporting period saw local Burn Furnaces explore new opportunities for gathered corporate worship after the restrictions of the Covid-19 pandemic were lifted. Most local Burn Furnaces have ceased all forms of live-streaming and have enjoyed supporting local churches in facilitating live worship events once more.

National Initiatives

As a national movement, we gathered regularly online throughout the reporting period, including monthly meetings of the Core Leadership Team and regular national and regional calls, open to Furnace Directors and members of local teams, to provide updates and opportunities to pray together and support one another.

In addition:

- In July-August 2022 Burn 24-7 UK facilitated 336 hours of unbroken worship and prayer during the Birmingham Commonwealth Games, partnering with local churches and ministries such as YWAM, Firestarters and Healing on the Streets. Various missional activities took place during each day. We were grateful to Elim Life Centre, Pheasey, for the provision of a venue, encouraged by feedback from local partners about the efficacy of what we were doing during the event, and excited about ongoing connections with church leaders in Birmingham who are eager to explore ongoing expressions of unified extended worship and prayer in the city.
- In August 2022 many local Directors and Team members choose to attend the 'David's Tent' worship festival in West Sussex, and an informal Burn 24-7 gathering was held onsite during the event.
- In September 2022 we held a weekend in-person Summit at The Poplars in Ledbury. This was attended by nearly all UK Furnace Directors and others interested in finding out more about the movement.
- In November 2022 the Burn UK Core Team was able to gather in Chester for a day of prayer, fellowship and planning.
- In January 2023 we began the year with three days of prayer and fasting, with daily prayer calls hosted by different Regional Directors. This culminated in an extended Zoom call which involved people from across the UK and overseas.

Overseas mission trips:

- A missions trip to Cyprus and Bethlehem took place in June 2022. In Cyprus the Burn partnered with a team from YWAM (Youth With A Mission) in outreach during the Kataklysmos Festival in Larnaca. In Bethlehem, our primary partnership was with local Christians already known to us, and their contacts. Future trips to these places and others are anticipated.
- In addition, Burn 24-7 UK paid for our missions director to participate in a Burn 24-7 Global missions trip to Iraq during the year.

Equipping and Training

We are committed to building people up to be able to fulfill the calling to love God and love the world He loves. To this end we run several initiatives aimed at equipping believers through the word and practical engagement.

Worship and Missions School

In July 2022, a Worship and Missions School was held at The Poplars in Ledbury. This was attended by a total of around 30 people including staff, students and visiting speakers. It was a wonderful time of training and equipping in worship and evangelism, in advance of our Commonwealth Games Burn and outreach activities. Most of the people who attended the School participated in the Commonwealth Games Burn in some way.

Burn 24-7 Apprenticeship

This is a year's programme with lots of hands on application and personal mentoring towards gaining practical leadership and ministry skills. Field Training (see below) forms part of the apprenticeship programme.

During 2022-3, we had two apprentices attached to the Durham Burn Furnace and its associated House of Prayer.

Field Training

This is an online course developed by the Burn 24-7 global community with an orientation towards establishing people in Burn 24-7 core values and principles. Field Training is recommended to local Burn furnace directors and members of their teams, and is open and available to anyone interested in developing a fuller understanding of the worship and prayer movement. In the UK, anyone considering launching a new Burn Furnace is strongly encouraged to complete the Field Training course as part of their discernment process.

During the report period, further revisions to course materials were made by Robin and Claire Dillamore, who oversaw the course globally. Teaching and learning takes place via pre-recorded videos, Bible study, and required reading by a wide variety of authors. The course includes opportunities for differentiation, such as resources for 'going deeper' in areas of study and suggestions for extended reading.

In the UK, 2022-3 saw another highly successful mentoring group run with a British leader. This group worked through the materials together at a manageable pace, with opportunities to discuss learning facilitated by fortnightly Zoom calls. Much positive feedback was received from participants.

Financial Statements

A bookkeeping system exists, overseen by our Administrator. This provides accountability for local Furnaces to raise finances (through free will offerings at monthly burns and regular giving via standing order). Funds raised are deposited in the shared bank account and registered within a 'virtual sub account.' The same account and bookkeeping system is also used to manage other corporate activities such as Discipleship Schools, Missions trips and the annual Summit.

Following a period of consultation with Furnace Directors, a new subscription-based Finance Model was implemented in April 2022. An annual subscription of £120 is requested from each Furnace. This covers central administrative costs such as the Administrator's stipend and licence fees, for example, and is transferred from each Furnace's 'sub account' in April each year.

