Divine Love Christian Assembly Luton Trustees' Report

Aim and purposes

The Divine Love Christian Assembly Luton, (DLCA) trustee board has a responsibility for the advancement of the Christian religion in the United Kingdom for the benefit of the public through the holding of prayer meetings, lectures, public celebration of Christian festivals and producing/distributing literature on Christian faith to enlighten others about the Christian religion. The DLCA Luton trustee board is also specifically responsible for ensuring the availability of places of worship and particularly the current rented premises at Sundon Village Hall.

Objectives and Activities

The DLCA Luton trustee board is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church and to become part of our parish community at DLCA Luton. The trustee board maintains an overview of worship and prayer in the local area of Luton. Ministers within the trustee board invite and liaise with other Christian groups and ministries in the United Kingdom and abroad to ensure that the local community benefits from the preaching of the Word.

When planning our activities for the year, the incumbent and the DLCA Luton trustee board have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit and, particularly the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. We try to encourage and enable ordinary people to follow the teachings of the Word of God as written in the Bible and to have the liberty to practice their faith through the following:

- Prayer and worship to the Lord Jesus Christ
- Developing the community faith and trust in Jesus through knowledge.
- Provision of pastoral care for people living within the local community.
- Carrying out missionary and outreach work.

Achievements and Performance

Worship and prayer

The DLCA are keen to offer a range of services during the week and over the course of the year and our community find this both beneficial and spiritually fulfilling. Every Friday evening the minister presides over worship and prayer.

This service provides an opportunity for the community to reflect and be intimate with their creator after exhortation from the minister.

This is the fourth year for the registered charity and church membership is still comparatively small. The church continued to host sister Christian groups for Sunday worship for the benefit of members and the community. This provided a welcome environment for unity and brotherly love and kindness which are very necessary to build good communities. The church was also able to host visiting parishioners and offer spiritual help through counselling and prayer.

The DLCA also enhanced fellowship through instituting communion service once every two months. This communion service has provided members to reflect on humility and service to one another.

The church made changes on Sunday school lessons by including adults in the children and youth classes. This improved the whole church in their knowledge of the bible and aspired all to be better Christians and good members of the community. The Sunday school is a welcome forum for the young people to discuss and study the bible by sharing lessons and experiences. The young people have shown great enjoyment of this part of the DLCA service.

The DLCA also conducted outreach services mainly in Luton City centre. The open street outreach was an opportunity for those going about their Saturday shopping to hear the gospel freely with least interference to their daily chores.

The DLCA also distributed scripture leaflets as part of the community service. The church has made efforts to welcome more new families and has instituted programmes and preaching services that cater for the different needs within the old and new families. One other need for the families is the baptism of young children as they reach the age of accountability. It is hoped that more people will be baptised as efforts to spread the gospel continue. No baptisms were reported in the year under review due to the need to enhance the Christian experience and more witnessing in the community.

In addition, a great deal of time, thought and research was spent sharing and conducting message tape services and worship sessions on Sundays. These tape services continue to be of immense benefit to the parishioners and many have commented well on the benefits of hearing these pre-recorded messages. Many have appreciated the fact that these messages have also been made available on line and are available free of charge.

The DLCA welcomes everyone to our Friday evening prayer service and our Sunday worship service. There are at present 20 parishioners on the electoral roll. Five members left to join other fellowship groups in the year. The average weekly attendance counted during the month of October was 20. This number however increased during revival meetings when additional chairs had to be arranged for the increased number of attendees.

Board of Trustees.

The trustee board has three members. The board acts as an important link between church and other external bodies which would be conducting business with DLCA Luton. One trustee resigned from the board and was immediately replaced by another one.

Sundon Village Hall.

Although Sundon Village Hall is used for many other activities, it has remained to be reserved for DLCA Luton every Sunday, Friday evening and every New Year's Eve. Relations with the Sundon Village Hall management are very cordial, and liaison is currently through e mails and the occasional Sunday morning liaison visits. The wood flooring showed signs of wear during the year and the trustee board advised the management to attend to the repairs. This was done promptly and the hall is now in a good state. The two fridges in the kitchen were also replaced with new ones.

Pastoral Care

The church service is divided into a Sunday school service and the main preaching service. While the Sunday school is aimed at the children and young people, it is being attend by the whole church because of the nature of the various bible lessons discussed during the class. During the year under review a total of eight children attended the Sunday school classes. We were particularly pleased to be able to offer bible lessons to the enthusiastic group and their individual contributions made the whole experience very rewarding. Br Bare would give lessons reflecting on the good characters of the bible and the different experiences of many of the characters which help mould good behaviour in young people.