In addition, each Furnace is invited to make voluntary donations to centralised Burn funds. These and other generous donations enable us to subsidise missions trips, provide travel expenses (e.g. for our Missions Director), and to offer bursaries for different events, for example. As a charity we monitor the payments received and will claim gift aid where it is appropriate.

The reporting period saw an easing of restrictions on in-person gatherings as the Covid-19 pandemic entered its second year. These changes brought about different responses from local Burn Furnaces as some embraced the opportunities to gather in physical spaces and navigated the challenges posed by mask-wearing and restrictions on singing, for example. Other Furnaces continued to worship online whilst some adopted a 'blended' approach, meeting in-person whilst live-streaming events for the benefit of those who were unable to attend. Many local Directors reported similar experiences of attendees hugely appreciating the social spaces Burns facilitated, as well as the opportunity to worship together again. Several also commented on the sense that people needed to 'relearn' how to worship and rediscover confidence in singing and being in close proximity to others.

National Initiatives

As a national movement, we gathered regularly online throughout the reporting period.

Furnace Directors participated in calls, some regional and some national. In addition:

- In August 2021, many local Directors and Team members choose to attend the 'David's Tent' worship festival in West Sussex. Burn 24-7 UK was able to host a session in a large marquee; this represented the first opportunity for a national gathering since the Covid-19 pandemic.
- In October 2021, we held a weekend in-person Summit at The Poplars in Ledbury. This was attended by nearly all UK Furnace Directors. All attendees were asked to provide proof of Covid-19 vaccination or a negative Covid-19 test which enabled us to gather in a Covid-safe environment. This was the first opportunity to gather as a national Movement since Robin and Claire Dillamore became National Directors. It was a precious time of connecting and reconnecting, worshipping together, teaching, learning and resting, and was hugely appreciated by all who attended.
- In December 2021, the Burn UK Core Team was able to gather in Chester for a day of prayer, fellowship and planning.

The course now includes opportunities for differentiation, such as resources for 'going deeper' in areas of study and suggestions for extended reading.

In the UK, 2021-22 saw a highly successful mentoring group run with a British leader, who has now been added to our National Leadership Team. This group worked through the materials together at a manageable pace, with every student who began graduating the course. Much positive feedback was received from participants.

Development of this model in the UK and USA is anticipated, as is further development of the teaching and learning materials, including translation for non-English speakers.

Financial Statements

A bookkeeping system exists, overseen by our Administrator. This provides accountability for local Furnaces to raise finances (through free will offerings at monthly burns and regular giving via standing orders). Funds raised are deposited in the shared bank account and registered within a 'virtual sub account.' An annual donation of 10% is recommended from each furnace to help cover 'generic costs', such as

paying for the cost of bookkeeping. As a charity we monitor the payments received and will claim gift aid where it is appropriate. During the reporting period, a consultation involving Trustees, Burn UK Core Team and UK Furnace Directors took place to establish a new subscription-based Finance Mode; this will be implemented from April 2022.

This account and bookkeeping system is also used to manage other corporate activities such as Hillside. Missions trips and the annual Summit.

The Trustees are usually responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In the year ended 31 March 2022, the charity's annual income was below the threshold at which an independent examination becomes a requirement. Structure, governance and management

Governing document

THE BURN 24-7 UNITED KINGDOM is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 13 Jun 2017.

The Burn 24-7 as an organisation

The Burn 24-7 - UK operates primarily in the United Kingdom, with links with churches and Christian organisations both in the UK and internationally. In particular, Burn 24-7 UK relates very strongly to the Burn 24-7 as a global movement, operating in over thirty countries worldwide, in around 300 locations. Burn 24-7 is a movement of burning hearts across the world returning to their first love for Jesus and then taking that love to the nations.

Local Burn Furnaces are at the heart of the movement. These are communities of passionate worshippers from across different churches and denominations who unify around the presence of God for 'Burns' – extended times of worship and prayer which take place on a regular basis.

Burn 24-7 UK started in 2009 and has grown since to around 30 Burns across the UK. The movement is growing as new Burn Furnaces are launched. There is a hunger stirring across the nation for the presence of God and to see night and day worship established.

Discipleship and training is carried out via the online 'Field Training' programme. We also have an annual residential discipleship school, Hillside Intensive, and an apprenticeship programme.

Our UK missions arm is developing with regular outreaches to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, via the 'Love Project' to a large pagan festival, and other local street outreach. In the past we have sent several mission trips overseas e.g. to refugee camps in Northern France and in India. Through our wider connections with the Burn 24-7 Global we are currently involved in supporting a missions base in Northern Iraq.

Within the United Kingdom an organisational structure has developed to provide this largely 'grassroots' movement effective support for sustainable growth. Local Furnaces have at least one Director ultimately responsible for pioneering it with the Holy Spirit's help. Directors are strongly encouraged to prioritise the development of a local team that will share the vision and bring different skills to bear on its fulfillment. Local Furnace Directors are supported by a National Leadership Team which includes the National Director, five Regional Directors, an Administrator and others providing

additional support for areas such as evangelism and overseas mission, technology and social media.

The Burn 24-7 as a charity

The charity was established in 2017 in support of the wider aims of the organisation. Being registered as a charity provides a context within which good practice can be applied to financial accountability and social responsibility. As such the board of Trustees aims to meet at least quarterly and, within the constraints of one Trustee living overseas, to make two of these meetings face to face. These meetings are to allow Trustees to review the finances, risk management, legal issues and other matters affecting the charitable company.

In setting our objectives and planning our activities, the Trustees have regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

Trustees added

In November 2020, James Waters, Robin Mark Dillamore and Jocelyn Claire Dillamore were added as Trustees.

Objectives, activities and achievements

The objectives of the charity are:

- The advancement of the Christian faith;
- The stirring of prayer and worship within the wider church;
- The facilitation of mission and evangelism in the UK and wider.

Local Furnaces

Local Furnaces are at the heart of the Burn 24-7. There are around thirty Burn furnaces in the UK, with more being added every year. We are convinced that everything in life should flow from a place of first love for God.

There is a variety in the level of activity, depending on where each local Furnace is in its development process, but the majority consistently hold extended (at least six hours, often more) worship and prayer times, with sessions led by worship leaders representing the church across their locality. Burn 24-7 UK has a rising profile within the UK church, which is helping connections with local leaders, and an increasing sense of favour for what we are doing. We love to partner with other parts of the body of Christ, and our Directors are often found supporting other similar ventures under those ventures' own banners.

The Covid-19 pandemic continued throughout the reporting period. Lockdowns and other restrictions on in-person gatherings brought about different responses from local Burn Furnaces. Some entered a period of sabbatical and reflection whilst others continued to worship regularly online using platforms such as Zoom, StreamYard and Facebook. Responses to online worship were mixed; benefits included the opportunity for believers to 'attend' Burns without geographical limitations but many found it difficult to engage actively (e.g. in singing and dancing).

National Initiatives

As a national movement, we gathered regularly online throughout the reporting period. Furnace Directors participated in calls, some regional and some national. In addition:

- In September 2020, we held an online 'Summit' – a day of worship and prayer. This also provided the opportunity to welcome Robin and Claire Dillamore as new National Directors, and to celebrate with James Waters as he stepped down from the role.
- In January 2021 we began the year with a week of prayer and fasting, culminating in a 24-hour online 'Burn' which involved people from across the UK and overseas.
- In February 2021 we held a national 12-hour online 'Burn'.
- Leaders within Burn UK shared responsibility for leading weekly prayer calls.

Burn 24-7 UK Missions

Burn 24-7 UK Missions seeks to:

- See the restoration of the UK as a great sending nation of long and short-term missions
- Train and equip local Burns across the UK to become missional – activating them in local, supernatural outreach
- Plant Furnaces of worship all over the world, bringing worship to the darkest places

Equipping and Training

We are committed to building people up to be able to fulfill the calling to love God and love the world He loves. To this end we run several initiatives aimed at equipping believers through the word and practical engagement.

Hillside Intensive

- As a result of Covid-19 restrictions it was not possible to run Hillside Intensive in the summer of 2020

Burn 24-7 Apprenticeship

This is a year's programme with lots of hands on application and personal mentoring towards gaining practical leadership and ministry skills. Field Training (see below) forms part of the apprenticeship programme.

In 2020-21, we had one apprentice attached to the Durham Burn Furnace and its associated House of Prayer.

Field Training

This is an online course developed by the Burn 24-7 global community with an orientation towards establishing people in the Burn 24-7 DNA.

During the report period Field Training was significantly redeveloped by the global team so that it changed from a 9-month distance learning approach, with guided mentoring and assessment, to an 8 module self-paced approach with support offered via social media. Teaching and learning takes place via pre-recorded videos, Bible study, and required reading by a wide variety of authors. Modules included: Biblical Foundations of the worship and prayer movement; revival history; missions; and practical teaching on how to build a team and lead a successful Burn Furnace.

Field Training is recommended to local Burn furnace directors and members of their teams and is open and available to anyone interested in developing a fuller understanding of the worship and prayer movement.

Some of the challenges for UK students in accessing this course were overcome during 2020-21. A pilot mentoring groups was established within Burn UK, with a British leader. This group worked through the materials together at a manageable pace and proved to be successful. Development of this model, and of the teaching and learning materials is anticipated in the future.