The church elder Brother Bare has taken it upon himself to continue providing transport for those members who need transport assistance. Assistance in rent payments was also provided for some desperate members. The year has been a very busy one in offering encouragement to the discouraged and bringing relief to the depressed.

DLCA teamed up with The Revealed Word Fellowship in Wolverhampton for revival meetings in new premises acquired by the Wolverhampton fellowship. The group stayed at a hotel for three days and had wonderful fellowship with other believers. The three-day excursion helped to reinforce bonds of friendship, fellowship and humble service to one another as well as offering the atmosphere of rededication.

The DLCA fellowship organised a church retreat in Yorkshire Center Parks. This was designed to cement our bonds and improve our spiritual well-being and experiences.

Some members of our fellowship are not able to attend church services due to sickness and other reasons beyond their control. Brother Bare visited those members in need of support and together with other members celebrated communion in the homes.

Mission and Evangelism

DLCA Luton continued to uphold the values of giving and living for one another. The fellowship believes in the continuation of the Book of Acts where the spirit of God was always present among the believers. During the year under review DLCA Luton continued to support missionary work by giving financial contributions to Voice of God. Most of the support is directed to the needy believers in Africa, South America and other poor countries. A total of £845.00 was donated to this cause.

It is our desire as the DLCA to spread the gospel starting from the local area of Luton and spreading as far as the Word would reach. During the year the church continued to carry out outreach street witnessing and tract distribution in Luton town city centre. This exercise has been growing with each foray. The church printed gospel tracts and posters for distribution during the witnessing.

Relationships with other churches.

DLCA is an independent Christian group which links closely with other Pentecostal and believers in the original scriptures. As a non-denominational church, we welcome and wish to fellowship with all who call themselves Christians. We continue to hold combined meetings with other churches both in Luton and further afield. Revival meetings were held with the Revealed Word Church in Wolverhampton. DLCA Luton was also able to go to Rotherham to fellowship with the Voice of God outreach programme.

Humanitarian Aid

The cyclone Idai disaster which ravaged the southern African countries of Malawi, Mozambique and Zimbabwe was of major concern to DLCA. The charity mobilised relief in the form of second hand clothing and funds and forwarded to the groups in the three countries affected. Funds were channeled through Voice of God (Malawi), Pastor Elias Mtisi in Chimanimani, Zimbabwe and Pastor Pedro Charles Biera in Mozambique.

Financial Review

Donations received during the year were £18,130 Charitable expenditure was £24,935, with governance costs only being £400. The deficit for the year was £7205. The trustees agreed to give a £15,000 donation to another church in Halifax during the year, hence the reason for the current year deficit.

Reserves policy

It is DLCA policy to maintain a balance on unrestricted funds (if possible), which equates to at least three months unrestricted payments, equivalent to £18000, to cover emergency situations and off-site functions and activities that may arise from time to time. The trust account closed the year with a balance of £25,402

Volunteers

We would like to thank all the volunteers who work so hard to make our church the lively and vibrant community that it is. Special mention must be made of Andrew Mlundira who took over the Sunday School bible teaching. We would also like to make a special mention of our church band whose contribution during outreach services has been immense.

The church band has been a wonderful component of our Sunday worship services as well. I would also like to thank the elder sisters for their unwavering support and contribution in making food for visitors and entertaining strangers.

Structure, governance and management.

The method of appointment of the trustee board is set out in the DLCA Luton Constitution. At DLCA Luton membership consists of a trustee board of at least three persons. The leader of the church is also a member of the trustee board. Deacons are elected by the members of the congregation whose membership is determined by their attendance to worship services.

The trustee board is responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the church including deciding on how the funds of the church are spent.

The trustee board met three times during the year with a 100% attendance. The trustee board is presently in charge of all church programmes due to the present small size of membership. Duties will be delegated to committees as the church grows.

Public benefit

Each of the activities mentioned above has a direct benefit to parts of the general public.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Reduced donations

General risks include an economic downturn in the country which might affect the generality of the church and thereby affecting the donors' giving.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities



The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to the Financial Statements
For the year ended 31st January 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**Accounting convention**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the statement of recommended practice: Accounting and Reporting by charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and with the Charities Act 2011

Financial reporting standard number 1

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charity qualifies as a small charity.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under the headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Depreciation

This is provided at 20% reducing balance on all fixtures and fittings

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restriction arises when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
